she sustained February 21. At that time Francelle's clothes caught fire and her mother, Mrs. Bobby Greer, found her "a sheet of flames." Mrs. Greer rolled Francelle in bedclothes to extinguish the

blaze. Since all the beds were full in Galveston, Francelle was flown to Dallas. An area wide "Fund for Francelle" made it

possible for Mrs. Greer to pay the \$75-a-day nurses fee there. After three weeks in Dallas, Francelle was flown to Galveston with high fever and infection. Then she began the long

road to recovery. A doctor's report revealed that Francelle has sustained second and third degree burns over 41% of her body. Before the grafting started, Francelle required a lot of

transfusions. Mrs. Greer thought this would be a problem since Francelle had a rare type of blood, but the institute found an ample supply. Francelle's grafts took bea-

utifully. In fact, she only lost one, which in itself is a great feat. And now she is through grafting, which means she is covered by new skin everywhere she had had burns. She is now classified as an

out-patient and has to return for only checkups. To start with, she will have to go every three months, later every six months, and then yearly. She will have to return for two different sur-

geries during this time. Francelle had an excellent attitude while in Galveston. She would sing songs often and had

When Francelle and her mother arrived at the Lubbock airport last Thursday night, they were greeted by a 30foot sign which read, "Welcome home Francelle Greer." It was held by 24 Shriners. When she finally got home, Francelle wanted to see Bunkle, her pet dog. She said she loved her mother, but she thought she loved her dog more. But it will be a while before she can play with Bunkie, but at least she can watch Bunkie in the yard.

That first night home was a big affair for Francelle. She was just too excited to sleep. Her regular bed time in Galveston had been at 8:30 p.m., but that night she stayed up until midnight.

Mrs. Greer said the only problem about coming home was the fear of Francelle catching a cold, since there was a weather difference from Galveston to Slaton.

The hectic days are over and it's nice to be home.

## ORIGIN OF CAPS AND GOWNS

#### By Carla Nesbitt Tigers Cage Staff

The use of the cap and gown at graduation from high school, college, or a university can be traced to the fact that the buildings of medieval times were damp and drafty, and the robes or gowns were needed for warmth.

The hood had its origin in the alms bag slung around the necks of the friars in the Middle Ages. Gowns for the bachelor's degree are fashioned from "worsted stuff" with semistiff pleated front and intricate shirring or pleating across the shoulders and back. The bachelor's gown may be worn either open or closed and its primarily distinguished by its long, pointed sleeves. The master's gown has the same yoke effect but its worn open, and the very long sleeve is oblong with a crescent cut out at the base, closed at the end, the forearm comes through a slit just below the elbow. Gowns for the doctor's degree are also worn open, but they carry broad velvet panels down the front, and three velvet bars on the full, round, bell-shaped sleeves.



Its the hood that gives color and real meaning to the costume. A black cloth shell, of varying size according to degree, and of material to match the gown, is lined with silk in the color or colors of the institution bestowing the degree. The bood is bordered with velvet of the proper width to indicate the degree and in a color signifying the department that the degree represents.

The use of some of these colors goes back to the Middle Ages, White velvet indicates Arts and Letters. Scarlet represents divinity and Theology, a reminder of the Crucifixion. Philosophy is blue, the colors of truth. Purple is an indication of law, the color of kings who made the laws. Science is golden yellow, the color of gold, which the old scientists used to attempt to make from baser metals. Medicine is the color green, the color of herbs.

Medicare can now help pay for the purchase of medical equipment, John G. Hutton, social security district manager, said today.

" Previously, Medicare helped pay only for the rental of such items as wheel chairs and hospital beds which a beneficiary needed for use at his home," Hutton pointed out. "But now the patient can decide whether he wishes to purchase, rather than rent, the

needed equipment, if it appears that he will need it for a long period. If he purchases the equipment, part of the cost will be reimbursed either in installments or in a lump-sum, depending on the price. If the patient has had doctor bills during the year totaling \$50 or more, Medicare would pay 80 per cent of the purchase cost of the equipment. But if he has had no other medical expenses the first \$50 of the cost would come out of his

pocket." "This coverage applies only to those who signed up for pital there for two weeks.

the supplemental part of Medicare, involving a \$4 a month premium, Hutton said that payment can

be requested either by the supplier or the patient. In addition to the invoice for the equipment, a statement by the physician as to its medical necessity and how long it will be needed is required.
