DITORIALLY SPEAKING Observations and Potpourri

Have you read the proposed Amendment No. 14 that is to be placed before the voters of Texas on November

Frankly, this "trial de novo" amendment would grant the State Legislature unlimited and unprecented control over administrative and executive functions of every town and city within the state, counties, school boards, water and hospital districts and state agencies by subjecting their actions -and orders, -even those of routine and minor nature - to litigation in the

Mayor L. O. Lemon has pointed out to the Slatonite that the city commission is unanimous and emphatic in its desire for study of this situation by every voter, urging defeat of the proposal. Literature coming across our desk indicates apprehension in any areas all over the state, with even the judicial branch, as represented by Texas Supreme Court Justice Meade F. Griffin. indignant about this additional power advocated for the

"De Novo" means "anew." Thus, when any decision is taken to court for "trial de novo," not only is the decision of the administrative body disregarded, but the fact that such a decision was made cannot be mentioned nor can it be recited what facts led to such a

This amendment, if approved by the people and implemented by a future Legislature, will have a drastic effect on the fundamental democratic processes of

It will make meaningless any decision reached by a city council, school board or any other executive agency of the state. To you, the taxpayer, it will increase the cost of government. The courts will be swamped with "trial de novo appeals." It has been estimated that at least 100,000 cases would be added to civil dockets each year on appeal from local and state agencies, an increase in court filings of 200 per cent.

Technical staffs of administrative agencies will stand idly by while judges are forced to ake decisions on budgets, highway right-of-way, water allotment, oil and gas proration, insurance rates, classification systems for school teachers and a multitude of other problems that are now handled by skilled experts in each of these various fields.

Chaos could be created in local and state governments. Also, business, professional men or industries, regulated by or doing business with local or state government agencies, will be subjected to time-consuming and costly court actions. Confusion will be created for the average citizen.

Following are aong the comments made by prominent Texans:

'If this amendment is adopted, municipal officials may as well close down everything but the City Jail. Even the granting of a dog license by city agencies could be made subject to review in the courts." -George E. Murphy, President of the Texas Municipal League.

"This is the most serious and dangerous proposal to come before the people in my lifetime. . . Under this amendment, any crackpot with a \$15 to \$20 court deposit could file a law suit and delay a \$15,000,000 project for years." - Victor W. Bouldin, Houston attorney.

"I am interested in frontyard government, where the people can be as close as possible to the government, but this proposal will open the door to the destruction of local government." - Abner V. McCall, president of Baylor University.

"This amendment would destroy the most fundamental principal of our government—that of checks and balances between the legislative, judicial and executive branches of government." - J. E. Sturrock. manager of the Texas Water Conservation Association.


