

City Approves Water Line On S. 9th Street

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, conducted a short and routine meeting which included approval of installing a water line on S. 9th street.

The commission also aproved the appointment of Cecil Griffin to the City Electrical Board, replacing Bentley Page who recently resigned from the board.

The new pipeline on S. 9th is needed to replace a smaller line that has "rusted out", according to water superintendent Joe Cardenas. Plans call for installation of some 1,300 feet of 6-inch concrete pipe to replace 2-inch galvanized pipe. The line is located in an area near City Floral.

Commissioners reported a number of complaints on mud holes in city streets following the big snowstorm. A request for street lights on the west end of the Russell addition was tabled antil the new commissioner is elected for that Ward.

The Monday session lasted only 30 minutes. Mayor Jonas Cain and commissioners Hugo Mosser and Henry Bollinger were present.

Strong March Wind Arrives

Rain, strong winds, and a cool front followed by a warming trend were in the weather headlines the past week in the Slaton

Showers Saturday night almost missed Slaton, with about .50 of an inch reported around the Posey area. Lubbock also had half an inch, while Tahoka had the heaviest rainfall with just over an inch. Post reported .25 of an inch.

The winds of March arrived in the area Monday, with a strong 25 mph wind reported most of the day and gusts reaching up to 49 mph. The wind brought lower temperatures to most of the state, with snow flurries in the Panhandle.

Low temperature for the week was registered at 28 degrees early Tuesday morning. The mercury had climbed to a high of 75 last Sunday, but reached only 50 Monday.

Police Record Two Accidents

election looms Tuesday, April 1, when voters will choose a mayor and two city commissioners, and contested races are set in each election.

As might be expected, the citywide mayor's race claims most voter interest with three candidates vying for the top post. Wards 1 and 3 will elect city commissioners in the Tuesday election, and Ward 2 voters will have a special election on April 5 to fill a vacancy

Polling places will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Tuesday with Ward 1 voters going to the junior high school, Ward 2 at Community Clubhouse, Ward 3 at City Hall, and Ward 4 at Stephen F. Austin School. The mayor's race is a threeJonas Cain seeking re-election after serving three consecutive terms of two years each. He is challenged by two former city commissioners -- Dr. David Hughes and J. W. (Curly) Mart-

Cain is a retired railroader. Dr. Hughes is owner and operator of Slaton Veterinary Clinic, and Martindale operates a service station and is a parttime postal employee. Dr. Hughes was serving on the commission from Ward 2 until he resigned last month to enter the mayor's race. Martindale is a former commissioner from Ward 1 and former school board trustee.

Officials are not anticipating a record vote turnout, but it could happen. A total of 909 votes were cast in the 1967 city election, when a citywide race was involved. The record was a turnout of 944 voters in

1965. Two incumbents are also seeking re-election in the ward races Tuesday, Hugo Mosseris seeking a second term in Ward 1, and he is matched against a former city commissioner, J. S. Edwards Jr. Henry Bollinger, who has served four terms in Ward 3, seeks re-election and is challenged by Floyd Guel-

Mosser, owner of Mosser Radio & TV, is completing his first term. Edwards, former banker and now in the investments field, served on the commission some years back. Bollinger is a retired railroader and a resident since 1915, Guelker is a locomotive engineer, a deacon and treasurer of First Baptist Church, and a resident 23 years.

Planners say the project is technically and economically feasible. The study isn't finished yet. Detailed plans must be made and many problems must be researched and resolved. The project is still much alive, however, and the study is well underway by the City of Lubbock.

The proposal calls for Lubbock to reclaim and store the reclaimed water from its treatment plants in a series of dams. In addition, runoff would also be impounded in the canyon, a natural drainage outlet for the Upper Fork of the Double Mountain Fork of the Brazos River. A recirculation plan linking some lakes is also pro-



Open House Set at First Baptist

on its new \$156,000 educational building, and the public is invited to view the new facilities from 2 to 5 p.m.

The Rev. J. L. Cartrite, pastor, announced that members "extended a cordial welcome to all interested persons." Rev. Cartrite, who came to Slaton in July of 1965, is the church's 16th pastor since it was chartered in July of 1911. The new two-level building connects with the auditorium

and other facilities at the corner of 9th and Scurry. The new educational building faces S. 9th Street and contains some 10,360 square feet of floor space. The space provides for a nursery suite, classrooms and offices, in addition to a chapel and church parlor. Just off the lobby of the new addition will be found the

secretary's office, which is adjoined by the pastor's study and office space for a music and education director. A chapel, with seating capacity of 115, and the church parlor are nearby, each carpeted in a light green.

The first floor also houses a three-room nursery suite, complete with a diaper room--equipped to take care of baby's needs. The suite also has speakers connected to the auditorium so that worship services can be heard.

The second floor houses Sunday School classrooms from beginner to high school levels. The building has year-around air conditioning with gas heat and refrigerated air. The chapel and parlor have sound systems, and the secretary's office has an intercom system to the assembly rooms.

The present auditorium at First Baptist was dedicated Jan. 6, 1957. The older educational building was erected in March, 1951. The church has been at its present location since 1922. The first house of worship was built in 1912 at the corner of 10th and Division streets.






