

Wheeler, assistant to the president of the Santa Fe at Chicago, will speak and introduce a new color motion picture "Milepost 100." This will be the premiere showing the road's centennial film in

this area. Wesley S. Izzard, editor and publisher of the AMARILLO DAILY NEWS, will serve as toastmaster and Wales Madden, Jr., president of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, is also a featured speaker.

Although construction of the railroad began at Topeka, Kan., Oct. 30, 1868, the railroad is observing the anniversary of its founding with a series of luncheons and dinners across the nation. The year - long ob-servance began with a dinner at Topeka, Apr. 25, following the annual stockholders' meeting there that day.

The Santa Fe or the Southern Kansas Railway Co. of Texas, built into Panhandle, Tex., in 1887, and Panhandle City, as it was known then, was the terminus until Apr. 20, 1898. Then, the Panhandle Railway Co., extending from Panhandle City to Washburn on the Fort Worth & Denver, was leased and later acquired and operation extended to Washburn. On May 10, 1898, Santa Fe started operating into Amarillo through lease over the Fort Worth &

ect connection from Panhandle to Amarillo was completed May 12, 1908, and the line from Panhandle to Washburn was abandoned and the FW&D lease cancelled. The general office was moved from Panhandle to Amarillo Oct. 1, 1899. The secretary treasurer's offices were loc-ated in a bank building at the

southeast corner of Fourth and Polk Streets, present site of the Amarillo National Bank. Some other offices were located in the First National Bank building across the street at the northeast corner of Fourth and PolkStreets, and some were located in small company buildings on the railroad's rightof-way. In 1902, a 44-ft. by 68-ft. frame office building was moved from Rosewll, N.M., and located at Second and Grant Streets. This building was enlarged several times until it reached a length of 290 feet, with two stories and an "L" shape wing at each end.

Construction of the general office at Ninth and Polk Streets began Apr. 16, 1928, and was completed Nov. 26, 1929. The building was dedicated Jan. 18, 1930, and is now the headquarters of Santa Fe's Western Lines.

It takes much time to gather evidence to convict a suspect --far more time than the fickle interest of passing public attention is likely to allow.


The detective's duties include the investigation of all criminal cases in the city of Slaton, the detention and arrest of criminal offenders, the transfer of all required cases to county or erby.

ORDINANCE NO. 311 AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING PARKING ON A PORTION OF LOOP 251 (F.M. 400, 9TH STREET, AND OLD POST HIGHWAY) IN THE CITY LIM-ITS OF THE CITY OF SLATON AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR THE VIOLATION THERE-OF.

WHEREAS, congestion of traffic on the hereinafter described portion of Loop 251 in the City of Slaton, Texas, makes it advisable to prohibit the parking of motor vehicles of any kind on that portion of Loop 251 hereinafter more specifically set out and described and lying between a point 600 feet south from the centerline of Murray Street to the end of the curb and gutter on the east side of the Old Post Highway, a distance of 935 feet and on the west side of 9th Street to the end of the curb and gutter on F. M. 400, a distance of 600 feet; NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF CITY OF SLATON:

Section 1: No person shall park or cause to be parked any kind of motor vehicle, automobile, truck, truck tractor, or motor vehicle of any kind on the east side of 9th Street and the Old Post Highway beginning with the point 600 feet south of the centerline of Murray Street and continuing to the end of the existing curb and gutter, a point 935 feet to the south and east.

SECTION 2: No person shall park or cause to be parked any kind of motor vehicle, automobile, truck, truck tractor, or motor vehicle of any kind on that part of the west side of 9th Street, Loop 251, and Farm to Market 400, beginning at the point 600 feet south of the centerline of Murray Street and continuing southerly to the end of the existing curb and gutter, a distance of 600 feet.

SECTION 3: Any person who shall violate or fail to comply with any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in a sum of not less than One Dollar (\$1.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00).
