"Belated honor" for a former state legislator from Slaton, the late R. A. Baldwin (1885-1940), is being sought in a resolution passed by Slaton Rotary Club and endorsed by

Slaton Lions Club. Efforts to name a tower of the Texas Tech Wiggins dormitory complex in recognition of Mr. Baldwin was recommended to a special name committee at Lubbock. The committee will present recommendations to the Tech board.

The resolution, pointing out contributions of Rep. Baldwin in an early fight for establishment of Texas Tech was sent to the committee for consideration. W. J. Klattenhoff was one of the local men to head the effort.

The four - page resolution set forth Baldwin's interest and efforts in behalf of the school, culminating in his co-authorship of the successful bill establishing the college, signed by Gov. Pat Neff on Feb. 10, 1923, during the 38th Legis-

Baldwin was elected to the state legislature in 1919, serving until 1925, It was during the 37th Legislature that he took the lead, according to the resolution, in the "time-consuming, frustrating and sometimes unpopular effort to establish a four-year college of the first rank in West Texas, even underscoring his devotion to the cause by making it a prime issue in his platform leading to successful bid for reelectmas time, this is the first summer the building is in use.

C-C Committee Sponsors Open Water Meeting

development committee, under chairmanship of Ed Moseley, held a meeting several weeks ago on long staple cotton. Moseley emphasized that the

meeting is open to all interested persons, businessmen and farmer alike ... "anyone interested in the subject of bringing water to West Texas."

Buford Duff, city administrator for Slaton since Feb. 15, 1966, announced his resignation during a regular City Commission meeting Monday night,

Duff submitted a letter of resignation to Mayor Jonas Cain, who read it at the meeting. Duff asked that termination of his duties be effective Aug.

No official action was recorded by the commission concerning the resignation, and no discussion was held as to a successor for the job.

In other business Monday night, the commission accepted paving bids on the new municipal airport and for some 24 blocks around the Public Housing project in southeast Slaton, authorized calling for bids on the sale and removal of a house on the airport site, and approved a Texas Highway Department plan for reworking the "Y" intersection on the south end of 9th street.

Contract on the runway, taxiway and apron improvements for the airport was awarded to C. W. Zahn & Son of Lubbock on a low bid of \$54,781.25. The contract is subject to approval of the Federal Aviation Agency. The bid was about \$29,500 lower than the next bid.

Low bid on the paving project around the Public Housing Authority project was submitted by Pioneer Pavers of Lubbock for \$90,747.32.

Duff said he was not yet ready to announce his future plans. His letter of resignation stated simply: "I wish to submit my resignation effective Aug. 1. I've enjoyed my stay in Slaton and wish the city every success in the future."

He is Slaton's second city administrator. Wayne Baker in 1966. The city hired Duff following a four month search for someone to fill the post. He and his wife, Saleta, have a 5-year-old daughter, Saleta Ann. Mrs. Duff has been teaching at Slaton High. He is in Slaton Lions Club and serves as treasurer of Babe Ruth League, Both are active

in the First Baptist Church, Duff attended school at Southland and Wilson and graduated from Texas Tech. He served as city secretary at Plains before coming to Slaton, and was former manager of the Crosby-

ton Chamber of Commerce. The commission also discussed a petition Monday night which requested paving of two blocks on 11th street. The two blocks, however, would not connect with other pavement, and commissioners took the request under consideration.

Several dog complaints were reported by commissioners, a problem which seems to occur every summer. The city does not have a designated "animal warden" or "dog catcher" at the present time.

The commission approved a "yield" sign on Scurry at Divvision, and a "stop" sign on Scurry at 15th street, after Hugo Mosser introduced the suggestions at the meeting.
