What Blood Can Do

Most people think of blood in terms of whole blood transfusion, and most blood is used in that manner. But blood given through Red Cross may aid you or your friends or relatives in a variety of other ways too.

At present, whole blood may be used in transfusion for 21 days after donation. After that, it is converted into one of several derivatives or "fractions," which serve a number of vital health needs.

One of the derivatives is serum albumin, which is used for fighting shock. One unit has five times the shock-fighting effect as the same volume of plasma. Serum albumin is helpful in treating cirrhosis of the liver and certain kidney diseases and also is used in treating malnutrition due to surgery or disease where the amount of blood serum protein is low.

Gamma globulin, another fraction, is used to prevent serious after-effects from measles. It gives the same kind of protection against some forms of jaundice or infectious hepatitis and is given to children deficient in this infection-fighting element

A special kind of gamma globulin, vaccinia imnune globulin, is used to treat rare but virulent complications of reactions to smallpox vaccinations.

Fibringers is the substance that helps plot the blood. It is used to cases of hemorrhage during child birth and other cases of severe bleeding.

Plasma, the liquid part of the blood, has many ses. For example fresh frozen plasma is used in the treatment of hemophilia. In these cases, a cut or scratch or tooth extraction can cause a person to bleed to death. The administration of fresh frozen plasma, rich in antihemophilic globulin, speeds up clotting time, making the time more nearly normal. With repeated doses, the hemophiliac can be prepared for tooth extractions and even major operations.

Red cells are very valuable for the treatment of anemia.



Highway Safety Is Mainly Up To the States

By RAY FARKAS

WASHINGTON (UPI) - Everybody talks about traffic safety even the President. But it is mostly up to the states to do mething about it.

President Kennedy, who has his own committee on traffic safetees for new officers . The ty, recently said the matter was ne that "affects everybody.

The states are giving the subject increasing attention. For example, figures supplied by the National Highway Users Conferislation in 1961 strengthening standards for motor car equip-

Seven states — Georgia, Kan-sas, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah and Washington - tightened licensing laws to require that driver applicants submit their driving records in their last state

Though no states enacted new vehicle inspection laws. five took it under study.

Oklahoma and New Hampshire set up departments specifically concerned with safety.

Eight states put laws on their ooks relating to driver education and restricted licenses for drivers under 18. The trend in almost every instance was toward requiring completion of a driver educa-tion course before licensing.

Three states made it tougher on drivers who drink by enacting chemical test laws. Five others strengthened their existing laws. Five states upped the minimum insurance coverage its drivers must carry.

Turn signals, headlights and the lighting of vehicles was the ubject of legislation in 14 states. . Reflectors. flares and fuses. brake fluid — name it. Some state legislatures made these require-

Even the obvious wasn't overlooked.

Florida made it legislatively clear that drivers must keep their cars on the right hand side of the road when approaching a rail road crossing.

And Maine took action against

another problem, though it may not rank as the worst in the annals of traffic safety. It prohibited driving in reverse on a one-

Correct Spray Fixes the Coif

CHICAGO (UPI) - Hold that can of hair spray at least seven inches away from the head, the experts advise.

In this way, you spray on a fine, atomized mist that keeps the hair soft and lustrous without stiffness and avoids the formation of beads and droplets of spray on the hair.

Researchers for one of the aerosol packaging companies (G the hair, however lightly, into place after each application of spray. This precaution serves to keep the apray from forming a dulling film.

For bleached or tinted hair, they advised using a gentle-type waving lotion - one that will soften as it dries. Also recommended for tinted hair is a special conditioning rinse designed to counteract the tendency of color-treated hair to be porous dry and brittle.

Finally, there really is a difference between hair sprays for ordinary and hard-to-hold hair. say the experts. The sprays for hard-to-hold hair contain antistatic ingredients which tend to keep fine, "fly-away" hair in





ST, JOSEPH'S PARISH First Mass was said in Slaton on December 8, 1911 by the Rev. Joseph Reisdorff who came here from Putnam. Texas. At that time there were only two Catholic families in the Slaton territory, the Frank Simnachers and the A. L. Hoffmans. These families went to Amarillo to make their Easter duty, a distance then of about 175 miles.

The Santa Fe Railroad donated the land for a Catholic church, the deed being dated Dec. 12, 1911.

Father Reisdorff moved here in 1912 and lived in the Sacristy. Soon Catholic families began to move in, among them the Kittens, Millers, and Heilers, all of German descent and all from the state of Nebraska, The first church was erected in February 1912. It was a small frame structure about 28x 16 ft, with two 12x10 rooms in back as living quarters. The cost of approximately \$1,500 was paid by Western Land Co.

The second church was built on the land which J. S. Edwards had donated for school purposes. Gas heaters and plumbing was installed in 1927 This building was destroyed by fire in May 1956, A new school building had been begun in April and was completed in August of that same year, the cost approximating \$87,000. The building burned just one week before the close of school,



Texas Crime Rate Rises

The Texas Department of Public Safety reports that major crime in Texas increased 2,2 per cent in 1961 over 1960, with an estimated total of 203, -285 offenses for the year com- tatoes, green beans, apricot pared to 198,956 in 1960.

Murder and homicide was up 0.7 per cent, rape increased 5,7 per cent, robbery de- lish peas, celery sticks, fruit creased 16,5 per cent, burglary salad, cranberry sauce, was down 6.7 per cent, aggravated assault increased 0,3 per cent, theft increased eight percent, and auto theft was down 0.8 per cent.

Murder and homicide was up from 1,080, rape was up from 1,196 to 1,264, robbery was down from 3,560 to 2,974, burglary was down from 56,976 to 53,149, aggravated assault was up from 12,128 to 12,166 theft was up from 108,869 to 117,619, and auto theft was down from 15,147 to 15,025,

"The totals for 1961 mean that one major crime was committed in Texas every three minutes, there was a murder every eight hours, a rape every seven hours, a robbery every three hours, an aggravated assault every 43 minutes, a theft every four and one-half mintues, and an auto theft every 35 minutes," Col. Homer Garrison Jr., DPS Director, said.

"They also indicate approximately a 60 per cent increase in major crimes in our State since 1955 -- an increase which far outstrips the population increase during this period."







Paul Desrochers at Republican State Headquarters said, "We're working like mad to get a primary in every county." Two obstacles stand in the way: Getting funds in about 235 counties where the party has county chairmen, and getting chairmen for the other 19 counties.
