Ford- Mer- | Co. to "Smth Ford, Inc."


Smith also revealed

architect's drawing of a big new building, with plans for construction to be started in the near future. The building, containing some 16,000 square feet of floor space, is to be constructed on three acres of land near the US-84 and FM-41 intersection west of town.

"Our decision to put up this new building", Smth said, "reflects our faith in the economy and growth of the Slaton trade area." He added that the new facilities would greatly enhance customer service, providing more space for display, service work and parking.

Location of the new auto firm building will be at the end of Division Street west of town. The building will face the west, being situated on the southeast corner of the highway intersection. Smith said plans call for ease of entrance and exit on both highways.

Bill Stracener of Lubbock is architect for the new building. Contract on construction has not been awarded as yet.
