Cap-Gown Time Arriving

City Okays Summer Water Rates, Writes Off Taxes

Excitement begins to build this week for 182 candidates for graduation from the area high schools. Most baccalaureate services have been slated for Sunday, May 19 with graduation exercises the following week.

Slaton High School's 92 candidates will have baccalaureate services May 26 and graduation exercises May 27. Both will begin at 8:15 p.m.

Roosevelt's 34 seniors will have their ceremonies set for 8:15 p.m. May 19 and 20 respectively. Cooper's 31 candidates have their ceremonies slated for May 19 and 24 at 8 p.m.

Wilson's 18 candidates will have a morning baccalaureate at 11 a.m. May 19 and graduation May 24 at 8 p.m. Southland's seven candidates will have services scheduled for May 19 and 24 beginning at 8 p.m.

Southland's highest honors went to Karen Melcher, valedictorian, and Patsy Ginkoff, salutatorian. The valedictorian at Wilson this year is Diana Koslan and Doris Behrend is salutatorian.

Named as valedictorian at Cooper is Debbie Griffin. Andy Watkins is salutatorian. Roosevelt's honors went to Jamie Thomas and Carolyn Goode, respectively. Slaton has not announced this year's honors.

A no-parking ordinance for South 9th Street was approved by the Slaton City Commission

in regular meeting last Monday. The zone will be from U. S. Highway 84 to Murray Street in certain designated places.

The commission also recommended that the summer irrigation rates on water to go into effect again this summer. The rates will be the same as last year. The first 3,000 gallons will be \$3.50. The next 7,000 will cost an additional 55 cents per thousand gallons. The next 5,000 will cost 45 cents per thousand and over 15,000 gallons for 30 cents per thousand.

In other action, the commission voted to purchase a used garbage truck from Patton Equipment Company for \$2,500 and approved the bills for the month of April which totaled \$11,265.

Old delinquent personal property taxes in the amount of \$3,294.60 were written off, but the commission decided to withhold action on the delinquent water accounts.

The commission will have a public hearing Monday at 7:30 p.m. in the Municipal Building concerning the paving project. The paving project includes streets around the new public housing program in the southeast part of town. The total curb and gutter program is estimated at \$114,769 on 24 units.

The assessment per front foot for curb and gutter is estimated at \$1.74 and per front

foot for paving \$4.63. The program includes portions of Jean, Powers, Edwards, Knox, Collins and 7th through 2nd Streets.

The commission elected Hugo Mosser, commissioner of Ward One, as Mayor Pro Tem for the coming year.

All of the commissioners, the mayor and the city secretary were present at the meeting as was the Street Supt. Grady Elder, Water Supt. Joe Cardenas, Chief of Police Walter Head, City Atty. Carroll Smith, and the cemetery superintendent, Ernest Alvarado.

County Demos Back Connally

Slaton Democrats joined other precincts in endorsing Gov. John Connally as a favorite son candidate for President during the Demo County Convention in Lubbock Saturday afternoon.

The pro-Connally forces claimed a 5-1 margin in delegate strength, pushed through their resolutions by voice vote, and rejected several resolutions offered by the minority group.

Almost 700 delegates attended the convention at O. L. Slaton Junior High. A test of strength came early on the vote for permanent chairman, with county chairman Ralph Brock and Frank Carrillo being nominated, Brock won by 539 to 100.

Slaton landed four delegates among the 57 named for the state convention, and the group will go under the unit rule. Named from Slaton were Max Arrants, Beverly Kercheval, Ford Stansell and Pearl Pinkert.

The convention supported resolutions: pledging support of the party's nominee this fall; urging elimination of the electoral college; changing precinct convention times from 2 p.m. to 7 p.m.; and moving the general election from Tuesday to Saturday.

In a drawing for places on the June 1 runoff ballot, Preston Smith will be listed first and Don Yarbrough second in Lubbock County. Others, in order: Jack Hazelwood and James Joy, 7th Court of Civil Appeals; C. H. (Choc) Blanchard and Grady Harnett, sheriff; Bruce Parson, F. H. Bolen, justice of peace,

SERVICES FOR LONGTIME SLATON RESIDENT HELD

J. A. Elliott, a Slaton resident since 1920, died Saturday morning in Mercy Hospital following a brief illness. He was 81.

Elliott and a partner established the first light power company in Slaton, known as the Slaton Power and Light Co. He spent almost forty years in the utilities business, including Waco and Mart.

He was a native of Kentucky and after his discharge from the service following World War I, he came to Slaton to start the power company. He stayed in the business until it was purchased by the Texas Utilities Company, at which time he was made manager of the Slaton District. He served in this capacity until his retirement in 1943.

Elliott was recently recognized as a 50-year member of the Masonic Order. A civic worker in Slaton for many years, Elliott was past president of the Rotary Club and had 30 years perfect attendance.

Services for Elliott were held at 10:30 a.m. Monday in the First Baptist Church with the Rev. J. L. Cartrite officiating. Burial was in Englewood Cemetery under the direction of Englund.

Survivors include his wife, the former Beadie Lokey; a daughter, Mrs. John F. (Juanita) Schide of Houston; and one grandson, James Elliott.

Slaton police made 24 arrests and issued 28 traffic tickets the past week, a check revealed Wednesday.

Pratt, pastor of the First Assembly of God Church, will be speaker at the baccalaureate service. There are 92 candidates for graduation at SIS.

Slaton Junior High graduation has been set for Tuesday, May 28, at 8 p.m. in the high school auditorium. There are 142 candidates for graduation.

The drill, which lasted approximately one hour, was conducted under actual conditions including switching to the auxiliary power unit.

An information center was set up in the office at St. Joseph's School and was utilized during the drill.

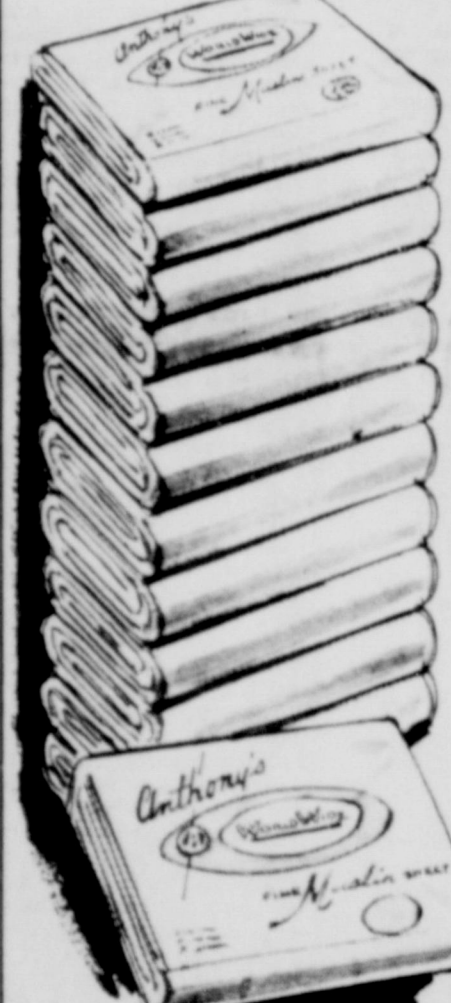

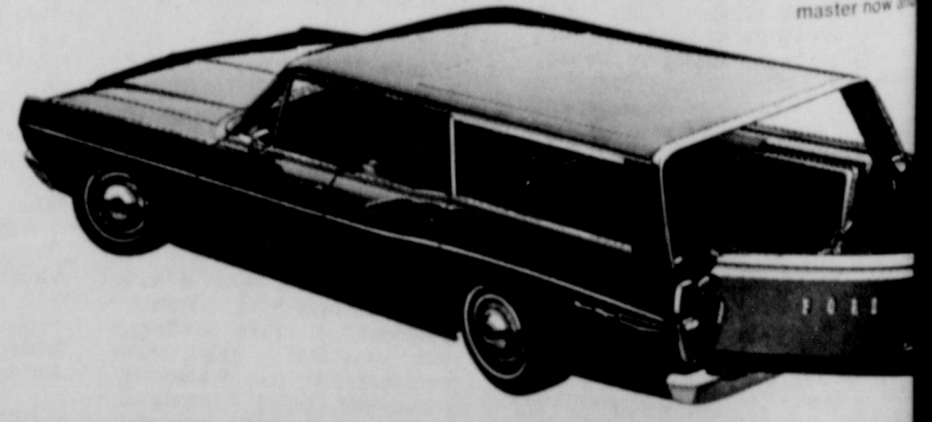
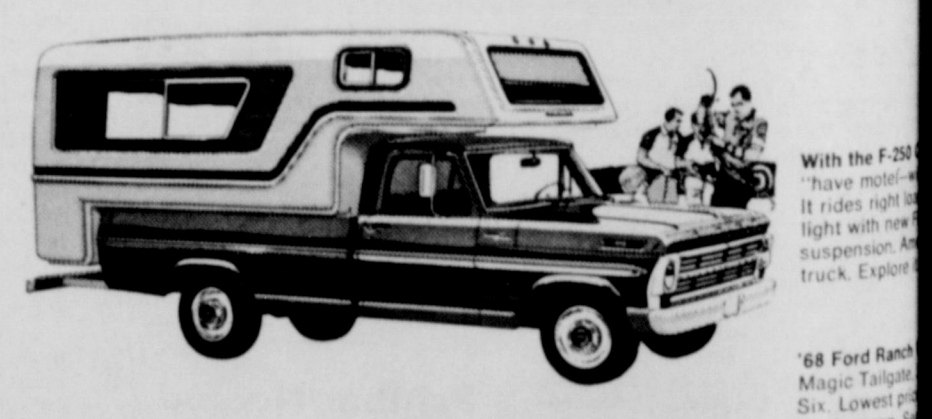

The next meeting is set at 2:30 p.m. June 11 at the hospital.



Lunch will be served at noon Sunday at which time the first and second place winners of the District 7 "Voice of Democracy" will be guests.

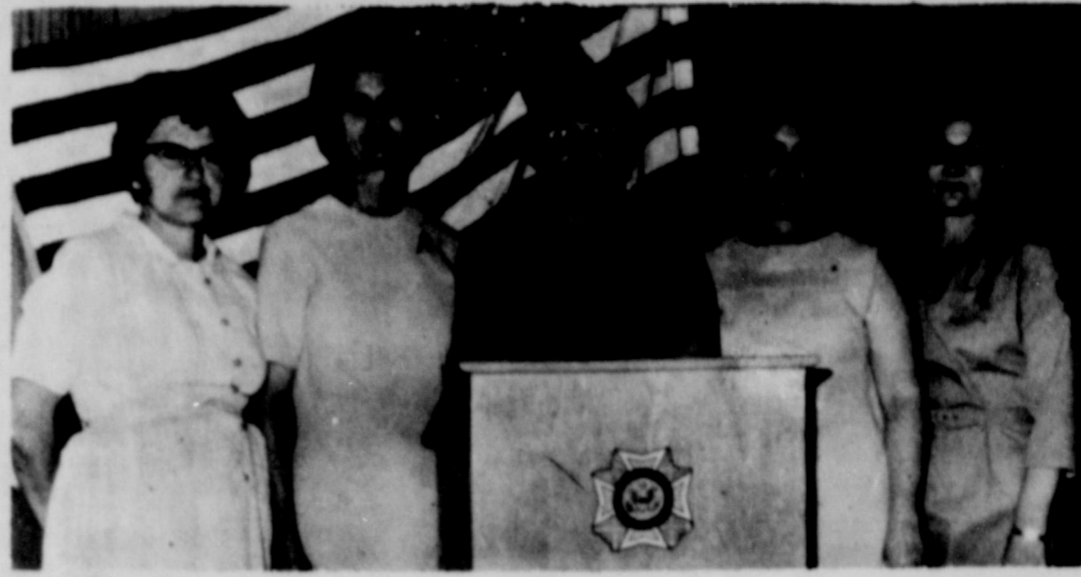

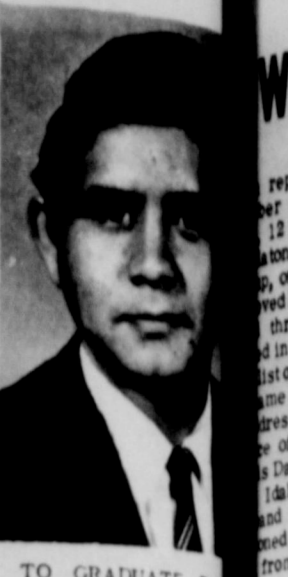

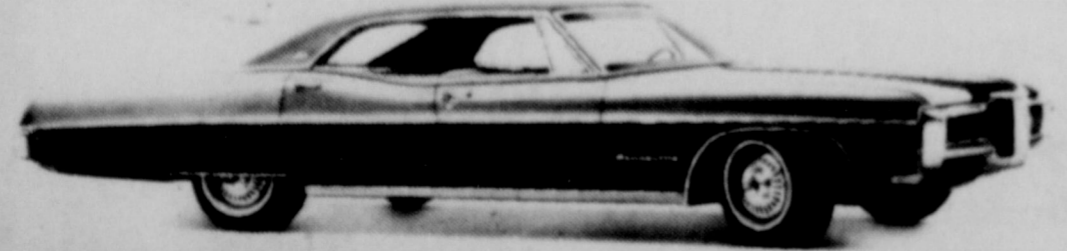

SLATON BOY DROWNS IN SWIMMING POOL

Tragedy came to Slaton last week when a little 11-year-old Negro boy decided he wanted to go swimming in the Slaton Swimming Pool.

Jerry Don Riddley was reported missing at 1:24 a.m. Thursday morning by his mother, Mrs. Rosevelt Riddley. She had tried to find him and when she couldn't the Slaton Police came to her aid.

It was reported that he and a friend went to the Babe Ruth Baseball game that night. His friend said Jerry Don told him he was going swimming and took off running from the ball game.

Police found his clothing outside the fence at the swimming pool at about 1:35 a.m., and the continued search for Jerry Don found him drowned in the swimming pool. A large metal pole was used by Coach Ernie Davis to probe the bottom of the pool and after several attempts were made, the body of the subject was found and lifted from the north end of the pool at the 10 foot depth.

A cursory examination of the body revealed no bumps or bruises around the head. An autopsy was performed Sunday and the death was ruled as a definite drowning.

The pool has an extra high fence around it that makes it a struggle for most anyone to climb over.

Co-hosted by the directors of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce and the Santa Fe, the luncheon will be held at the Amarillo Country Club May 21.

Edwin M. Wheeler, assistant to the president of the Santa Fe at Chicago, will speak and introduce a new color motion picture "Milepost 100." This will be the premiere showing of the road's centennial film in this area.

Wesley S. Izzard, editor and publisher of the AMARILLO DAILY NEWS, will serve as toastmaster and Wales Madden, Jr., president of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, is also a featured speaker.

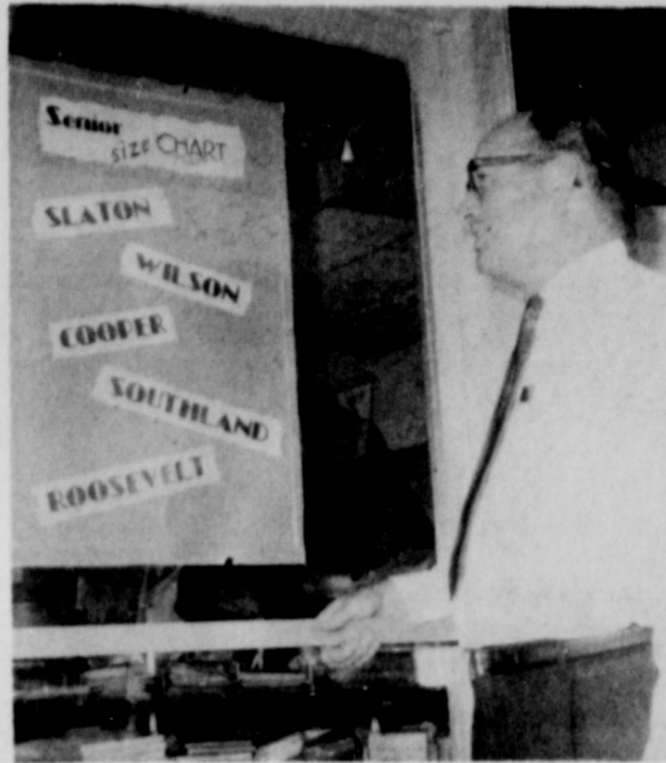
Although construction of the railroad began at Topeka, Kan., Oct. 30, 1868, the railroad is observing the anniversary of its founding with a series of luncheons and dinners across the nation. The year-long observance began with a dinner at Topeka, Apr. 25, following the annual stockholders' meeting there that day.

The Santa Fe or the Southern Kansas Railway Co. of Texas, built into Panhandle, Tex., in 1887, and Panhandle City, as it was known then, was the terminus until Apr. 20, 1898. Then, the Panhandle Railway Co., extending from Panhandle City to Washburn on the Fort Worth & Denver, was leased and later acquired and operation extended to Washburn. On May 10, 1898, Santa Fe started operating into Amarillo through lease over the Fort Worth &

Denver from Washburn. A direct connection from Panhandle to Amarillo was completed May 12, 1908, and the line from Panhandle to Washburn was abandoned and the FW&D lease cancelled.

The general office was moved from Panhandle to Amarillo Oct. 1, 1899. The secretary-treasurer's offices were located in a bank building at the southeast corner of Fourth and Polk Streets, present site of the Amarillo National Bank. Some other offices were located in the First National Bank building across the street at the northeast corner of Fourth and Polk Streets, and some were located in small company buildings on the railroad's right-of-way. In 1902, a 44-ft. by 68-ft. frame office building was moved from Rosewell, N.M., and located at Second and Grant Streets. This building was enlarged several times until it reached a length of 290 feet, with two stories and an "L" shape wing at each end.

Construction of the general office at Ninth and Polk Streets began Apr. 16, 1928, and was completed Nov. 26, 1929. The building was dedicated Jan. 18, 1930, and is now the headquarters of Santa Fe's Western Lines.

Soil Stewardship Week is sponsored by local soil and water conservation districts in coordination with the National Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts. The observance will include several special news articles, radio and television programs. Many ministers will observe Sunday, May 19 or Sunday, May 26 by preaching sermons on the stewardship of our soil.

Man is a steward of the soil that God has created and it has been entrusted to his care. Man but uses what God provides. The lesson is clear to see. It means that man must use well what God has given to him. "The earth is the Lord's and the fullness thereof." A sense of stewardship is one of the greatest safeguards against dictatorship.

Oliver Wendell Holmes once said, "I find that the great thing in this world is not so much where we stand as in what direction we are moving."

The point is particularly relevant to the stewardship of our natural resources. With only a few notable exceptions, we proceeded during most of two centuries without any deliberate direction in the use of our natural resources, unless it can be said that it was in the direction of exploitation.

It is in the way we live our lives, rather than in what we say, that we demonstrate our allegiance to God. How well we fulfill our responsibility to God will be measured in the final analysis, by the dimensions, the adequacy and the initiative of our service to God, His people and His earth.

POLICE BEAT

In a small police department, the city detective receives his case supervision from the chief of police.

If the chief were to use all his manpower on the city's latest gruesome case, he would end up with a file - room full of facts on what happened but practically nothing on who committed the act.

It takes much time to gather evidence to convict a suspect - far more time than the fickle interest of passing public attention is likely to allow.

The detective's duties include the investigation of all criminal cases in the city of Slaton, the detention and arrest of criminal offenders, the transfer of all required cases to county or

district jurisdiction, the location of missing persons, the recovery of loot and stolen property, and the cooperation with other authorities.

When the detective receives a report of crime, he makes detailed reports as frequently as may be required by the facts developed, withholding neither names or details which may be essential to the case. He personally visits the scenes of unusual and important crimes, and acquaints himself with the location and conditions so he may better investigate such cases.

Top Conservation Farmer Named In Lubbock Co.

The Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District selected Clifford Hamilton as the Outstanding Conservation farmer of the District for 1967.

Hamilton was picked by the Board of Supervisors of the District from some 1300 co-operators as doing the best job of applying needed soil and water conservation measures to his farm. Hamilton's farm is located 5 miles west of New Deal and is composed of 320 acres of irrigated crop and pasture land.

The New Deal Lions Club honored Hamilton and presented him a plaque May 6 as the Outstanding Conservation farmer of Lubbock County for 1967.

During the past three years, Hamilton has sprigged 54 acres to Midland bermudagrass as an improved irrigated pasture. He has built 10,118 feet of parallel terraces and shaped and established a 1.3 acre waterway to grass to safely control runoff water. He has installed a sprinkler irrigation system as well as 6,329 feet of underground irrigation pipe. The mechanical installation of soil and water conservation practices is only the beginning

of a well maintained conservation program. Hamilton is doing a good job in maintaining his conservation program. He is properly using the irrigation water on 239 acres of cropland. He fertilizes, rotates his livestock and properly uses his irrigated pastures. A good conservation cropping system is being carried out on all his cropland.

Hamilton is a participant in the Great Plains Conservation Program and has received technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service in applying and maintaining his conservation program.

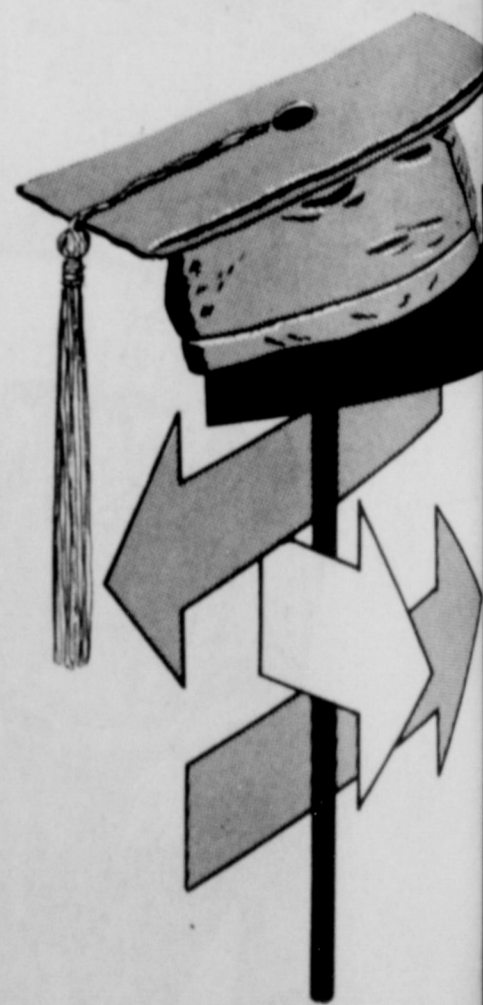
