# Huge Cotton Harvest Awaits Jack Frost

A light drizzle Tuesday and Wednesday mornings slowed the harvest of King Cotton in this area—a harvest already lagging behind last year, but one of the best harvests in the area is expected to get underway with the first killing frost.

The combined November crop estimate of the Lubbock Cotton Exchange and the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., has pegged the harvest in the 23-county region at 2,218,000 bales.

The estimate for Lubbock County, top producer in the great South Plains, is up to 271,000 bales. Lynn County's estimate has been increased to 150,000 bales. Estimates are also up for Slaton's two other neighboring counties—Crosby County tabbed for 147,000 bales and Garza for 29,000.

November estimates for the region were up 77,000 bales over the October prediction. The harvest had picked up some momentum last week with the volume of samples received at the three USDA classing offices at a high for the year.

Most farmers are now wishing for clear, dry weather and some light frosts preceding a hard freeze that could come anytime. Some farmers have defoliated cotton, most apparently are waiting for frost to kill the leaves, stop growth and open the bolls. A few have stripped cotton already.

The three classing offices at Lubbock, Brownfield and Lamesa received approximately 10,000 samples daily during the week ending Friday, Nov. 5, and classed 52,000 samples during the week. This brought the season's total for the three offices to 1,279,305. This year's harvest continued to lag behind the 1964 harvest. Through Nov. 5 last year, 146,000 samples had been classed.

Grades of cotton classed at the Lubbock Office were lower than those of the previous week. Fifty-five per cent of the cotton was in the White grades and 45 per cent in the Light Spotted grades. The previous week 61 per cent of the cotton was classed in the White grades and 39 per cent in the Light Spotted grades.

Middling made up only 14 per cent of the total classed last week. Strict Low Middling 27 per cent, Middling Light Spotted 30 per cent and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 13 per cent.

Average staple length was also lower than that of the previous week. Sixty-one per cent of the cotton classed at Lubbock was 33.

Gary Don Hennington won the second prize of \$3 with a guess of 36 on the total score. Oneita White captured third place and \$2 with a guess of 33 on the total score.

A host of entries missed only one game. The game missed by most was the Morton-Frenship TFL. Other games frequently missed were Southland-Gall and Post-Slaton.

This is the final week of the contest. A prize of \$25 is offered for a perfect entry, including the tie-breaker.

## Rites Held For Former Resident Mrs. Shelton

Mrs. Eva Robinson Shelton, 59, former Slaton resident and wife of the vice president of Santa Fe Railway Co., died suddenly and unexpectedly of an apparent heart attack in her home in Hindsdale, Ill. Saturday morning.

Mrs. Shelton's body was brought to Slaton Tuesday by train and funeral services were held Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. in the First Baptist Church. Most Slaton businesses were closed from 1 to 3 p.m. for the funeral and in honor of Mrs. Shelton.

Services were conducted by Rev. W. F. Ferguson, retired Baptist minister of Lubbock, followed by interment in Englewood Cemetery. Burial was under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

A native of Marshall, Tex., Mrs. Shelton was married at Slaton when her husband was working for the railroad as a telegraph operator. They lived here nearly 20 years. The Sheltons also lived in San Angelo and in Amarillo from 1942 to 1946 when he served as trainmaster. Mr. Shelton is now operating vice president at Santa Fe's main office in Chicago.

In addition to her husband, Raymond, Mrs. Shelton is survived by three sons, Bill R. of Wichita Falls, James D. of Amarillo, and John M. of the home in Illinois. Other survivors include two sisters, Mrs. Ewell Lovell and Mrs. Otis Newman, both of Longview, and a brother, Milton Robinson of Waco.

# Annexation Plan Studied

Annexation, water bills and a utility company franchise highlighted a lengthy meeting of the Slaton city commission Monday night.

With all commissioners present, Southwestern Public Ser-

vice Co. was granted, on the second reading, a 20-year franchise to operate in the city.

The ordinance was approved on the first reading at the Oct. 27 meeting. The ordinance was proposed last month by Carroll

McDonald, SWPS district manager. McDonald had asked for the renewal as a preliminary step in constructing a new office in Slaton.

Harold Wilson, local developer, met with the council to discuss the annexation of his property along the US 84 by-pass. The commission told Wilson the annexation would be for the purpose of controlling the highway.

Wilson told the commission he did not oppose coming into

the city. However, he asked that his house not be included in the annexation.

Wilson said he would be willing for the city to take in 17 acres of his land if his house and utility buildings were not included. He said he would not benefit from the annexation since sewer could not be furnished at the present.

After failing to agree on the annexation, the commission authorized the city attorney to prepare an annexation ordinance, subject to revision which would include property 340 feet from the center of US 84 from 22nd to FM 41.

# Tigers Close Out Season At Morton

Slaton's Tigers travel to Morton Friday night to put the tailgate on the 1965 football season, and both teams will be hoping to close out their schedules on a winning note.

Both schools have experienced disappointing grid records—Slaton standing at 3-6 and Morton at 2-7 going into the finale, but both squads have had injury problems during the year.

Slaton is winless in district play with an 0-3 mark, while Morton downed Frenship for its lone victory against two losses. Frenship, also 1-2, plays Denver City Friday night.

If the Tigers lose to Morton, the locals will have the cellar position all to themselves.

Coach Neal Chastain Wednesday announced his Tigers would be in fairly good physical condition for the District 4-AA contest. Back Steve Harlan is out, missing the last two games due to a dislocated shoulder.

Tackles Roy Green and Tommy Donaldson are back at full speed this week, however, and the probable starting lineup will probably be about the same as last week.

Victor Cristan is expected to start at a defensive halfback post in one major defensive change. Henry Johnson and Billy Gass will probably get the starting nods at offensive halfbacks, with Cristan and Ricky Brush as top replacements. Brush performed well in workouts this week.

Johnson is still far ahead as the Tigers' top ground gainer despite a drop in yardage over the past few games. He has totalled 742 yards on 130 carries for a 5.6 average. Gass is a district second with 369 yards in 78 trips for a 4.7 mark.

Brush, who hasn't carried the ball since the Crosbyton game, is next with 162 yards on 45 carries. Fullback Larry Bownds, after a great performance last week, now has 155 yards in 30 trips.

Larry Picketts will probably start at quarterback with Danny Scott and Oscar Henderson at guards, Donaldson and Billy Martin at tackles, Byron Johnson and Bobby Magallanes at ends, and Doug Williams at center. Joe Olague, Doyle Ethridge, Green and Cristan will be in on defense.

Morton's Indians returned 11 lettermen from a 7-3 season last year and expected better things this season. The Indians, when at full strength, have good weight and top-notch runners.

Kenny Palmer, 180-pound senior fullback, has been the big offensive threat for Morton. Quarterback Johnny St. Clair adds power to the backfield, as does fleet Jimmy Joyce.

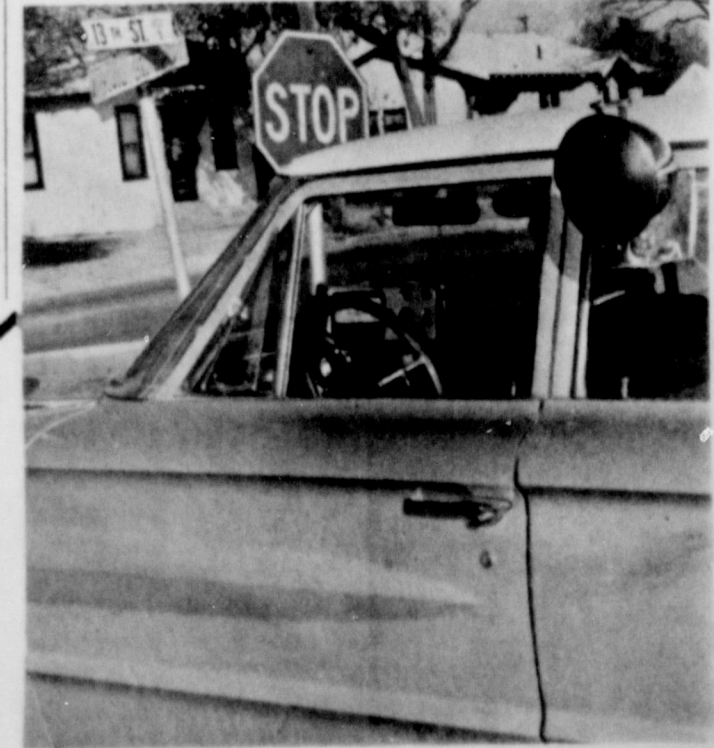
The unit will be in use during the weekend, but Breedlove said it will be a period of grace. In other words, a warning will be given but the pocket book won't be hit.

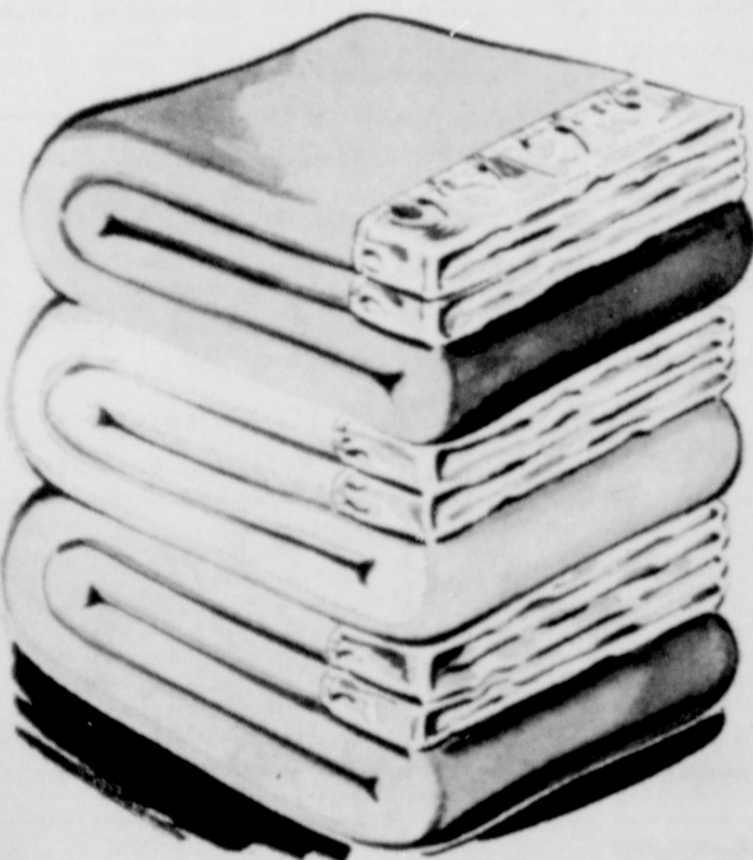

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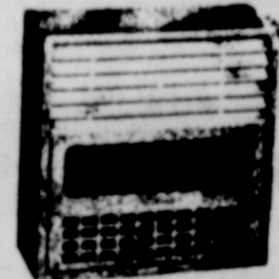

# Tiger Rally Shy, Post Wins

the Tigers' failure to tally extra points, an intercepted pass and one costly defensive error provided the margin.

Fullback Larry Bownds, used primarily this season as a blocker, ignited the Tiger offense as he churned through the Antelopes for 115 yards on 15 carries.

Another new twist in the Tiger offense paid off as halfbacks Victor Cristan and Henry Johnson connected on touchdown passes in this first aerial effort of the season. Ends Byron Johnson and Bobby Magallanes hauled in the payoff pitches.

But this one was a team effort, and the Tigers deserved a better fate on this outing. Slaton gave up two easy scores, however, and they were too hard to overcome. One was a stray Tiger pass which Post picked off and returned 47 yards for a touchdown; the other was a "bomb" just seconds before the half when a fleet Post back got behind the Tiger secondary and romped in to give the Antelopes a 13-point bulge.

Post scored two points on a safety to further handicap the Tiger rally in the second half. Slaton had pulled to within seven points at 19-12, but the Antelopes chased Larry Pickens back into his end zone and nailed him for two points.

Slaton had troubles with the red hankies, too, as officials

stepped off 95 yards in penalties. Four of the 15-yard infractions slowed the Tiger offense in the second half. Post drew 49 yards in penalties.

Doug Williams, Joe Olague and Billy Martin were defensive standouts for the Tigers. Williams was credited with eight tackles and five assists according to an unofficial count.

The Tigers kicked off to Post, and the teams exchanged possession twice before a first down was logged. The second time Slaton got the ball on their own 20 and, on the first play, Bownds slid off right tackle, cut to the outside and almost went all the way.

Bownds went 52 yards before a desperation lunge by a Post defender tripped him up at the Antelope 28. Three plays netted only seven yards against the tough Post defense, then Billy Gass went all the way to 6-yard line on a reverse, Henry Johnson hit for one yard, lost one on the next play, then shrugged off a would-be tackler on a right-end sweep and dove into the end zone at the corner flag.

Johnson was stopped on the try for two points, and it was 6-0 with 2:49 left in the first period.

A special outside kick formation, tried by the Tigers several times, failed to work for Slaton and Post started a drive from its own 42. Fullback Paul Walker and halfback Ricky Welch spearheaded the Antelope ground attack, and the visitors moved to the Slaton 21 where they were faced with a 4th and four situation.

Walker swept right end, shook off a would-be tackler, and moved six yards to pick up the vital first down. Four more tries ate up the remaining 15 yards with Walker plunging over from the two. Walker's kick put Post ahead, 7-6, with 1:13 remaining in the second quar-

ing effective, Ordinance No. 19 and Ordinance No. 97 are hereby repealed.

ARTICLE IV Southwestern Public Service Company is hereby authorized, licensed and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in executing the powers and utilizing the privileges herein mentioned and granted by this franchise, provided that all work done in said streets, alleys, highways or other grounds of said City by said Company shall be done with the utmost diligence and least inconvenience to the public or individuals, that said Company shall, within a reasonable time, restore streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it to their original condition as nearly as possible, and that said work shall be done subject to the approval of the City. The Company shall assume all liability or risk of damage to persons or property which may arise from the construction or operation of any or all of said system and shall save the City of Slaton, Texas, its officers and agents, harmless from any and all liability that may arise or be incurred from the erection, construction or operation of the same.

ARTICLE V Southwestern Public Service Company, its successors and assigns, for and in consideration of the granting of this franchise and use of the streets, alleys, highways, bridges and other public grounds of the City of Slaton, shall pay the aggregate sum of 2% of the gross receipts, as hereinafter defined, of the Company, for electric energy used within the city limits of the City of Slaton. "Gross receipts" shall consist of the total amount billed users of electric energy for light, heat and power within the corporate limits of the City of Slaton under the Company's lighting and power rates in existence at the time of payment, excepting therefrom the gross receipts for electric service furnished the City of Slaton, Texas, and all municipal, County and State agencies and institutions, public schools and Federal governmental agencies and institutions.

Such payments, shall be payable for each quarter period of each year, said periods to begin on the first days of the months of January, April, July and October of each year. The payments covering each prior period shall be made within a reasonable time immediately after each period. Such payments shall be in lieu of any and all other taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements) upon the business, revenue or property of the Company or any part thereof in said City during the term of this franchise, and they shall continue only so long as said Company is not prohibited from making them by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises and so long as the City does not charge, levy or collect or attempt to charge, levy or collect other franchise, license, privilege, occupation, excise or revenue taxes or other exactions (except general ad valorem property taxes and special assessments for local improvements).

For the purpose of determining the amount of the gross receipts of the Company, as hereinbefore defined, the books of the Company shall, at all times, be subject to the inspection of the City of Slaton.

ARTICLE VI Southwestern Public Service Company shall, within thirty days from the final passage of this ordinance, file with the City Secretary of the City of Slaton, Texas, its written acceptance of this ordinance and upon the filing of such acceptance this ordinance shall constitute all of the terms of the franchise herein granted by the City of Slaton to Southwestern Public Service Company.

peared before the commission to propose free water for the volunteer firemen. The commissioners did not take action after it was pointed out that the \$7.50 per month now being paid is slightly more than the average water bill of the firemen.

Cecil Scott, cemetery board chairman, appeared before the commission to recommend regulations concerning the setting of monuments at Englewood.

The commission voted that monuments would be set only on Friday and that the charge be reduced to \$4 per foot from \$5. A permit must be granted by the city secretary before work can be started.

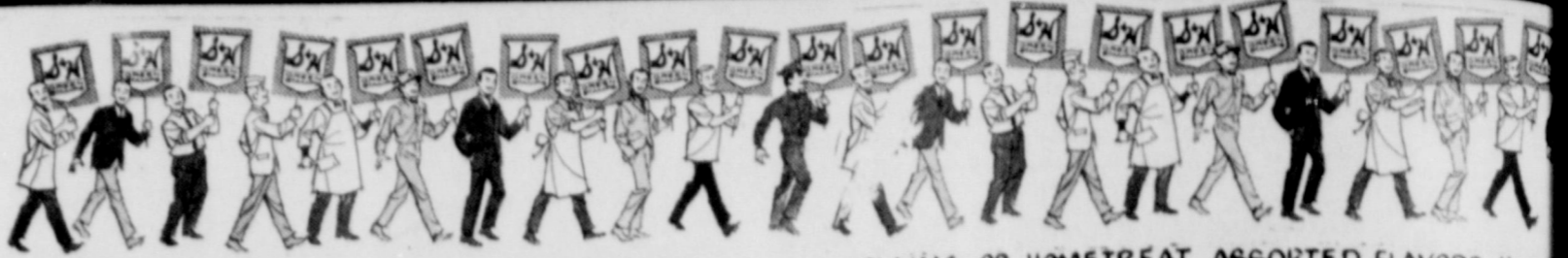
back last week was 15/16 of an inch and shorter. The previous week 53 per cent was 15/16 of an inch and shorter.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities were: Middling 15/16 - 27.65, Middling 31/32 - 28.25, Strict Low Middling 15/16 - 26.45, Strict Low Middling 31/32 - 26.95, Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 26.75, Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 27.25, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 15/16 - 25.80 and Strict Low Middling Light Spotted 31/32 - 26.20.

Prices paid farmers for cottonseed ranged from \$45 to \$50 per ton.

Crow said an assembly line can produce a car in about 52 minutes and, when a plant is in full operation, one comes off the line every two minutes.
