





### **METROPOLITAN LUBBOCK ?**

Is Slaton a part of the Lubbock Metropolitan area? The recent census report as published in a Lubbock paper claims that it is, as it does the communities of Idalou, Abernathy, Ralls and several other area towns.

That a city as large as Lubbock is nearby has its advantages and disadvantages to a growing community and it is evident that Slaton is progressing in many ways as the last census count shows.

The report for 1950 gives our poulation as 5,036 and the 1960 count as 6,554, which is a gain of a few over 1,500. Not impressive, but a healthy showing that means we are prosperous but not as overburdened with inflation as some areas and not in an area that is losing ground.

Perhaps our business development would have been greater had our town been a little further away from Lubbock than it is, but it is also true that the competition of the firms in Lubbock has kept our Slaton merchants more in line with lower prices because the competition in Lubbock is a healthy condition.

With the city limits of Lubbock and Slaton only nine miles aparts there is no denying that Slaton is a part of the Lubbock metropolitan area. Webster's dictionary gives metropolitan as a large city that is the mother city to communities in its area. We must give Lubbock such a title, but it is doubtful that there are many people who live in Slaton who desire Slaton to become a part of Lubbock.

It would not be a very big bite for our fast expanding neighbor to the north to gobble us up as it has several budding communities in the past.
