## **Vote Canvass** Made, Slight **Error Noted**

An official canvass of votes in the Justice Precinct 2 local option election was made by Lubbock County Commissioners Monday, with only one slight discrepancy being noted.

Commissioners found a sixvote difference in the tally list and poll list in Box 38, S. F. Austin School in Slaton, The tally lists showed a total of 568 ballots cast in the box while the poll list indicated only 562 persons as having voted. First check of the packet of

election supplies furnished commissioners had revealed poll lists covering only 500 voters. The election judge was called by phone and reported finding another poll sheet listing 62 voters, still six short of the indicated total vote in the box.

Commissioners noted the discrepancy in the canvass resolution after they pointed out that there is no way for them to determine how the figures should be balanced,

Otherwise, returns as canvassed tallied with unofficial results announced Saturday night following the close of t he polls,

Box 34 indicated one ballot was thrown out as defaced and two were indicated as defaced at Box 37. Five ballots were not counted in the absentee box, one because the voter died be-fore election day; another, because the voter returned to ask that his vote not be counted as he had discovered he did not live in the precinct, and three





ability plus un-employability at (1) Age through 54 years: One disability, 60 per cent or more; Two or more disabilities, one of which is at least 40 per cent, the total impairment combining at least 70 per

(2) Age 55 through 59: more disabilities, eval uated to at least 60 per cent. (3) Age 60 through 64 years: One or more disabilities, evaluated to at least 50 per cent.

(4) Age 65 years: evaluated to at least 10 per cent, Plus unemployability: For compensation or pension purposes, unemployability is considered to be the inability to secure or follow a substantially gainful occupation.

## County Records 40 Accidents

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 40 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of December according to Sgt. O. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, 33 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$42,710.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year 1966, shows a total of 471 crashes resulting in 16 persons killed, 307 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$387,318, "When the final reports are

tabulated, we will find that more people were killed in Texas traffic accidents during 1966 than in any prior year in the history of this state," the Sergeant stated. The final count is expected to be about 15% more than the 3,028 traffic deaths in 1965. This increase should be a challenge for every individual to put forth his best defensive efforts to prevent accidents during 1967.

The veteran patrol supervisor cautions all motorists to beware of ice spots at bridges, underpasses and in shadows. Reduce speed before you reach these slippery areas.

## Rising Production Costs Are Serious To Farmers

to make serious inroads into money as they needed for mach- Public Safety Patrolmen, M. L. farmers' and ranchers' net in- inery and equipment, "That has Simpson or L. W. Luker. come as 1966 drew to a close, and the outlook for 1967 indicates more of the same.

Hal Weatherford, president of the Federal Land Bank of Houston, said today in a yearend statement that farmers and ranchers in Texas, which is served by the bank, will probably have about the same gross income in 1967 as in 1966 but their net may be off by as much as five percent.

The bank which Weatherford heads provides long-term real estate loans to farmers and ranchers throughout Texas.

"The prices of virtually everything farmers need will be up in 1967," Weatherford predicted. "Real estate taxes may increase by another five to seven percent; feed, fertilizer, labor costs, insurance, seed, livestock--all are likely to follow the same pattern."

The cost of money, upon which interest rates to farmers is based, was higher in 1966 than at any time in the bank's 50year history, he said. This had an adverse effect upon the bank as well as upon its borrowers:

"The Houston bank is one of

12 Federal Land Banks which are owned by Land Bank Associations throughout the country," he said. "Collectively, we borrow money by issuing oonds and we loan this money to farmers. At one time in 1966 we paid as much as 6.14 percent interest on money we loaned out to farmers at 6 percent, our legal ceiling."

One of the brighter hopes emerging at year-end, Weatherford said, was that the oney market may be easing slightly. "The last interest rate was paid, for bonds sold on December 20, was 5.95 per-

One of the most serious effects of the current money shortage is that farmers have

Rising production costs began been unable to borrow as much been particularly damaging in areas where there is an acute labor shortage and machines are sorely needed. If this situation continues, it will certainly drive farm commodity prices upward."

Although 1966 ended in an atmosphere of uncertainty clouded by inflation, tight money, and the Viet Nam war, all wasn't black on the farm. Weatherford noted.

Farm assets in the U. S. in-creased by some \$18 billion in 1966, and at year-end the total value of U. S. farms and ranches stood at about \$273 billion. Most of the rise, however, came from increases in the market value of farm real

Life on the farm continues to improve for those who still remain there, though every year the farm and ranch population dwindles as more move to the cities and suburbs.

In 1966, net farm income per farm in the U. S., was \$4,900 --an increase of 66 percent over 1960. But there were 17 percent fewer farms at the end of 1966. so the real per-farm increase was probably closer to 3 per-

Where do American farmers go from here?

As indicated by developments of the last couple of years, the next big breakthrough on farms will be the sophisticated uses of calculators and computers. "Farms are becoming fewer and bigger and thus more like big businesses. They will be run by business tools ... to help show them what crops can be planted most profitably, how and when to use credit, what kinds of livestock to buy and when, how fast livestock should be moved to market. And so on.

The 1966 South Plains cotton crop showed a slight improvement in staple over the 1965 erop, according to W. K. Pal-mer, in charge of the Lubbock otton Classing Office of the

Final harvesting figures of this season's crop have not been completed, but estimates indicate that approximately 1,-225,000 bales will be classed. The three South Plains USDA classing Offices classed approximately 2,118,000 bales of the 1965 crop.

Only 8 per cent of the South Plains cotton this season was

classed in the White grades. Fifty-five per cent was classed in the Light Spotted grades and 37 per cent in the Spotted and Tinged grades. This represented a much higher percentage of Light Spotted, Spotted and Tinged cotton than during previous years. During the 1965 season 6 per cent was classed in the White grades and 44 per cent n the Light Spotted and Spotted

Average staple length improved this season and averaged 30,0/32nds inch, or slightly better than 15/16 of aninch, Average staple of the 1965 crop was 30.0/32nds of an inch, or 15/16 of an inch. Twelve per cent of this season's crop was 1-Inch and longer and 2 per cent was an 1-1/8 and longer. This represented a significant improvement over the 1965 sea-

Micronaire of this season's crop was lower than the 1965 crop. Only 27 per cent of this season's crop was in the premium category of 3.5 and better, compared to 35 per cent of the 1965 crop, Eleven per cent of this season's crop was 2.6 and below, compared to 8 per cent of the 1965 crop. The early freeze in October halted the maturing process of the cotton in the northern twothirds of the area, thereby causing a low micronaire crop. Micronaire declined rapidly after October 19th and during the week ending December 7th only 9 per cent of the cotton classed in the Lubbock office had a micronaire reading of 3,5 and

Enrollment

LEVELLAND (Special) South Plains College has now reached a new high of enrollment, ranking number 14 in the 33 public junior colleges in the state of

Only one private junior college, South Texas Junior College of Houston, enrolled more students than SPC this year, SPC ranks number 15 in enrollment of the 53 state junior colleges including the twenty private junior colleges.

This announcement was made by the newly appointed Coordinating Board of Texas.

It was announced this week that within the next decade, there will be systems of junior and community colleges providing two years of advanced education beyond high school for everyone in the nation. This announcement came from Dr. Edmund J. Gleazer, Jr., executive director of the American Association of Junior Colleges. He calls it "one of the great educational phenomena of the age."

This year, 1.5 million stu-dents are enrolled in junior and community colleges. The U.S. Office of Education predicts that there will be two million enrolled in these two - year schools by 1971.

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

## **Voter Deadline** Coming Jan. 31

Registration closes Jan. 31 for persons wishing to qualify as voters in any 1967 elections. There is no poll tax this year, so it doesn't cost \$1.75 to get a voter's registration receipt. Anyone who fails to register by Jan. 31, however, will be ineligible to vote in 1967 elec-

The free voter registration receipt can be obtained at the county tax assessor - collector's office, or in Slaton at the deputy's office in the Drewry Insurance building -- located

just south of the post office. The 1967 Voter Registration Certificate enables a person to vote from Feb. 1, 1967, through Feb. 29, 1968. Persons who will be 60 years of age or over on the day of an election, and who do not reside in a city of 10,000 or more, are not required to register to be eligible to vote.


