## WAYNE BAKER APPOINTED TO OFFICE

### City Administrator Is Created

Wayne Baker, director of public works and water superintendent, was elevated to the office of Slaton City Administrator during a city commission meeting Monday night.

The post was newly created by ordinance Monday night, and the commission promptly appointed Baker to the post by unanimous vote. The appointment was effective Tuesday.

Mayor Jonas Cain described the action as a move to set up more efficient supervision of municipal affairs. The appointment of the city administrator is for an indefinite term and he is subject to discharge at the will of the commission.

Cain added that the recent resignation of City Secretary Bobby Sokoll was a factor in the commission's decision to set up the new administrative post. Baker, according to the ordinance, will be "administrative head of the municipal government under the direction and supervision of the commission."

As director of public works, Baker was already supervisor of all departments except the secretary's department. The mayor added that creating the office by ordinance also permits the city to bond the administrator.

The commission set the administrator's salary at \$600 per month and approved a bond of \$10,000 on the officer. The newly-created office will take on some duties and responsibilities formerly assigned to the city secretary.

Commissioners have taken no definite action on filling the city secretary post, but approved the appointment of Oma Faye Brown as acting city secretary Monday night. Sokoll's resignation was effective Tuesday, and he is moving to Abernathy as city manager.

Baker was employed by the city in October, 1963, as water superintendent. He came here from Pecos where he was assistant superintendent of the water and sewer department. In January, 1964, he was named director of public works for Slaton.

A native of Baytown, Baker attended Lee Junior College at Baytown and later attended Abilene Christian College where he majored in chemistry and psychology. He and his wife, Jo, have one daughter.

Baker's duties as city administrator will include: with advice of commission to appoint and remove heads of departments and other subordinate employees; to exercise supervision and control over all departments; to see that city laws and ordinances are enforced; to act as budget officer, preparing and submitting a proposed budget to the commission; to act as purchasing officer; to report monthly to the commission on operations and expenses of the city; to attend commission meetings and take part in discussions, but with no vote; to recommend salaries for appointive city officers and employees.

### Pioneer Area Resident Dies

Carl A. Womack, 71, longtime Slaton resident, died at 11:25 p.m. Friday in Methodist Hospital in Lubbock after a lengthy illness.

Womack, a native of Oklahoma, moved to the Slaton area in 1909 and was married July 26, 1911, at Tahoka. He moved to Slaton from Olton in 1946. A member of the Methodist Church, he was on the official board of the Slaton Methodist Church at the time of his death.

Funeral services were conducted Sunday in the First Methodist Church with the Rev. David Binkley, pastor, officiating.

Assisting was the Rev. Lloyd Mayhew of Brownfield and the Rev. Alvis Cooley of Panhandle. Burial was in Greenwood Cemetery under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Survivors include the wife; two sons, R.E. Womack, Midland, and Rev. Royce Womack, Hamlin; a daughter, Mrs. Elton Wyatt, Petersburg; two brothers, M.H. Womack, Lubbock, and H.L. Tulsa; a sister, Mrs. Beulah Shattuck, Lubbock, seven grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

### Trustees Name Board Members

Charlie Walton, Elbert Wilson and T.A. Johnson were appointed as a board of equalization during the regular monthly meeting of the Slaton School Board Tuesday night.

The board is scheduled to meet in June. Trustees received a report that Project Head Start had been tentatively approved by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

This program, slated to begin July 2, will provide training for pre-school children in certain economic strata.

The school board authorized payment of bills and discussed financial conditions of the district.

### City Awards Pipe Contract

Two firms tied for low bid on concrete asbestos pipeline for the city, and commissioners voted to split the contract during a bid opening Monday evening.

Identical bids of \$22,150 were submitted by Western Industrial Supply and by Clowe & Cowan. The pipe will be used to tie the city's two new wells into the water system. The wells are located on the Rhoads farm southwest of town.

In other business, the commission authorized calling for bids on two well pumps and motors. Bids will be opened at 9 a.m. May 21.

### Copies Of New Slaton Phone Book In Mail

Copies of the Slaton telephone directory were mailed to customers on Wednesday, Bob Davis, manager for the Southwestern Telephone Company said today.

The cover is of white stock, overprinted in brown ink. There are 24 "white" or alphabetical pages and 36 classified or "yellow pages".

Davis said that almost 3,590 copies of the new directory have been printed but not all of them will be mailed to customers at this time. He explained that additional copies are always prepared to have on hand for new customers moving to this area and as replacements for books in heavily used locations like public telephone booths.

Customers should throw their old directories away when the new ones are received. Davis cautioned customers to check them carefully for address and out-of-town number lists as well as other valuable papers before consigning them to the wastebasket.

"Quite often," he said, "customers will keep lists, valuable papers and even pictures between the pages of the telephone directory. Then when the new ones arrive, they throw the old ones away without checking them and things that they wanted to keep are lost forever."

### Loyalty Day Program Held

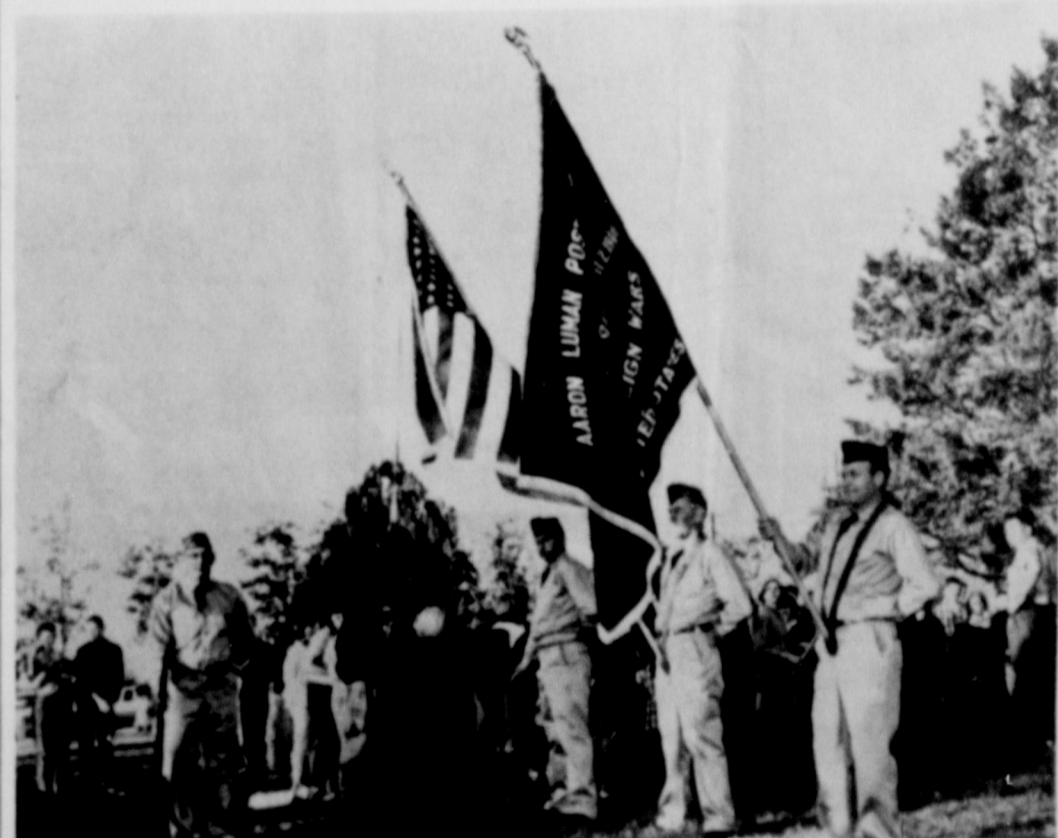

A sunrise ceremony on the city hall square was followed by a flagpole dedication at Mercy Hospital, where a special Loyalty Day Citation was also presented.

Recipient of the citation was the Slaton High School Band, being recognized for its active participation in Loyalty Day observance. Steve Tucker, band president, accepted the citation from Roy Milam, VFW department chairman and a past district commander from Lubbock.

Bo Becker, local VFW commander, led the post in dedication of a new flagpole and flag at Mercy Hospital. A plaque under the pole was donated by S.O. Henry, West Texas Monument. ### Gives Go-Ahead On 1965 Paving Plan; 1 Block Omitted

Commission gave on an ambitious program following the hearing Monday night, approving a paving program for the city.

The only block which definitely will not be in the city paving program is S. 6th Street between Division and Floyd. Property owners were 100 percent against paving on this block.

Approval of levying the assessment gives the contractor the green light on contracting property owners and signing them up for the paving. It is possible that other blocks will be omitted when the contractor reports back to the commission. If the contractor does not wish to take a lien against some property, the commission will decide whether or not it wants to do this, or okay a "leave out" on a block.

The new paving program covers approximately 80 blocks with a total cost tabbed at \$261,223. The City of Slaton will pay an estimated \$54,000 with property owners assuming the rest. Estimated assessment rates by the city engineer range from \$3.56 to \$4.78 for paving and curb and gutter--depending on width of streets.

A number of property owners involved turned out for the hearing, some to object and some to speak in favor of the program. Some blocks which drew one or two protests were left in the project by the commission, pending the report from the contractor after he contacts all owners.

The hearing on Division Street curb and gutter assessments was a "repeat" to comply with certain legal requirements. Four property owners voiced objections on the assessments.

After the hearing was closed, the commission discussed the matter and unanimously approved to levy the assessments. All were of the opinion that property value was "enhanced at least as much as the cost of improvement." All four commissioners expressed the opinion that residents were "getting a bargain" on the street.

Commissioner Earl Reasoner remarked that the city rushed the project, but pointed out that the job would have cost the city and property owners at least \$16,000 more if the project had been delayed. The county paid about that much on the paving.

Both ordinances to levy assessments were passed as emergency measures, thus doing away with second and third readings.

### Bank Deposits Up Over 1964

A healthy deposit total of \$5,176,654 is reported in Citizens State Bank's statement of condition in response to a bank call at the close of business April 26, 1965.

The statement, published in today's paper, also showed loans and discounts totaling \$3,925,732. Both the total deposits and loans and discounts were well ahead of last year's figures.

Deposits totaled \$4,582,769 at the close of business April 15, 1964 while loans and discounts were recorded at \$2,024,465.

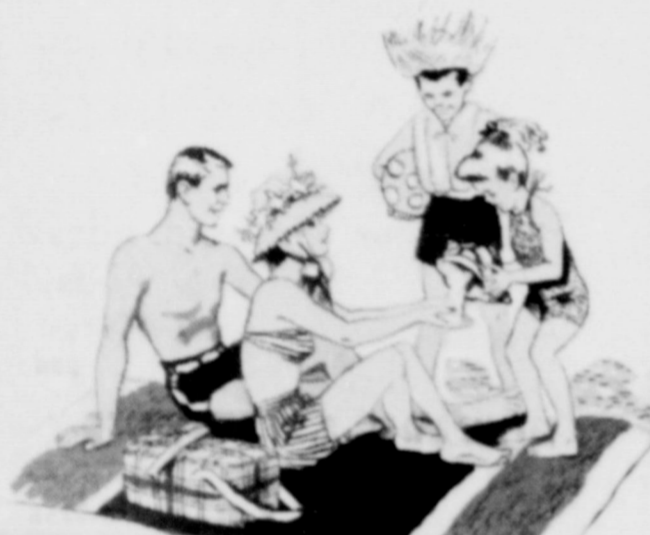

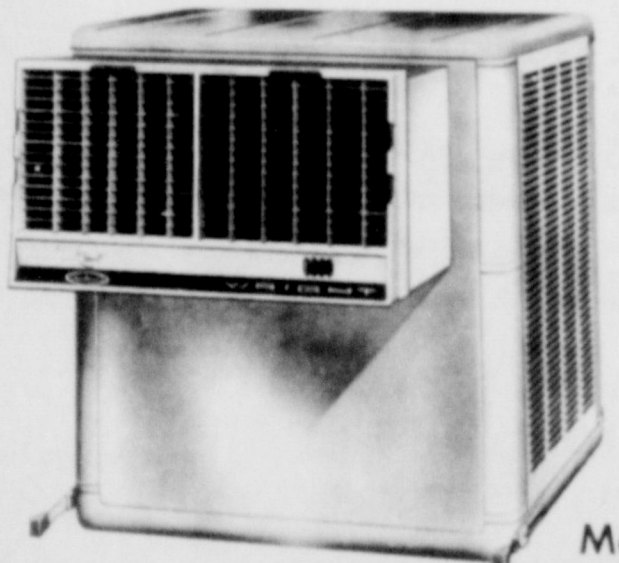

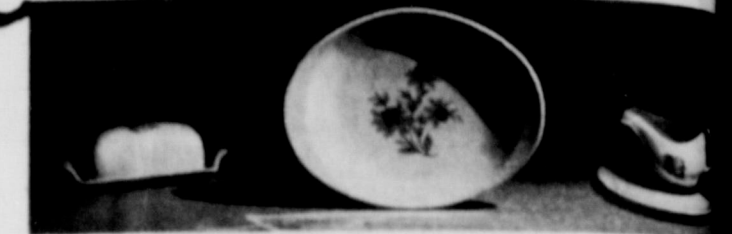

## Press Gets Preview Of Frontier City

The Slatonite was well represented Saturday when Rimrock City, West Texas' newest frontier city, had a sneak preview for the press of this area.

Five employees of the newspaper and our families traveled to the "city" to get a first hand look at what is under construction and being planned for the "fun spot of the southwest".

By the end of 1967 Rimrock City and Zoological Gardens will be a multi-million dollar education, entertainment and amusement center, according to Roland Ponce, president of Rimrock City, who dreamed up the whole idea.

Attractions now under construction and planned to be constructed as soon as can be are an 18-hole miniature golf course, second largest Reptile Garden in Texas, the fifth largest zoo in Texas, one of the most modern amusement ride areas anywhere, a ride in a replica of an 1893 model iron horse, two-mile horseback riding trail, and private picnic area.

Future development includes an 18-hole regulation PGA golf course, an authentic replica of a Cavalry Post and Museum, indoor-outdoor rifle range, and a convention auditorium seating 500 people.

Here on a canyon hillside just southeast of Lubbock off Loop 289 on Buffalo Lakes Road will be a playground for the entire family. The frontier city will come alive May 22 for all to see.

Taking a tour of the city, you would most likely start with the Red Garter Saloon, continuing on through each business in the little city and on to the church chapel on the hill. It's an authentic frontier town with boarded walks and hitching rails.

While you are making the tour it is likely that there just might be a bank robbery, stage hold-up or maybe some "drunk" cowboys who wander into town and have a shoot-out with the sheriff.

After visiting the bank, lawyer's office, livery stable, general mercantile store, barber shop, doctor's office, blacksmith shop and many more attractions, we boarded a stage coach for a ride through the rest of the City and Zoological Gardens, Inc. On this ride we got a view of the zoo and other attractions.

We were back from the ride just in time to catch the next act about to be staged in the Red Garter Saloon. During the three hours spent there Saturday, we enjoyed seeing Indian dances, arrow shooting by experts, singing and music provided by a quartet of youngsters.
