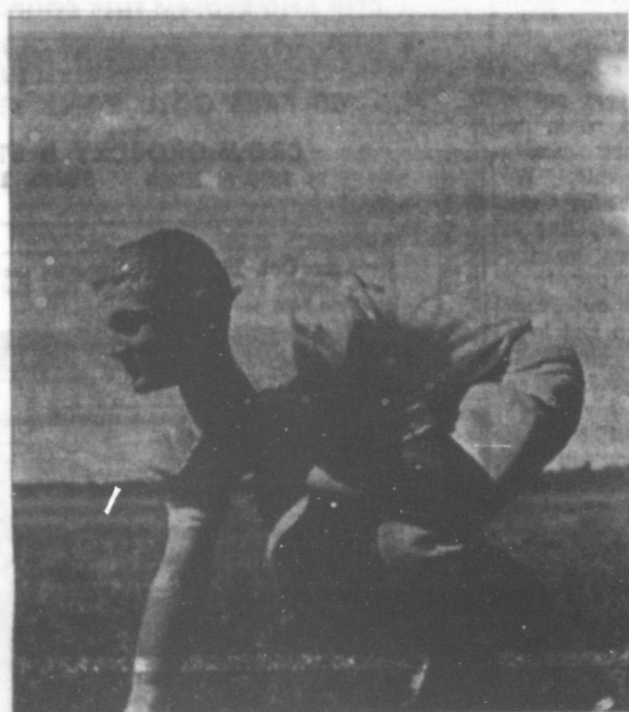

# Arlie J. Hoover Writes About Red Tape In East Berlin, Germany

(Editor's Note: Arlie J. Hoover, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Hoover, 850 South 12th St. in Slaton, is an exchange student attending the University of Berlin on a Fulbright scholarship. Hoover has written the following letter explaining the red tape that is necessary to cut in order to travel in and out of East Berlin. Accompanying Hoover on the trip described herein is his wife, Gloria and a friend, Ann Baxter of Kansas.

Dear Folks,  
Well, here we are back in Berlin after over a week on the road and in Denmark. We took off last Thursday, September 12. First you have to have a visa to get thru the East German zones. Most people have to go over to East Berlin to a special little building to get theirs, but we got a tip from Ann Baldwin that you can take your passport to the Swedish Travel Bureau and they will take them over and have the visa stamped in your passport for an extra charge of three marks, the visa itself costing 10 marks. That saves about four to six hours trouble we

were told so we did it gladly. Then we took off in the little Triumph Spitfire for west. When we got to our first checkpoint it took about two hours for me to get thru all the red tape they make you go through. Ann and Gloria waited in the car while I went through the ceremony for the first time. You have to pay a five mark visa for the car you are taking through the zones. Then all parties traveling have to fill out a special little form telling how much and what kind of currency they are taking out of West Berlin. Actually the first thing you do is to register at the Allied Check Point (they are nice guys, they are on our side). They take down your passport numbers and the number of the car in case you don't get out on the other side in about four hours and if you don't they begin to hunt for you. Well, it was pretty crowded the day we went out. Its the end of the summer and lots of tourists are going out. When we got through the first control station you start driving for 110 miles. That went pretty fast, but then came the second control station at the end of the East German border near Hanover. The cars were backed up

for a mile or more waiting to get into the area where they could go through the final check. Again they must inspect your passports, check your car permit, take up your currency form, and then search your car to make sure you aren't trying to smuggle someone out. Then you make another check at the Allied Check Point to tell them you got through. In all it took us seven hours to go that 110 miles. That was during the day, however; on the way back we hit all that during the night and it only took about three hours, so it just depends on a lot of factors as to how fast you can get through. I wish I could have gotten some pictures of that line of cars we were in during the day. We saw a cookey Italian shooting a moving picture of the line, something that was strictly forbidden, he looked like the cat that ate the canary. Ann and Gloria were just furious about all the time it took, but it was an interesting experience to me. They say that the control points are easy or rough depending on whether there have been any incidents in Berlin lately. If there has been an incident they can really get sassy and gum things up good and proper. They have been known to rip open suitcases and search them—something which

they cannot legally do. We kept all cameras and radios in the trunk or well concealed since the guards have been known to confiscate those things if they get provoked. Their real purpose in all this red tape is to discourage tourists from going to West Berlin. When people of the world look at the contrast between East and West Berlin its the worst propaganda defeat they could get. When you fly in you miss all of this red tape since they have no jurisdiction over the corridors, air that is.

Well, we got out on the other side and tanked up on cokes for a few minutes. Then we continued the trip to Denmark. I drove all the way. A sports car is not a very comfortable riding car. We made our way to a little town on the German coast called Puntgarden. There we put the little car on a big ferry boat (it carried RR cars also) and it took us to the island of Zealand, where Copenhagen is located. We stayed on Zealand for the next week. We never got to the mainland of Denmark, but most people say that Copenhagen is Denmark and anyway there was plenty to do there. The Danish countryside was very beautiful all the way up. Its amazing how the farmers in Europe use every last square foot of their soil for something, either plants or animals grazing on it. Beautiful little flower gardens growing all over the place. The houses and streets were so clean. We spent the night in a motel at the bottom of Zealand that night and then drove to Copenhagen the next day. We got there about noon and started looking for a place to stay for the night. We put Ann in a hotel in the center of town and then Gloria and I went out to the Youth Hostel, a place designed to help young people spend the night cheaply. We stayed there that night for about a dollar but we didn't like it too much. So we got up the next morning and drove to a motel about 9 miles out from the center of the town and kept it for the next five nights. It had private shower and all so we were satisfied. It cost 45 Krona, that is about 6.50 a night. In Denmark you have to divide by seven to get the equivalent in dollars. Then for the next week we just loitered around the city doing various things. We went to four movies while we were there, "The VIP's," "Escape from East Berlin," "Mutiny of the Bounty," and "The Birds." We frequented a lot of exotic restaurants, two of which give you the menu to keep. We have them as souvenirs now. The food in restaurants is very reasonable in comparison to the states. We got a lot of steaks, and they had very tasty sauce with loads of green beans and french fries; we really stuffed ourselves. For dinner we would sometimes have just a hotdog from one of the corner stands since we weren't really hungry after the last big meal on the town. Its so hard to get a coke with ice anywhere in Europe; and you have to ask for water if you really want it with your meal. Then we went one night to

Tivoli's, which is sort of an amusement park with a lot of other things thrown in. It was very crowded that night and the next day we found out why: that was the night Lyndon Johnson was there; it was part of his goodwill tour into Scandinavia that you have probably read about in the papers. I tried to take some pictures of the beautiful lighted buildings that had there that night but I don't know if they took or not. Went to a swell Smorgisbord at Tivoli's and met a guy from Los Angeles who knew about Pepperdine College. He gave us his card and told us he wanted to have us for dinner when we get to Los Angeles, Calif. We mostly liked the sights on the city; like monuments, queer and quaint little buildings, and the like. I really was let in for a lesson in a new kind of driving in the city; I mean it was the worst I have ever seen. Not only are there jillions of cars, little cars, everywhere, but the place, especially during rush hours, is flooded with bikes, motorbikes, motor cycles, and all kinds of

little self-propelled vehicles. The streets had such strange names and the street signs were on buildings instead of on poles on the street corner. It was very confusing to try to find anything although we had a very accurate map of the city and it looked very simple on the map. I really learned how to drive unscrupulously in that city, I mean. They had so many crazy one-way streets and I started making U-turns right in the middle of the streets. I had seen other natives do it so I figured I could get away with it also. I made one right in front of a trolley car once; almost got smashed too; I'm not used to looking out for those things yet. When the week was up I was skilled in that frenzied driving. I'm glad to be back in Berlin; its not quite so bad here. One day on the trip, Gloria and I left Ann in the city and took a little jaunt across the middle of the island. We passed through a lot of little quaint villages and took some pictures of a castle and what not. Then one day we went through a museum of art. Then one day we left Ann in the city and took a Hydrafoil boat (that's one of those boats that gets up on stilts when it gets to going fast) over

to Sweden, to the port of Malmo. We kicked around the town for a while, window-shopping and sight-seeing, and also bought some Swedish knives for Mrs. Garrison; she really needs them. We plan to get you all a set in Berlin later in the year; both countries are famous for their cutlery. Then the next few days were taken up in shopping mostly. Gloria and Ann spent a long time getting some clothes for Ann, and we looked around all kinds of shops. I almost had to put a bib on Gloria she drooled so much; she really liked Danish modern furniture and the prices were so much less than that in the states.

So we pulled out of Copenhagen yesterday, the 20th and back in Berlin. As my trip back in was mostly Mother, you really worry about anything that happen to us here. They do anything to anyone do something illegal, like a person out to the tourists and to make this red tape one has to recognize East Germany. don't need to worry about kidnapping us, unless we do something really bad, the whole thing is just a of one's patience. Coming to Berlin a funny thing happened at the first control

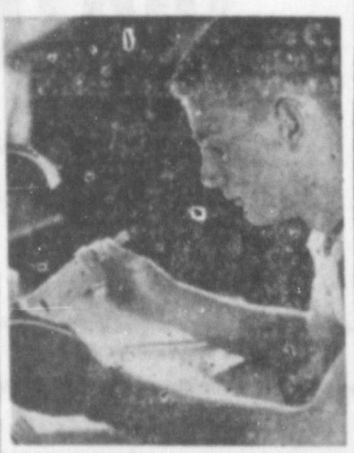

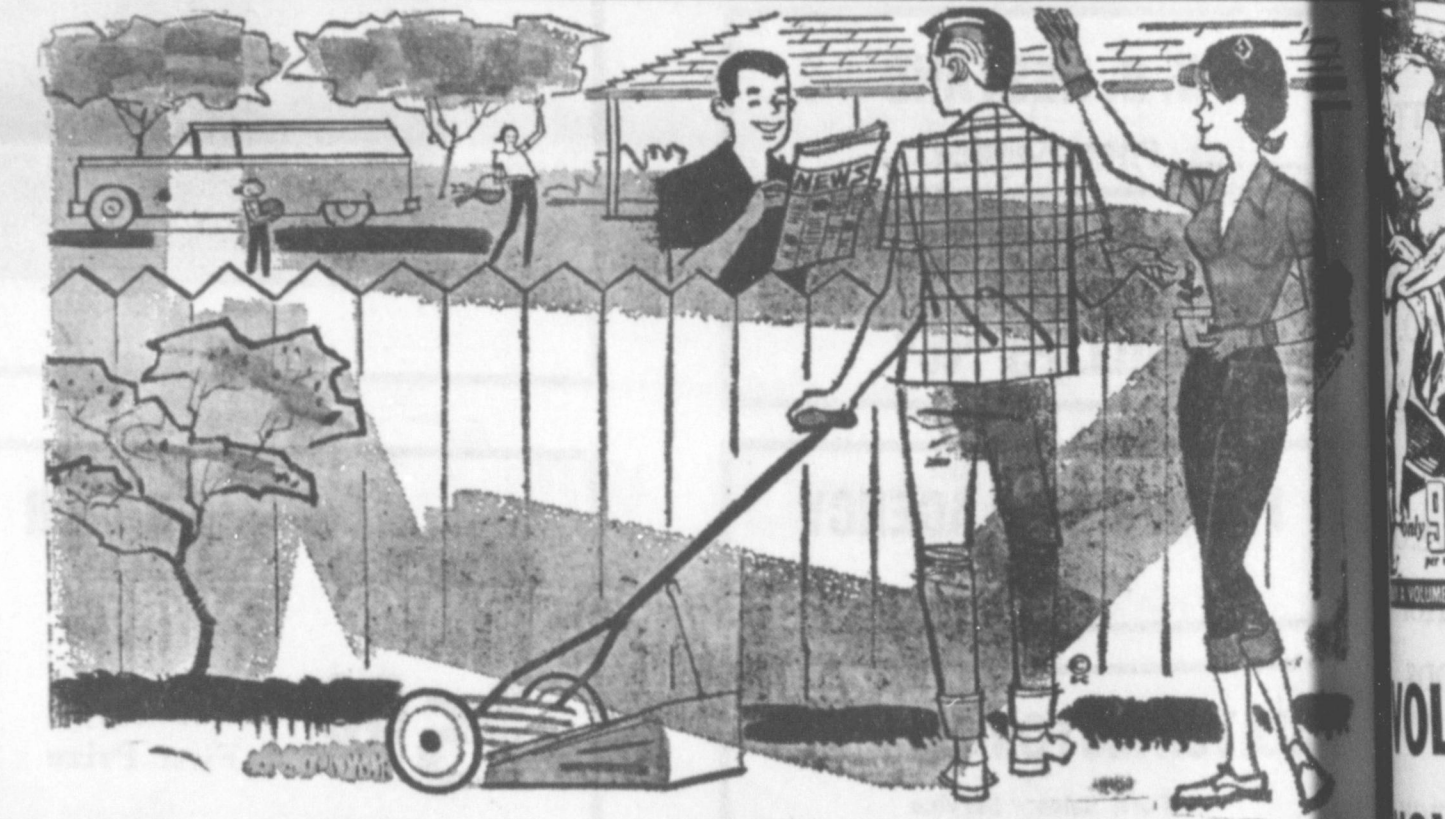

We paid \$37 for the both of them; now we have SOME kind of transportation, even if it's still not as good as a car. With our transformer we can use all of our appliances, which are 110 volts, on Berlin's

current, which is 200. We got it for only \$5 used, and it pulls up to 1500 watts which will handle all the appliances we have. It even has the American type plug, so we don't have to change all our plugs to the round type like is used in Germany. Now Gloria can use her hair-drier and I my shaver which pleases us both to no end. Gloria got her hair fixed twice in Copenhagen; the hairdressers are all male and they do a very good job.

### Columbus Day Address Will Be Broadcast On Local Station

Andrew Kitten, Grand Knight of Slaton Council No. 2571, Knights of Columbus, has announced that a Columbus Day Address by Supreme Knight Luke E. Hart, head of the million-member fraternal benefit society of Catholic men, will be broadcast at 12:15, October 12, over radio station KCAS.

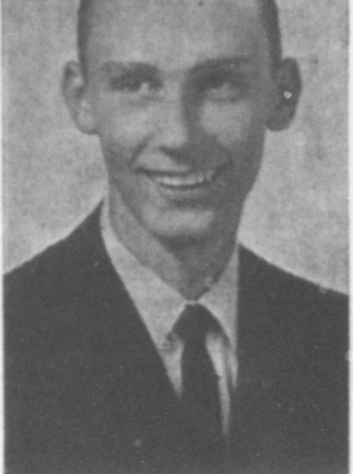

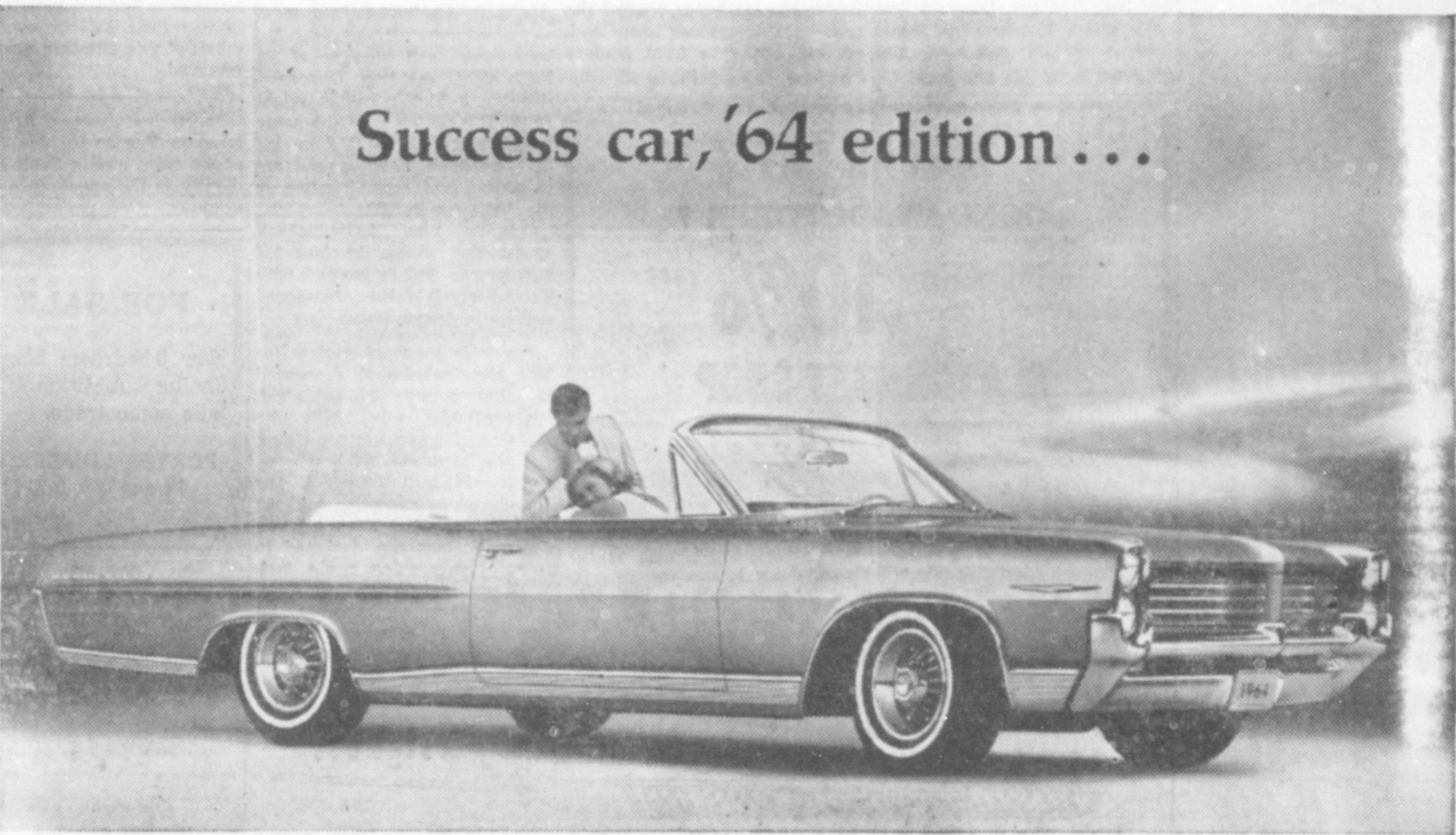

Mills vice president of Ford Motor Company said. "It attains new standards in performance with a new three-speed transmission and a broad range of four engines, including a new 289 cubic-inch V-8 and a new 200 cubic-inch six."

The new Compact is roomier, even though wheelbase is continued at 114 inches and overall length and height are virtually unchanged. Over-all width is increased one inch and the rear is increased 1.5 inches, providing new sturdiness on the road.

Completely new styling, with a family resemblance to the luxury Lincoln Continental, makes the 1964 Comet appear larger. The Comet's sculptured hood set between raised fenders emphasizes its wide appearance. A double concave sculpture follows the fender line, widening toward the rear, making the car seem long-footed and, with the front fenders extended beyond the grill, giving

the car an appearance of forward thrust.

Improvements in driving posture, leg room, and head room in the front compartment are provided by increasing seat travel one inch, shortening the length of the steering column, and introducing a new steering wheel with a one-inch smaller diameter.

Rear seat leg room and knee room are improved substantially by moving the rear seat backward 1.4 inches. The interiors of all models are more luxurious, while the new top-of-the-line Caliente series features interior treatment rivaling that of the most expensive cars. The Caliente's thick foam rubber seat padding replaces conventional slab cotton found in most compacts, and door panels, instrument panels, and steering wheel are trimmed with simulated wood grain. The new instrument panel on all Comets includes gauge instead of lights for oil pressure and generator.

Power brakes and an AM-FM radio are offered as extra cost options on the Comet for the first time, and power steering also is available.

The new Comet 289-cubic-inch V-8 engine offers performance previously available only on higher priced cars. It develops 210 horsepower and because of its lightweight cast-iron construction has a high power-to-weight ratio. The engine is of the same basic design as the V-8 engine that powered Lotus race cars to second and seventh place in the Indianapolis 500.

Comet's new 200-cubic-inch six-cylinder engine develops 116 horsepower and is teamed with the Merc-O-Matic two-speed automatic transmission.

The wide range of engines for 1964 also include an improved 101 horsepower, 170-cubic-inch six available only with the three-speed manual transmission, and the improved 164 horsepower 260-cubic-inch V-8 which was introduced as an option midway in the 1963 model year. All four Comet engines are designed to operate on regular grade fuel. A 43 per cent larger fuel tank, with a 20-gallon capacity, increases cruising range for today's expressway driving.

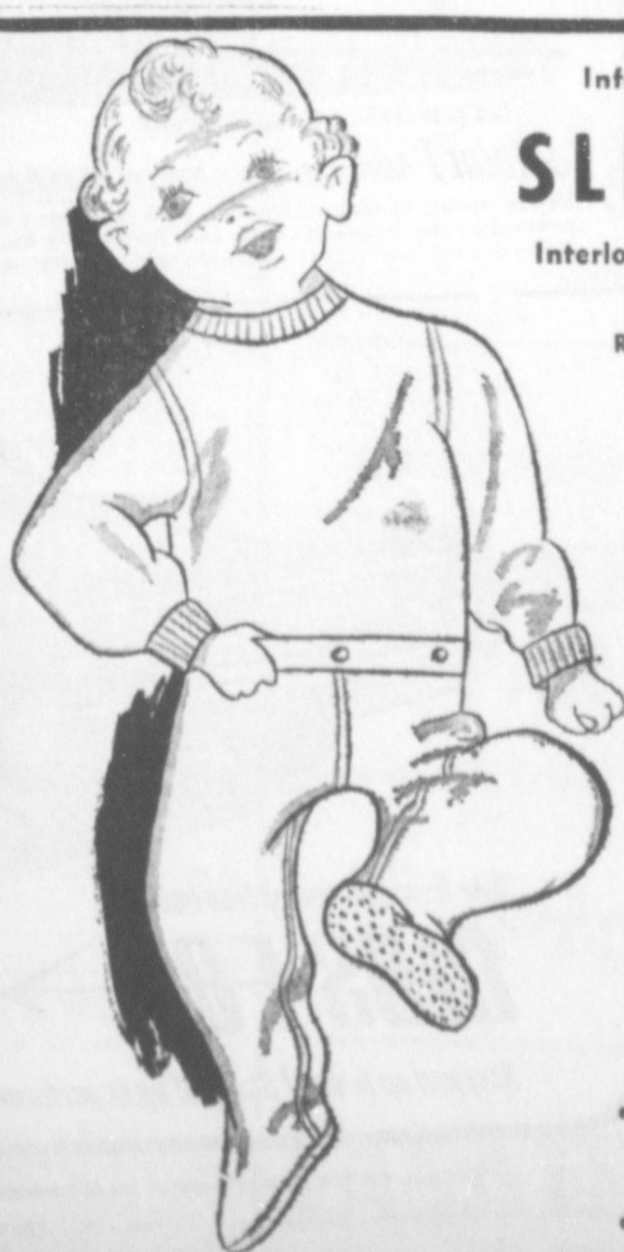

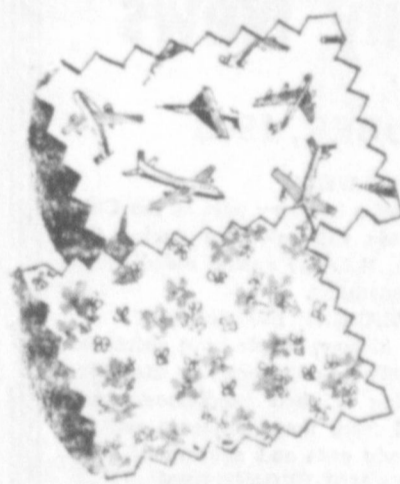

# Oldsmobile Adds New Jetstar 88 to '64 Line

Oldsmobile's new Jetstar 88, along with the new F-85's, Dynamic and Super 88's, 98's and 99's, will be on display at the Oldsmobile Show on Friday, October 4, at the Oldsmobile Show Room, 130 West Lynn St., Slaton, Va.

The new Jetstar 88, lower-priced companion to Oldsmobile's other famous, high performing 88's," Wolfram said, is powered by the new Jetfire Rocket engine, an ultra-high compression, 330 cubic inch member of the Rocket engine family.

"In addition," he said, "our

"An ordinance ordering an election in the City of Slaton, to be held on the 5th day of November, 1963, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the City of Slaton for adoption or rejection, proposed amendment to the existing charter of the City of Slaton, designating the place in which said election is to be held, appointing presiding officer thereof, and de-

claring an emergency.

WHEREAS, the City Commission of the City of Slaton deem it proper to submit the proposed amendment to the present City Charter to the qualified voters of said City; THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That a special election be held in the City of Slaton, on the 5th day of November, 1963 for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of said City, for adoption or rejection the following proposed amendment to the existing Char-

ter of the City of Slaton:

AMENDMENT

To amend Section 23 of Article VI of the City Charter of the City of Slaton so that it will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23: CITY MANAGER: The City Commission may appoint a City Manager, who shall be the administrative head of the municipal government, and shall be responsible for the efficient administration of all departments; and may or may not be a resident of the City of Slaton when appointed, and shall hold office at the will of the Commission; the city manager shall hold a Bachelor's Degree or some higher degree from a secondary school, college or university which normally requires some four years of on campus attendance for the securing of a bachelor's degree and whose credits, records and students are accepted for enrollment at an advanced level by Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas. Said city manager shall in addition to such

required education have at least four years of experience in public administrative work or the equivalent of such experience."

SECTION 2: That the polling place and presiding officer of said election shall be respectively as follows:

Said election shall be held in the Corporation Courtroom of the City-hall of the City of Slaton, Texas and C. H. Whalen is appointed presiding officer\* of said election. Phil Brewer is appointed alternate presiding officer for said election. The presiding officer is authorized to appoint a maximum of four clerks to serve in such election.

SECTION 3: Said election shall be held under the provisions of the Texas Election Code and all persons qualified to vote in said City under the law of this state shall be allowed to vote.

SECTION 4: That the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the Texas Election Code.

SECTION 7: This ordinance is hereby declared an emergency measure in view of the fact that this ordinance is necessary for the immediate preservation of the public business and property and provides for the proper and efficient daily operation of the administrative department of the government of the City of Slaton, Texas and all other departments and the fact that the present Charter is inadequate creates an emergency, and an imperative public necessity for the suspension of the rules requiring ordinances to be read upon more than one day, and for the immediate taking effect of this ordinance, and such rules are hereby suspended and it is ordered that such ordinance shall take effect immediately.
