Mercury Drops To 5 Below In Slaton

A frigid cold front and a 4-inch snowfall put Slaton and the area in a deep-freeze situation the past week, with the mercury staying at 32 degrees or below for nine straight days.

A low of 5 degrees below zero was posted early Saturday morning, and the thermometer climbed to only 1 degree above on Sunday morning.

The big snow came early Friday morning, closing Slaton and most area schools, causing cancellation of athletic contests and community meetings, and making for extremely hazardous driving conditions.

The snowfall was estimated at only 4 inches, but the frigid weather kept the white blanket over the area until a brief thaw started Tuesday afternoon. The temperature, however, reached only 31 Tuesday. The weatherman predicted a high of about 40 degrees Wednesday, but old man Sun was having a hard time melting

some of the packed snow and ice.

Beginning with a high of 27 on Jan. 17, the temperatures never climbed above the 32 mark until Wednesday, provided the weatherman called the shot right yesterday. Following the snowfall last Friday, the mercury reached a high of only 24.

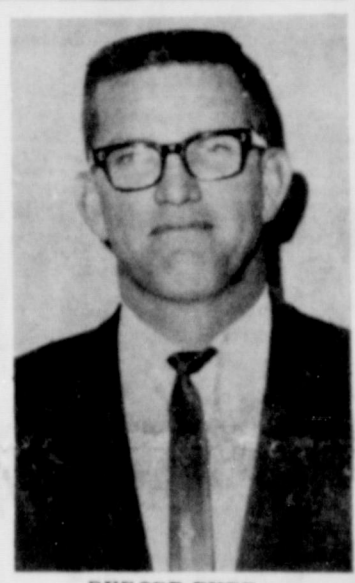
The snow was a welcome sight to farmers of the area, putting vital moisture into the soil, but it was not enough to suit most of them. With the accompanying freezing weather, the moisture was not as beneficial as it might have been, weather forecasters were predicting more moisture, either rain or snow, for the weekend.

Many weather observers will watch with interest next Wednesday—Groundhog Day—to note whether the little animal sees his shadow or not. If Mr. Groundhog sees his shadow, we're due for six more weeks of winter weather; if he doesn't we're due an early spring...or so the legend goes.

Despite the snow and ice-covered streets here the past week, only eight minor car accidents were reported and no injuries.

Slaton was without electricity for about seven minutes last Thursday night when ice broke a line between Slaton and Southland. Southwestern Public Service officials quickly restored the power, and located the circuit break with only one more flicker interrupting the flow of current.

City Hires New Administrator

Buford Duff, 31, former city secretary at Plains, was named as city administrator for Slaton by unanimous vote of the commission during a regular meeting Monday night.

The employment of Duff, who will assume his new duties Feb. 15, ended a four-month search to fill the vacated post.

The commission interviewed Duff and another applicant Saturday, agreed on hiring Duff during a special meeting Monday morning, then made it official at the regular session. Duff's salary will be \$650 a month plus a car for business use.

In other business Monday night, the commission heard a report from the city engineer, a report from water board chairman T. J. Wallace, and reviewed a three-month budget report.

A possibility for the city to secure additional water rights was reported by Wallace. Commissioners agreed the city was interested in the matter and would request test holes on the land before negotiating further.

City Engineer Bennett Reeves recommended the city excavate approximately 2,500 cubic yards of dirt from the bottom of the lake on East Division Street, moving the dirt to low places on the outer edges of the property. Reeves explained this would allow the lake to have the same storage capacity as it did before dirt was added along the shoulders of Division during recent street

PLAY PETERSBURG TONIGHT

Slaton Captures District Victory

The Slaton Tigers kept their District 4-AA title hopes alive with a 65-48 victory over the Frenship Tigers on the home court Tuesday night.

The victory put the district mark at 2-2 for the Tigers with the other win coming over the Indians from Morton. The Tigers have dropped tilts to Denver City and Post.

The Tigers take on the Petersburg quintet here Thursday night. The varsity contest will follow the Boys B-team and

the girls varsity contests which get underway at 6:30 p.m.

The tilt was originally scheduled for Friday night. Tiger Coach Tommy Lacey explained that Petersburg missed a district game last week and the game is rescheduled Saturday night. The game with Slaton was moved to Thursday in order to give Petersburg a one-night rest.

Tuesday night, the Post Antelope upset what most district followers have taken for grant-

ed for six years—basketball dominance by Denver City. The Mustangs bowed in the Antelope gym, 98-80.

The Tigers have a chance for the crown and a good chance for a tie for the crown. Slaton meets both Post and Denver City on the home court while Post must rematch with Denver City on the Mustang hardwoods.

Slaton captured the impressive victory over Frenship, playing without the services of senior John Henry Johnson. Johnson did not report for the game and Rodney Farrell started in his position.

SCHOOL BOND IS APPROVED

A \$100,000 bond issue for the Roosevelt School District was approved by a slim margin Saturday as a light delegation of voters weathered the ice and snow to cast ballots.

The bond issue, which calls for an eight-classroom addition, passed by a vote of 70 for and 39 against. Marvin Williams, superintendent of schools, said the turnout for the one issue proposition represented about a third of the qualified voters.

Supt. Williams said construction on the classrooms is likely to begin in 60 to 90 days. It is hoped that the classrooms will be ready for use by junior high students by next fall.

Roosevelt school is located 10 miles north of Slaton and has an enrollment of 105 pupils in 12 grades. Superintendent Williams said the school board

is considering putting the new classrooms underground.

Should the classrooms be placed underground, Roosevelt would be one of the smallest schools, and perhaps the smallest, with underground facilities.

The school official listed several reasons for considering an underground school. It would prevent the purchase of additional land and the building could serve as a shelter for the entire student body in case of an emergency.

Officials said the long range cost would be cheaper and would include benefits of a constant temperature, air conditioning, savings on heat, and an absence of noise distraction.

No tax rate increase is anticipated because of the proposed construction, Williams pointed out.

LWV To Push Poll Tax Drive

Deadline Near On Poll Tax

Persons wishing to vote in state and local elections were asked to avoid the rush expected Monday which is the deadline for obtaining the 1966 poll tax in Texas.

The number which has obtained poll taxes or exemptions is still running behind the potential, according to Mrs. F.A. Drewry, deputy tax assessor-collector of Lubbock County.

A total of 422 persons have been qualified to vote in the elections. Mrs. Drewry said 382 poll taxes have been sold and 40 exemptions have been issued.

Deadline for obtaining the \$1.75 poll tax is midnight Monday. It is expected that some Slaton residents have purchased a poll tax in Lubbock. Yet a last minute rush is anticipated at Mrs. Drewry's office, located on the east side of the square.

1966 is an important election year for Slaton with three local residents already tossing their hat into the ring. Several county and state offices and the post of U. S. Senator from Texas will be voted upon.

Attorney General Waggoner Carr today urged all Texans who will be eligible to vote in this year's elections to obtain the poll tax before the deadline.

Man Wounded Here In Burglary Try

A 21-year-old Slaton Negro, Leroy Fields of 925 S. Johnson, is free on \$2,000 bond after charges were lodged against him for the Wednesday night burglary of Kirksey Gulf Station on N. 9th.

Fields was wounded by a Slaton patrolman during the robbery. He escaped and was later taken into custody at Lubbock's Methodist Hospital when he sought medical attention.

The incident occurred about 11:30 p.m. Wednesday. Patrolman Don Blackerby was on routine patrol when he noticed that the cigarette machine was not in its normal position inside the building.

Blackerby said he began checking the doors of the building. When he shined a light on the rear door, the door was opened and a shot was fired from inside the building.

Blackerby returned three shots into the building. The door closed and Blackerby said a man ran through the plate glass window on the east side of the station.

SCHOOL NEEDS OUTLINED Cafetorium, Stadium, Gym Rate High On List

Adequate buildings and facilities and excellent teachers are the basic elements upon which an educational system can be established, a system that meets the needs of youth and other people.

Careful planning is necessary in order for a community to always provide these elements, and trustees of the Slaton Independent School District are now outlining building improvements which they feel are an absolute necessity to provide patrons with the type

system they desire for their children.

Slaton schools have been fortunate in many respects, and one of these has been its pattern of growth. The increase in enrollment has been slow and rather constant throughout the past 20 years, and it is assumed that this pattern will be continued in a rapidly growing industrial and agricultural region.

Through a special grant from the Texas Education Agency and from other sources of money,

Slaton schools will purchase \$10,000 worth of books this year, and the program is designed to continue for three years. At the end of this period Slaton school libraries will be in an excellent condition as to number, quality, and balance of books. It is necessary to provide additional space to house these collections in some of our buildings.

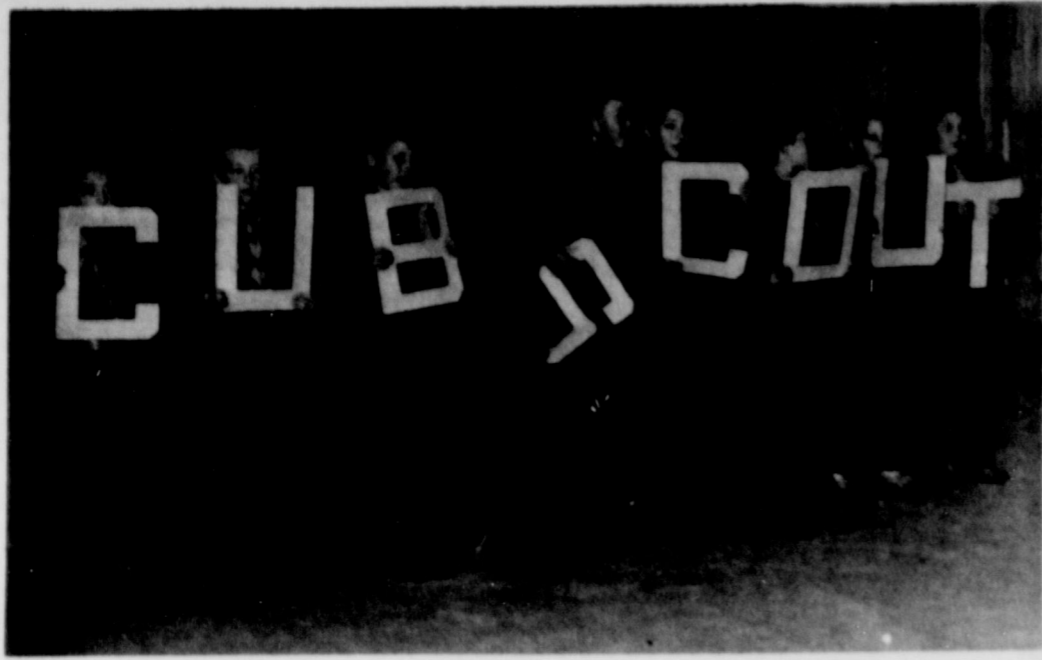

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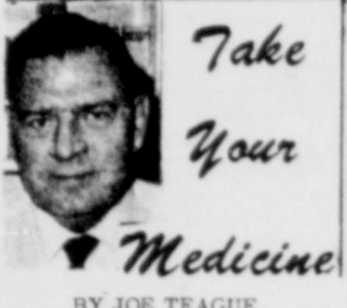

Traffic Deaths Decline Shown

Memories of 1965 are slipping quietly away for most people, but for those maimed in automobile accidents and the families of others who were killed during the year, will be remembered always.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 47 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of December, according to Sgt. Q. C. Guthrie, highway patrol supervisor of this area.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county for the calendar year of 1965 shows a total of 437 crashes resulting in 15 persons killed, 246 injured, and an estimated property damage of \$329,470,00. Four of the 29 counties in

the THP's Lubbock district had no traffic fatalities during 1965. These were Bailey, Kent, Terry, and Throckmorton--but 77 persons were injured and property damage reached \$95,-975 in automobile accidents in those four counties during the year.

"It is estimated when the final reports are tabulated, we will find that less people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1965 than in 1964," the sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about three percent less than the 1964 all time high of 3,006 traffic deaths.

Commission Okays Highway

The Texas Highway Commission today authorized protective buying of right of way for future development of State Highway 116 in Lubbock and Hockley Counties.

The State highway engineer was directed to enter into contractual agreements with local authorities for right of way purchases from 1.5 mile east of the Lubbock-Hockley County line westward 19.5 miles to Levelland.

The commission also ordered the Texas Highway Department to proceed with engineering development. Ultimately, the highway will be developed into a four-lane divided traffic artery.

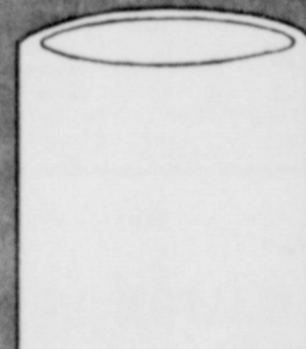

Laurindo Almeida introduces The San Francisco Guitars, a group of accomplished musicians who provide support for Laurindo's playing throughout his new album. New Broadway Holiday LP's are from scores of 1965-66 Broadway stage and Hollywood screen favorites - the themes from Skyscrapers, The Reward, Zorba the Greek, and Morituri are four examples. Three of the tunes were composed by Almeida. In each of the selections, he plays one of the lead instruments, using both electric and standard unamplified guitars. 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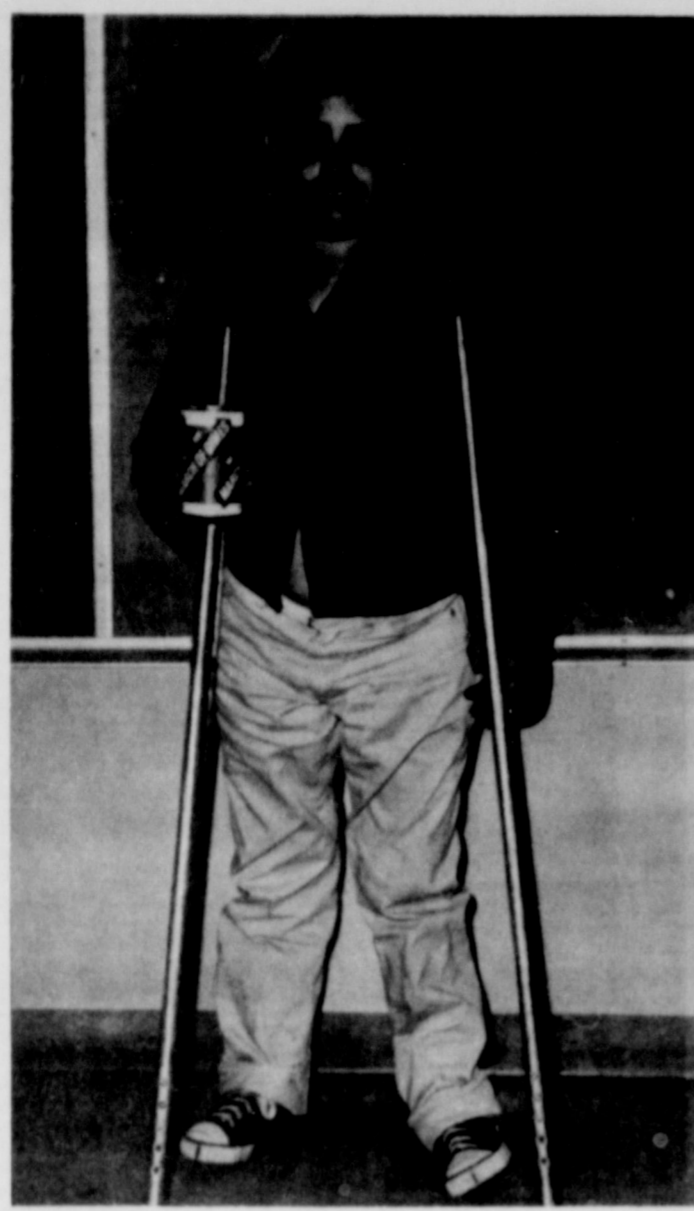

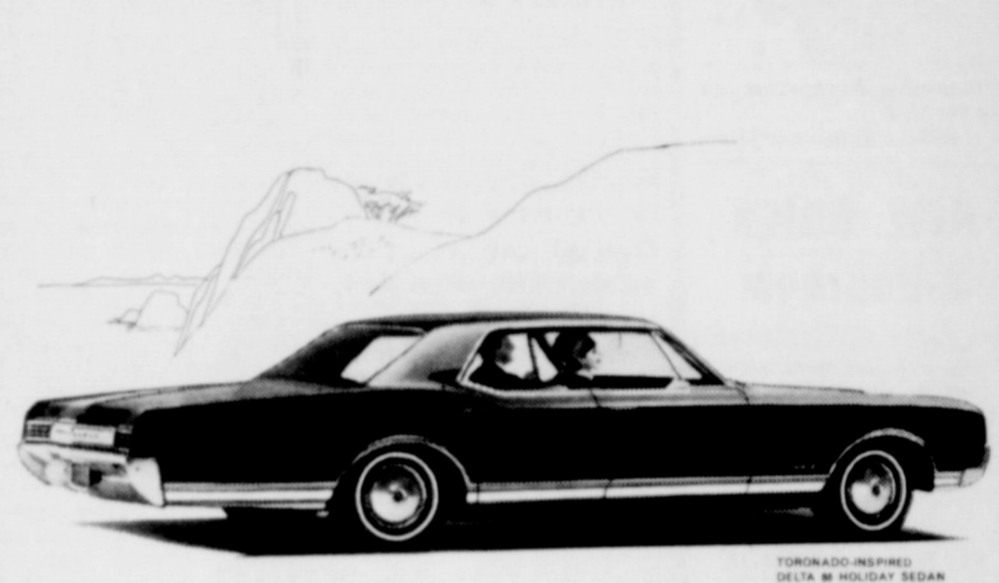

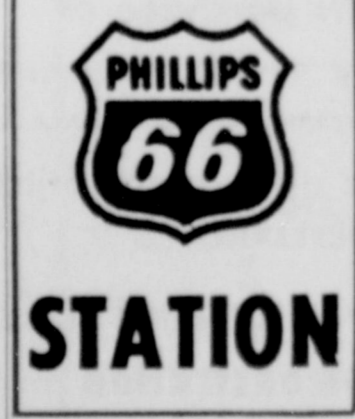

School to conform to the standards of the President's physical fitness program is an essential part of the improvement program needed by the Slaton schools. The present trend of enrollment in the high school, which now stands at about 470, indicates that in the near future Slaton school will be classed in the AAA conference for all athletic and interscholastic League competition.

Careful planning must be made at this time so that the schools will have adequate facilities to provide for this new demand. One of these requirements is a new football stadium.

There are some 400 and more people eating in the cafeteria at West Ward school which is not adequate in size or equipment to care for this many children. This cafeteria is located in a renovated building that was built around the year 1920, which makes it possibly 46 years of age.

The need for an adequate and modern cafeteria at West Ward is overdue. The growth pattern of Slaton is to the west, both north and south and the time is not far away for the construction of a new elementary school in the west part of Slaton. The site for this building has been purchased and is available for immediate use. Therefore, when the time does come for this construction is in readiness except the financing of the program.

The people who have been giving these problems thought and time-consuming consideration feel that it is essential that Slaton should provide the facilities mentioned above through moneys obtained by issuance of a bond by the school district for the construction of new buildings and improvement of old ones.

It has been seven years since any money has been provided for construction. As long as the population increases school enrollment will increase, and it will be essential that new buildings be constructed.

The trend in public education is gradually expanding into the various fields of study being opened by today's research and development. At one time it was thought that reading, writing, and arithmetic were the basic subjects, and the completion of these courses usually completed a person's formal education.

Through the various eras, new concepts have been added, such as basic knowledge in science, human relations, social relations, languages, vocations, physical education to conform to present standards, and communications. It is a well-known fact that no one can predict the needs of an individual in the year 2000, but it is possible to prepare a youth so that he may be prepared to adjust to a rapidly changing condition.

Schools must be able to provide the necessary experiences for the youth of today so that he may be able to adjust to an ever-changing world.
