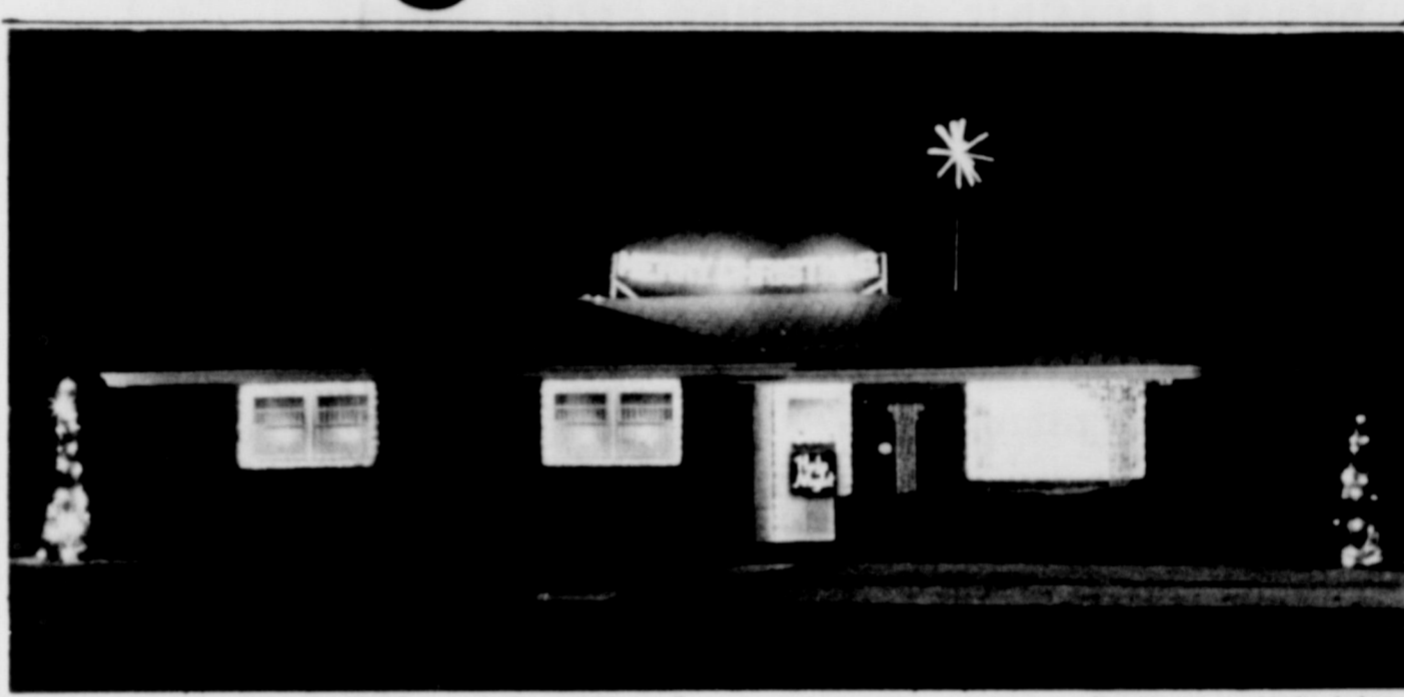

GREGORY RESIGNS AFTER COMMISSION CUTS SALARY

City Judge Quits Post

Slaton City Commission approved indigent care hospital bills, passed two Public Housing resolutions, discussed purchase of additional water rights, and heard routine reports during a regular meeting Monday night in the City Hall conference room.

Corporation Court Judge Luther Gregory resigned his position Monday night during a regular Slaton City Commission meeting, the action following a split vote by ward leaders to cut the judge's salary from \$207.50 a month to \$100.

Commissioner Henry Bollinger introduced the issue into the session when he reported hearing complaints about the judge's salary "for no more work than he does."

Gregory immediately offered a verbal resignation and requested the commission to act on the matter. Commissioners approved the resignation, to be effective at 5 p.m. Dec. 31.

Mayor Jonas Cain said Tuesday that the commission has no one in mind for the job, as far as he knew, Gregory's salary had been based on \$125 per month as city judge and \$75 a month as civil defense coordinator.

A routine check by Patrolman Don Blackerby here Monday morning led to the arrest of two men and a juvenile on charges of theft and concealing stolen property.

Police Chief Robert Breedlove said the arrests cleared up several thefts in this area and at Lamesa. Questioning by the police here Breedlove said, seemed to point to the 16-year-old Posey juvenile as the "leader."

Gay Hoover, 18, of Slaton pleaded guilty of a theft charge Tuesday in County Court-at-Law No. 2 and was accused of stealing a hydraulic jack, valued at over \$5 and under \$50, from Fabian Stahl of Posey.

Blackerby, a new city patrolman, stopped Hoover and the juvenile near the junior high gym about 4 a.m. Monday. He took them in for questioning after finding four 5 gallon Army gasoline cans in the auto.

Police said the pair confessed to several thefts and about \$200 to \$300 worth of tools, tires, jacks, electric drill, oil, gasoline cans and other items were confiscated, Walter Little, 20, of 715 E. Fordham in Lubbock, was also implicated for receiving and concealing stolen property.

Little pleaded innocent and his bond was set at \$500. The juvenile was charged with theft in county juvenile court.

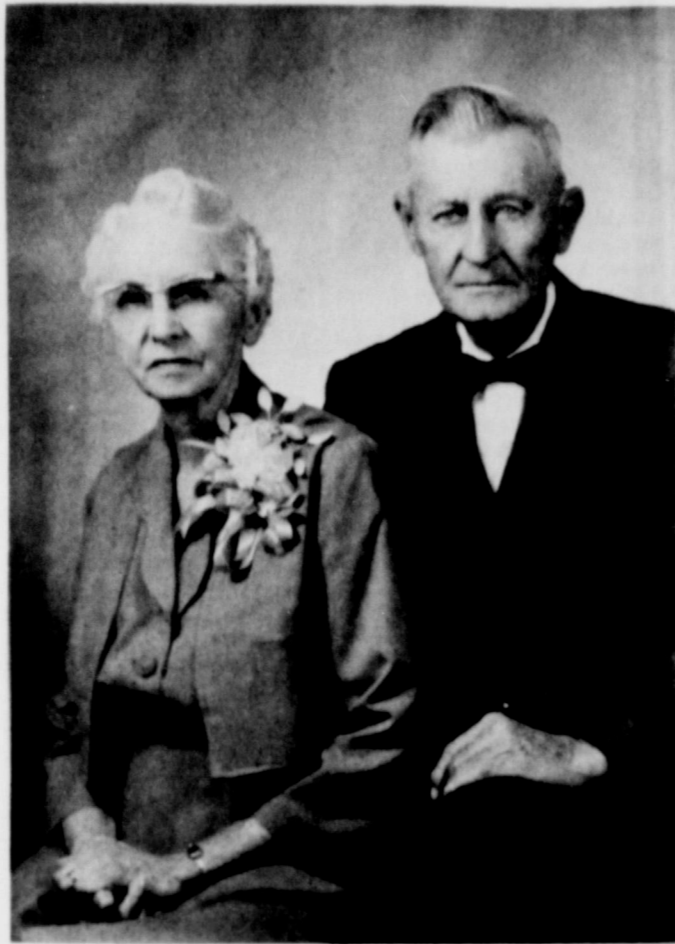

water was discontinued. The salary question was injected into the meeting when City Atty. George Lemon was asked if he would serve for \$75 per month. Lemon had accepted the post on a three-month trial basis at \$75 and agreed Monday night that the figure was acceptable "at this time."

The attorney recommended very strongly, however, that the city establish a law library to him and other city officials. Prior to Lemon's appointment this year, the city attorney was receiving \$200 per month.

After Lemon's salary was established, Bolinger introduced the city judge's salary matter into the session. Lemon was quick to point out that Gregory's job was full-time, subject to call at anytime. He also reminded the commission that the corporation court earned a state award for efficiency last year.

After a short discussion Gregory told the commission "if it will help settle the argu-

ment, I'll let you know now that I will resign before I work for less." The discussion was dropped for lack of action, and the commission moved ahead with other business on the agenda.

After the last business, however, Gregory requested a clarification of the salary matter. Then came the motion and split vote to amend the ordinances setting the pay for the city recorder (judge) and civil defense coordinator.

The commission voted to pay Gregory for vacation time. The mayor of Slaton is actually civil defense coordinator, but Gregory was appointed as the executive assistant and worked up state certification for the city.
