Audit Report

Slaton School Board met in regular session Tuesday night with the annual audit report and a discussion of the school insurance program highlighting the lengthy meeting.

Trustees approved the audit report, okayed a proposal to convert insurance on buildings and vehicles to a singlepolicy type of coverage, gave tentative approval to a junior ROTC program in high school, and approved an expansion of the Federal lunch program.

Total assets and liabilities for the school district were listed in the 1968 audit at \$3,464,647. Receipts for the year totaled \$979,495 and disbursements were \$974,382. Net deficit for the year ending Aug. 31 was about \$23,000 -- compared to a deficit last year of

Instructional salaries totaled \$545,663 for the year, including \$460,864 for class room teachers, \$37,723 for special teachers (Title 1 and Head Start), and \$47,076 for

principals. The audit showed a bonded principal of \$1,062,000 and bonded interest of \$346,396 for

total funded indebtedness of

\$1,408,396. Bob Kern, local insurance agent, appeared at the board meeting to discuss the district's insurance program. He suggested coverage on buildings be increased, and that the program be simplified by placing all business with one company. All local agents would still draw a percentage of the insurance commission as is presently being done.

After discussing the program and determining the insurance coverage would be greater for the least amount of expenditure. the board agreed on the proposal. Local agents will be contacted to see if they are interested in being the principal agent under the new program. Supt. P. L. Vardy reported

Nava Tells Of Action In Vietnam War

An Hoa, Vietnam, Nov. 19 --It was a sad day for enemy soldiers who started a fire fight with a squad of leathernecks.

As elements of "M" co., 3rd Bn., Fifth Marine Regi-1st Marine Division swept toward a treeline, an estimated platoon of North Vietnamese (NVA) Soldiers took them under fire.

As B--40 Rockets whirred toward the leathernecks, Lance Cpl. Rudy Nava, 18, (Box 771 Wilson, Tex.) and his assistant, moved their machinegun into position.

Nava silenced the enemy rocket launcher with a burst of automatic fire as the previously fired missiles exploded harmslessly in front of the

Shortly thereafter, the leathernecks opened up with mortars and the enemy began breaking

"It was ridiculous," recalled Nava. "It was almost as if they didn't even expect we'd return fire. Once we did, they didn't want any part of the battle." While the enemy retreated,

four more NVA were killed. There were no marine cas-



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



The Christmas Seal Mobile Detection Unit goes to any county requesting it to take chest X-rays. During the past seven months, the unit made more than 19,000 X-rays, disclosing abnormalities in about one out of every 40 films. In addition to tuberculosis, these X-rays alert people to the presence of emphysema, heart disease, and cancer.

Over 30,000 school children are being tested for tuberculosis this fall. In many in stances, a positive tuberculin reaction in a child, leads to the discovery of an active case in his immediate family.
