



# EDITORIALLY SPEAKING — Observations and Potpourri —

We never cease to be disturbed when new proposals are made for firearms control. Whether it's the sportsman in us or whether we are apprehensive of another freedom being withdrawn, we are not quite sure; probably both factors enter in.

A number of publications have hinted, and not so gently, during recent months that more legislation is necessary for a stringent firearms control on governmental levels. The supprting argument usually is a variation of the cry that "arms aid the criminal."

Sure, we agree that the scum of our nation is more dangerous with a gun at hand. but no further legislation can curtail this without infringing on the needs, rights and pleasures of the hunter, the farmer, the boy with his dog and gun.

As for criminal's use of a gun: upon tracing, in practically every instance it is found that the criminal is carrying a stolen weapon — not one purchased through legitimate channels.

If additional controls are needed — then let's control them and himself, not his gun! Then the criminal will meet his just reward, and the sportsman and citizen can continue with his game shooting, varmint control and protection of home.

We hope the politicians of both parties, many of whom have just assumed office in recent elections, will note this among the growing number of freedoms that are being lost.

We might point out some other liberties in danger or forfeited during the past decade. Our children may even fail to recall some of these privileges:

Freedom to know what's going on in every segment of government.

Freedom from peacetime military conscription. Freedom from foreign entanglements.

- Freedom to receive our total income.
- Freedom of the farmer to run his own farm. Freedom to own gold.

Freedom to determine measure of our intervention in affairs of other nations, foreign give-away. foreign loans, etc.


... and doubtless any reader could add many more. The trend is more frightening to us than any specific one of the above listed losses. Are we alarmists?



#### On Management of the News . . .

The old problem of whether or not the ends justify the means cropped up in a form relatively new to the United States Tuesday.

Arthur Sylvester, Assistant Secretary of Defense for Public affairs in the Pentagon, frankly admitted the Government had managed, controlled and damned up the flow of news about the Cuban crisis, and he indicates it expected to continue to do so. He envisaged news as "part of . . . weaponry," and declared flatly that "the results. . .justify the methods we use."

There is no doubt that "management" or "control" of the news is censorship described by a sweeter term. There is no doubt that it restricts the people's right to know. Thre is no doubt that public positions upon great national issues cannot be intelligently formed unless the facts are available. There is no doubt that a democratic government cannot work if news of and about that government is long suppressed or managed or manipulated or controlled.

There is also no doubt that in time of crisis a sense of responsibility and restraint on the part of all public informatinn media is imperative. The withholding by voluntary restrictions or, in time of war by censorship, of certain types of military and security information is imperative. But to attempt to manage the news so that a free press should speak (in Sylvester's words) in "one voice to your adversary" could be far more dangerous to the cause of freedom than the free play of dissent, than the fullest possible publication of the facts. —N.Y. Times.

Attorney General Robert Kennedy explained it that way in an interview with Henry Brandon, Washington correspondent for the London Times.

The story came out last Sunday morning on the front page. Jim Whittenburg III, who is visiting over there, clipped it and airmailed it to us.

Reporter Brandon wrote: "I remarked that what struck me most in Mississippi was the unbelievable isolation in which its people live. A slightly embarrased smile scurried over the Attorney General's face. With a slight shrug of the shoulder he said, 'What can you do if all the local newspapers, radio and television stations, politicians, businessmen, most of the clergy, do everything to maintain this isolation?' "
