### Hearing Changed On Restraining Order

A district court hearing on a temporary restraining order suit filed against the City of Slaton and the Slaton School District has been changed from Aug. 16 to Aug. 27, Mayor Jonas Cain was informed Wednesday.

The suit was filed in 140th District Court last week by Claude Cravens in a dispute over the recent tax revaluation program and the hearings concerning tax values in Slaton. The restraining order for-

bids the closing of the city-school tax rolls until the defendants appear in court to show cause why they should not be restrained. The mayor said he was notified of the change in the court - hearing date by Charles Cobb, attorney representing the City and School in the case. Cain said neither the City nor the school had requested the change.

The city commission was in regular session Tuesday night, and the agenda included a discussion on the tax suit matter. No decisions were made public, but it was known that the assessment of automobiles was under consideration.

### Services Held For Phil Brewer

Phil Brewer, 41, a native Slaton resident and prominent businessman, died late Friday in Lubbock's Methodist Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Last rites were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the First Methodist Church, where he served on the board of trustees. The Rev. Bruce Parks, pastor, and the Rev. J. T. Bolding of Lubbock, officiated. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under direction of Englands.

Brewer's parents were pioneer residents, moving here about 1915. He graduated from Slaton High School and Texas A&M. Brewer served with the U. S. Navy in World War II and had been in the insurance and real estate business here since 1951.

Brewer was active in many organizations and projects in Slaton. He served as a Chamber of Commerce director, precinct Democratic chairman, member of Retail Merchants Association, member of the board of equalization, a Mason, member of the American Legion and former Rotarian and Jaycee, chairman of the fund raising committee in Slaton for the Girl Scouts, director and secretary of the Slaton Golf Association.

Survivors include his wife, Winona; three daughters, Amy Lynn, Leslie Renee and Jo Michele, all of the home; two brothers, Joe Brewer of Garland and Dr. J. H. Brewer of Waco; one sister, Mrs. Bill McDavid of Waco.

Some ambulance services have been "inherited" by the city, some to community groups, some to subsidized operators, others to franchised people for political reasons. Some communities feel they must, of necessity, do without local service because of costs and personnel problems.

### Trustees Await Tax Roll Total

Slaton School Board, in regular session Tuesday night, approved election of several new teachers, approved bills, rejected bids on a press box addition, and-of course--discussed the district's tax program.

Dr. Lee Vardy, superintendent, said he expected to have a full teacher roster ready for announcement next week. Opening of school has been set for Sept. 3, and the school "calendar" is expected to be complete next week.

The trustees took no action on the tax revaluation program, but will study the issue further when the Board of Equalization completes its work and certifies the tax rolls. Just how much tax revenue the district can expect cannot be determined until the equalization board completes its hearings.

Dr. Vardy announced that two bids on the proposed press box addition at Tiger Stadium were

around \$11,000 and \$10,000--far in excess of the \$2,750 okayed by the board for the project. The trustees decided to study the cost of remodeling the old press box on the east side of the football field.

The addition was approved to accommodate visiting press, radio, and camera men.

While discussing the tax problems, trustees expressed concern about the possibility of teacher pay raises this year. The board had previously considered a local pay increase this year, but doubts were expressed Tuesday night about the tax revenue total being sufficient to carry through on the plan.

Trustees were given preliminary figures to start a budget study for the new school year. Trustees present were Joe Miles, Willie Heinrich, Ted Swamer, Tommy Davis, Don Kendrick, and Jack Clark. Absent was Dr. M. J. McSwain.

Everybody and they can tell you how to run a newspaper. The following from the Wall Street Journal man thinks it's like and I quote:

"An in-depth story, it's too long. If I condense it, it's not a story. If I take sides on an issue, I'm prejudiced. If I don't stop and talk (deadlines), I'm too big for my britches. If I do, that's all right. If I ask for advice, I'm incompetent. I know-it-all. If I make a mistake I hear about it. If I don't, I never hear about it. If I accept a bribe, I'm an alcoholic. If I misspell your name, I'm a fool. If I don't, you didn't read the story."

Who wrote this had it pretty good compared to the newspaperman who also has to get out and hustle to pay the expense of printing the paper, to run an office supply business to make up the season when you were publishing eight or 10 issues couldn't pay the minimum overhead.

The little woman who calls in her personal column and, when I ask her to please write while I ask my customer to wait a minute, she says, "I don't have time. I'm just trying to get it done. . . . but we're just trying to get it done. . . . and there's just too many jobs to handle."

Those readers who think The Slatonite should be a "good" thing that goes on in Slaton. "After all, those ugly, bad things in our daily newspaper," one man said if he were editor, no news would be published until it was re-evaluated, because it's just causing trouble.

To publish a NEWSPAPER, it involves all these things that I doubt if we'd trade our profession for any other. Maybe we're like a farm friend of ours, who is going to sell his farm and go to work in town. He's just as we know we aren't going to let a bunch of readers and advertisers get us so unhappy that we give up and throw in the towel.

When someone does offer a compliment, it happens, it makes you feel good that you worked hard and re-wrote that story to make it sound the way it should, or spent a lot of time on an advertising business man would be proud of the way it looks. We pride that we and all our employees at The Slatonite, just as a farmer who doesn't want any weeds in his fields and wants his turnrows plowed, want this newspaper to be the best weekly in the area.

fire emergency--human life." As time goes by, England said he thinks city administrators will realize that it doesn't make sense to see \$100,000 worth of fire apparatus go out to protect property which can be replaced, and not have any equipment to protect human life.

England also brought up another point in connection with his topic, urging local interested citizens to work for a "Good Samaritan" law in Texas.

He said 32 states have laws which protect doctors, nurses, ambulance people, police and firemen, and other citizens from law suits should they be challenged with not exercising due care in aiding those in need. Texas does not have this law, causing some qualified people to fear legal entanglement on giving aid in emergency situations.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-1, to read as follows:

Section 1-1. All merchandise, products, goods or wares in the temporary custody of a public warehouseman, who has no financial connection other than as bailee for hire with the owner, shipper, or consignee of the merchandise, products, goods, or wares, are exempt from ad valorem taxation if they are shipped to or from the warehouse by regulated or bona fide private carrier, are held by the warehouseman not longer than six (6) months, and have a predetermined out-of-state destination at point of origin. The books and records relating to out-of-state shipments covered hereby of such public warehouseman shall be available for reasonable inspection by

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52e to read as follows:

"Section 52e. Bonds to be issued by Dallas County under Section 52 of Article III of this Constitution for the construction, maintenance and operation of macadamized, gravelled or paved roads and turnpikes, or in aid thereof, may, without the necessity of further or amendatory legislation, be issued upon a vote of a majority of the resident property taxpayers voting thereon who are qualified electors of said county, and bonds heretofore or hereafter issued under Subsections (a) and (b) of said Section 52 shall not be included in determining the debt limit prescribed in said Section."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to add Section 64 to read as follows:

"Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within El Paso or Tarrant Counties. Any such statute shall require an election to be held within the political subdivisions affected thereby, with approval by a majority of the voters in each of these subdivisions, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may require."

(b) The county government, or any political subdivision, or any political subdivision, may contract one with another for the performance of governmental functions required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State, under such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe. No person acting under a contract made pursuant to this Subsection (b) shall be deemed to hold more than one office of honor, trust or profit or more than one civil office of employment.

The term "governmental offices," as it relates to this amendment, includes all offices and operations of importance to the State as of local importance required or authorized by this Constitution or the Laws of this State."



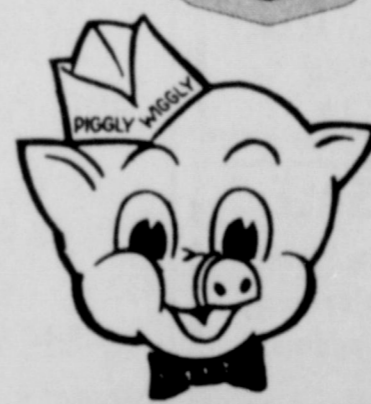
