Mix peas, onions and pickles together. Salt and pepper, mix with salad dressing.

1 Pkg. dry yeast
2 cups warm water
1/2 cup sugar
1 T. salt
1 egg
5 T. melted fat
6 cups flour
2/3 cups dry milk

Dissolve yeast in water, add sugar, salt, beaten egg and fat. Add dry milk and about half of flour, stir well, add remaining flour. Round dough up on floured board. Place in greased bowl. Let rise two times. Place in two loaf pans. Let rise again. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes. Rub with margarine while hot.

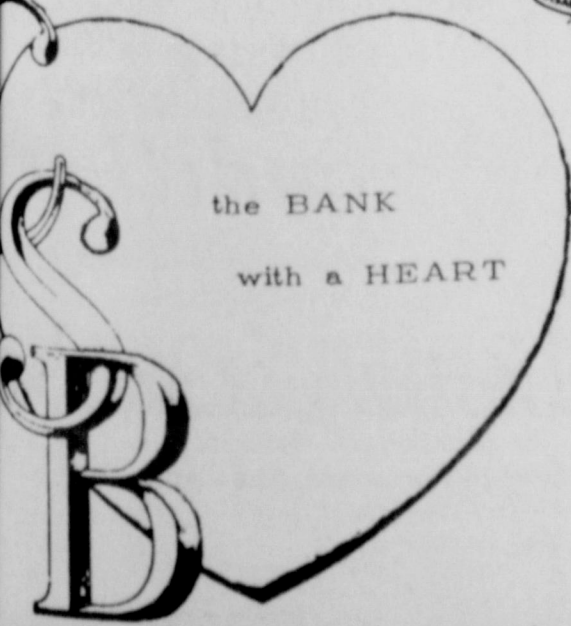

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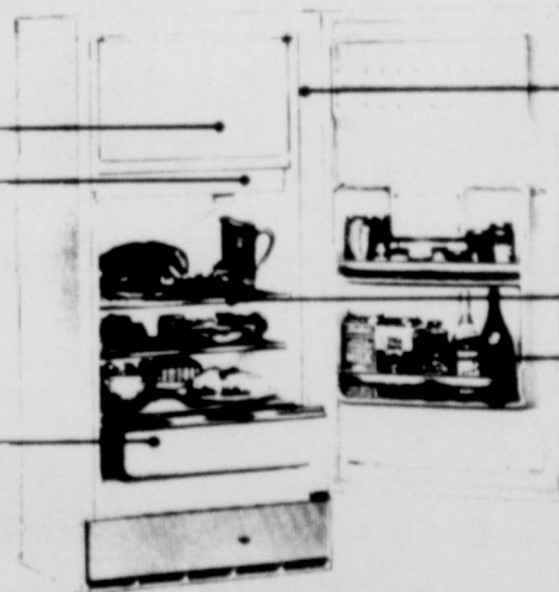

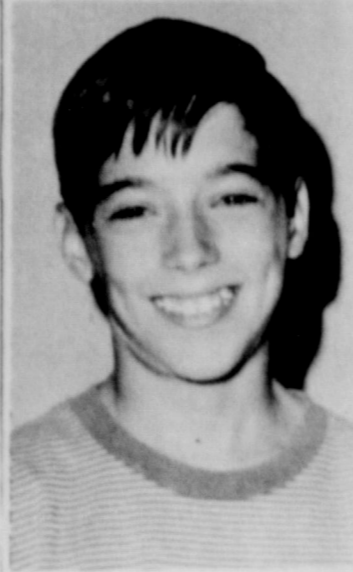

A very important position in the Slaton Police Department is that of a patrol sergeant. He is charged with the proper performance of patrol duty from the members of the department assigned to such duty.

He must be thoroughly familiar with all subjects pertaining to the duties of the patrolmen and shall instruct them in the proper discharge of their duties, and he is held strictly responsible for their efficiency, discipline, and general good conduct and appearance.

The patrol sergeant must be thoroughly acquainted with the capabilities of the patrolmen and faithfully and impartially report, in writing, to the police chief every case of misconduct, incompetence, neglect of duty, and all cases of outstanding performance of patrolmen above and beyond the call of duty.

In the absence of the chief of police, the patrol sergeant acts in his capacity and in his behalf.

The patrol sergeant assists the chief of police to determine what subjects of training are required to instruct the personnel in the field in carrying out their duties more effectively and efficiently, and he shall act as an instructor in the police department training program.

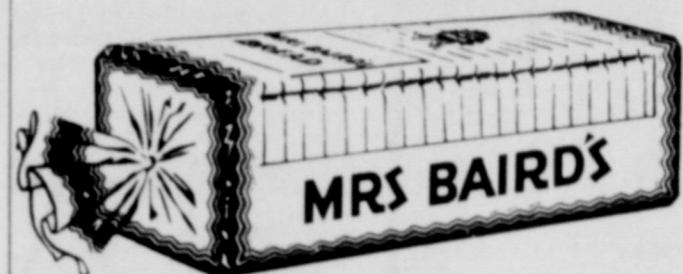

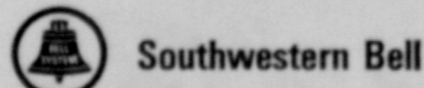

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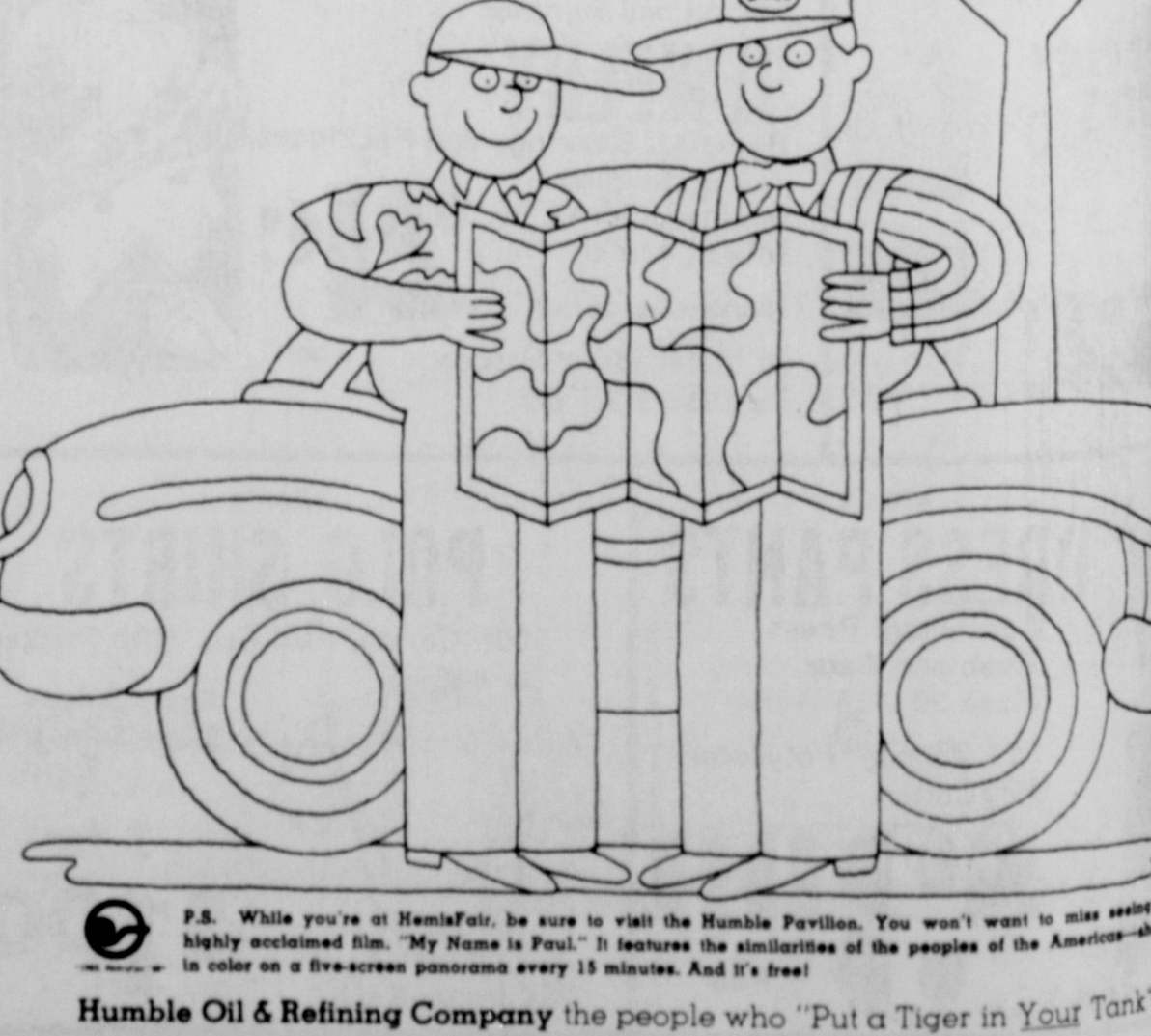

ORIGIN OF CAPS AND GOWNS

The use of the cap and gown at graduation from high school, college, or a university can be traced to the fact that the buildings of medieval times were damp and drafty, and the robes or gowns were needed for warmth.

The hood had its origin in the alms bag slung around the necks of the friars in the Middle Ages. Gowns for the bachelor's degree are fashioned from "worsted stuff" with semistiff yoke, long pleated front and intricate shirring or pleating across the shoulders and back. The bachelor's gown may be worn either open or closed and its primary distinguishing by its long, pointed sleeves.

The master's gown has the same yoke effect but its worn open, and the very long sleeve is oblong with a crescent cut out at the base, closed at the end, the forearm comes through a slit just below the elbow.

Gowns for the doctor's degree are also worn open, but they carry broad velvet panels down the front, and three velvet bars on the full, round, bell-shaped sleeves.

Gowns for the both the master's and doctor's degrees are preferably of silk. The caps can be made of serge or broadcloth. The doctor's outfit can be made of velvet and the tassel is sometimes of gold bullion.

Its the hood that gives color and real meaning to the costume. A black cloth shell, of varying size according to degree, and of material to match the gown, is lined with silk in the color or colors of the institution bestowing the degree. The hood is bordered with velvet of the proper width to indicate the degree and in a color signifying the department that the degree represents.

The use of some of these colors goes back to the Middle Ages. White velvet indicates Arts and Letters. Scarlet represents divinity and Theology, a reminder of the Crucifixion. Philosophy is blue, the colors of truth. Purple is an indication of law, the color of kings who made the laws. Science is golden yellow, the color of gold, which the old scientists used to attempt to make from baser metals. Medicine is the color green, the color of herbs.

So next time you see a graduating class in their caps and gowns you will know what the colors represent and how the cap and gown first originated.

Medicare Helps Pay for Medical Equipment Now

Medicare can now help pay for the purchase of medical equipment, John G. Hutton, social security district manager, said today. "Previously, Medicare helped pay only for the rental of such items as wheel chairs and hospital beds which a beneficiary needed for use at his home," Hutton pointed out. "But now the patient can decide whether he wishes to purchase, rather than rent, the needed equipment, if it appears that he will need it for a long period. If he purchases the equipment, part of the cost will be reimbursed either in installments or in a lump-sum, depending on the price. If the patient has had doctor bills during the year totaling \$50 or more, Medicare would pay 80 per cent of the purchase cost of the equipment. But if he has had no other medical expenses the first \$50 of the cost would come out of his pocket." "This coverage applies only to those who signed up for the supplemental part of Medicare, involving a \$4 a month premium."

Hutton said that payment can be requested either by the supplier or the patient. In addition to the invoice for the equipment, a statement by the physician as to its medical necessity and how long it will be needed is required. Further information regarding requests for payment can be obtained from your Social Security Office, 3428 Avenue H, Lubbock.
