The Tigers have also lost three games in a row and need victories in the final two outings to claim an even 5-5 won-lost mark for the season. It will be the last home appearance for about 12 seniors who are expected to see action.

Coach Neal Chastain Wednesday reported he was "well pleased" with workouts the past two weeks, but the quarterback "jinx" popped up again Tuesday. Junior Steve Harlan sustained a dislocated shoulder in the workout and was reported out for the season.

Harlan, who started the season at quarterback, has been in and out of the lineup with injuries while Billy Gass, Larry Pickens and Allen Miles have also handled the signal-calling chores. Gass and Pickens have also been slowed by injuries during the season.

Chastain tabbed Pickens or Miles to man the important post Friday night. Miles looked sharp at passing and handling the ball this week, while Pickens is the best runner.

Rounding out the starting offensive backfield will probably be Henry Johnson and Billy Gass at halfbacks and co-captain Larry Bownds at fullback. If Miles starts at quarterback, it would be an all-senior backfield. Senior halfback Victor Cristan could see plenty of action if an ankle injury heals.

Two regulars in the line missed drills last week but were back in harness this week after the open date. They are tacklers Roy Green and Tommy Donaldson. Co-captain Billy Martin and Joe Olague are listed as tackle starters, unless Donaldson moves in for Olague--normally a defensive guard.

Strong Doug Williams still holds forth at the center position, with co-captain Danny Scott and Oscar Henderson at guards, Bobby Magallanes and Byron Johnson are the regular ends.

Work Starts On Crow Building

Groundbreaking ceremonies here Wednesday morning sign the start of the new Don Crow Chevrolet Co. plant in west Slaton.

Several out-of-town guests joined local dignitaries in witnessing the official start of construction for what is termed by owner Don Crow as the "largest retail establishment ever built in Slaton."

Crow estimates the total developed cost of the new automotive facility at about \$175,000. Located at the intersection of US-84 and FM-41, the facility will be on 2.75 acres of developed land. The new structure will have some 19,536 square feet under the roof.

To be built of steel structure and masonry walls, expected completion is tabbed for February 1966. Crow said anticipated employment after completion will be 30 persons. Contractor is Norman Igo of Lubbock.

Chevrolet officials attending the groundbreaking included Leon C. Dorn and Jack Sherman, zone manager and sales promotion manager from Oklahoma City; B. R. Hutcheson, district manager from Lubbock; George Quisenberry, GMAC branch manager of Lubbock, and A. L. Bradshaw, Motors Insurance Corp., Lubbock.

School Considers Building Plan

A long-range look into the needs of the Slaton Independent School District was taken Tuesday night at a regular meeting of the board of trustees.

The board discussed improvements of the overall plant. Trustees concluded that more study should be given to find out the necessity and desirability of items that might be included in the project.

It was estimated that the board improvement project would cost a half million dollars. Should the board agree to initiate the program, a bond issue would be required.

Items discussed were a new elementary school, a new gym, a new cafeteria at West Ward Elementary and renovation of the football stadium.

The discussion began when the board heard a report from the Tiger Club where a group of citizens met to consider raising funds for the stadium improvement.

Improvements at the stadium are estimated to cost \$20,000. Board members talked in the terms of concrete stadium and press box. Trustees had discussed the gym in a previous meeting.

Also, the need for a new elementary school is nearing, according to Dr. P. L. Vardy, superintendent of schools. The school would be constructed on existing school property, should approval be gained.

The board unofficially agreed to implement plans to find out the feasibility of the project. Should a bond issue be passed, a slight increase in the tax rate would be required, according to a statement by Dr. Vardy in answering a board member's question.

The last major improvement project was held in 1959 when Slaton citizens voted a \$500,000 bond issue.

In other action, the board instructed Doctor Vardy to check into a new adult education program sponsored by the state.

Slatonites Okay 6 Amendments

The Slaton electorate went one step further than their fellow state voters by approving six of 10 proposed constitutional amendments in Tuesday's special election.

Slaton balloting went exactly as the state-wide trend with the exception of amendment 2 which would have authorized an increase of \$200 million in bonds for loans to veterans to buy land and extend the program for eight years.

Slaton residents voted 174-115 to give the proposal a narrow margin. Unofficial election returns from the state showed that the amendment was defeated 227,524 to 237,623.

The most resounding victory was in the hard-fought battle for amendment 1 which will increase the state ad valorem by five cents on \$100 valuation for building construction for 17 state colleges and universities.

Slaton went for the amendment in all three boxes for a total vote of 225-69. Across the state, approval was gained 279,549 to 185,958. Amendment one gained wide support by school leaders.

The only real opposition to any amendment was number 4 which, if passed, would have increased the term of the governor and other elected executive officials to four years.

The measure failed in Slaton by 111 votes to 196. State-

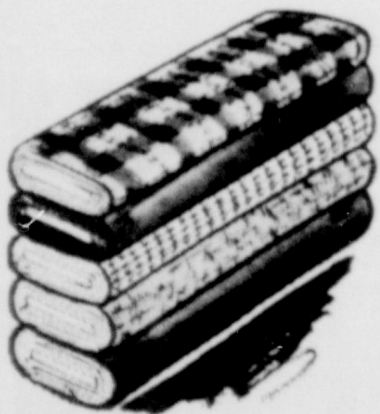

PUMPKIN BREAD
3 cups sugar
4 eggs
1 t. cinnamon
2/3 cups water
2 cups cooked pumpkin
2 t. soda
1 cup salad oil
1-1/2 t. salt
1 t. nutmeg
3-1/2 cups flour

Mix with electric mixer. Divide in three loaf pans. Bake 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Pecans may be added. Freezes real well.

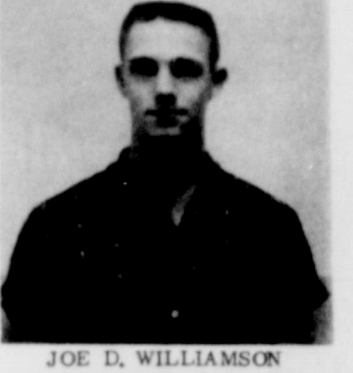
REFRIGERATOR ROLLS
3/4 cup hot water
1/2 cup sugar
1 tablespoon salt
3 tablespoons margarine
1 cup warm water
2 pkgs. yeast (dry or compressed)
1 egg - beaten
5-6 cups unsifted flour

Mix together hot water, sugar, salt, and margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle or crumble in yeast; stir until dissolved. Stir in lukewarm water mixture, egg and half the flour; beat until smooth. Stir in enough remaining flour to make soft dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board and knead until smooth and elastic, about 10 minutes. Place dough in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover tightly with waxed paper or aluminum foil. Store in refrigerator until doubled in bulk, or until needed. To use, punch down and cut off amount of dough needed. Shape. Let rise 1 hour. Bake in hot oven (400) about 15 minutes.

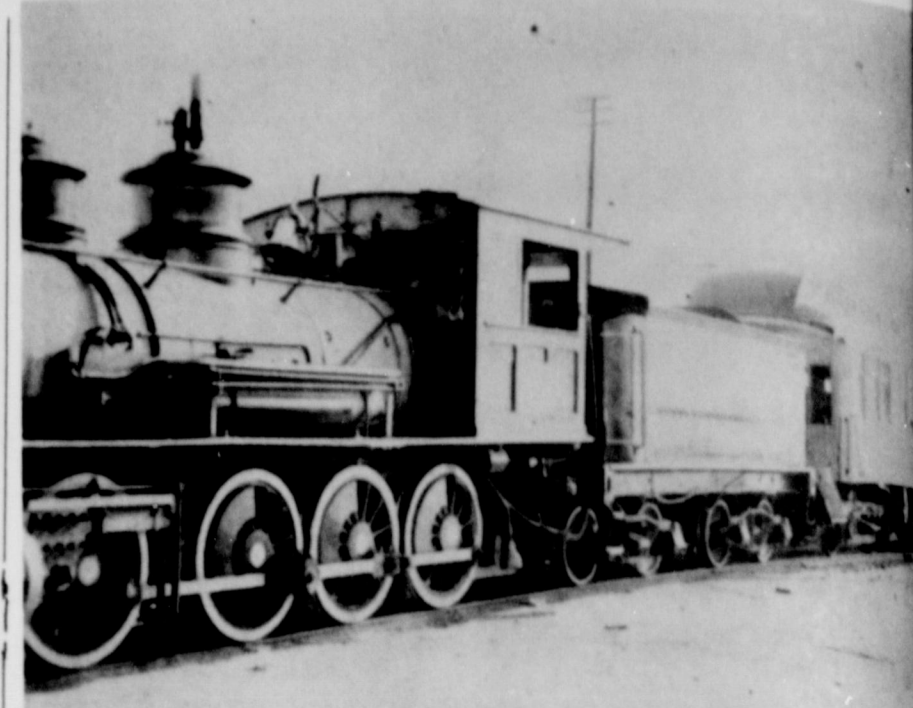

LOCOMOTIVE NO. 1 COMES TO SLATON--The Cyrus K. Holliday locomotive, No. 1, better known as the Cyrus K. Holliday, rolled into Slaton early Monday morning, and it didn't take long for the word to spread and for Slatonites to start making plans to go by and see the old locomotive.

Famed Santa Fe Locomotive H

Santa Fe's famous and frequently filmed Locomotive No. 1, better known as the Cyrus K. Holliday, rolled into Slaton early Monday morning, and it didn't take long for the word to spread and for Slatonites to start making plans to go by and see the old locomotive.

The Cyrus K. Holliday is a replica of the motive power which launched railroad operations in the late 1850's and the two yellow wooden passenger coaches also represent that pioneering era. The train is on its way to Plainview where

it will be put on exhibit Saturday. The train will probably pull out of Slaton sometime tomorrow.

The original diamond-stacked locomotive was named after the Railway's first president who envisioned building from Topeka, Kansas, into the West and Southwest to the Gulf of Mexico and on to the Pacific Coast.

The first Cyrus K. Holliday locomotive hauled two wooden passenger cars of celebrities a distance of seven miles from Topeka soon after ground was broken at that point in November of 1868. Later it aided in pushing commerce and opening new markets along the old Santa Fe Trail and deep into the West and Southwest.

Its counterpart, the present Cyrus K. Holliday, was also important in building the West. It was constructed in 1880 by the Baldwin Locomotive Works and the two wooden-passenger coaches it hauls were also built in that period. After a valiant service, it was relegated to yard operation. It served in this capacity for years at Topeka, birthplace of the Santa Fe, and withdrawn from service in 1939 after more than a half century of activity.

The managements of Santa Fe and Chicago & North Western last week announced an agreement for the sale of certain portions of the Rock Island Railroad to the Santa Fe for \$100 million should the Interstate Commerce Commission decide the division of the Rock Island between the Santa Fe and the North Western is in the public interest.

Under the terms of the Santa Fe-North Western agreement, the Santa Fe would pay \$100 million for all of the Rock Island lines south of Herrington, Kan., as well as the line from Herrington to Salina, Kan. The sale, however, would not include Rock Island's main line from Kansas City to Tucumcari-Santa Rosa, N. M.

In addition, Santa Fe would acquire trackage rights over the Rock Island between Kansas City and St. Louis under a joint facility agreement. All of the other Rock Island properties, including the main Tucumcari line, would be retained by Rock Island.

The agreement between the managements of the two roads was approved Oct. 26 by the Santa Fe's board of directors. It will be submitted to the North Western's board for approval at its next regular meeting on Nov. 4.

wide, the proposal went down 217,032 to 264,375. A so-called non-partisan group campaigned against the issue for several days before the election.

Overwhelming approval both in Slaton and in the state was gained for amendment 3 which authorizes legislation to continue cooperation with the federal government in providing assistance and medical care to aged, needy and handicapped persons and expanding the age categories of those eligible for blind assistance. The program will also be expanded to include non-citizens who have resided in the U. S. 25 years. The vote in Slaton was 246 to 61.

Amendment 5, which also passed, makes the teacher retirement system's board a constitutional function, it removes restrictions on investments. The vote in Slaton was 222-78.

A 203 to 95 vote in Slaton was in step with the state balloting in giving the okay to providing for issuance of bonds to be used in creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund as a loan fund for Texas students

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attending both public and private colleges in the state.

Approval, 207-89, was given to amendment 8 providing for the automatic retirement of district and appellate judges. The measure also passed state-wide.

Other amendments failing in Slaton and in Texas was number 7 which exempted certain hospitals expending at least \$1.5 million for free care of indigents from the payment of ad valorem taxes levied by any taxing entity except the state. The vote in Slaton was 129 for and 166 in favor of the constitutional change.

Proposition 9 also met defeat Tuesday. The vote in Slaton would have allowed the legislature to set salaries of the Gov. and Speaker of the House and increase the per diem pay of members of the Legislature from \$12 for 120 days to \$20 for 140 days and 30 days each special session. The 10th amendment which would have provided for four-year terms for members of the Texas House of Representatives was also defeated. The vote here was 87 to 210.

Even if the trustees decide to call a bond election which included stadium and field-house improvements, the Tiger Club idea could still be used for "extras" in athletic facilities.

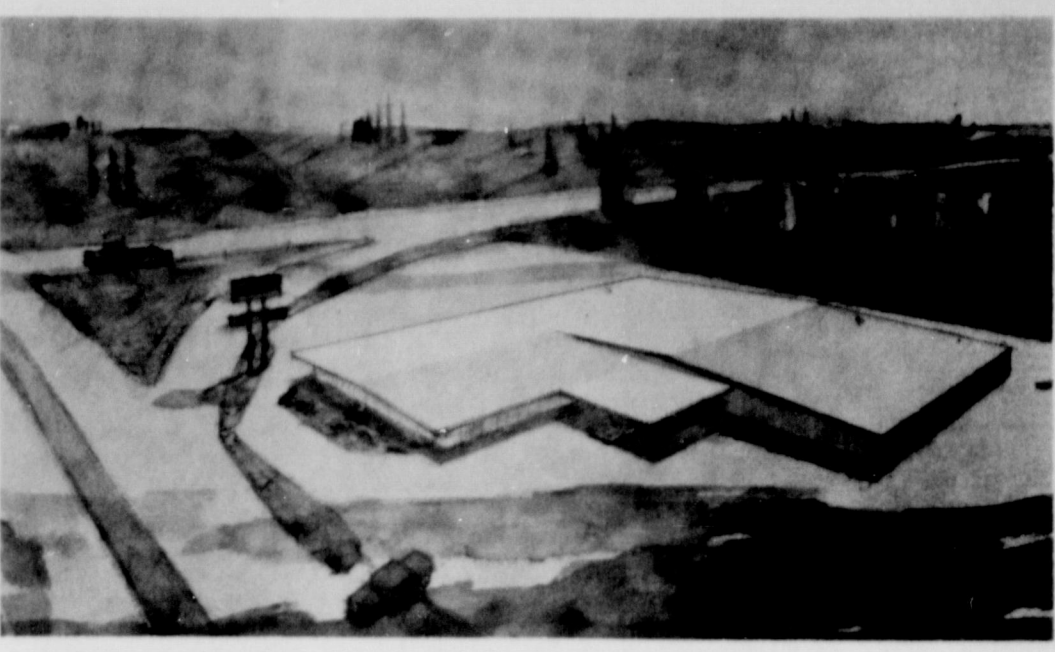

Under the setup, the school would offer basic courses in reading, writing and citizenship.

The program is designed for persons who did not advance to the higher grades in school.

The superintendent told the board Slaton is eligible for \$56,000 in the Job Corps program adopted last month by the school. Under the federal program, the school will employ students from low-income families a few hours during each week.

Vardy said the school's application has been sent and approval of the project is expected soon. A total of \$6,366.85 in bills were approved for payment.

Vardy gave trustees a report on a damage suit filed against the school district by a former Evans School teacher.

Don G. Jones, now a teacher in the Lubbock system, filed a \$21,000 damage suit in 140th District Court. Jones was driver of vehicle in collision with a Slaton school bus last Jan. 13.

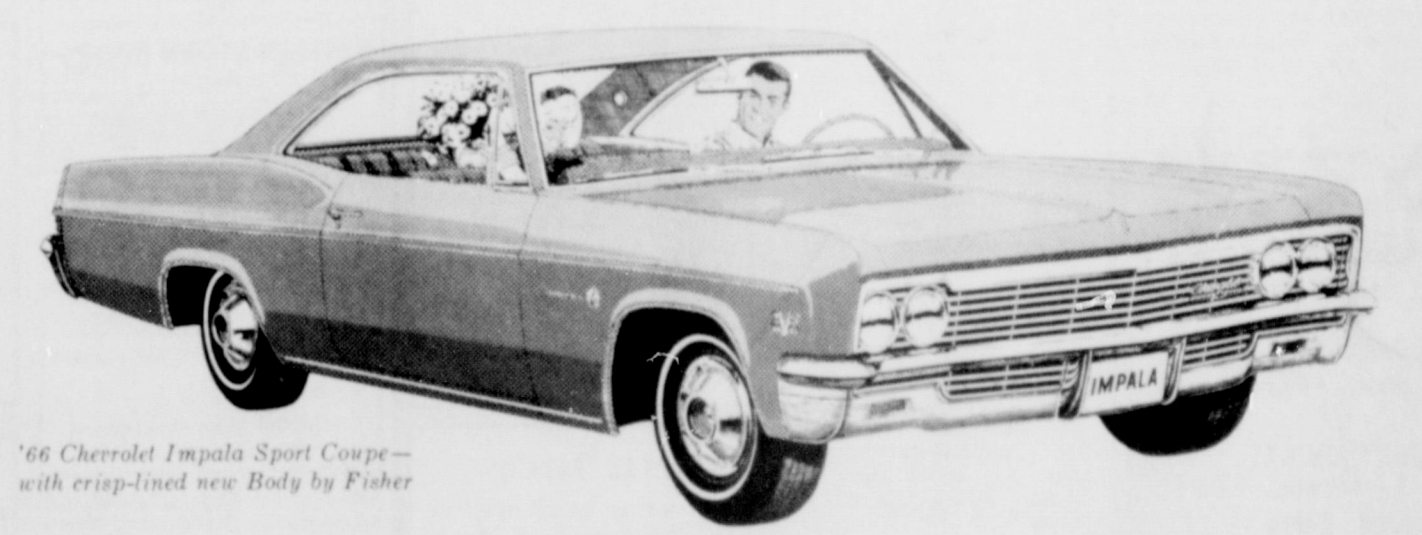

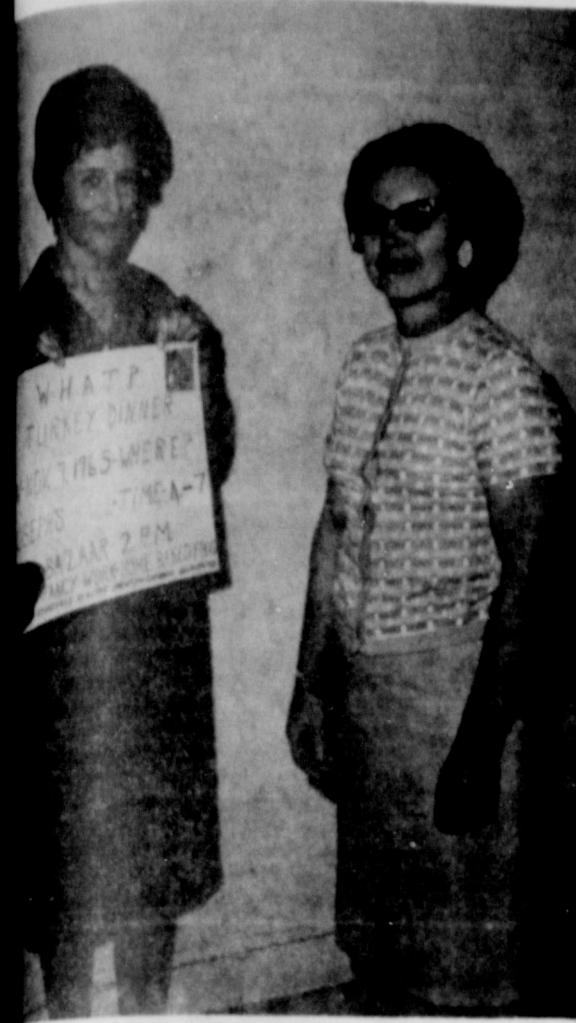

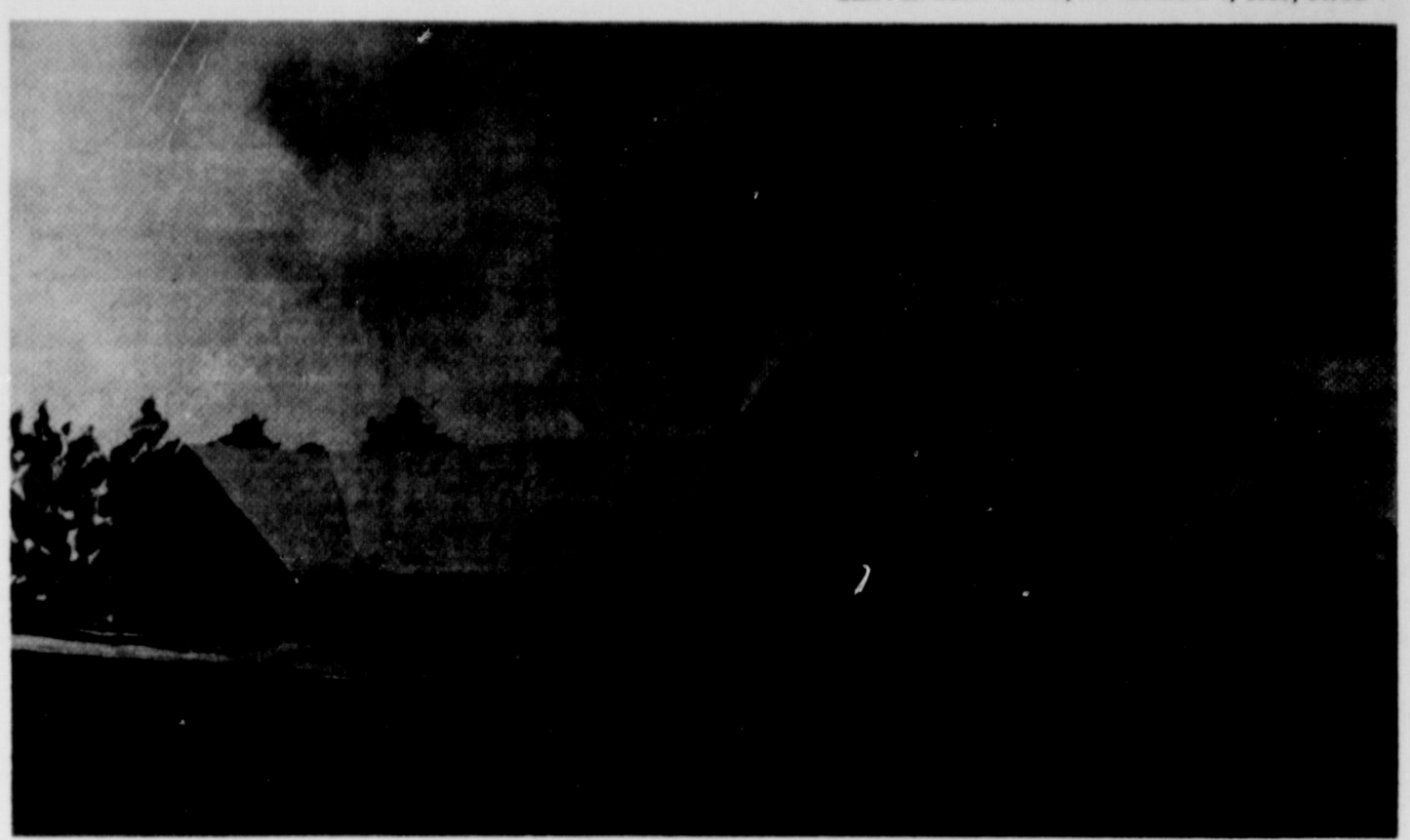

The Leopards fumbled five times, setting up three Mustang tallies. Coach Bobby Davis' squad also dominated the statistics and the mentor emptied

his bench in the final quarter. It was the first loop victory in the same number of outings for the Mustangs. The season record now stands at 5-2. The Mustangs travel to Meadow Friday night for a district game at 7:30.

The victory represented an outstanding team effort on the part of the Mustangs. Pacing the offensive surge was half-back Dennis Verkamp. The 145-pound junior rushed for 132

Wilson received the opening kickoff and started a drive until it was spoiled on a pass interception by Kenneth McClung at the 23-yard line.

Wilson held the Leopards on downs, forcing a punt. A bad snap from center to punter Dwayne Wyatt gave the Mustangs the ball on the Leopard 15-yard line.
