Survey Slated On Irrigation

The annual High Plains irrigation survey compiled by the Texas Agricultural Extension Serivce is scheduled to be print ed in November, according to district extension agents Billy C. Gunter of Lubbock and W.W. Grisham of Amarillo,

The district agents said the survey covers the 42 counties the Panhandle and South Plains areat that make up extension districts I and II.

Included in the survey are more than 35 statistics on irrigation in each of the 42 counties. opics covered by the report include such things as the acres of each different cropirrigated, total acres irrigated, capacity of wells, type of power used on wells, acres bench leveled, etc.

This year, Soil and Water Engineering Specialist Wayne Keese, of Texas A&M University, will be working with county agents in compiling the survey statistics.
