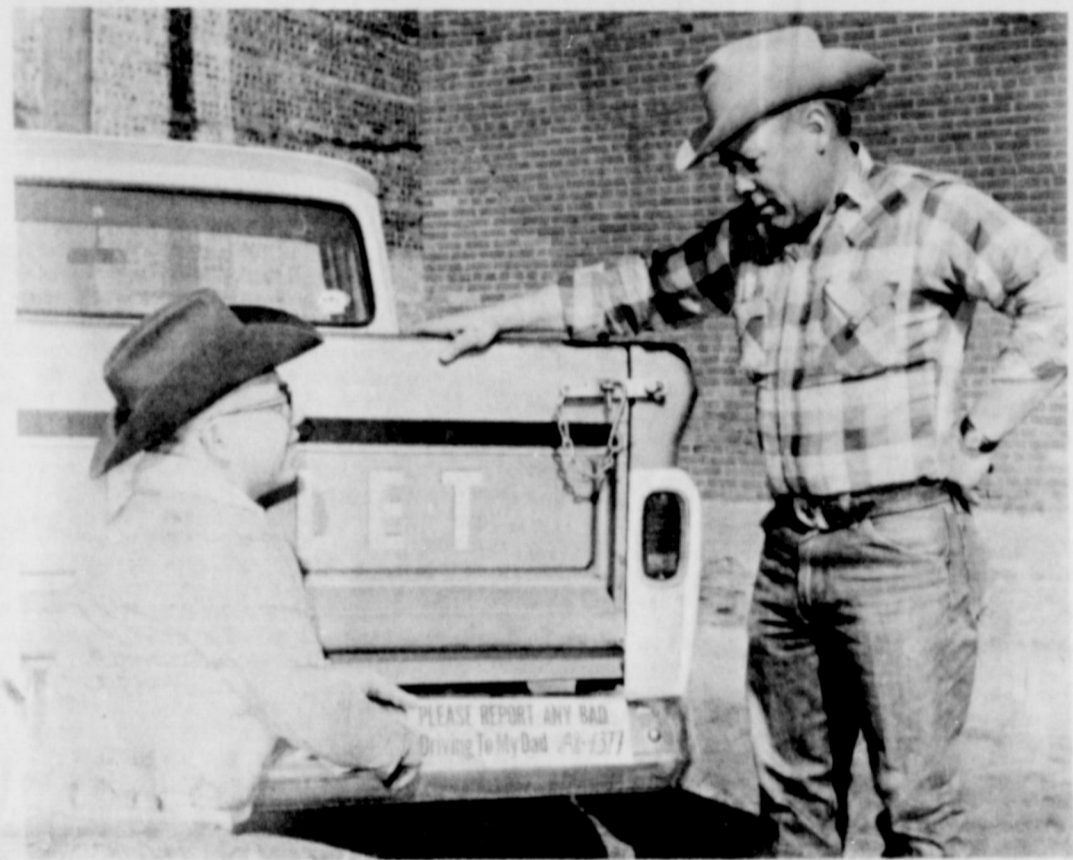
Mayor on Division Street says he is proud of the community in which you live so the city will be proud of you.

RECORD BREAKING PERFORMANCE

Slaton Division Sweeps Santa Fe Safety Honors

AMARILLO (Special) -- J. P. Spears of Slaton, superintendent of Santa Fe Railways, Slaton division, was singled out for special honors today at the railroad's annual safety meeting at Amarillo.

The Slaton division logged 1,750,000 man hours in 1966 without a single lost-time injury.

Spears' division won first place in safety over 15 other operating divisions that comprise the Santa Fe Railway.

Sign Approved For City Hall

Slaton City Commissioners, in regular session Monday night, approved advertisement of bids on a water construction project, okayed installation of a sign on the City Hall building, and studied a three-month budget report.

The division's performance to the 1966 first place won by the Western Lines over the Eastern Lines and Coast Lines in the annual competition for the best safety record.

Spears has 847 employees under his jurisdiction to operate the 1,188 miles of railroad that make up the Slaton division.

With Mayor Pro-tem Curly Martindale presiding in the absence of Mayor Jonas Cain, the commission also approved repair jobs on a city maintainer and a sewer rodder.

Commissioners Jack Smith and Rudy Dominguez were in attendance, along with City Administrator Buford Duff, City Sec. Gerald Kendrick and City Atty. Carroll Smith, Bennett Reeves, city engineer from Lubbock, was also present.

Spears added that "we've had a lot of meetings which I feel have penetrated deeply into the safety-consciousness of the employees. They realize there's more than just life and limb at stake; there's the well-being and happiness of their home and family, too."

Electricity Off Short Time Monday

A power failure of short duration left Slaton without electricity early Monday morning. The power was off about 5 to 10 minutes after a line accidentally grounded out between here and Southland, according to Southwestern Public Service officials. Power was also off at Southland.

Although the city charter does not require two publications, it was discovered that state law makes such a provision. Therefore, the city will have to advertise the bids again and award the contract. Bids will be opened at 2 p.m. on Feb. 21.

Duff termed the three-month budget comparison "very good" with expenditures being well in line. Commissioners discussed several ways of installing a sign to designate the City Hall building, deciding on 10-inch aluminum letters to be placed on the northwest corner of the building. It was decided to have the letters read: Slaton Municipal Building. Estimated cost is \$253.

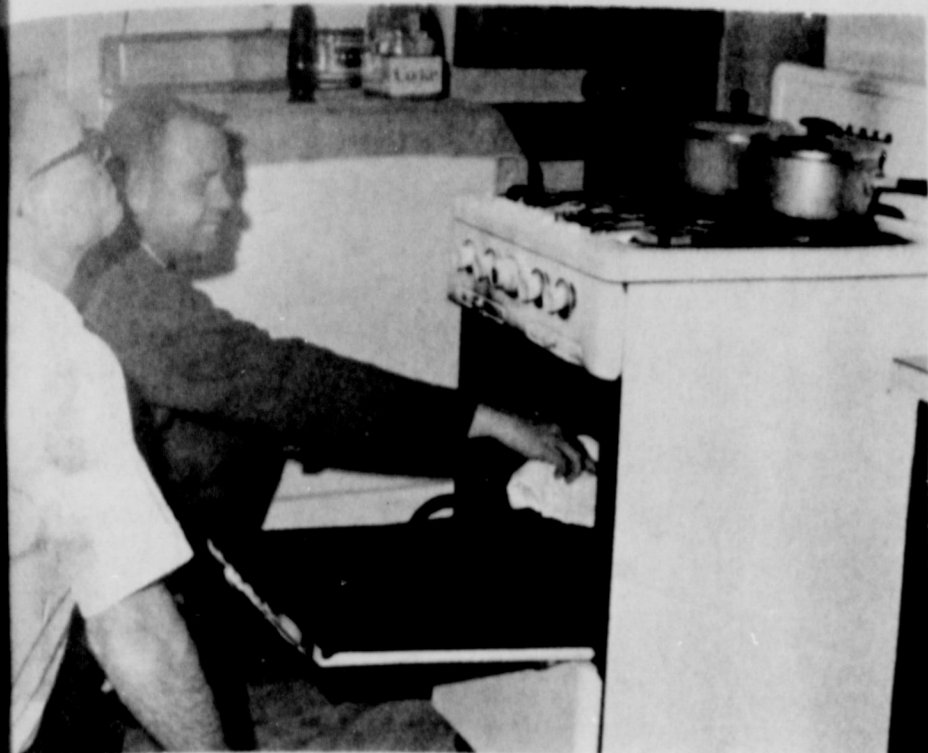

Other survivors include three daughters and six sons.

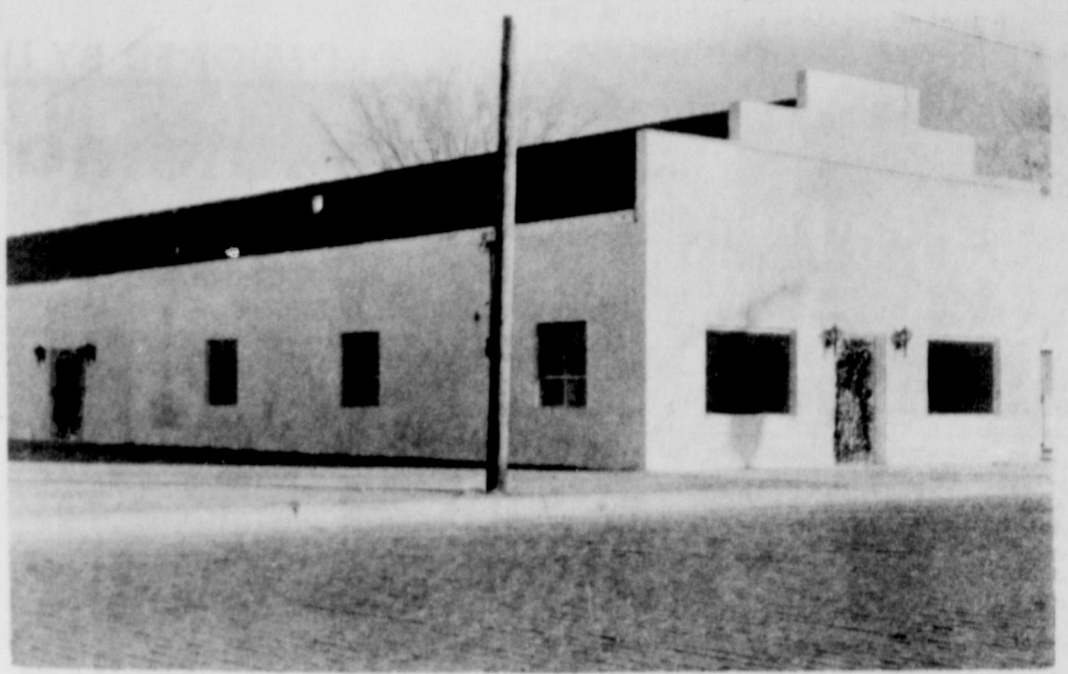

Automatic Check Stand Produced in City Shop

Automation marches on...and one of the latest "mechanical monsters" has been created right here in Slaton. Just as labor problems caused a move to mechanization in the agricultural industry, this new invention was designed upon request of a large supermarket chain which faces a critical labor situation in the East. Called an "Auto-Check", with copyright applied for by United Steel and Wire Co. of Battle Creek, Mich., the automatic checking stand was manufactured at Interstate Fixture & Supply Co. in Slaton.

Together with special shopping carts, the machine will automatically unload the baskets and deliver the items to the cashier behind the checking stand. The Auto-Check will also return the cart to the customer side of the stand, allowing them to "unload" the baby seat, or pick up items on the bottom rung of the cart.

The Auto-Check was designed by Garth Close, independent development engineer from Lubbock. He contracted Interstate to help him build the first six stands, which are to be tested in Battle Creek.

Close was retained by United

Steel and Wire to design the automatic checking stands and special carts. It is not known at this time whether additional units will be assembled here.

All of the cabinet work and assembly of the six machines was accomplished at Interstate's shop, 218 Texas Ave. Motors were readied in Lubbock. Locally, Triangle Manufacturing, Deal's Machine Shop and several firms had a part in the project -- through parts are supplies.

Close, an engineer who thrives on the challenge of his work, explained how the project was launched last November. United Steel and Wire, one of the companies which Close does work for, explained a problem posed by an Eastern supermarket chain, and asked Close to come up with an automated checkout stand.

The supermarket chain was losing out on customer service after highly unionized labor had made it economically unfeasible to have employees to take groceries out of baskets at the checkout stand. Smaller stores, not bothered by wage controls, were still offering the service.

So, the Auto-Check does away with the "Pick-up man" at the checking stand. The special carts, which can be pushed from either end, have a "gate" on

one end which is automatically opened when pushed into position at the checking stand.

As the gate is lifted, groceries slide gently down the wire basket and onto a grooved belt, which carries the items right to the checker behind the cash register. When the basket is emptied, an arm takes hold of the cart and moves it gently around to the customer side of the stand. With a slight modification, the machine will move the shopping cart the other direction.

All the checker, or cashier, has to do is push a button to operate the Auto-Check.

Close said it might be a long time before the automatic check-out stands make an appearance in this part of the country. A working model has already been demonstrated to the prospective buyers, and a large order for the stands is anticipated as soon as the test units are put in operation.

Jim Benton III, Interstate Fixture, said he and his father enjoyed working with Close in putting together the automatic stands.

"We had a number of people come into the shop and ask about these 'mechanical monsters', and some had some suggestions on improving them," Benton added.

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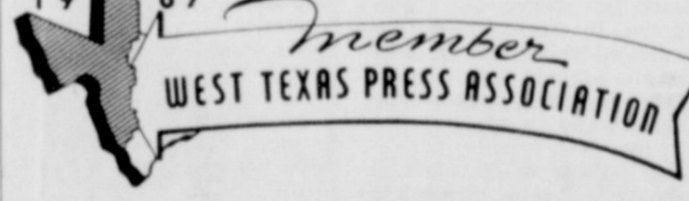

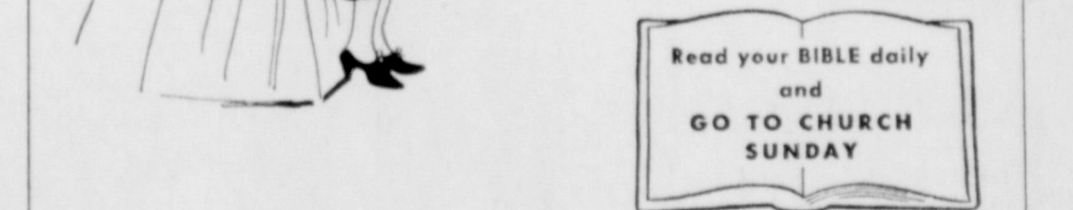

Tax Return For Ag Workers Due

Employers of farm workers are required to file Form 943, Employer's Annual Tax Return for Agricultural Employees -- 1966, and pay over their share of Social Security taxes plus amounts withheld from employee wages, on or before Jan. 31, 1967, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for northern Texas announced today.

These taxes applied to cash wages of \$150 or more paid to each employee in 1966 or on cash wages in any amount even though under \$150 in 1966, if the employee performed agricultural labor on 20 or more days during the year, Campbell said.

The rate of tax is 4.2 percent for the employer and 4.2 percent for the employee or a total of 8.4 percent on the taxable cash wages paid. A "Crew Leader" is treated as an employer under the law for the purpose of these taxes the director said.

Publication No. 225, "Farmer's Tax Guide," which gives more details on this subject may be obtained without cost by dropping a post card to District Director, Internal Revenue Service, 1600 Patterson Street, Dallas, Texas 75201.

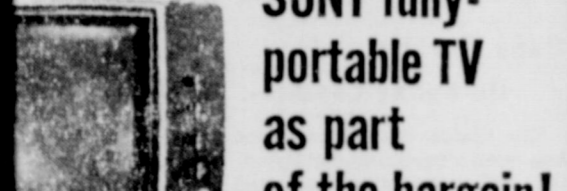

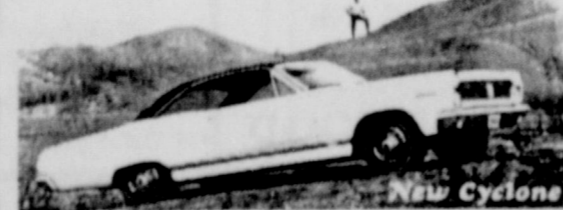

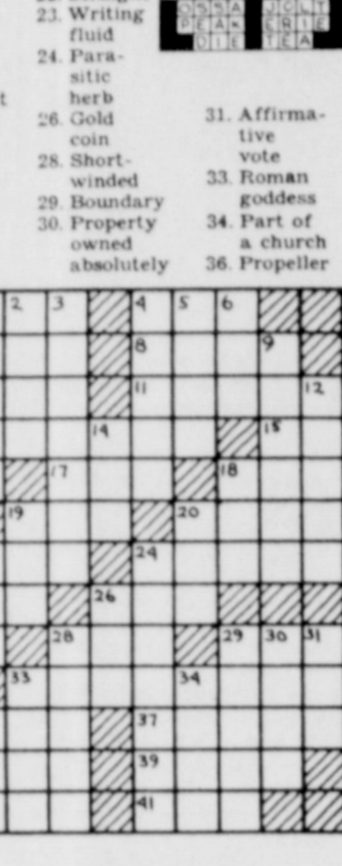

Shortage of Funds Threatens Mobile X-Ray Unit Operation

LUBBOCK -- A critical shortage of funds threatens to curtail for the coming year the use of the West Texas Tuberculosis Association mobile X-ray unit, as well as other work of the 23-county organization. Dr. John H. Selby, president of the WTTA, said today that although the Christmas Seal campaign brought in \$27,000, the organization must have another \$10,000 to work effectively.

He named several reasons for the problem: one, an expansion of the TB Association's work from a two-county to a 23-county organization in the past year; two, a consistent lag in contributions from people who use the mobile X-ray unit; and three, insufficient returns from the Christmas Seal drive.

He pointed out that, while seven West Texans died of tuberculosis in the past six months, 902 have been warned by X-ray pictures of possible serious chest illness. The number of readings last year totaled 41,757. Of these, 202 were

shown to be TB suspects, 540 showed evidence of other respiratory disease -- including cancer, emphysema and bronchitis -- and 160 indicated heart irregularities. Approximately 50 West Texans are in the state TB hospital near San Angelo at all times, Dr. Selby said. Many of these cases are discovered through the work of the TB Association.

"Tuberculosis can be eradicated," Dr. Selby said, "because you can get it only from someone who has it. If we can find all the cases, isolate them and cure them, there will be no more TB."

The WTTA, as a part of the Texas Plan for the Eradication of TB, was organized last spring to include counties which surround Lubbock and which alone "couldn't raise enough money to carry out an effective program."

WTTA expenditures for the past year's operation totaled \$32,994, including \$14,000 in salaries for the director and two full-time employees. The cost of clerical help was \$4,225.

Since this will be the first full year of operating as a 23-county Association, and in view of the necessity of following up the case-finding program to be sure medical attention is sought, the new budget will require an additional \$4,000.

This also will cover a greatly expanded educational program relating not only to tuberculosis, but also to the other chest diseases and to smoking. "The new regional setup," Dr. Selby said, "has placed more responsibility on us, and we just don't have as much money as we need."

In referring to a curtailment of the mobile unit, he pointed out that travel distances are greater and that, while volunteers formerly did much of the work in Lubbock, the unit now requires a paid worker.

The cost of each X-ray has risen to 97 cents for this area, which compares favorably with \$1.26 costs in some other Associations.

Most people using the X-ray unit last year donated no more than 50 cents, and many gave nothing at all. Persons who need the service but who cannot pay are urged to use it free, but these people, Dr. Selby said, represent a small proportion of the users.

A number of firms call upon the WTTA to X-ray all their employees, guaranteeing a donation to cover the cost. This is a mutually beneficial arrangement, and Dr. Selby said it would be helpful if more businesses would use this safeguard.

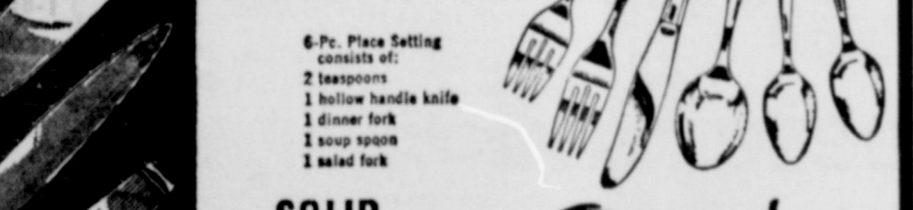

JUVENILE CASE, ATTEMPTED RAPE TOP POLICE BLOTTER

Highlights on the police scene this week included apprehension of three juveniles in connection with damages to mail boxes, investigation of an attempted rape charge, and an aggravated assault case filed in county court at Lubbock.

In cooperation with parents, two juveniles went before the local Youth Council Board after admitting to damaging mail boxes with powerful "fire-crackers." The boys are to make full restitution for damages and are on six-months probation, losing driving privileges during that time and being placed on an early curfew.

Another youth will face county juvenile authorities on charges of selling "M-80" fire-crackers. The explosives are made with nitroglycerine powder, according to police, and are strong enough to cause serious injury.

A 23-year-old man was being held for investigation of the attempted rape charge. A 12-year-old girl was involved in the case.

Police were checking two break-ins at Malone Warehouse the past week. An overcoat was taken in the first burglary last Thursday, then two drills, a jig saw and an electric screw-driver were stolen over the weekend.

A male shopper was charged with the theft of two boxes of shirts at Rona's Shoppe Tuesday afternoon. Police reported 17 arrests the past week.

Two accidents were logged on police records. A three-car accident was reported Sunday afternoon. A car driven by Joann Roberts was in collision with two parked vehicles on S. 9th street. Sandra Kay Taylor, a passenger, was taken to Mercy Hospital. Damage was estimated at \$1,650 in the accident.

Last Thursday, vehicles driven by Betty Gober of Canadian and Leslie Mitchell, Crosbyton, collided at FM-41 and US-84. Total damage was pegged at \$250.

In connection with the mail box case, Postmaster Rush Wheeler warned that the boxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or imprisonment. The Postmaster noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested in the year up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

Postmaster Wheeler quoted from the law: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail or any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or

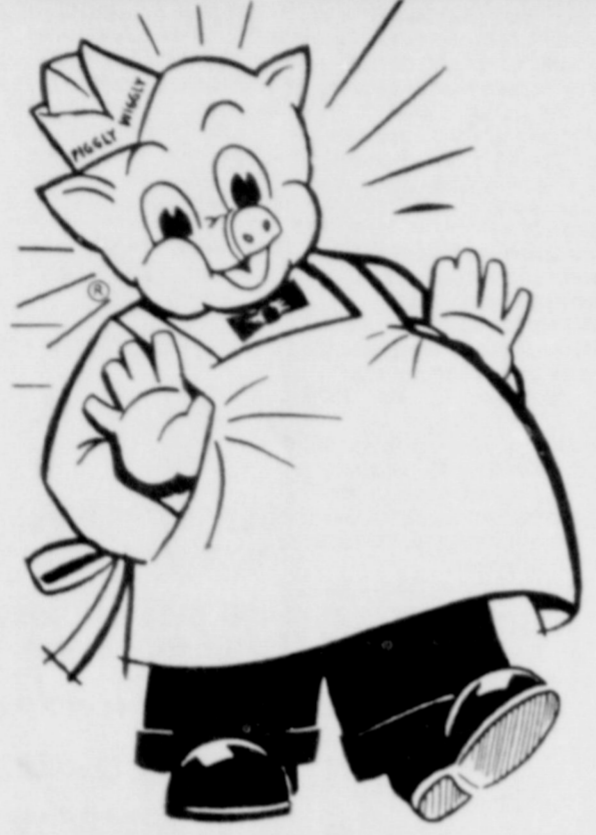
