

This must have been the time when "modern" appliances began to appear.


Anyway, Homer's folks bought a Dazy churn. That was

stay with the old-fashioned crock and pump that dasher up Then, across the block, the Adamses put in a cream sept rator, of all things 'Course, the Adamses had three or four cows and we had only one, so I guess we didn't need a sepa-

rator. But when Mr. Adams installed his, it was the talk of the neighborhood, and I felt that we were shamed forever if we
