COMMISSION OKAYS STRICT ENFORCEMENT

Trash Cans 'Must', Says City

The coming of Spring traditionally signals a "clean-up" time in homes and communities, and Slaton City Commission decided Monday night to begin a strict enforcement of the trash and garbage-can ordinance.

In a regular session Monday night, commissioners called for a warning to the public, then a crack-down on violators.

The ordinance calls for each house or business place to have a 55-gallon barrel or drum for trash and as an incinerator. It also calls for a garbage can of not less than 5 gallon capacity nor more than 30 gallons, with a tight-fitting lid.

The city law also provides for a fine not to exceed \$200 per day for failure to comply. Each day of violation constitutes a separate offense.

In other business, the city commission approved purchase of a loader, heard a report from Dr. Don Hatchett, golf course association; passed three ordinances on first reading; passed an amendment to the electrical code on first reading, and approved bills.

Wilson Rites Set For Wreck Victims

Mrs. Emil (Elisa) Nieman, 68, a resident of the Wilson community since 1916, and her daughter, Mrs. Virgie Nieman Brannan, 35, of Lubbock were killed Tuesday night in a car-truck crash near O'Donnell.

Funeral services for both mother and daughter are scheduled in a single rite today at 4 p.m. in St. John's Lutheran Church of Wilson. Officiating will be the Rev. John W. Onda, pastor.

Burial for both will follow in Englewood Cemetery of Slaton under direction of Williams Funeral Home.

Mrs. Nieman is survived by her husband, Emil, and four brothers and four sisters. The couple farmed about four miles northwest of Wilson since 1916. She was born in Shiner, Tex., Sept. 11, 1897.

Mrs. Brannan was born April 1, 1930 at Wilson. She is survived by a son, Vernon L., of Lubbock and by her father.

Mrs. Nieman and her daughter were returning from a trip to Austin when the car in which they were riding was in collision with a tractor-trailer five miles south of O'Donnell at 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Driver of the truck, Gurd Dean O'Neal of Odessa, was reported in fair condition at Medical Arts Hospital at Lamesa. He sustained possible broken ribs and cuts.

An investigating highway patrolman said the truck was headed west on FM-1210, crossing into the path of the car which was going north on US-87. The car plowed into the left door of the truck cab. A passenger in the truck was not injured.

Mrs. Brannan had gone to Austin to take a test to become an airline hostess, according to relatives.

Stock Show Set Friday

The annual Junior Stock Show will be staged at 5:30 p.m. with FFA youngsters in the Slaton district competing for prizes and ribbons will be awarded in all classes, the number of places depending on entries. Slaton merchants and individuals have donated about \$600 in prize money.

Don Mitchell, high school agriculture instructor, estimates the show will have some 20 head of pigs, about a dozen lambs, and three calves. "We are a little shorter on numbers this year, but higher on quality," he remarks.

Boys for the show will be Dan Taylor, vocational agriculture teacher at Cooper High School, Ed Gilliam, Slaton agriculture instructor, and Mitchell will assist in directing the show.

The local show comes on the heels of the Lubbock County Junior Livestock Show and just prior to the huge South Plains junior show to be staged in Lubbock.

Boys will move their animals to Lubbock Saturday for weighing and sifting, and the South Plains show starts Monday and continues through Wednesday.

In the county show last weekend, 9-year-old Clay Mitchell, Slaton 4-H Club, showed the reserve grand champion barrow of all breeds and the animal was first in the Duroc division. He also placed 7th and 14th with Berkshire barrows in his first county show.

The two men receiving the most votes will be named to the board in the at-large balloting. Miles is completing two terms, and Heinrich is ending his first three-year tenure.

Miles, employed by Santa Fe Railway, has resided in Slaton since 1940. His wife, the former Billie Allen, has lived here most of her life. They attend the First Methodist Church and have two sons--Allen, a senior in high school, and Stanley, a 7th grader. Miles is current president of the Tiger Club.

His statement: "Recently an individual remarked to me, 'I see you are running for the school board again, you must be a glutton for punishment.' I have served two terms on the board of education and, in most instances, have enjoyed it very much.

"As in everything else where so many people are involved, it is impossible to please everyone, even though we try. I feel it an honor and privilege to serve on the board and want to have a part in the upcoming building program. All the men with whom I have served the past six years, I feel, have done a very efficient job.

"With the help of Dr. Vardy and the late bond election, I think the future for the Slaton schools looks very good."

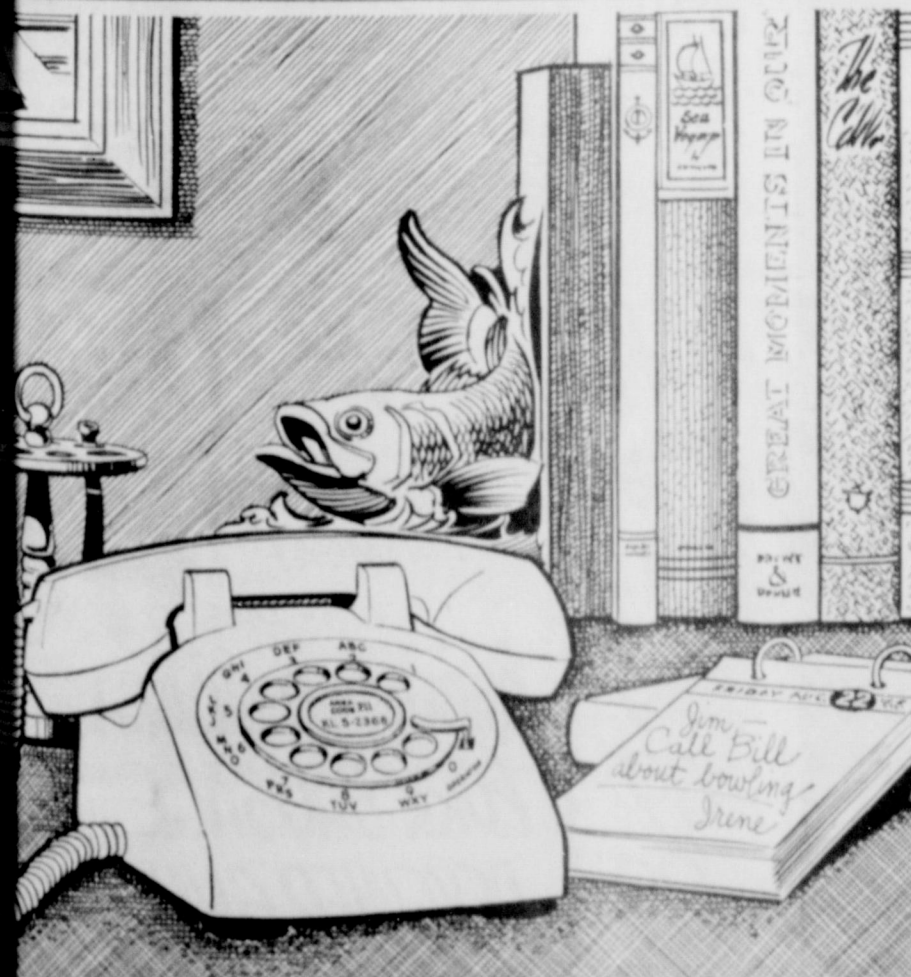

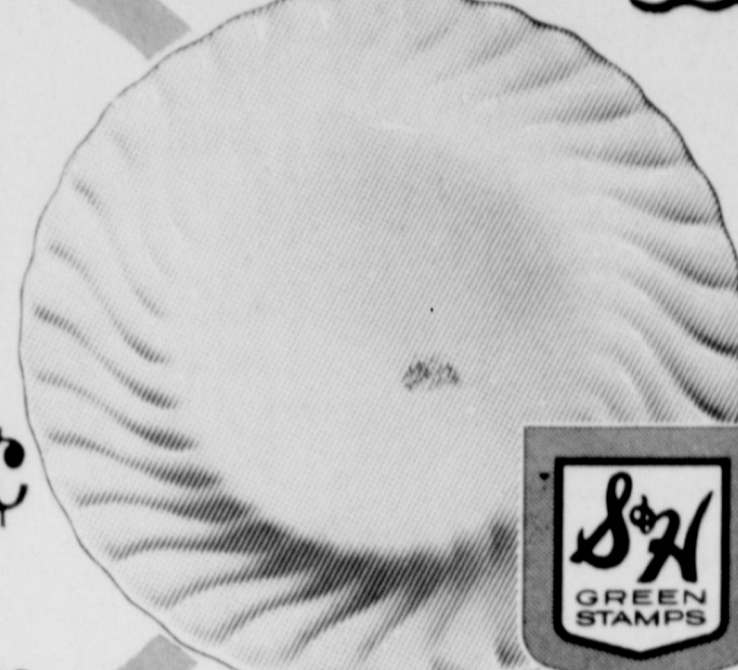

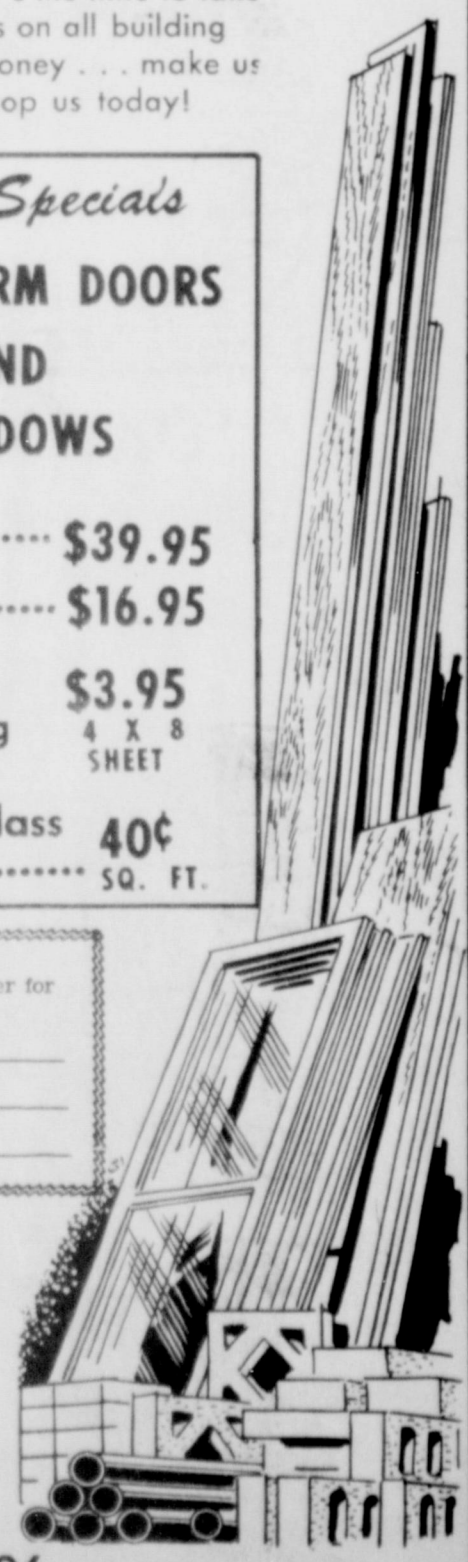

GI Education Bill Explained

Veterans planning to go to school under the new GI Bill do not have to rush to meet a deadline, Jack Coker, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, said today.

Although most benefits under the new Bill are effective immediately, the education benefits will not begin until June 1, 1966, Coker said.
