## VFW AUXILIARY NAMED AS TOP CLUB

### Payne, Mrs. Reasoner Cited

A favorable appraisal of the past year and an optimistic outlook for the new year highlighted the 40th annual Slaton chamber of commerce banquet here Monday night.

An abundance of humor, installation of new officers, sound advice and rewards for outstanding service—preceded by good food—took the spotlight.

The theme, "Cotton Is King," could have been replaced by Community Service as three distinguished awards were presented by last year's winners, Dr. Glenn B. Payne, Slaton physician for the past 20 years, was named Slaton's outstanding citizen. The award was presented by Don Kendrick.

Mrs. Earl Reasoner, with credentials in service organizations as impressive as can be found, was given the plaque as the outstanding Slaton woman. Mrs. M. H. Lasater made the presentation.

The VFW auxiliary was the recipient of the distinguished organization award. Master of Ceremonies H. M. (Bud) Englund presented the award to the president, Mrs. Frances Clements.

Dr. Payne's selection was based on "service to humanity." In making the presentation, Kendrick told the overflow banquet audience of 225 persons, "Dr. Payne is known for his service to his fellowman. He is a man who may be called upon at any hour—regardless of their ability to pay for his services."

"His workday often extends 15-18 hours per day," Kendrick said. He serves as Slaton city health officer and is known for his charity work—including the Well Baby Clinic.

The 49-year-old physician—a man of few words—appeared deeply touched as he faced the audience. His was the shortest speech of the evening, but it was perhaps the most meaningful as he humbly said, "Thank you."

Mrs. Reasoner, wife of a farmer-city commissioner, was noted as successfully combining homemaking and community service.

Mrs. Reasoner choked back tears as the long list of her accomplishments was read. She is a member and Deaconess of the First Christian Church here. She is church historian and chairman of World Outreach and Christian Action and Community Service for the church.

She teaches an adult Sunday school class and is a member of the building committee. She is a member of the official church board and president of the Christian Women's Fellowship.

The winner is district secretary of the Christian

## URGES CHAMBER SPEAKER

### Attitude Key To Success

"Faith, courage and hard work will make life blossom like a rose." This was the advice given by Grand Prairie banker Lee D. Herring in his principal address at the chamber of commerce banquet Monday night.

Herring stayed strictly to his formula of two-thirds humor and one-third serious talk as he brought down the house with his "baptist and family jokes."

Other speeches were made by Jim Hughes and Q. G. (Speedy) Hoffman as Hughes handed the new president the reins of the organization for 1966.

"It is impossible to deceive people. You must have enthusiasm. Those whose light shines the brightest are those who are doing the most," Herring said.

Herring said the leaders of Slaton are on the right track. "Attitude of the people and the community is the most important thing. You're not going to get anything without going for it."

He said in order for a community to grow and gain industry, the people and community must first be willing to sell themselves. "Complacency is a bed-fellow with laziness. Chamber work does take time and it takes everybody."

"You have to believe in your

## Adult Education Classes Organized

Inclement weather Tuesday night resulted in a disappointing attendance at the organizational meeting of Slaton's basic adult education program.

Supt. Dr. P. L. Vardy, coordinator of the program, said 24 persons attended the meeting at the high school and expressed an interest in the program.

Two regular class periods were established. One class will meet at Austin school on Monday and Thursday nights

while classes will be conducted at Evans school on Tuesday and Friday nights. The sessions begin at 7 p.m. and will last approximately two and one-half hours.

Doctor Vardy stressed that any person interested in enrolling in the program may do so at any time. The program will continue through June.

Four teachers have been announced for the program. They are Mr. and Mrs. Marion F. Swisher, Stephanie Elder and Mrs. Vera Sexton. Doctor Vardy said additional classes and teachers will be added as the need demands.

Purpose of the program is to provide basic education to persons over 18 years of age. It is designed to help these people deal more efficiently with everyday problems.

Instruction will be provided at the three grade levels: Those who have not completed the third grade, those who have not

## SNOW COVERS AREA

An estimated 2 inches of snow left a blanket of white over the area Tuesday night, bringing smiles to the faces of farmers who were eager for some form of moisture. The snowfall reached the area shortly before 11 p.m. Tuesday night, and weathermen were predicting more snow on the way to the Panhandle and South Plains. A freezing drizzle preceded the snowfall Tuesday night. A light rain or drizzle was predicted Wednesday.

The "surprise" snowstorm had Slaton residents sweeping walks, scraping ice off car windshields, and driving with extra caution Wednesday morning. The snowfall was the "blanket of white" to cover Slaton in about two years, according to several local citizens.

The general snowfall covered the entire Panhandle and parts of the South Plains. Hazardous driving conditions were reported all over the area early Wednesday morning.

Forecasters reported a new storm on the way, with more snow predicted for the Panhandle and South Plains on Wednesday. The massive winter storm produced heavy snows along the southern Rockies.

## Poll Tax Sales Till Lagging

Less than two weeks remaining to purchase a poll tax for local elections, only a few persons have done so in Slaton, according to Mrs. F. Drewry, deputy tax assessor-collector.

Drewry said 250 poll

taxes have been sold and 20 exemptions have been issued. The slow pace is giving county officials some indication to expect a last minute rush for persons to obtain their permit to vote.

The \$1.75 poll tax will remain on sale until Jan. 31. In Slaton, the poll tax may be obtained from Mrs. Drewry at her office on the east side of the square.

1966 is an important election year for Slaton with three local residents already tossing their hat into the ring. Several county and state officials and the post of U. S. Senator

## Ministers Issue Statement On Sunday Funerals

Slaton's Ministerial Alliance this week issued a "clarification" of the organization's position concerning Sunday funerals.

Officials of the alliance felt there was some misunderstanding as to the intent of the proposal, and as to the origin of the matter.

"It was not proposed that the city forbid Sunday funerals," said Rev. Johnnie Moore, Alliance secretary. "This would be an encroachment on the rights of individuals and on churches in their free exercise of religion."

He added, however, that the alliance did request that a "ruling be made to close the city cemetery for the purposes of burial on Sundays."

The alliance had submitted a request to the city commission on the Sunday cemetery closing. At their last regular meeting Jan. 10, commissioners tabled the matter after a letter signed by three Slaton churches opposed the proposal.

The commission, however, apparently felt that such a ruling would, in effect, prohibit Sunday funerals if burial was planned in the city cemetery.

In their regular meeting this week, members of the alliance issued some statements concerning the issues of Sunday

## School Bond Election Called At Roosevelt

Voters in the Roosevelt School District, north of Slaton, will decide the fate of a \$100,000 bond election Saturday.

Absentee balloting is underway this week in the superintendent's office. Votes may be cast absentee from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. daily.

The bond issue has been called by the school board to construct eight classrooms as an addition to the present building.

School officials said there is a possibility the school will be built underground.

The school cited increased growth of the student body as the reason for the additional classrooms. Enrollment shot to 905 pupils this year. The school has experienced an 87 percent enrollment increase in the past nine years.

The school listed several reasons for considering an underground school. It would prevent the purchase of additional land and the building could serve as a shelter for the entire student body in case of an emergency.

Officials said the long range cost would be cheaper and would include benefits of a constant temperature, air-conditioning, savings on heat, and absence of noise distraction.

No tax rate increase is anticipated because of the building, officials said.

## Wilson School Head Resigns

Tom Harkey, Wilson Elementary School principal, resigned his post last week to accept a similar position with the Hereford school district.

The announcement was made by Supt. Leroy Scott. The superintendent said he is accepting applications for the post.

Harkey had been employed in the Wilson school system for two years. He is married to the former Joyce Church, a native of Wilson. The couple have two children, Gary Don, 4, and Joyce Lynn, 10 months. They are active in the Methodist Church.

office. There will not be a door-to-door campaign this year.

One organization has already contributed \$194.11 to the cause. Proceeds from a March of Dimes Dance sponsored by the Slaton GI Forum at the VFW Hall Saturday night were presented to Mrs. Robert Hopper, drive chairman, from Luis Quintero, chairman of the forum.

As chairman of the drive, Mrs. Hopper said "I am working toward a successful drive this year so every baby born in

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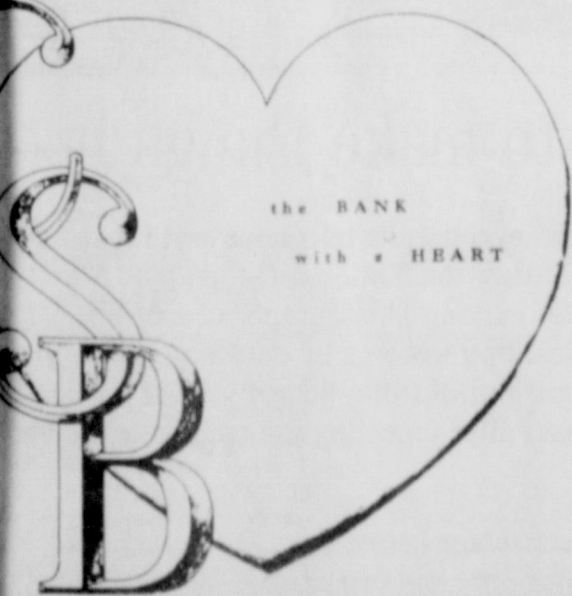

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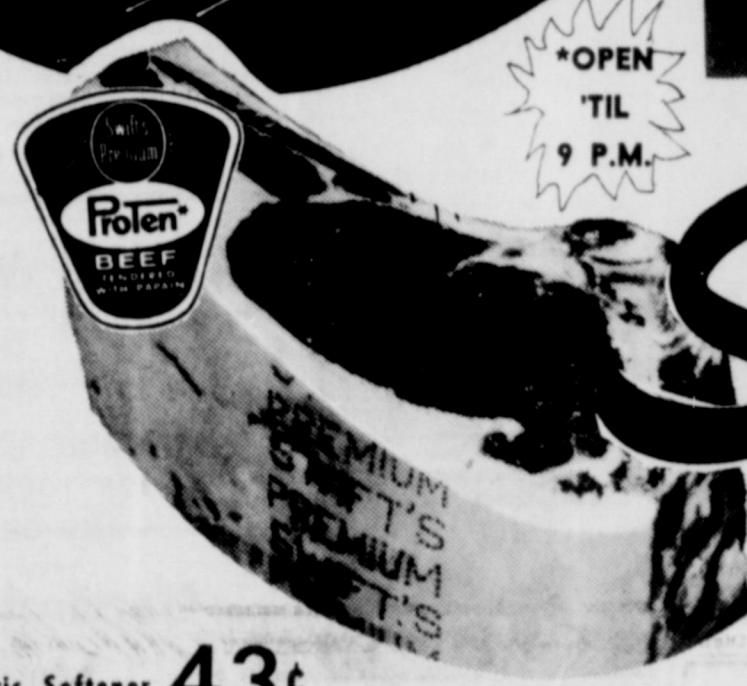

# Tigers Rebound To Claw Morton

The Slaton Tigers scalped the Morton Indians, 74-40, Tuesday night to keep their District 4-AA title hopes alive. The victory on the home court evened the conference record at 1-1.

Coach Tommy Laceywell's Tigers travel to Denver City for the big one Friday night in a game that could indicate the loop champion, Denver City is defending champion and favorite to repeat this season.

Tipoff time for the varsity game is 8 p.m. A B-team contest will start at 6:30 p.m. in the Mustang Gym.

The victory over the Indians was sweet revenge. The Morton quintet tied Slaton for second place in the district last sea-

son. The win pushed the win-loss record for the year to 16-2.

Senior Jack Mason was the leading scorer with 19 points. Two other Tigers were in the double columns. Freshman Richard Washington had 16 points while floorman Victor Cristian had 13 tallies.

Orin Smith, who dominated the boards Tuesday night, managed eight tallies. The other starter, John Henry Johnson, also had eight points. Doyle Etheridge, Dwayne Hall, Rodney Farrell, Pat Wheeler and Larry Pickens each made two points in the closing quarter.

Willie Moore was high point man for Morton with 10 points, Freddy Thomas had nine points

while Jimmy Joyce managed eight. Byron Willis accounted for five.

Slaton jumped off to an 18-8, lead at the end of the first period. Slaton extended the lead to 35-25 at intermission. Morton scored only five points in the third quarter and the Tigers led, 49-30, going into the finale.

Coach Doug Duncan's B-team pulled one out of the fire, crushing Morton, 43-41. The Tigers had a 42-31, lead going into the final quarter. The Kittens attempted to stall. Numerous steals on which the Tigers fouled narrowed the margin.

In the last quarter, Slaton committed six fouls. Of those free shots, the Indians converted six of nine attempts. The Tigers managed only one point during the period and that was a free toss by David Tucker.

J. B. White had 16 points for Slaton while Charles Fisher managed 12. David Tucker had six while Bernard Wall and Johnny Lakey pitched in four. For Morton, Johnny Black was the top shooter with 13 points. James Monroe had 11 for the visitors.

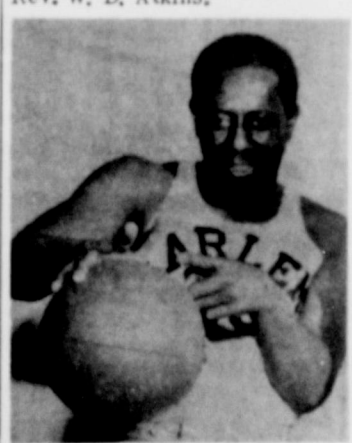

Slaton has the best chance to develop into a normal, healthy person."

The shocking fact that the nation's recent German measles epidemic will be responsible for between 15,000 and 20,000 birth defect babies this year should remind us all of the seriousness of the birth defect problem," said Mrs. Hopper.

"German measles despite this heavy toll, is responsible for only a few of the many hundred birth defects known to medical science -- defects which occur in an estimated 250,000 American babies each year," she added.

Mrs. Hopper pointed out that March of Dimes - supported scientists have been at work on the German measles problem for some time and that \$318,852 in March of Dimes funds is now going into accelerated research to perfect a vaccine.

While supporting this and other scientific investigations into birth defects, the March of Dimes is also expanding what is already the largest single national source of private support for the diagnosis and treatment of birth defect victims. Now in operation at medical schools and community hospitals are more than 50 centers where medical experts are developing better methods of treating children with birth defects.

"It's not enough just to be against birth defects," concluded Mrs. Hopper. "We must be for babies who survive, for babies who survive normally and for the best possible care of babies who are born defective. I feel this is what the March of Dimes is all about."

Packets of literature have been distributed to students in the three elementary schools, and students may give their contributions to the teachers. completed the sixth grade and those who have not completed the eighth grade.

Instruction will be provided in reading, writing, basic citizenship, money management, budget formation and communicative arts.

The program is free with all supplies and books furnished by the Texas Education Agency. The program is financed 90 percent by the agency and Slaton's 10 percent of the cost comes in teaching space and in teaching supervision.

In December, the Slaton school board authorized the school to apply for the funds which were appropriated under the Economic Opportunity Act. However, the funds are administered by the Vocational Education division of TEA.

funerals, and made it clear that no individuals or groups outside of the organization had anything to do with the proposal.

The ministers also announced plans for a "straw vote" among those persons directly involved with funeral services. The statement issued:

"Statistics reveal that a minimum of 20 people, besides the family of the deceased, are involved in conducting a funeral and several other arrangements which go with it. For instance, there are the florists, the minister or ministers, the persons in charge of preparing at least one meal for the family, and the undertaker and his assistants.

"If a funeral is held on Sunday afternoon, most of these people will, of necessity, not be able to attend morning worship services. The minister himself, because of having to conduct his normal Sunday service, will not be able to minister to the bereaved family on the day of the funeral to the extent that he would normally wish to.

"It also should be made clear to some ill-informed individuals that no one outside the Ministerial Alliance had anything at all to do with the request made to the city commission by the ministers. No firm or individual, including the area florists or funeral homes, were even aware that the request was being made until notice of the appearance of it was made known through our local news media.

"Since the matter has, at present, been tabled by the city, the Ministerial Alliance has decided to get an expression of the wishes of the people directly involved with funeral services and arrangements--that is, the ministers, florists and undertakers.

"The results of this unofficial 'straw vote' will be tabulated and made known to the city commission along with recommendation for appropriate action by the Slaton Ministerial Alliance. It is hoped this will clear the air, so to speak, and that it will be a fair voice of the people concerned."
