School Bond Election Set Feb. 28

\$500,000 Project Outlined by Board

A \$500,000 school improvement bond election will be presented to Slaton School District voters on Feb. 28, it was decided by trustees in a special meeting Monday evening.

If the bonds are approved, trustees propose construction this year of a new cafeteria at West Ward, a gym and band hall at high school, and a football stadium at a site to be selected.

Tabbed for future construction would be a new elementary school in southwest Slaton.

If the voters approve the issue, the projected maximum increase in taxes for next year

would be 8.1 percent, according to Supt. Lee Vardy. The present rate is \$1.85 per \$100 assessed valuation. The projected maximum at this time would be \$2.

This would mean, for example, that a person paying \$10 would have his tax raised to \$10.81; one now paying \$100 would see his raised to \$108.10.

Absentee voting for the election began Tuesday morning at the school tax office and will continue through Feb. 24. A petition asking for the election was presented to the board Monday with the names of 43 voters. Law requires a petition with at least 20 qualified voters' names.

The school board took the action after studying the proposal for the past four months. A study of facilities and school needs began in October, 1965.

Vardy said the board "has attempted to discuss the matter with various citizens in the community to assist them in making a decision based upon the needs of the school and the feeling of the community."

He added that the board had also attempted, through news releases and personal contacts, to inform the public of its action during this period of time. Trustees have also studied the operational costs of Slaton schools in comparison with schools of like size in the area.

Results of this study showed Slaton schools' per-pupil cost was as low or lower than other schools in the comparison.

"The board feels there has been a need for many facilities the past several years," commented Vardy. "They chose to propose construction of a cafeteria at West Ward, a gym and band hall at high school, a football stadium to be erected at a site to be selected, and eventually -- when growth is sufficient -- a new elementary school in west Slaton on a site previously purchased for a school building."

Continuing, Vardy said the first three items will be scheduled to be built in 1966, if

Senator H. J. "Doc" Blanchard of Lubbock, today announced for re-election as State Senator from the 28th Senatorial District.

The newly enlarged district is made up of Andrews, Cochran, Crosby, Dawson, Gaines, Hockley, Lubbock, Lynn, Terry, Martin, Yoakum, Ward and Winkler Counties.

Senator Blanchard served as a member of the House of Representatives in 1957-1960 where he served on all major house committees and received recognition for his service on House Investigating Committees that exposed Ben

Jack Cage, Crime and Official Misconduct in Amarillo and Randall County and later the Crime and Vice in Port Arthur and Jefferson County.

Senator Blanchard was elected to the Senate in 1962 and was thereafter the first freshman Senator to be appointed Chairman of a major Senate Committee. He was also appointed to 13 major committees, the largest number in history for a freshman Senator. Re-elected in 1964, Blanchard served as Chairman of the powerful insurance

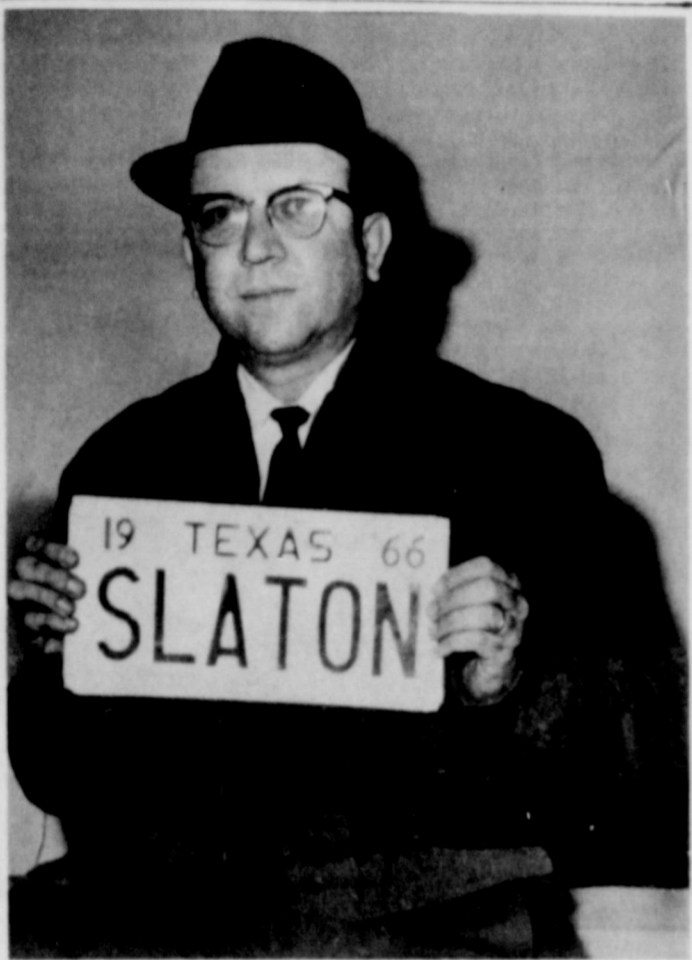

Four Escape Wreck Injuries

Four Slaton residents miraculously escaped serious injuries Monday morning in a grinding two-car crash on the U. S. 84 bypass northwest of here.

The accident occurred about 9:05 at the intersection of the bypass and Cemetery Rd. Officers said a car driven by Mrs. Suzanne Neil Preston of Canyon Rd. pulled onto the highway from the cemetery road and collided with a vehicle traveling south on the highway.

The Preston auto was struck by an auto operated by Hubert S. Creswell of 240 S. 10th. The impact caused the Creswell vehicle to overturn twice and come to rest in a field on the southwest side of the highway.

The top of the Creswell vehicle was caved in but Creswell was not injured. Mrs. Preston also escaped injury. Two passengers in the Preston auto, Jo Ann Preston, 6, and Dava Dee, 5, were treat-

ed and released at a local clinic.

The 1966 auto operated by Creswell is owned by Smith Ford Inc. of Slaton. Damage to the vehicle was estimated at \$2,000. Damage to the Preston car was estimated at \$700.

FOUR FILE ON LAST DAY

Four Seek Commissioner Post, Two in JP Race

Four candidates--three of them Republicans--beat the filing deadline Monday night as the political races for local county offices gained momentum.

A four-man race has developed for the precinct two commissioners chair. Precinct two includes Slaton. On the Democratic ticket is incumbent George Green of Slaton.

Announcing earlier on the Democratic ballot was Jim Benton, also of Slaton, Monday night H. B. Griffith, Posey farmer and businessman, filed

for the post.

The lone candidate on the Republican ticket for the county commissioners position is C. C. (Cliff) Weaver, Slaton contractor. He filed Monday with GOP County Chairman Syd Moore.

Peace Justice Mrs. Frank Lawrence, precinct two, place one, has filed for re-election on the Democratic ticket. She is opposed on the GOP ballot by Don Carpenter, a Slaton service station operator, who filed Monday.

State Rep. Reed Quilliam drew an opponent for the Democratic nomination for District 76, place one, when Jay Murdock filed for that post with Democratic Chairman Ralph Brock.

Denzil Bevers filed for state representative in District 76, place two. He will run against Bill Gillespie, Lubbock attorney, and Elmer Tarbox, Lubbock businessman.

D. J. (Buzz) Brown of Shallowater, a farmer and insurance salesman, filed for county commissioner in precinct four. His opponent will

Groundbreaking Set For Smith Ford

Groundbreaking ceremonies for a huge new automotive center--the home of Smith Ford, Inc.--will be held here Thursday at 2:30 p.m., it was announced this week by owner Bill Smith.

The new building is to be erected on the southeast side of the intersection of US-84 and FM-41 (Division Street). Total project cost is estimated at about \$175,000.

Smith and his son, Steve, will be joined by visiting Ford officials and local dignitaries in the groundbreaking event. Jack Mendel, district Ford sales manager, and several other Dallas officials are expected.

Smith has also invited Mayor Jonas Cain and city commissioners, C-C President O. G. Nieman, County Commissioner George Green, and Rev. David Binkley as special guests for the ceremony.

Construction of the plant is to begin immediately and completion date is scheduled in May.

"The new building indicates our confidence in the economic progress of the Slaton area and of our desire to always strive for better customer service and convenience," Smith said in announcing the start of construction.

He said the new facility would have approximately 20,000 square feet of space under one roof. "The building will be of the latest design with the most modern equipment, including electronic and diagnosis machines," he added.

Entrances to the Smith Ford property will be on both US-84 and FM-41. A modernistic showroom will face FM-41 and an outdoor showroom (under roof) will face US-84.

General contractor is Plains Steel Builders, Inc., and the architect-engineer is Bill Stracener of Lubbock.

Smith has been the Ford dealer here since January, 1952, and the Ford dealership has been at the same location--9th and Lynn--since about 1924.

Three 'Top Homemakers' Named

Three area girls have been named as 1966 Betty Crocker Homemakers of Tomorrow by scoring highest in written knowledge and attitude examinations taken by senior high school girls last December.

Cooper High School's winner is Deborah Cade who will receive a special award pin from the program's sponsor, General Mills.

Sandra Koslan, winner from Wilson High School, is the

daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Nolte, Rt. 2, Wilson.

Annie M. Beckwith is the winner from Slaton High School, and along with Miss Cade and Miss Koslan is now eligible for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

More than 570,000 senior girls in 14,714 of the nation's high schools were enrolled for the examination. Test papers of all school winners are being judged competitively. From them, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc. In addition, her school will be awarded a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica. The second-ranking girl will receive a \$500 educational grant.

Began in the 1954-55 school year, the Betty Crocker search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. This year's record enrollment pushes the 12-year total of participating girls near the 5 million mark. With the 1966 grants, total scholarship awards will exceed \$1.25 million.

Dickey-Bird Hair Style May Be Most Popular This Spring

Spring hair styles are for the birds. Literally according to the hair fashion authorities, the most popular styles will be the Dickey-bird hair fashions, light-hearted and gay styles that will help you wing into spring with a fresh and romantic outlook.

The new styles were designed to harmonize with new spring wardrobes by the Official Hair Fashion Committee of the National Hairdressers and Cosmetologists Association, the hair fashion authority of the beauty profession. They will be shown throughout the nation in observance of the 15th anniversary of National Beauty Salon Week, Feb. 13-19, with the slogan, "Wing into Spring with a new hair style."

In appearance the new Dickey-bird styles feature a small head look, almost a "puffed" look, dramatically accented with softly waved hair that flips up into a crest on one side. This crest can rise high over one eye, or the other, to give a perky asym-metric balance to the silhouette.

Sometimes the crest flips up like a cockatoo's crown, at other times it spills over like the plumes of a cock. In all cases, it has an airborne lightness, a weightless feeling of softness.

For daytime wear, the rise of the crest is generally more subdued, except for the high fashion devotees who seek that "way out" look. For evening, the crest is dressed into a high flare with the aid of hair pieces. In all cases, the rise must be

carefully proportioned to the individual, so that elegance of the small head look is retained. In all cases, too, the hair is waved, rather than curled. The new treatment is one of wavelets, short shell-shaped waves with a curl, or a half a curl, on the end. This is a completely new treatment of waving, one that gives a soft flow of smooth waves, gently accented with a suggestion of curl. The wavelets are interlaced throughout the coiffure in rhythmic patterns of shiny, lustrous hair.

Vital to the design and easy wear of the new styles is a feather-soft permanent wave prescribed professionally for your own particular needs. Vital, too, is the appearance of soft and lustrous hair, hair that looks and is as healthy as the young look of Spring de-

mands. This means that you will want to be particularly careful to get the necessary hair conditioning care you may need to eliminate any signs of winter drabness from your hair.

In hair lengths for Spring, chic hair is short hair. Exact lengths depend upon individual needs. The shaping must be done professionally for your own requirements. This is particularly true, since you actually need two different kinds of haircuts for the new Dickey-Bird styles. Hair at the sides and nape area is textured for a snug fit. This is absolutely necessary for small head elegance. Hair at the top and back crown area is shaped to flare out, or up, into wavelet patterns.

In hair coloring, the one color look is definitely out. Color is now used in combinations of natural shadings to create new harmonies and new proportions for your hair style. Termed "echo coloring," by the experts, color of one area is echoed subtly by a harmonizing color value in another area to enhance the design of the coiffure. Thus, hair coloring, as well as hair setting and shaping, becomes an integral factor in the design of Spring hair fashions.

New hair colors will reflect the brightened and lightened palettes of Spring wardrobes. Blonde shades ranging in value from soft porcelains through creams and filtered sunlight will be among the most popular colors. Lightened brownettes will echo Indian curry and nutmeg shades. Red heads will echo paprika and cinnamon shades. Raven hair will have echo tones of licorice and smoke, but discreetly used. The greater the depth of shade, the more subtle must be its use.

In make-up, Spring's face of fashion has a healthy glowing complexion. This is a soft and delicate natural look, fresh and dewy for Spring. Eye make-up will feature natural shades for eyebrows and false lashes to echo colors of the hair.

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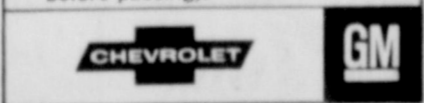

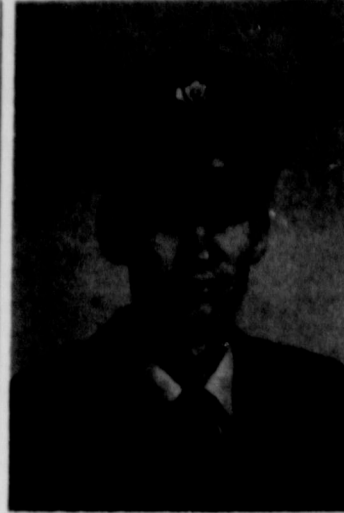
Colston Rites Held Friday

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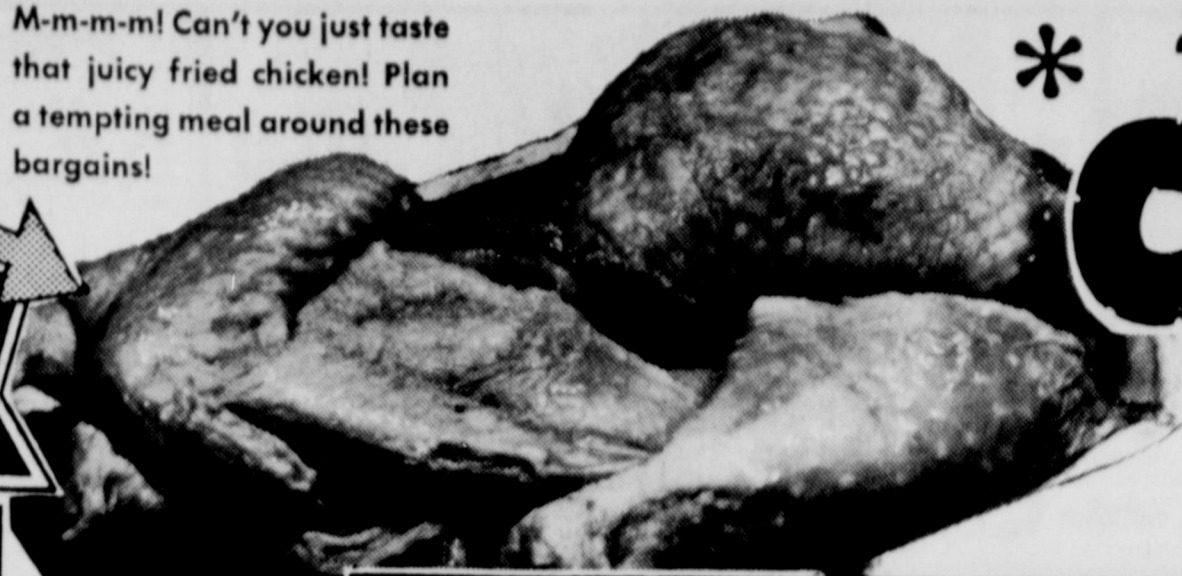

Counselor's Corner

When you put the first letters of each of these comments together, you have the word PRIDE; something we must have in our school.

See your Student Council, your faculty, and tell other students in order to see what you can do for your school. Believe me it will pay high dividends.

Band Banquet Set Feb. 25

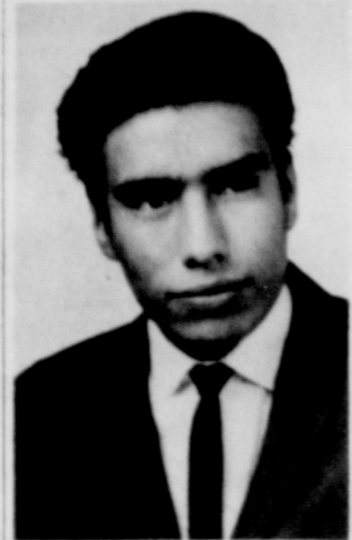
The band banquet will be held Feb. 25 at the junior high cafeteria. On the menu is steak fillet which will be \$1.50 per plate.

Lake Manager Talks To Rotarians

History and progress of Buffalo Springs Lake was outlined to Rotarians here last Thursday by James L. Segrest, general manager.

Officially titled Lubbock County Water Control & Improvement District No. 1, the lake area is a political subdivision but is self sustaining and does not receive a government subsidy.

Segrest was introduced by V. G. Browning of Slaton, a director of the water district. Other directors attending the meeting were Gordon Rose, Burl Kizer and H. D. Waller. Rounding out the board is T. E. Millam.

Segrest also recognized J. S. Edwards Jr. of Slaton, one of the first directors on the board. The present district was organized with five directors in 1956. A bond issue of \$1.86

million was voted that year for property acquisition and basic development.

The Buffalo Lakes area includes some 1,600 acres of land. The lake shoreline is about 7 1/2 miles, and water area is about 5,600 acre feet. Segrest pointed out that the original tax rate was 11 cents per \$100 assessed valuation, and the rate is now 6 cents. Fees are charged for recreational facilities to provide operating and development revenue to supplement the tax income.

The lake area has 250 cabin sites. Lots are leased and cabins are privately owned. A number of club sites are also leased to incorporated clubs and organizations.

Recreational facilities include a Kiddy Land, pony rides, boat rentals, fishing, concessions and picnic facilities. The board recently authorized more picnic facilities.

Segrest said fishing was not so good in 1965, because re-

bonds are approved by voters of the school district.

Elmer East of Lubbock National Bank, who is acting as fiscal agent for the bond issue, was present at the special meeting called at 5 p.m. Monday. He explained legal aspects of the bonding issue and election. East handles the majority of school bond issues in the West Texas area, pointed out Vardy.

East prepared election notices which were to be posted in three public places and also had ballots ready so absentee voting could get underway immediately.

The trustees held only a short discussion Monday before officially calling the election. One trustee said the only question asked him was one concerning whether or not the district would have enough money to complete the building program outlined.

Based on general estimates by the superintendent, trustees felt the half-million dollar figure would take care of the proposed buildings.

A "rough" estimate on the buildings -- without plans or specifications -- has figures of about \$175,000 for the gym, \$60,000 for the cafeteria, \$50,000 for the bandhall, \$30,000 or more for the stadium and fieldhouse, and \$125,000 to \$150,000 for the elementary school.

Factors still to be determined include the site of the grid stadium -- at its present location or at the high school property where the new gym could be used for dressing-room facilities, and whether to build a new bandhall or convert the physical ed gym into a bandhall.

The last major improvement project was held in 1959 when Slaton School District voters approved a \$500,000 bond issue.

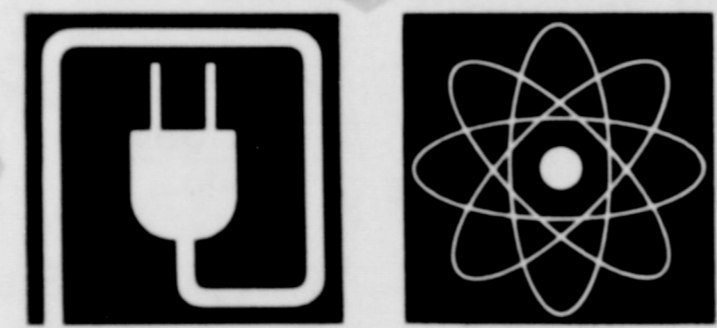

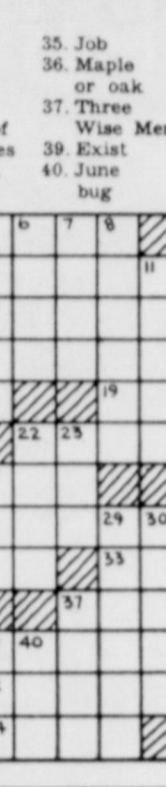
