VOTE SIGNUP NEAR FINISH

Texas voters were again warned this week that they must apply for a voter registration certificate by the end of the month if they want to participate in this year's elections.

Applications may be made by mail or by a personal appearance at the county tax assessor-collector's office or a sub-station. Forms have also been printed in The Slatonite, and are available in some business firms.

A big increase in registration over former years is expected. This is the first presidential election year under the new system of free registration, population has increased, and this is also the first year in which all voters will be required to register.

Along with the long registration period, a number of groups have been busy conducting organized registration drives. Voters who have not already applied for registration are urged to do so by Jan. 31.

Junior Livestock Show Saturday In Lubbock Barn

Plans for the Slaton Junior Livestock Show were being finalized this week, with the announcement Monday that the show has been moved from the Slaton Rodeo Arena to the swine barn on the Lubbock Fair Grounds.

Judging will start at 1:30 p. m. Saturday in Lubbock, according to Don Mitchell and Paul Johnson, vocational agricultural teachers at Slaton High. Judge will be Floyd Estler, ag instructor from Frenship High School.

The public is invited to attend, with special invitations extended to parents of the FFA and 4-H boys and girls.

The show is open to any boy or girl in the Slaton School District. Mitchell said approximately 70 head of barrows and 5 lambs would be entered by the FFA boys.

Prize money and ribbons will be given in each class, depending on number of entrants. Prize money is provided through support of Slaton merchants, firms and individuals.

City Approves Sewer Machine

Slaton City Commission approved purchase of a machine for the sewer department in the only action taken during a regular meeting Monday night.

The commission had only three members present again. Attending were Mayor Jonas Cain, and commissioners Hugo Mosser and Henry Bollinger.

The sewer machine -- used to clean out lines -- was a budgeted item and estimated cost is about \$3,900.

Commissioners noted several complaints from citizens concerning poor drainage of water following rains the past week. The commission also discussed the possibility of calling a city sales tax election. More study will be made before a decision is announced.

NEW SUPREME FEED PLANT NEAR COMPLETION

Slaton Industry Rebuilding

Supreme Feed Mills, Inc. is nearing completion of the newest, most modern formula feed mill in West Texas, it was announced this week by Robert Davis, president and general manager.

GOP's Contest For Commissioner

Another Republican candidate for Lubbock County Commissioner, Precinct 2, filed at GOP headquarters last week, assuring a primary contest on the ticket.

Phillip J. O'Jibway, Lubbock realtor, was the other Republican to announce. Bo Becker of Slaton, irrigation pump service operator, also filed last week.

Max Arrants, Democrat, is the current commissioner and the only Demo candidate to date. He was appointed to the post last year.

Another Slaton man -- C. C. (Cliff) Weaver -- also filed on the GOP ticket, seeking the constable's post in Precinct 2. The candidates were announced by Terry Condey, Republican County Chairman.

Becker, 42, has been a resident of Slaton some 33 years. He is a Navy veteran and is presently serving as district VFW commander. He and his wife, the former Charlotte Nesbitt, have two sons -- Gordon, 14 and Matt, 11.

O'Jibway, 47, has lived in Lubbock six years. He is a veteran and also has two sons. He is a graduate of Trinity University of San Antonio.

"Construction of the plant is in direct response to the ever-increasing demands for Top Flite Feeds in Texas and New Mexico, as well as the recognition of the dynamic and expanding livestock and poultry industry in the area," Davis commented.

Production is expected to start at the new plant in April, at which time the present milling facilities will be dismantled. A spectacular blaze destroyed much of the plant last May.

Supreme Feed serves an area that extends over a 200-mile radius of Slaton. Products are marketed both direct and through dealers in this area. Distribution is handled by the fleet of company-owned trucks.

The Slaton industry manufactures a complete line of livestock and poultry feeds under the brand name of Top Flite Feeds. Capacity of the new mill will be 500 tons each 24-hour period. This compares to 250 tons in the old plant that the company has operated for six years. Prior to that time, the plant operated as Ray C. Ayers & Son, Inc.

Feed processing will be in the new 90-foot high steel and concrete structure attached to the two-story brick tile and concrete warehouse containing 22,000 square feet.

More than 1,000 tons of storage for ingredients will be available plus the existing grain storage of 15,000 tons. Finished feed products will be available both bagged and bulk from 600 tons of storage.

Some of the major equipment includes a 4-ton weigh hopper, two 3-ton horizontal mixers, sifters, drum magnets, screeners, a pair of 150 h.p. pellet mills, double pass cooler, automatic bagging scales, pulverizers, steam cooker, roller mill and cooler.

All equipment will be operated from an air-conditioned central control panel room. The engineering design and construction is being done by Brown - McKee, Inc. of Lubbock.

Other officers of the plant include D. W. Walston, secretary - treasurer and manager of the grain department; John R. Morris, vice president and director of sales in the north zone; and Jerry Johnson, vice president and director of sales in the south zone.

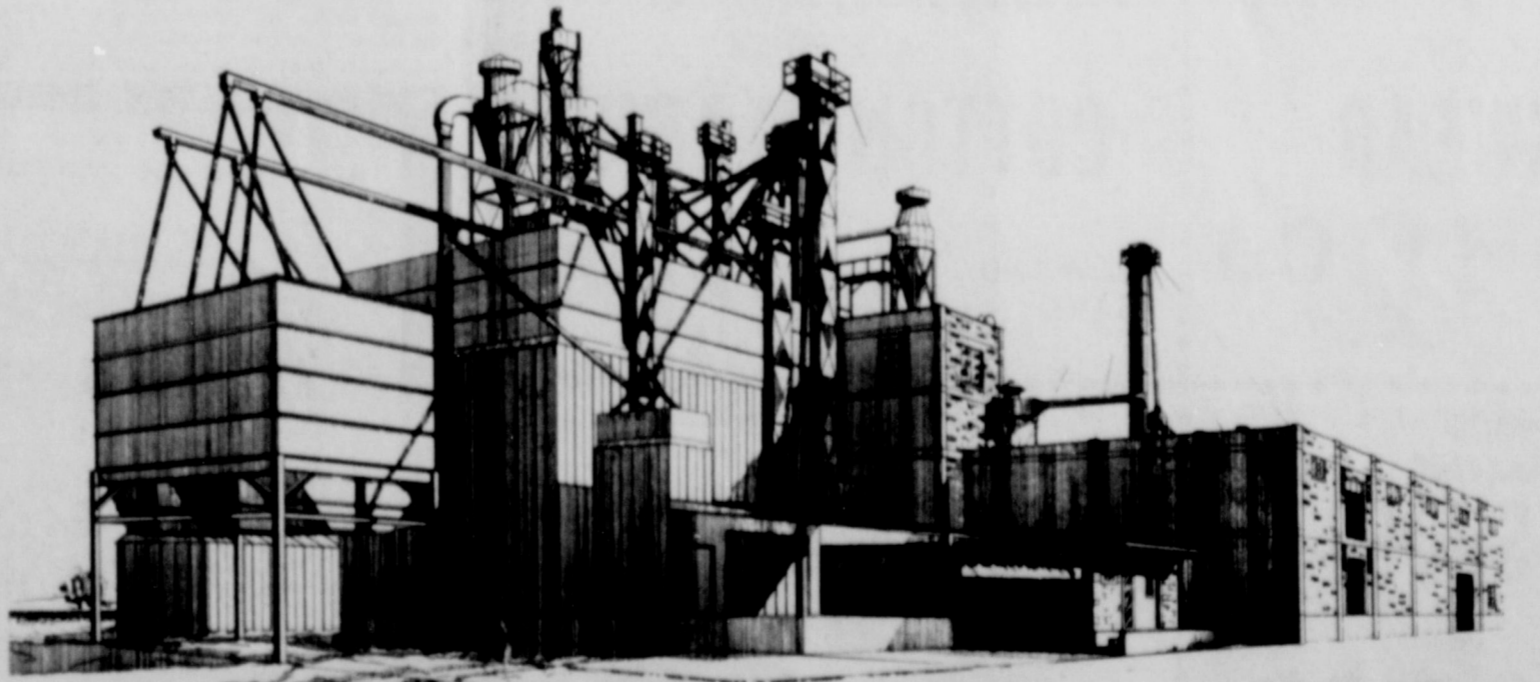

Because she finished first in a written knowledge and attitude examination for senior girls Dec. 5, Donna Alspaugh has been named 1968 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow at Slaton High School.

Donna is the 17 year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Alspaugh. A senior student, she is a cheerleader, was selected as Citizen of the Month in November, was first runner-up in the Lions Club queen contest last year, is treasurer of the senior class and is a member of the First Baptist Church.

The Alspaughs live one mile north of Slaton where her father farms. She has attended Slaton schools all her school years.

Donna's achievement has made her eligible for state and national scholarship awards and also has earned her a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, sponsor of the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow program.

A state Homemaker of Tomorrow and runner-up will be selected from the winners of the schools in the state. The state winner will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc. The runner-up will earn a \$500 educational grant.

The Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow from this state, together with those from

all other states and the District of Columbia, each accompanied by a school advisor, will join in an expense paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., next spring.

The national winner -- the

1968 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow -- will be announced at a dinner in Minneapolis, Minn., home of General Mills, Inc. She will be chosen from state Homemakers of Tomorrow on the basis of her original test score plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, and her scholarship will be increased to \$5,000. Second, third, and fourth ranking national winners will have their original scholarship grants increased to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

This is the 14th year of the Betty Crocker Search, initiated in 1954-55 by General Mills to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career.

Approximately six million senior girls have participated in the Search program since its inception, and 1,358 winners will have earned scholarships totaling \$1,481,500 at the conclusion of the current program.

The 603,798 girls from 15,079 schools registering for the 1968 Search established a new record for the program.

TANE Releases Books On Drugs

If the Senators and several Congressmen from Texas have their way, it will become illegal to advertise alcoholic beverages on radio or television between 3 and 10 p.m., according to a survey conducted by Texas Alcohol Narcotics Education (TANE).

Both Senator John Tower, conservative Republican, and Senator Ralph Yarborough, liberal Democrat, have approved Senate Bill 2202 which would prohibit advertising liquor, beer and wine during the hours children most watch television.

Tower said of the bill, sponsored by Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, "Be assured that I shall support this measure when it comes before the floor of the Senate."

Yarborough, speaking before

the Senate, said, "I believe we should make a more serious effort than we have in the past to keep our children from beginning to drink." He said present advertising is designed to encourage them to drink. The average teenager, influenced by radio and television advertising, begins to drink prior to graduation from high school, he said.

According to the TANE survey, several Texas Congressmen have expressed approval of the bill. Wright Patman of Texas said, "I am pleased to say I would favor the passage of S 2202, if and when it is introduced in the House."

Bob Casey of Houston said, "At first blush, without hearing any of the pros and cons, I would be inclined to vote for the bill, should it reach the House."

None responding to the TANE survey expressed opposition to the bill although some left both gates open.

TANE is a non-profit educational organization, whose goal is to prevent problems that arise from alcohol, narcotics, and other dangerous drugs. TANE's educational work is done through books, pamphlets, films, film strips, church programs, and public school assembly programs. A speakers bureau of more than 100 men operates state-wide.

Representatives for TANE will be in several Slaton churches Sunday morning presenting programs.

A recipe for Russian Spice Tea which is made of all dry ingredients is making the rounds in Slaton and those that don't have the recipe have been wondering where they could get it.

 1 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 3/4 teaspoon cloves

Mix all the above ingredients thoroughly and shake before using each time. Heat water and pour over mix in cup. Put 2 teaspoons of mix to a coffee mug or 1 teaspoon to a China cup. Mix well keep for long period of time.

'Back Seat' Drivers Just

Ladies who "back-seat" drive evidently have good cause, the Texas Safety Assn. said today in noting that more than one half of the female traffic victims in Texas last year were passengers.

Of 998 females killed on the state's streets and highways in 1966, 572 were simply along for the ride.

Only 283 of the total 1,714 Texas drivers killed were women. There were 136 females killed in pedestrian accidents and seven females killed in bicycle and other types of accidents. Females killed represented only slightly over 29 percent of the state's 3,406 traffic fatalities.

A look at the ticklish question of a lady's age shows that fatal accidents happen most often to young women between ages 16 and 55, with the highest number of fatalities occurring at age 19.

The Safety Assn. suggests that women "nag" their husbands or escorts to drive safely. They also advise women to cut down on romancing the driver in traffic. He needs his hands

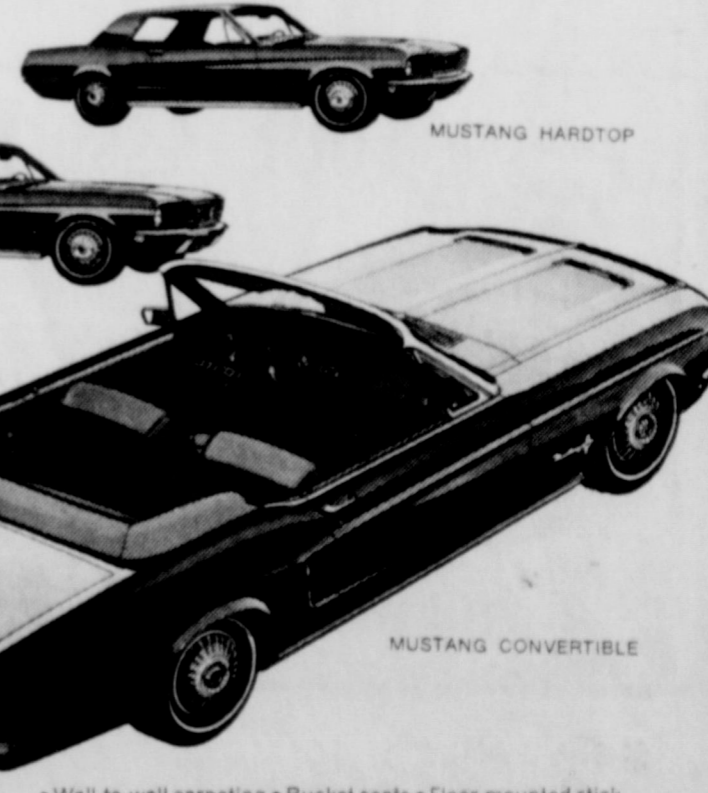

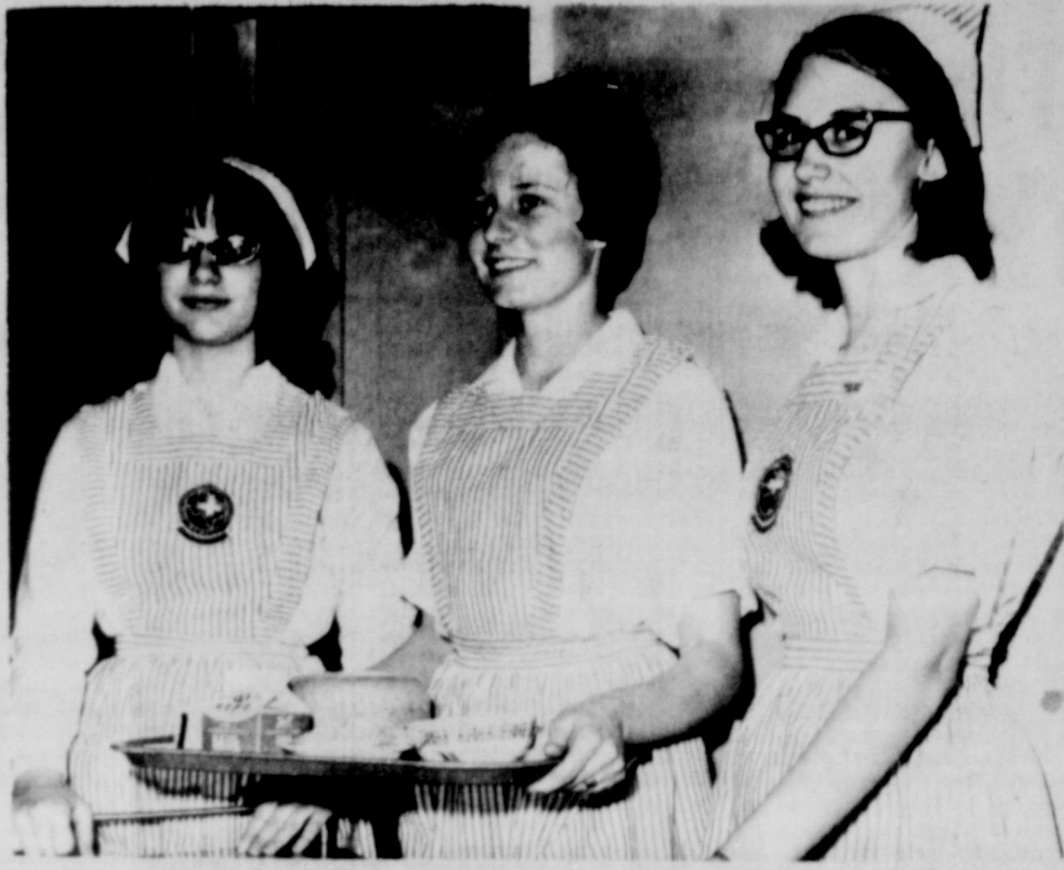

Color Photo To Be Standard On Driver License

AUSTIN -- Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety reminded Texans today that a color photograph becomes a standard part of all drivers' license issued after January 1, 1968.

"The change makes it necessary for all drivers to renew licenses in person at one of our Department offices," Garrison said, "and we have been working toward setting up a procedure that will not cause excessive delay when a person comes to us to renew a license."

Garrison explained that the change in license was incorporated into law by the last legislature.

"Renewal notices will be mailed to each driver, just as always," Garrison said, "However, under the new procedure, each driver must take the renewal notice to the nearest DPS office. There he will be given a standard vision test, sign the renewal notice and step in front of our camera. The picture will be snapped and a receipt will be issued to enable the person to drive until he receives his new license in the mail."

Garrison explained that about 250 full-time license offices would be in operation over the state to service license renewals. Issuance of new licenses will also be conducted in many of these new offices as well as at offices already established.

There are currently over 5,800,000 licensed drivers in Texas and about 2,500,000 licenses are renewed annually. To facilitate the process all licenses after January 1 will be renewed to expire on the birthdate of the licensee. If the person holds a license ending in an even number, it will be renewed for a four year term; if the license ends in an odd number, it will be renewed for two years the first time then for four years each time thereafter. The cost to the driver remains the same per year. The new license will be approximately 2 1/8 inches wide by 3 3/8 inches long, or about the same size as a standard credit card.

"We anticipate fairly large crowds at many of our offices," said Garrison, "and we hope to be able to give each person completely satisfactory service. We look forward to making many new friends among the millions of persons we have been serving by mail before now."

"The trouble with most folks isn't so much their ignorance, as knowing so many things that ain't so." -- Josh Billings.

Every police officer is aware that there are a few police critics who seem almost gleeful when they get a chance to describe a reported "police outrage".

Stories regarding police brutality and malpractice make interesting conversation and, in some cases, the stories may be correct. Our objection is that individual cases are used to give the impression that these incidents are typical of the police profession and tell the complete story. Nothing could be further from the truth.

There are a number of things police critics are reluctant to discuss. A big item seldom mentioned by those critical of the police is that the number of valid complaints against the police is a very small percentage of the total. Another thing that law enforcement fault-finders never mention is that the police are commended by citizens much more than they are complained against.

The police service and individual police officers have long been considered fair game for any and all critics. Much of this criticism has been justified, however, we dislike having our profession used as a "whipping boy" for all of society's ills.

Some people feel that never hurts to accuse a policeman of anything, but most of these people have been arrested and they make accusations to cloud the issue.

People should comment--be it complaint or commendation--on police activities. A citizen's opinion is highly valued by your Slaton Police Department. We never look upon a citizen's complaint simply as being a dispute between the accusing citizen and the concerned police officer.

We feel that when you complain about one of our policemen, your intentions are not to be malicious, but rather you are trying to do something constructive for your police department.

County Records 42 Accidents In December

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 42 accidents on rural highways in Lubbock County during the month of December according to Sgt. C. C. Guthrie, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in 16 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$26,125.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the calendar year of 1967, shows a total of 455 crashes resulting in 7 persons killed, 337

persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$365,149.

When the final fatal traffic accident reports are tabulated for 1967 it is estimated that the death count for Texas is expected to be 3,340 or about two per cent less than the all time high of 3,406 traffic deaths in 1966. If this proves true, then, it will be the first reduction in traffic deaths since 1960. This decrease should be a challenge for every driver to put forth his best defensive know-how and efforts to reduce accidents in 1968.

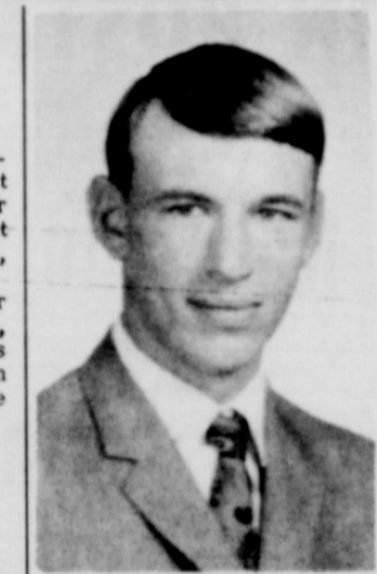

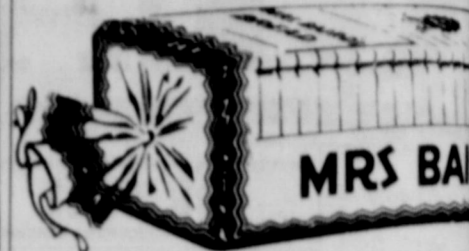
