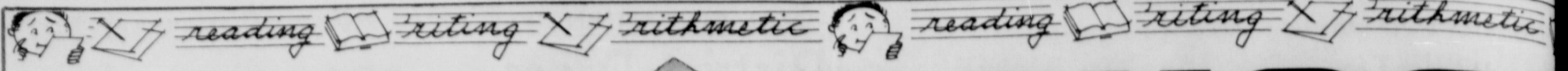

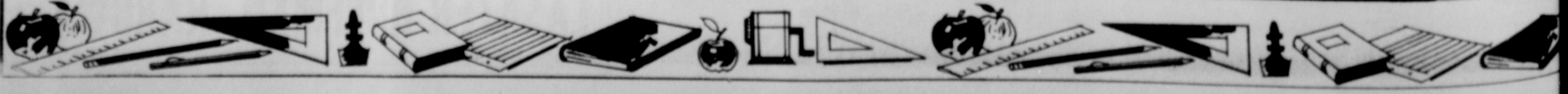
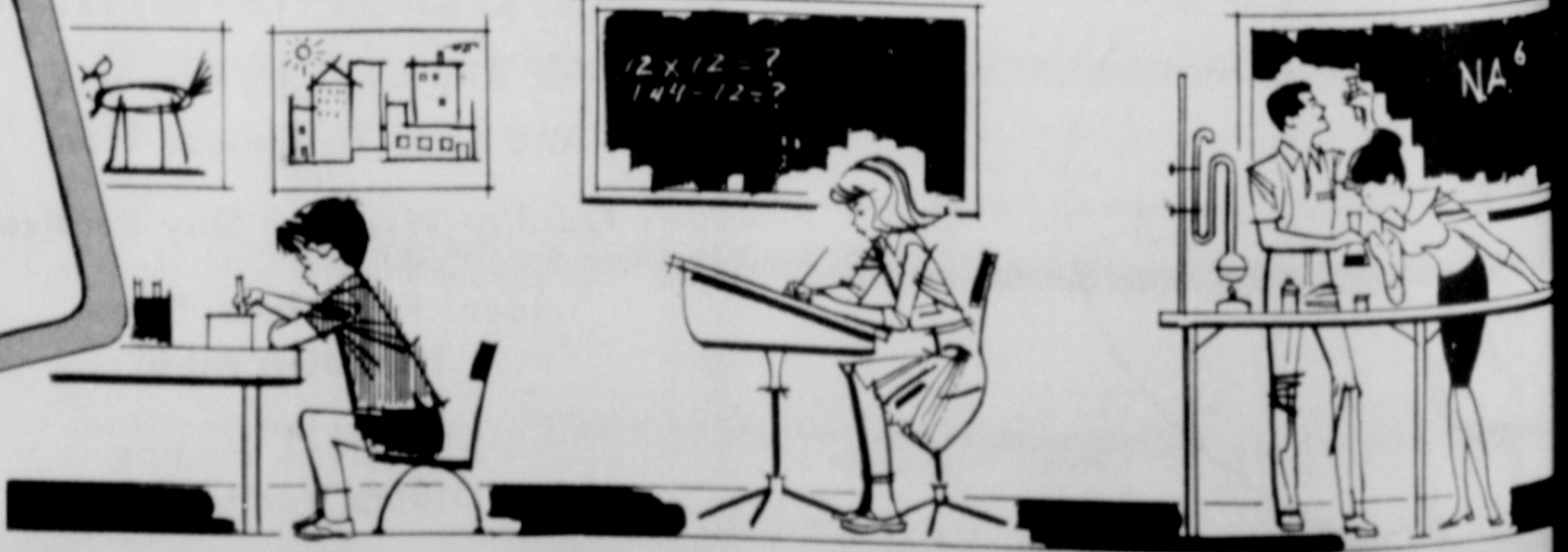

AGAINST SORGHUM MIDGE

Farmers Told To Be On Guard

Grain sorghum now in bloom over the High Plains is a reminder for farmers to be on guard against the sorghum midge. Past research at the High Plains Research Foundation shows that grain sorghum blooming after the first week in August may be in danger of severe damage by the sorghum midge. Over-wintering of the sorghum midge can be reduced by leaving grain sorghum residue above the surface of the soil until about February. Two years' results show over-wintering was significantly controlled in 1963 and 1964. Even though a farmer followed the recommendation of the Foundation in over-wintering con-

rol, migration from neighboring farms may cause a build up and warrant control with insecticides. In a recent publication University of New Mexico scientist, Stanley Coppock, recommends the same procedures developed by the Foundation in control of over-wintering midge through proper residue management. Loyd Langford, associate agronomist for the Foundation stated that normally an insecticide is needed that has the ability to kill in a short period of time and also a relatively long residual effect. Indications are that Trithion, Ethion, and Diazinon will be more effective against high infestations of the midge. A long residual insecticide, such as Endrin, looks promising for control of low population. DDT has shown to be superior to other insecticides, but can be used only on seed production blocks and is not approved for commercial grain sorghum. Two applications generally are necessary for good control. Applications should be spaced from four to seven days apart. The adult sorghum midge is a tiny flying insect about the size of a gnat. It can be identified by its bright color. The female lives for only about 24 hours but can lay as many as 100 eggs. Oso rapid identification of the situation and immediate control are essential.

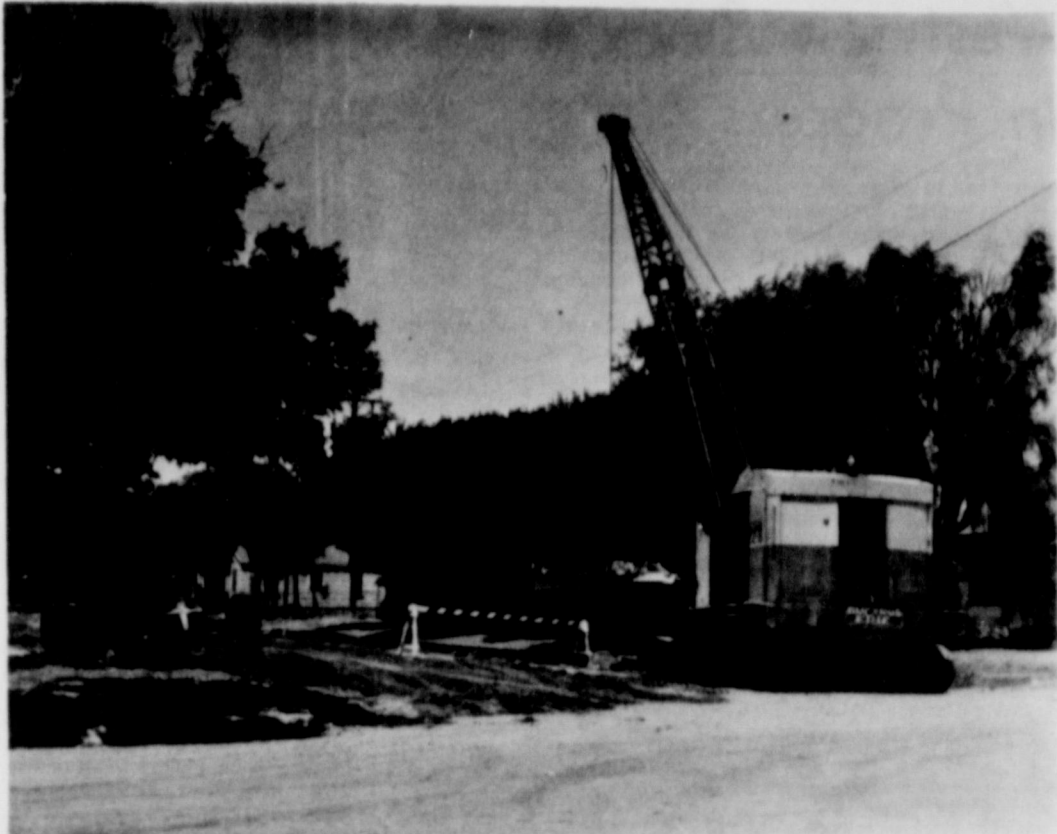
I hope all you readers had rain last night or this past week and feel as I do, that even though things don't always look so bright, it could be a lot worse, so let's thank God for what we do have!

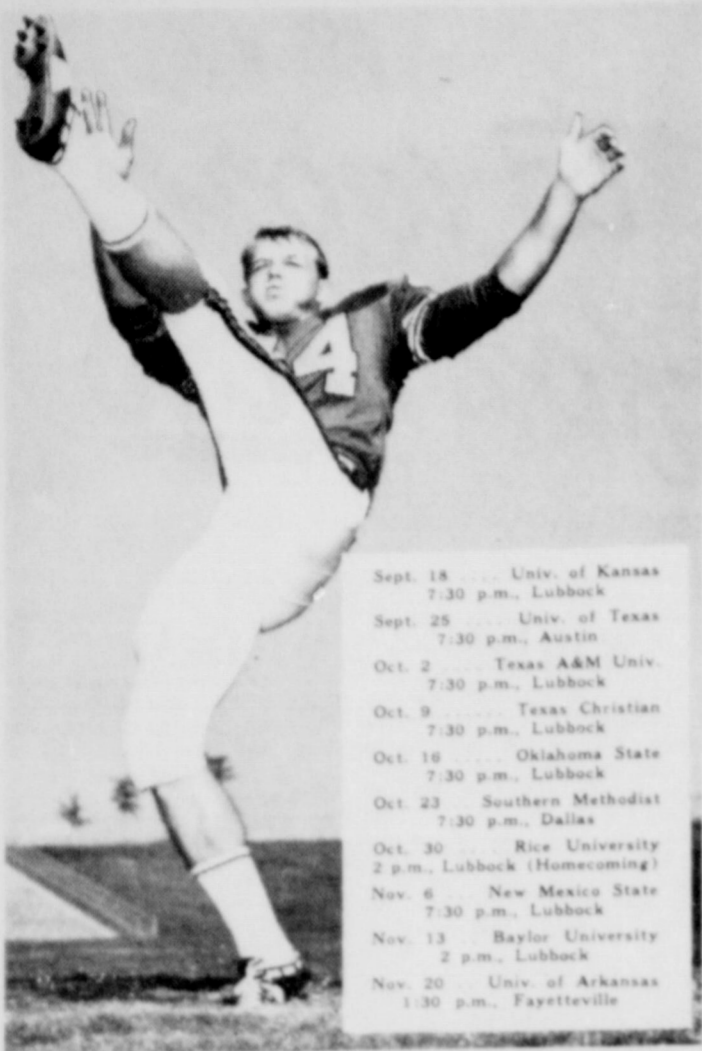
