Mrs. Blume Retires From Nursing Career

Mrs. Augusta Blume retired last Wednesday night after more than 42 years of nursing service, 33 of which were spent at Slaton's Mercy Hospital.

Coming to West Texas from Indiana, Mrs. Blume began her nurse's training in 1924 following the death of her husband. She studied and worked at Incarnate Word Hospital in Fort Worth; then spent the years of '28 and '29 at St. Anthony's in Amarillo.

She came to Slaton in 1929 where she was to become the first lay registered nurse at the then new Mercy Hospital.

In paying tribute to Mrs. Blume, Sister Brain Marie pointed out that those were "years of long hours when the 40 - hour week was a foreign notion and nurses were truly all things to all patients." She added that Slaton people owe her "many subconsciously happy memories of contented days in Mercy's nursery."

Mrs. Blume returned to St. Anthony's in Amarillo in 1936, coming back once again to Mercy Hospital in 1939.

Sister Agnes, who has been at the hospital since its opening, presented Mrs. Blume with a silver bon-bon dish inscribed "33 Years of Service". She also received commendation from Sister Amadeus, hospital administrator. The hospital employees presented her with a piece of luggage and a gift certificate.

Included in the more than 50 persons attending the special affair were eight of Mrs. Blume's brothers and sisters; Mrs. M. J. McSween, Glen B. Payne and S. H. Jaynes; and a host of her fellow workers, Sisters, nurses and nurses' aides. Members of her family attending included Roman Verkamp, Gilbert Verkamp and Mr.

Price Of Food Higher In '67

The new year is here, and it is time to dust off the old crystal ball and peer into the food future, says Mrs. Gwen Clyatt, Texas A&M University, consumer marketing specialist. There will be more food in 1967 and also more people to eat it. Incomes will be higher

so that even though more money will be spent on food, and food prices will be a little higher, food will take the same or a smaller percentage of the average family's take-home pay. In 1966 about 18.2 percent of the family income was spent on food; ten years ago almost 25

percent was spent.

The fresh fruit and vegetable picture depends upon the weather. You can look for favorable prices for citrus products into mid-1967. Both orange and grapefruit crops are large. Expected increases in the packs of peaches, pears, and fruit cocktail will likely mean steady prices for these items. Small supplies of apple products may result in increased prices.

Fresh vegetable prices should be some lower than in 1966. The supply of canned vegetables is about the same as last year and some increase is expected in average retail prices. Prices for frozen products likely will again increase slightly.

Per capita consumption of all meats for 1967 is expected to be 167 pounds per person, one pound less than the estimates for 1966.

Prices on eggs are expected to decline from now through the spring. The normal seasonal decline that occurs at this time may be accentuated by a production increase already underway.

Milk production in 1967 is likely to increase slightly over that of 1966. Prices will likely increase but not nearly as sharply as in 1966.

The 1966 South Plains cotton crop showed a slight improvement in staple over the 1965 crop, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

Final harvesting figures of this season's crop have not been completed, but estimates indicate that approximately 1,225,000 bales will be classed. The three South Plains USDA Classing Offices classed approximately 2,118,000 bales of the 1965 crop.

Only 8 per cent of the South Plains cotton this season was

classified in the White grades. Fifty-five per cent was classed in the Light Spotted grades and 37 per cent in the Spotted and Tinged grades. This represented a much higher percentage of Light Spotted, Spotted and Tinged cotton than during previous years. During the 1965 season 56 per cent was classed in the White grades and 44 per cent in the Light Spotted and Spotted grades.

Average staple length improved this season and averaged 30.0/32nds inch, or slightly better than 15/16 of an inch. Average staple of the 1965 crop was 30.0/32nds of an inch, or 15/16 of an inch. Twelve per cent of this season's crop was 1-inch and longer and 2 per cent was an 1-1/8 and longer. This represented a significant improvement over the 1965 season.

Micronaire of this season's crop was lower than the 1965 crop. Only 27 per cent of this season's crop was in the premium category of 3.5 and bet-

ter, compared to 35 per cent of the 1965 crop. Eleven per cent of this season's crop was 2.6 and below, compared to 8 per cent of the 1965 crop. The early freeze in October halted the maturing process of the cotton in the northern two-thirds of the area, thereby causing a low micronaire crop. Micronaire declined rapidly after October 19th and during the week ending December 7th only 9 per cent of the cotton classed in the Lubbock office had a micronaire reading of 3.5 and better.

Before the freeze during the

middle of October, prospects appeared excellent for a high quality crop due to efforts made to plant better quality cotton. The most significant aspect of this season's crop was the improvement in the average staple length and the great increase in cotton having staple length of 1-1/16 and better.

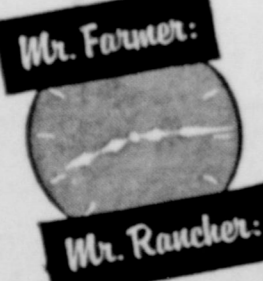
Voter Deadline Coming Jan. 31

Registration closes Jan. 31 for persons wishing to qualify as voters in any 1967 elections.

There is no poll tax this year, so it doesn't cost \$1.75 to get a voter's registration receipt. Anyone who fails to register by Jan. 31, however, will be ineligible to vote in 1967 elections.

The free voter registration receipt can be obtained at the county tax assessor-collector's office, or in Slaton at the deputy's office in the Drewry Insurance building -- located just south of the post office.

The 1967 Voter Registration Certificate enables a person to vote from Feb. 1, 1967, through Feb. 29, 1968. Persons who will be 60 years of age or over on the day of an election, and who do not reside in a city of 70,000 or more, are not required to register to be eligible to vote.
