Industrial development program... through community effort... by Harry Clark, executive vice president of the Texas Industrial Commission, to the Slaton Rotary Club last night.

Invited to Slaton to evaluate the city's airport plans, was a special guest at the weekly luncheon meeting in the Chamber of Commerce banquet hall.

Clark, industrial development chief, Slaton "has the nucleus for starting an industrial area." He commended the city for its industrial site plan.

Clark emphasized that industrialization is important to many small towns and that new towns are being started as trade centers for agricultural and transportation and mechanization. He pointed out the need for many things, he added.

Such as Slaton are the crossroads of the state, Clark cautioned. The five-point program for industrial development included: Community betterment, financing, sites, and leadership. "men who are willing to lead today in hopes of making \$2 million needed in the town-wide program."

He pointed out that the city's first industrial prospects might be "you already have... why aren't you... see if you can help them." He pointed out many prospects around Slaton. He urged a community effort to get the city's image ready for industrializing. He completed the five-point program.

New Slaton Area Firm Issues Open Invitation

Slaton claims a new industry this week with the open house announcement of Godbold, Inc., a livestock feed supplement manufacturer located midway between Slaton and Lubbock.

The new plant, one of the most modern feed mills in the area, has actually been completed and in operation for 2 1/2 months. The firm employs 15-20 people, all now living in Slaton.

Fisher Adams, general manager of Lubbock, issued a standing invitation to all area residents this week to tour the plant and inspect the facilities.

A Marfa-based firm, Godbold will manufacture protein and mineral blocks to serve markets in a wide area, including Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico, Arizona, Kansas and Colorado. The facility is a two-block plant.

Godbold purchased 7.5 acres of land on U. S. 84 between Slaton and Lubbock from H. C. Lewis for the facility. Mr. Godbold, whose Marfa plant employs some 20 people, tests the Godbold products on his 18,200-acre ranch near Marfa.

The plants here and at Marfa are among the largest of this type in the nation. Adams especially invites livestock raisers to come by and tour the new plant.

Tommy Wallace, Slaton Chamber of Commerce president, commented Wednesday that "we are certainly happy to welcome Godbold, Inc., to the Slaton area business community." He added that the Chamber's services and facilities would "continue to be available" to the new firm as it begins operation.

'Mix Papier Mache, Imagination In Equal Portions'

There are hundreds of uses for papier mache, but the most popular seems to be making jewelry. Even the most expensive-looking papier mache pin or bracelet can be yours with a few supplies and a free afternoon.

Even though it is a very old type of art medium, some modern developments have made it more interesting and more popular.

Mrs. B. B. Green, one of four ladies, that demonstrated uses for papier mache at last week's meeting of the Slaton Home Demonstration Club, said there is no set way to do papier mache.

Many Slaton area women are making their own papier mache jewelry. And the job provides

plenty of personalized accessories, as well as a creative hobby.

Other articles that can be made including spray net can covers, statuettes, plaques, artificial fruit, candlesticks, wastebaskets, hand mirrors and toys.

A woman's imagination is the only limitation to the items she can make with papier mache, says Mrs. Green.

Two members of the Slaton Home Demonstration Club, Mrs. Green and Mrs. Ricky Brush, and Mrs. Bennie Hagens of the Woodrow Home Demonstration Club, attended a workshop Jan. 20 held by county agent, Mrs. Mildred Patterson, and learned how to work with papier mache.

Assisting Mrs. Green and Mrs. Hagens present a program were Mrs. E. E. Bishop and Mrs. Alton Meeks.

Following is a list of instructions that can be used and the method these four women recommend:

Home Made Papier Mache
Cut or tear newspaper into

fine pieces. Place in waterproof container; add water to cover and let stand overnight or longer. When you are ready to use it, drain off excess water. Make a pulp from the paper mixture by whipping it with an old egg beater or pulling and tearing it with your fingers. Again drain off excess water.

Add white glue as a binder -- about 1 cup of glue to 3 or 4 cups of paper pulp -- and knead it through with your hands. The mixture is now workable and will remain that

way several days as long as it is moist.

Instant Papier Mache
Recently there has been developed a product known as instant papier mache. It is available at some art stores, some paint stores.

This product is mixed with water (about 5 parts instant papier mache to 1 part water) in a bowl or plastic bag. Knead until firm like clay or stiff dough. It is then ready to use for jewelry, candlesticks and many other articles.

After mixing, this product may be kept at room temperature for 2 or 3 days, and up to 2 weeks in the refrigerator. Strips of Paper and Glue
This, perhaps, is the simplest form of papier mache.

Cut strips of newspaper about 1 1/2 x 1/2. Larger strips may be used for larger objects. Cover strips with white glue. Apply to object to be covered. Continue until the object is completely covered.

Dry at room temperature or in 150 degree oven. Paint desired color.

Jewelry boxes, wastebaskets, hand mirror backs and wall plaques are only a few examples of using this type papier mache.

Another variation is to use layers of newspaper and glue, then cut out around a pattern, for example: Papier Mache Pins

1. Pour about 1/2 cup plastic wallpaper paste into bowl and add 2 tablespoons of Elmer's glue. Mix well.

2. Fold 2 sheets of newspaper into quarters. Cut around all edges so that you have 8 loose sheets of paper.

3. Place one sheet of the cut paper on several thicknesses of newspaper. Using a 1" or 2" brush, cover the cut sheet of paper with the paste, brushing both ways until the paper is well covered. Lay next sheet of cut paper on glued surface. Without dipping brush in paste, brush from center to outside edges, applying a small amount of pressure to the brush in order to work out all air bubbles. Repeat until 8 sheets have been used. Use a rolling pin to roll out all bulges and bubbles.

4. Lay the 8 sheets on clean flat surface to dry, turning often to keep from warping, or hang on coat hanger with clothes pins to dry.

5. When paper is almost dry, mark your design and cut out. Pins can now be shaped to forms desired. Let dry at room temperature or 150 degrees in oven.

6. If using string for decoration, glue on with Elmer's glue and let dry.

7. Seal pins with shellac or a good sealer and let dry.

8. Paint with tempera or acrylic paint.

9. To Antique: Mix a small amount of oil paint in compound and brush on. Wait about 5 or 10 minutes. Wipe off with cheese cloth or soft rag until desired effect is obtained.

10. Apply 2 or 3 coats of Elmer's glue. If using Elmer's glue, use a brush with three strips of newspaper dipped in Elmer's glue. Paper with color of paper is dry.

11. Imagination is the key to working with papier mache. Most any firm surface can be covered with papier mache. With a little creative some spare time and investment, it seems that papier mache personal articles are available to anyone.

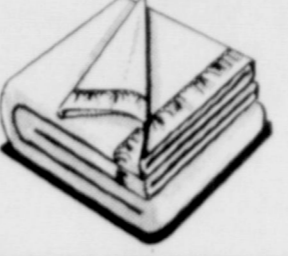

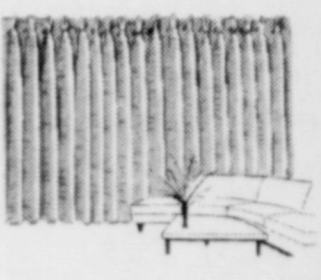

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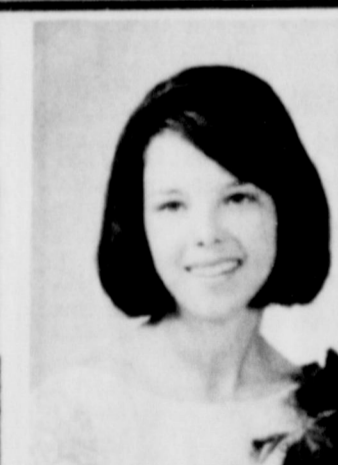

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Slaton Club Marks Rotary Anniversary

Next week the Slaton Rotary Club will mark the 62nd anniversary of the founding of Rotary, the oldest of the service clubs, in Chicago, Ill., on Feb. 23, 1905.

At its regular weekly luncheon meeting on Feb. 23, the local club plans a program on the anniversary of Rotary.

Announcing the milestone, B. B. Castleberry, president, said "The Rotary Club of Slaton is linked with more than 12,600 other Rotary Clubs in 134 nations around the world. Rotary meetings marking this anniversary will be held in many languages, including Arabic, Danish, Finnish, French, Spanish, Portuguese, Japanese and Persian."

The Rotary Club of Slaton, organized in 1925, has 35 members, all business and professional men of the community. Since the membership is composed of one representative of each business and profession, the club represents a cross-section of the community's vocations.

Richard L. Evans of Salt Lake City, Utah, president of Rotary International, outlined a 10-point program for Rotary clubs everywhere at the beginning of his year last July. It includes extending Rotary to new communities, aiding youth, developing friendships across national borders, and "doing something for someone, somewhere."

Mr. Evans, Rotary's world leader for 1966-67, is a radio broadcaster. Since 1930, he has narrated, written and produced "Music and the Spoken Word" over a nation-wide (U. S.) network.

Rotary clubs carry out their service programs both through individual and united action.

Discussion on Welfare Presented at Slaton Church

"Rags and Riches" was the theme of a panel presentation at First Christian Church here Feb. 8 which was participated in by representatives from the various welfare and social service agencies of the Slaton area.

Master of ceremonies Raulin McCormick began the informative program with a prayer and statement directed toward the need of the Church generally to understand and to act in this area of human need which is so real to so many people who live, "right with us."

First member of the panel to present her particular area was Mrs. R. T. Farley who is locally in charge of responsibilities in connection with the Women's Job Corps, which is a federally authorized program very similar, but not so comprehensive as the Job Corps for men which has been in operation a much longer period of time.

Mrs. Farley pointed out that girls, 16 to 21 years of age are eligible, who are school drop-outs, or who have home situations from which they need to move in order to be able to improve themselves. Also pointed out by Mrs. Farley was the fact that there is no local contact in Slaton for the male side of the Job Corps and that, in all probability, one certainly is needed.

Mrs. Rosa Settles, Lubbock County Welfare Director, said for Slaton, the big problem of implementation seems to be the distance of the County office in Lubbock from the needy persons who reside in the Slaton area. She stated that all applications for County welfare must be made in person in the Lubbock office, even though City of Slaton is furnishing a pick-up truck which goes to Lubbock on the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month. It picks up the food subsidies which are distributed to Slaton needy, but this is distributed only to the needy who have been to Lubbock to make application. Some of the statistics revealed by Mrs. Settles were most enlightening.

She said that one out of every six of the applicants over 65 years of age can't read nor write. Further she said that in all the cases only 1/2 of one percent had as an element the desertion of the mother from needy children, but that 32 percent had as an element the desertion of the father. She showed further that the largest single item in the County Welfare budget was for hospital care and

that most of this is of an emergency nature.

Mrs. Hester Moore, Lubbock County Health Nurse assigned to the Slaton area, made her presentation by saying that her main commodity was not so much in goods or tangible services, but mainly in the area of education. She pointed out that the County Health program is primarily designed to teach people how to better care for themselves in the areas of health, personal hygiene and family planning. In addition a vigorous program of immunization and child care is also in effect.

Mrs. Moore pointed the great need for more of our streets in the entire town of Slaton being provided with street signs and the houses with numerals.

Next Speaker was Chief of Police Robert Breedlove, who reported primarily on one particular aspect of our town's life, that of juvenile delinquency, especially as it is related to the Slaton Youth Council. The Council is a board composed of persons on a basis of salary-free participation, who have brought before them children and young people accused of crimes in the categories of both felony and misdemeanor.

The small percentage of second offenders who have occurred with those brought before the council speak very highly of its degree of effectiveness. It was pointed out that the parents as well as the children accused of the crime are brought before the council and that the things prescribed in each case are tailored to fit the individual child and family situation.

Mrs. Bill Smith told of the services of groceries, clothing, etc., being provided for residents of the Slaton area by the welfare center operated by the United Church Women of Slaton, composed of the women from four churches, First Baptist, First Presbyterian, First Methodist and First Christian.

The center is now housed in new quarters provided in rent-free property located at 7th and Lynn avenues. Citizens of the Slaton area are encouraged to bring their used clothing to the center where it will be sorted, etc., and put into the hands of people without adequate clothing.

Final report was made by Rev. Johnnie Moore on behalf of the Slaton Ministerial Alliance. Rev. Moore stated that the aid given by the Alliance is totally geared as to indigent transients to help them on their way with gasoline, groceries, or a night's lodging. He pointed out that this is a cooperative venture on the part of most of the churches in Slaton, and that any officer of the Alliance is authorized to secure that which is needed.

He went on to say that the Alliance is presently actively

trying to take the necessary steps in order to secure a day nursery for Slaton that would provide care on a day-basis only for the children of underprivileged persons who must work (both husband and wife or wife in home without a father or a disabled father). He pointed out that the program is in a condition to be able to go now, if a building or large house can be secured on a rent, lease or time-purchase basis. More is to

be brought to the attention of the public as soon as further developments take place.

Persons attending the meeting and hearing the presentations of the members of the panel expressed their thanks and their appreciation to all who participated, as it was felt that a great deal more understanding was given to all in connection to what is being done in this very vital area of our communities life.

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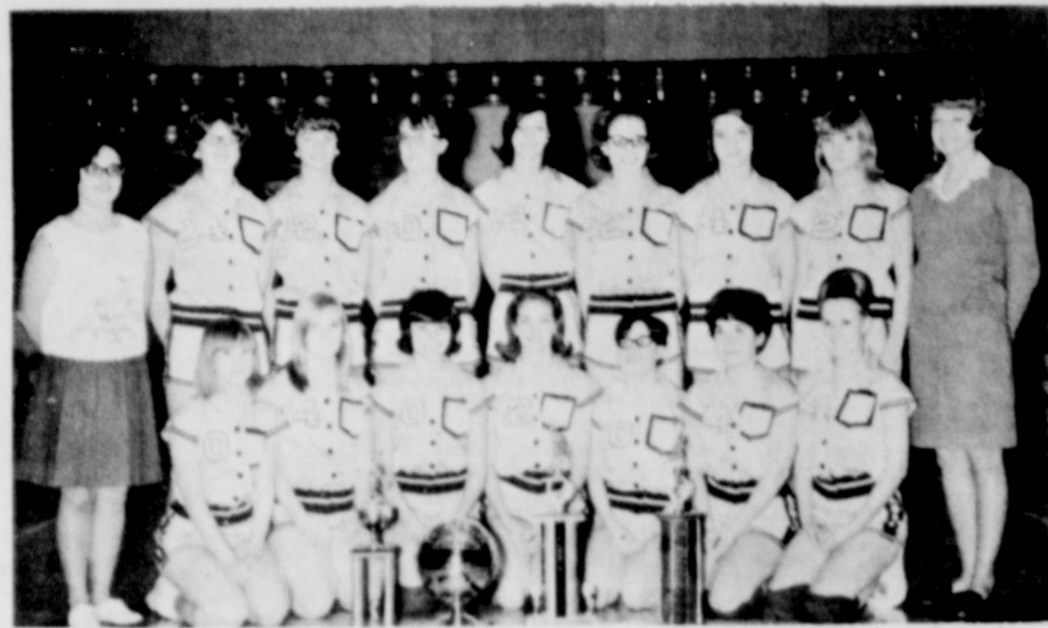

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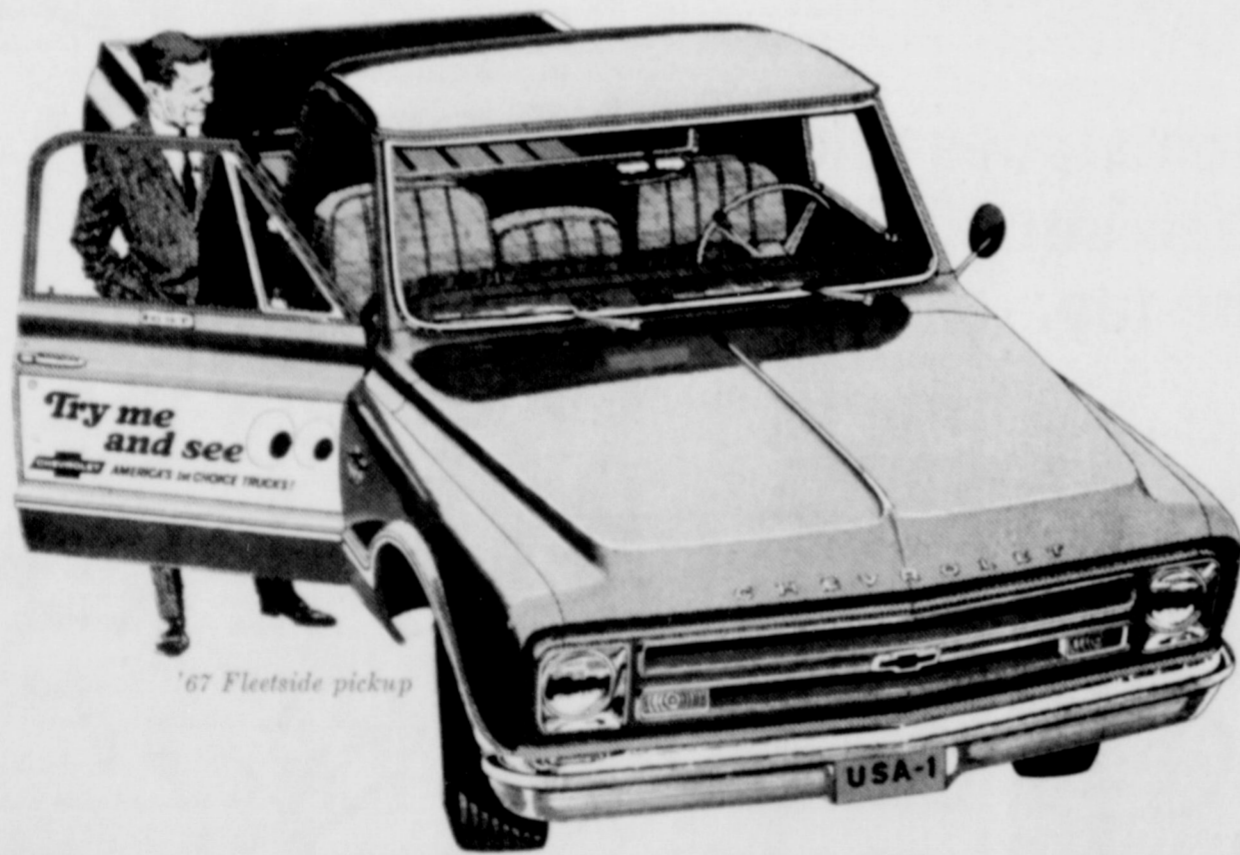

Offenses reported to the Slaton Police Department during the month of January totaled 81, and police cleared 46 of the incidents, according to figures from a monthly report.

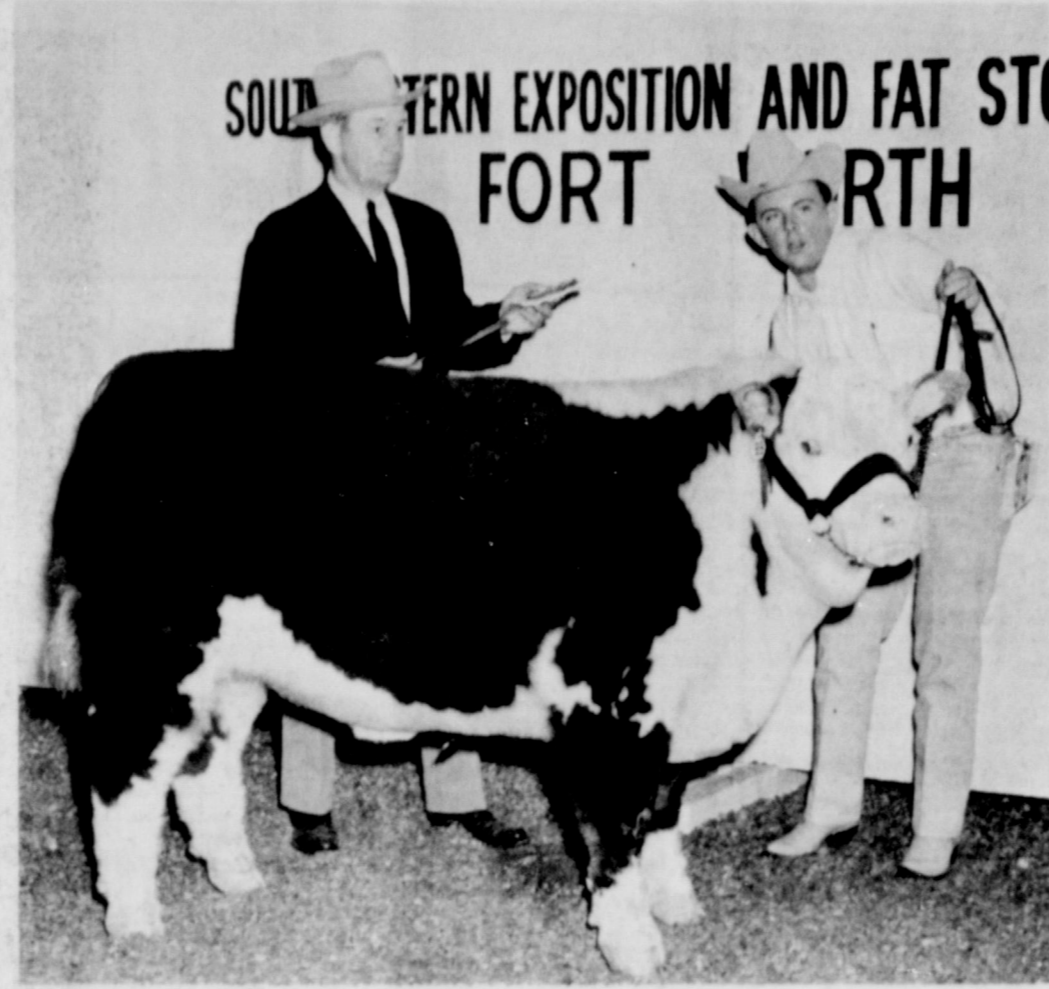
Of the 81 offenses reported, 36 were listed as thefts, burglary or lost property. Fourteen cases of vandalism or destruction of private property were on the report.

Jail arrests for the month totaled 44, and 10 of these were for possession of alcoholic beverages by minors. Another 21 cases involved illegal alcoholic offenses. City court collected \$825 in fines for the month.

A total of 33 traffic tickets were issued during the month with six being for driving without a license. City court collected \$381 on the traffic offenses.

Police investigated 12 accidents during the month, and damage was estimated at \$4,155. The two police units registered 6,417 miles on patrolling the city.

MEXICAN-AMERICAN RELATIONS TOPIC FOR LIONS CLUB MEET

Frank Gonzales, Lubbock, district Lions' chairman for international relations, was guest speaker for the Slaton Lions Club meeting Tuesday at noon.

Gonzales, introduced by Joe Diaz, spoke on the need for better understanding between peoples of Mexico and the United States. He contrasted the founding and background of the two countries, pointing out they were "as dissimilar as could be."

While remarking that "mutual respect and friendship is at an all-time high between the countries, Gonzales called for both Americans and Mexicans to "look at both sides of the coin."

Gonzales added that there was a need to "speak more frankly about Mexican-American relations", and to better understand each other in order to keep communism out of the hemisphere.

He said the U. S. was a "great hybrid nation", opening its doors to 43 million immigrants up to 1966. Mexico, on the other hand, has never opened its doors to others. He said most Mexicans were proud of their Indian heritage, but not of their Spanish heritage.

Gonzales said Mexicans were not ready for self rule when they came out of 300 years of oppression under the Spaniards. They didn't realize the difference between "liberty" and "license", Gonzales said. He said Negroes were in a similar position in the U. S.

He pointed out that Mexico was making great strides in education, welfare and industrialization.

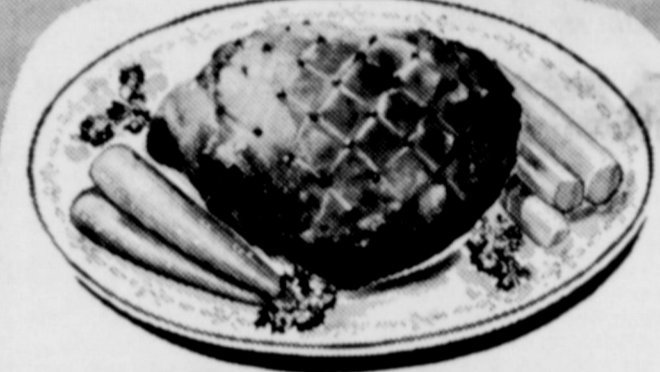
