Time For Immunizations

Yearly immunization totals for Lubbock County have been released by Lubbock City - County Health Department. The fact that the figures show a marked increase over last year's totals, is encouraging to City and County health authorities. Figures were taken from the number of immunizations administered in private doctors' offices, and the Lubbock Well-Baby Clinic, as well as City-County Health Clinics.

Total immunizations for March, April, and May are as follows: polio: 4,287 doses; diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus: 4,951 shots; and measles: 1,796 immunizations.

Totals for the year are polio, 6,586; DPT, 7,750; and measles: 3,084.

Because this normally is the polio season, present emphasis is placed on the polio vaccine,

or trivalent. For those children who have not yet had the benefit of these important protective immunizations, appointments with a family physician are recommended. Families who do not have a doctor, or cannot see a doctor, are asked to contact the Lubbock City - County Health Department, Porter 2-5411, extension 344, for more information, or actual administration of the vaccines.

A clinic in Slaton has been set up by Lubbock City - County Health Department at the Triumph Baptist Church, East Geneva and Johnson Streets. The clinic is set for each month on the first Thursday from 1:30 to 3 p.m.

Last Thursday, Mrs. Hester Moore, county health nurse, reported the clinic nurses gave 97 immunizations to children and 10 children were seen in the

FINANCIAL REPORT GIVEN

Slaton Youth Center Association released a financial statement this week showing receipts of \$13,359 and disbursements of \$12,123.

The association report reflected payments of \$3,500 on the building and property, leaving a balance of \$4,000 on the building note. Remainder of the expenses were primarily for remodeling and supplies.

Center officials pointed out that the financial statement, in no way, "reflects the many hours of labor, the furniture, fixtures, and other items donated by numerous individuals."

Donations to the center total \$7,094.91. Of this amount, \$4,131.85 was donated by clubs, organizations and firms and the remainder by individuals.

Fund-raising projects added \$6,264.40 to the receipts. Top money - maker for the youth center was the Little Britches Rodeo which netted \$1,118.28. Disbursements have included: Car project \$2,297.05; volley ball tourney \$122.39; postage & printing \$36.10; plumbing \$600; electrical work & fixtures \$963.96; acoustical tile \$1,019; utilities \$48.27; concrete and tile work \$178.40; paneling, lumber, paint \$2,405.23; pool table and accessories \$228; waste baskets \$20.59; insurance \$185.20; mops, broom & supplies \$12.76; two card table sets and wall clock \$101.28; upholster two chairs \$30; air conditioner duct work & installation \$249.78; down - payment on building \$2,500; first payment on building \$1,000; interest \$125.

The statement showed \$1,236 cash on hand and \$645 balance on donation pledges. Mrs. Willis Farrell is treasurer.

POLICE CHIEF INVITES CITIZENS TO FIGHT AGAINST BURGLARS

Every citizen of Slaton can help in the campaign to reduce losses due to burglary, Police Chief Robert Breedlove said today. Your co-operation is needed to help reduce the surge in burglaries which result each summer when families leave their homes for vacation trips, and weekend outings. By learning and practicing a few simple home protection hints, residents can keep their homes from falling victim to a vicious intruder.

The week of June 18-24 has been declared by Mayor Jonas Cain to be "Burglarly Prevention Week" in Slaton. During this week, your police department will provide information to help you protect your homes from burglars. Failure to know and practice the fundamental techniques of home protection, was largely responsible for the 61 burglaries committed in our city last year. Although most people didn't intentionally invite intruders to ransack their home, they might as well have hung up a sign saying, "no one's home, burglars welcome!"

A stroll around your neighborhood any day will tell at a glance who's away; their porches will be cluttered with circulars; an accumulation of milk bottles on the stoop; an unkempt lawn; an empty garage with the door open; or a bulging mailbox. All of these are tip-offs that'll broadcast "no one's home" to anyone canvassing the neighborhood. In the evening, most empty homes can be spotted too -- just look for the dark houses. It's a known fact, light is one of the best deterrents to crime, yet most home-owners go out for an evening and leave their homes completely dark. Or, they'll go off for a week-end or vacation and leave the same light burning day and night. No light at all, or a light burning continuously is a good giveaway "no one is home."

A simple, but effective means of having light in your home every evening, is by connecting an automatic timing device to one or two lamps. Such a timer will turn a lamp "on" early in the evening, then turn it "off" several hours later. With lights turning on and off during the evening hours it'll give the appearance someone is home and may avert a possible burglarly attempt.

Chief Breedlove went on to say, that most burglars pick the easiest targets they can find. They want to get in, get the loot and get away as quickly as possible. Therefore, if you put several obstacles in his way, he is less likely to try to break into your home, but will seek "easy pickins" elsewhere.
