The coming of Spring traditionally signals a "clean-up" time in homes and communities, and Slaton City Commission decided Monday night to begin a strict enforcement of the trash and garbage-can ordinance. In a regular session Monday night, commissioners called

for a warning to the public, then a crack-down on violators. The ordinance calls for each house or business place to have a 55-gallon barrel or drum for trash and as an incinerator. It also calls for a garbage can of not less than 5 gallon capacity nor more than 30 gallons, with a tight - fitting lid.

The city law also provides for a fine not to exceed \$200 per day for failure to comply. Each day of violation constitutes a separate offense.

AND PUBLIC WAYS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DISTRIBUTING AUDIO AND VIDEO SIGNALS AND AUDIO AND TELEVISION ENERGY BY CABLE TO TELEVISION SETS TO CUS-MERS IN THE CITY OF SLATON. TEXAS, WHO DESIRE SUCH SERVICE, AND IT IS THE

OPINION OF THE CITY COM-MISSION THAT THE GRANT-ING OF SAID FRANCHISE UN-DER THE TERMS AND CON-DITIONS HEREINAFTER SET FORTH WOULD BE ADVAN-TAGEOUS TO THE CITIZENS OF THE CITY OF SLATON; NOW THEREFORE:

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON:

SECTION 1. GRANTING CLAUSE Subject to the subsequent sections of this Ordinance, Slaton Cable Television Company of Slaton, Texas, hereinafter referred to as "Company" is hereby Granted the right, privilege and franchise to own operate and maintain a citywise cable signal distribution system for the distribution of audio, video and radio signals and in connection therewith to use and conduct its operations on, in, over, under and across the present and future streets, highways, alleys and public ways of the City of Slaton, hereinafter referred to as "City", to the extent that such use will not interfere with the public's use or the city's use, and to the extent that the City may lawfully permit the use of the above described properties for the purposes enumerated herein.

SECTION 2. PURPOSE OF GRANTED FRANCHISE, NUMBER 1:

That the Company shall use

City assumes no responsibility for securing any franchises, rights-of-way, permits or easements which the City does not already own, making and maintaining of such attachments, or permission to make such attachments to the poles of others, but the Company assumes the duties and responsibility of securing the same. The permission granted herein is likewise subject to the laws, ordinances and regulations now in force, or that may be hereafter enacted or promulgated

by any governmental body or agency having jurisdiction. The City shall in no way be responsible for construction, operation, maintenance, performance, or any other activity of Company or its system or any part thereof. Company agrees to take any necessary precautions, by the installation of protective equipment, or otherwise, to protect all persons and property against injury or damage that may result from Company's installations or operations. If, in the City's opinion, Company has not taken such necessary precautions, within a reasonable time after City has so notified Company, City shall have the right by written notice to the Company to terminate this franchise as hereinafter provided in Section 10.

SECTION 5 CONDITIONS ON STREET OC-CUPANCY

NUMBER 1:

Use of transmission and distribution structures, lines and equipment erected by the Company within the City shall be so located as to cause minimum interference with proper use of streets, alleys and other public ways and places, and to cause minimum interference with the rights or reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of said streets, alleys and public ways and places,

NUMBER 2: Restoration. In case of any disturbance of pavement, sidewalk, driveway or other surfacing, the Company shall, at its own cost and expense and in the manner approved by the City Commission, replace and restore all paving, sidewalk, driveway or surface of any street or alley disturbed or cause same to be restored in as good conrights and privileges dition as before said work was

CRIMINATORY PRACTICES PROHIBITED.

SECTION 6.

The Company shall not, as to rates, charges, service facilities, rules, regulations or in any other respect, make or grant any perference or advantage to any person nor subject any person to any prejudice or disadvantage, provide nothing in this franchise shall be deemed to prohibit the establishment of a graduated scale of charges and classified rate schedules to which any customer coming within such classification would be entitled. The Company shall have the right to determine and fix charges for its service.

SECTION 7. TYPE OF SERVICE. The Company agrees to fur-

nish reasonable service to any person, firm, corporations in any area within the City and shall extend its cables and facilities without additional charge not to exceed a distance of 100 feet per customer where necessary to supply such customer upon written order therefore provided that such written notice shall be accompanied by the usual installation fee and three months' service charges in advance. The Company shall maintain all of its equipment in a good state of repair at all time, except and unless its operations be disturbed by fire, strike, riot or other occurrances beyond its control or by an act of God in which case the Company shall restore normal service within a reasonable time thereafter. The Company shall permit the City, its agents or employees to make an inspection of its facilities at any reasonable time and on as many occasions as the City may deem necessary for its supervision.

SECTION 8. COMPENSATION TO CITY. That in order to compensate

the City for its superintendence of this franchise and as the cash consideration for the use of city streets, alleys and other public ways, the Company agrees to pay to the City annually, during the continuance of this franchise a sum equal to two per cent (2%) of the Company's annual gross receipts derived from charges received from its customers on operations within the City. This first payment shall be made 12 months from date and succeeding payments shall be made annually thereafter during the term of this franchise, The books of the Company shall at all times be open to the City for inspection,

pertaining to the rendering of satisfactory service shall be reasonable.

SECTION 11, ASSIGNMENT OF INTEREST. The Company shall not assign its right and privileges under this franchise or dinance except upon the written approval of the City Commission. However, this does not preclude the Company's option to incorporate, assuming the incorporators shall be substantially the same as those parties holding the franchise; providing the Company may mortgage or pledge its rights thereunder for security or obligations owing by the Company.



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
