DITORIALLY SPEAKING These Events Made Ne Observations and Potpourri

IN LOOKING BACK over the fiscal developments of 1962 we find one bright spot in the tax picture ... this was the first year in 17 years in which there were no increases in state gasoline taxes in all the United States!

We naively hope this situation continues, for after all, \$6 billion a year is the price added to the cost of driving because of the gasoline taxes. Authorities reveal that on the average, these taxes amount to 50 per cent of the basic price of the fuel itself.

Gasoline no longer is a luxury, but a necessity, and it looks to this editor as if this is a pretty large tax tab on a basic necessity.

AND IN LOOKING AHEAD for tax signs in 1963 . we see the rude awakening that will come immediately with the advent of the new year: on January 1st, Social Security taxes will rise once more. Both employees and employers will pay at the rate of three and five-eights per cent on earnings to \$4800. The self-employed rate will be 5.4 per cent on earnings to that figure. A-N-D additional increases are scheduled, by law, for 1966 and 1968.

CHRISTMAS DAY, that most joyful of all celebrations, again is history and the holiday festivities are well along toward their finale. Throughout the world hearts were made lighter, were drawn nearer to their Maker, with the observance of the Holy season.

Again it is going to be mighty interesting to observe the lasting effects, during 1963, of the holiday spirit, the new year resolutions, the application of Christ's teachings of peace, solace, understanding, tolerance and love. Acceptance or denial of these tenets will make many of the news stories and headlines in the big newspapers and magazines during 1963 . . . let's hope for pleasant reading!

In extolling the value of savings, our banker friend points out that if the Indians of Manhattan Island had taken the \$24 in cash instead of trinkets and invested it at 6 percent, compounded quarterly, theoretically their descendants today would be worth more than the assessed value - \$10,000,000,000 of Manhattan's land and buildings.

Research Grants Seek Solution In Cotton Production

Research grants to find answers to three key problems ers Institute.

of cotton growers have been announced by the Cotton Produc-Grants are for projects aimed at developing effective systemic insecticides, a way to control verticillium wilt, and a rapid method of measuring fiber strength, according to Roy Forkner of Lubbock and LeRoy Durham of Plainview, Institute trustees in West Texas.

Russell Giffen, Fresno, Calif. cotton grower who is chairman of the Institute's trustees, said direct support of research on tute's drive to increase markets and profits. It also has a consumer advertising program un-

der way to sell cotton products. Basic and applied research on systemic insecticides is being done at the University of California, Riverside. Aim is to get facts that will make it possible for an insecticide, placed in the plant's sap stream, to join forces with predatory insects in destroying the insects that attack cotton. The grant is for \$50,000, with matching funds from the University.

The verticillium wilt re will be conducted under a \$10. 000 grant to New Mexico State University Agricultural Experiment Station. The work is seeking basic information that will lead to a systemic method to control the disease. The cooperating agency will expend \$21,000 on the project.

A \$35,000 grant was made to Stanford Research Institute to design and construct a laboratory prototype of a high-speed, fully mechanized instrument for measuring cotton fiber strength. This is a vital step in determining the spinning and performance value of cotton and in improving the fiber's competitive position at the mar-

An Institute agreement with the Board of Directors of the National Cotton Council makes the Council staff available without charge for developing and supervising research and promotion projects.






