regular session Monday night, passed a resolution to join the Lubbock Metropolitan Council of Governments, approved plans for a curb and gutter project on S. 9th, and handled other items in a relatively short but productive meeting. Mayor Jonas Cain formally

called a municipal election for April 4 and appointed the election officials. Terms of the mayor and commissioners of Wards 1 and 3 expire this year, Curly Martindale and Jack hold the Ward 1 and 3 posts.

Candidates may file anytime prior to 5 p.m. on Friday, March 3, Filing deadline is 30 days before the election.

In other business, the commission approved the appointment of a new city policeman; approved a master meter plan for water to the low - income project; approved "Trucks Crossing" signs at points on Railroad Ave., and approved payment of bills.

The resolution to join the Lubbock Metropolitan Council of Governments (LMCOG) followed a short discussion. LM COG will not be officially organized until all governmental units have adopted resolutions and representatives meet to approve by-laws.

Bennett Reeves, city consulting engineer, presented plans and specifications for the curb and gutter project on S. 9th St., extending from Murray St. to just south of the Cloverleaf Liquor Store, Council approved the plans and authorized advertisement of bids, which will be opened March 6 at 2 p.m.

Property owners will be assessed for the curbs and gut-The commission will notify property owers involved and call a public hearing after bids have been taken on the project. Total estimated cost of the project is \$6,400. An curb and gutter was also passed.

After a short discussion, commissioners approved a "master" water meter for the proposed low-income housing units here. The city will have a single billing and collect from the Housing Authority of Slaton, rather than having some 70 meters to read and bills to make.

The only advantage for the users will be that they will reach the volume discount brackets sooner. The commission, at the same time, approved a 20 percent reduction on sewer charges for the housing units. Seventy units are planned in the project, which officials hope to have bids ready for in about 40 days.

City Administrator Buford Duff suggested that "Truck Crossing" signs be installed on Railroad Ave., and the commission approved one near Texas Ave. and another near the industrial area on the west end of the street.

Officially appointed as a new member of the police force was

a deputy sheriff in Lamb County. In recent weeks, two patrolmen -- Ricky Brush and Chester Simons -- resigned from the Slaton department, There is still one vacancy.

Several months of planning have gone into the LMCOG project, with Mayor Cain having an active part. Cain was not satisfied with the proposed bylaws restricting the governmental units to Lubbock County; otherwise he said he thought the plan would be beneficial to the city and the county.

LMCOG is a voluntary association of governmental units -- with no legislative or taxing powers -- which will act as an advisory planning group for the metropolitan area and serving as a vehicle for cooperative Federal, state and local projects.

Martindale said he was hopeful the association would serve to create better relations and communications between Slaton and Lubbock. The Ward 1 commissioner inquired about the procedure which might be used if one city wanted to apply for a Federal grant on some pro-

The mayor said it was his understanding that LMCOG would handle the paper work, and that the city involved would receive the full grant. The type of project, how many cities will participate, and other matters, will be decided before application is made.

Cut or tear newspaper into ver fine pieces. Place in waterproof container; add water to cover and let stand overnight or longer. When you are ready to use it, drain off excess water. Make a pulp from the paper mixture by whipping it with an old egg beater or pulling and tearing it with your fingers. Again drain off excess water. Add white glue as a binder -about 1 cup of glue to 3 or 4 cups of paper pulp -- and knead it through with your hands. The mixutre is now workable and will remain that

veloped a product known as instant papier mache'. It is available at some art stores, some paint stores. This product is mixed with water (about 5 parts instant papier mache to 1 part of water) in a bowl or plastic bag. Knead

dough. It is then ready to use for jewelry, candlesticks and many other articles. After mixing, this product ature for 2 or 3 days, and up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator.

Strips of Paper and Glue This, perhaps, is the simplest form of papier mache. Cut strips of newspaper about

1/2 x 1/2. Larger strips may be used for larger objects. Cover strips with white glue. Apply to object to be covered. Continue until the object is completely covered. Dry at room temperature or

in 150 degree oven. Paint desired color.

Jewelry boxes, wastebaskets, hand mirror backs and wall plaques are only a few examples of using this type papier mache.

Another variation is to use layers of newspaper and glue, then cut out around a pattern,

wallpaper paste into bowl and rylic paint. add 2 tablespoons of Elmer's glue, Mix well.

2, Fold 2 sheets of newspaper into quarters. Cut around all edges so that you have 8 loose sheets of paper.

3. Place one sheet of the cut paper on several thicknesses of newspaper. Using a 1" or 2" brush, cover the cut sheet until firm like clay or stiff of paper with the paste, brushing both ways until the paper is well covered. Lay next sheet of cut paper on glued surface. Without dipping brush in paste, may be kept at room temper- brush from center to outside edges, applying a small amount of pressure to the brush in order to work out all air bubbles, Repeat until 8 sheets have been used. Use a rolling pin to roll out all bulges and bub-



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

### Monthly Police Report Given




