Tax Man Sez:

If you have lived in one place all year and have worked for one employer, probably you haven't been faced with the problem of getting your W-2 form. You may even have already received your refund check.

However, if you move around and still don't have all of your W-2's you better let your old employers know what your address is now, so he can mail you your W-2's. Don't file your tax return until you get all of your W-2's because the computer will simply hold up your refund or the processing of your tax return. The computer will also send you a nice little form letter saying "Get your W-2's."

Internal Revenue can help you in some cases, but ordinarily they expect you to talk to your former employer and get the W-2. If you cannot secure a W-2 Internal Revenue will furnish you with an affidavit form for you to estimate to the best of your ability, your earnings, Social Security tax and the income tax that was withheld by your employer. If you don't have all of your W-2's—now is the time to start getting them.

Senior Citizens Subject to Same Tax Provisions

The medical expenses of taxpayers 65 years of age or older are subject to the same rules that apply to younger taxpayers, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue for Northern Texas, said today.

All taxpayers who list medical expenses on their 1968 Federal tax returns may deduct only the total expenses that exceeds 3 percent of their adjusted gross income. Medicine and drug expenses exceeding one percent of income should be included in the taxpayers' other medical expenses.

Mr. Campbell pointed out that one-half the cost of premiums paid for medical insurance, up to a maximum of \$150, may be deducted by all taxpayers who itemize without regard to the three percent limitation. For taxpayers 65 or older, one-half the cost of supplementary medical insurance under Medicare may be deducted under the same tax law provision.

The remaining costs of insurance premiums should be added to the taxpayer's other medical expenses and reduced by three percent of adjusted gross income.

Pioneer Files For Listing On 'Big Board'

NEW YORK - Pioneer Natural Gas Company expects to be listed on the New York Stock Exchange in the very near future, according to a statement made last week by C. I. Wall, chairman of the board and president of the company, speaking before the New York Society of Security Analysts. Wall announced that the company had filed an application on Tuesday, March 18, for listing on the "Big Board."

Discussing the company's future with the analysts, Wall stated that the combined deliveries of natural gas for new industrial loads connected during 1968 and under contract for future delivery should approach 200 million cubic feet per day.

Four executives of Pioneer made an appearance before the New York Security Analysts. In addition to Wall, the company was represented by B.P. Smith, executive vice president, E. S. Morris, senior vice president of Amarillo Oil Company, a wholly-owned subsidiary, and A. F. Cox, senior vice president for Pioneer and president of Amarillo Oil Company.

In his remarks to the group, Smith, who is chief financial officer for Pioneer, said "We believe the five-year period ending 1973 will call for capital expenditures by the company of at least \$50 million." He went on to say, "The company is pursuing and making studies of diversification which may or may not be in related lines. We will be highly selective in any acquisitions and will form new subsidiary companies when appropriate. We are interested in any acquisition or diversification that will benefit Pioneer's stockholders."

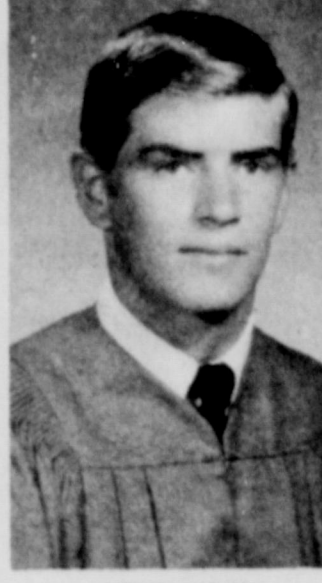

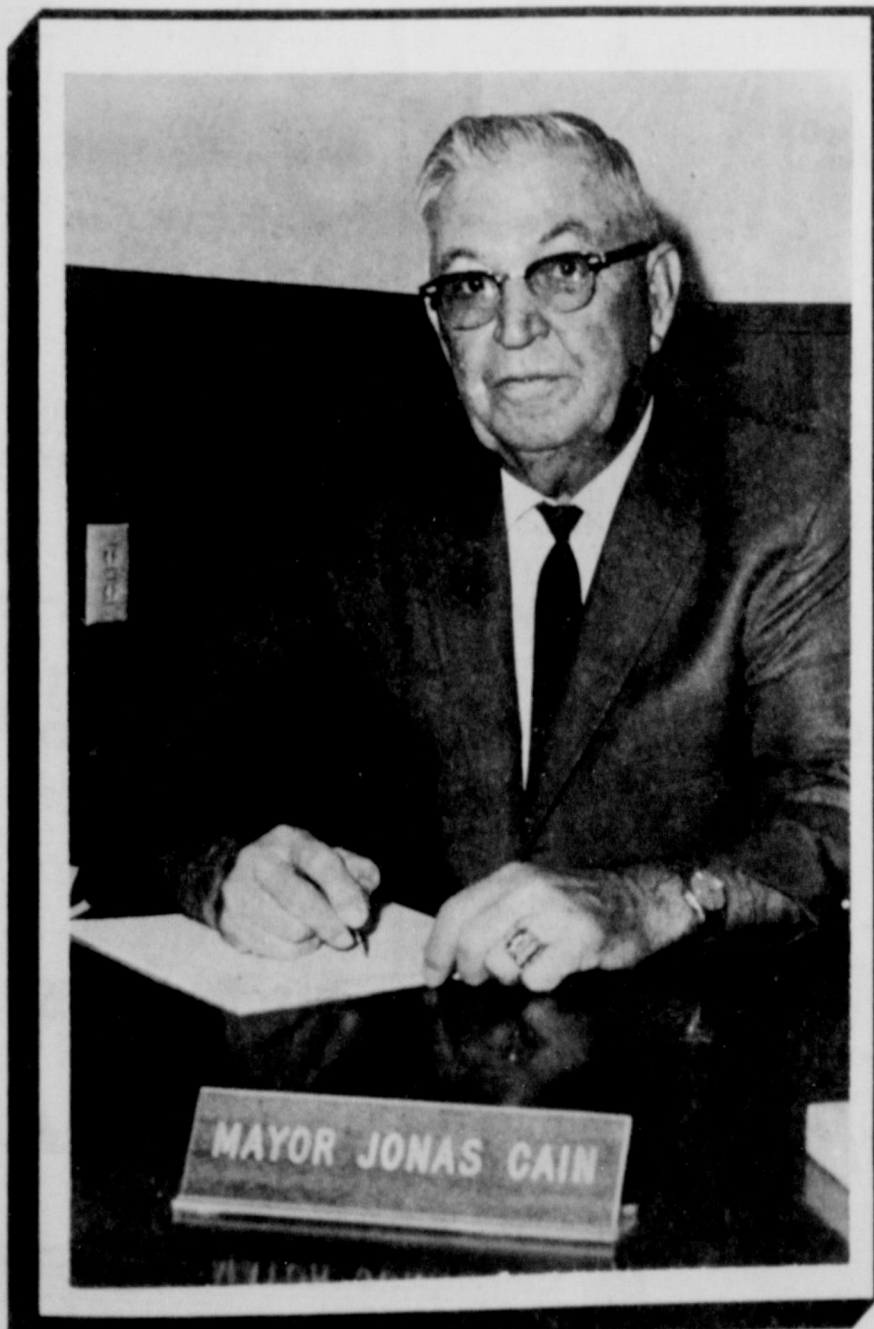

Baptist Church Started Slaton 58 Years Ago

By the New Testament of evangelism, Thomas, missionary founded Baptist Assembly to Slaton soon after opening on June 15, 1911, to conduct a revival at a Baptist church.

Rev. W. F. Ferguson was a success that a Baptist church was organized with six members in July, 1911. Members were Mr. C. V. Young, Mr. and Mrs. H. S. Young, Sr. and Mr. Dickey.

Rev. W. F. Ferguson was called pastor and by the year the church grew to membership of forty.

House of worship was built in 1912 at the corner of 10th and Division streets. In 1922 the church was made to move to its present location.

Men served the

church as pastor between 1914 and 1929: Rev. James Lamkin; Brother Ingall; Brother Durham; Rev. F. A. Whiteley; Rev. J. H. McCaulley; Rev. John P. Hardesty; and Rev. B. G. Holloway.

In March, 1930, the church called Rev. W. F. Ferguson as pastor. Under his leadership a Mexican Baptist Church was organized in December of 1930. He remained with the church until July, 1932. He was followed by Rev. W. M. Turner, under whose leadership the building was remodeled in 1934. He resigned in 1935.

Rev. Turner was followed by Rev. C. G. Sewell who served until June, 1937. The church then called Rev. W. F. Ferguson as pastor on September 15, 1937. He resigned in December, 1948.

On March 9, 1949, the church called Rev. J. T. Bolding as

pastor. Under his leadership the church erected a new educational building in March, 1951, at a cost of \$100,000. By November, 1952 the church was debt free from this great undertaking.

Under his continued leadership a groundbreaking service was held on March 18, 1956 for a new auditorium, which will seat seven hundred at a cost of \$162,000 and was dedicated to the Lord on January 6, 1957. Brother Bolding resigned effective September, 1956.

On October 21, 1956, Rev. Ted Gaze assumed the pastoral leadership and served until March, 1961.

Dr. Charles Wood was called as pastor in July, 1961. He resigned effective March 30, 1965.

In July of 1965, the church called Bro. J. L. Cartrite as pastor.

Open House Set at First Baptist

First Baptist Church of Slaton will hold Open House Sunday on its new \$156,000 educational building, and the public is invited to view the new facilities from 2 to 5 p.m.

The Rev. J. L. Cartrite, pastor, announced that members "extended a cordial welcome to all interested persons." Rev. Cartrite, who came to Slaton in July of 1965, is the church's 16th pastor since it was chartered in July of 1911.

The new two-level building connects with the auditorium and other facilities at the corner of 9th and Scurry. The new educational building faces S. 9th Street and contains some 10,360 square feet of floor space. The space provides for a nursery suite, classrooms and offices, in addition to a chapel and church parlor.

Just off the lobby of the new addition will be found the secretary's office, which is adjoined by the pastor's study and office space for a music and education director. A chapel, with seating capacity of 115, and the church parlor are nearby, each carpeted in a light green.

The first floor also houses a three-room nursery suite, complete with a diaper room--equipped to take care of baby's needs. The suite also has speakers connected to the auditorium so that worship services can be heard.

The second floor houses Sunday School classrooms from beginner to high school levels. The building has year-around air conditioning with gas heat and refrigerated air. The chapel and parlor have sound systems, and the secretary's office has an intercom system to the assembly rooms.

The present auditorium at First Baptist was dedicated Jan. 6, 1957. The older educational building was erected in March, 1951. The church has been at its present location since 1922. The first house of worship was built in 1912 at the corner of 10th and Division streets.

Rev. Cartrite 16th Pastor of First Baptist

The Rev. J. L. Cartrite, pastor of First Baptist Church, came to Slaton in July, 1965, after serving as pastor of the Lamar Street Baptist Church in Sweetwater.

Both he and his wife, Joy,

are natives of Sunray, located near Amarillo. Cartrite attended Wayland Baptist College one year before transferring to Baylor University at Waco. He also attended Southwestern Theological Seminary.

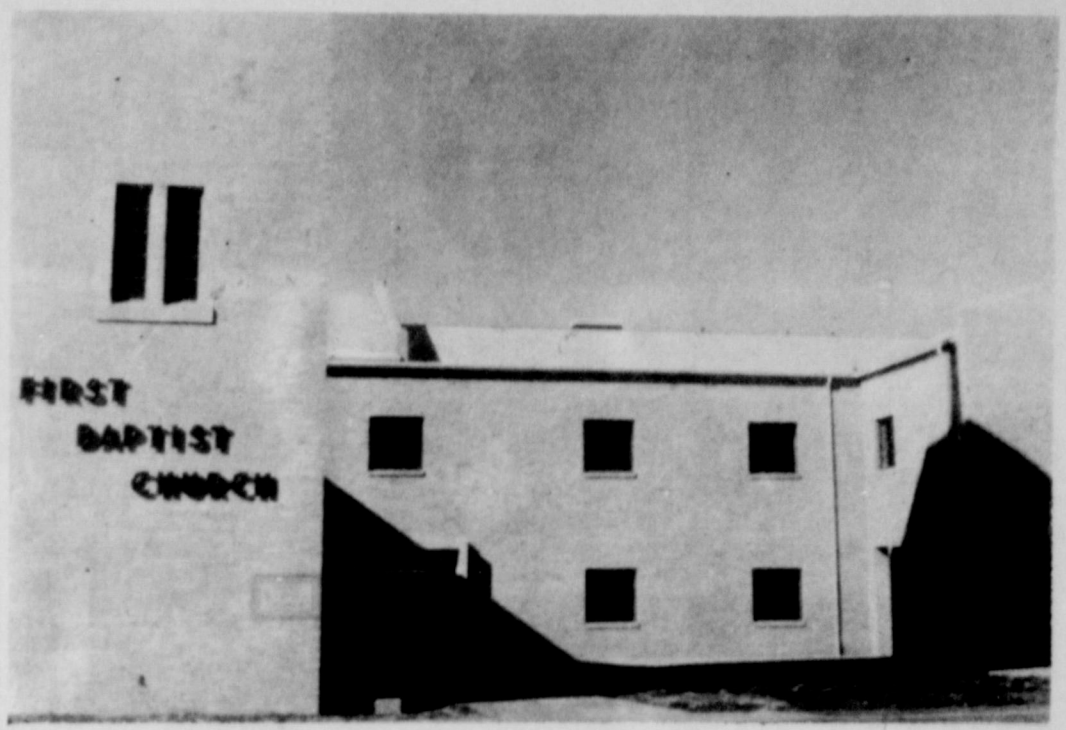

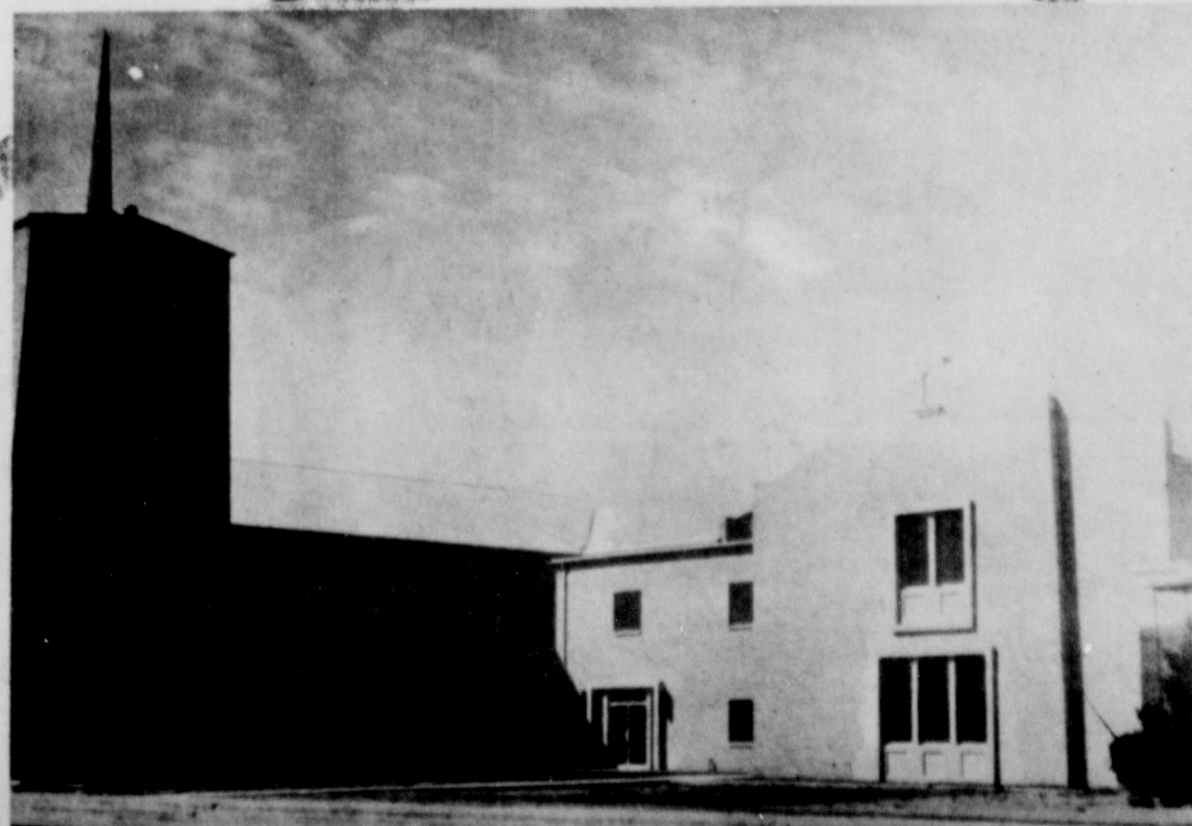

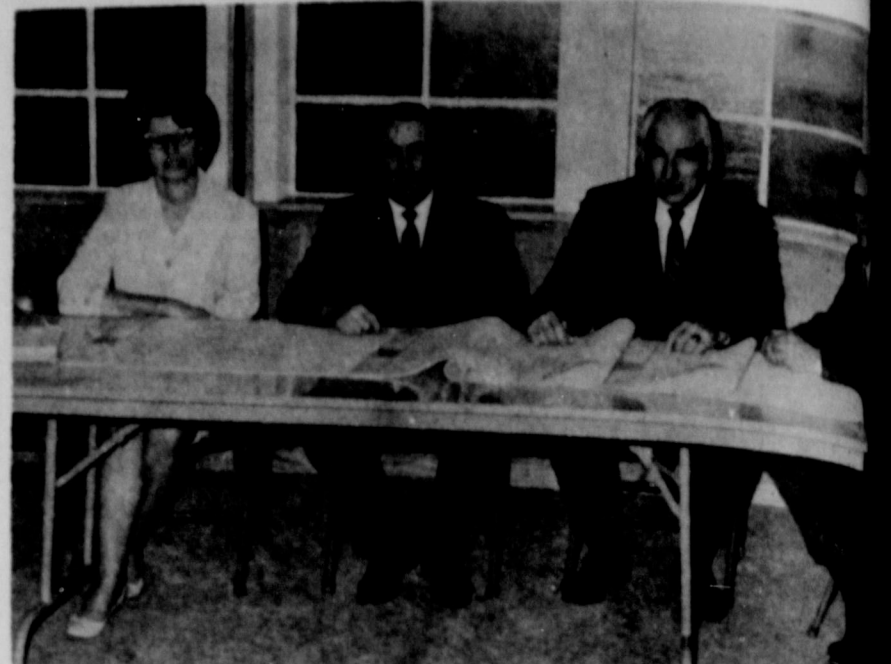
Rev. Parks Attends Seminar

The Rev. E. Bruce Parks, pastor of Slaton's First United Methodist Church, recently attended a special ministers' seminar held on the campus of Oral Roberts University, Tulsa, Okla. The University hosted some 500 ministers representing 20 denominations Feb. 28 through Mar. 4. Featured speakers were President Oral Roberts and several of the ORU faculty members.

The seminar was the fifth in a series of seven that will be conducted on the ORU campus this year that will bring an estimated 3,000 visitors to the campus. The seminars are directed towards laymen and youth. In addition to the seminar visitors, some 30,000 additional people register annually

for tours of the campus which has been termed "space age" by many of the guests who view it for the first time.

During the seminar the guests were introduced to the physical facilities, educational media and philosophy of the school which is now in its fourth year of operation with a current enrollment of over 800. The University is well known in the academic circles for its innovations in the field of electronic teaching methods. It is the first institution of higher learning to install a complete audio-visual information - retrieval system. The 21.5 million dollar campus is located on a 420-acre tract in suburban Tulsa.

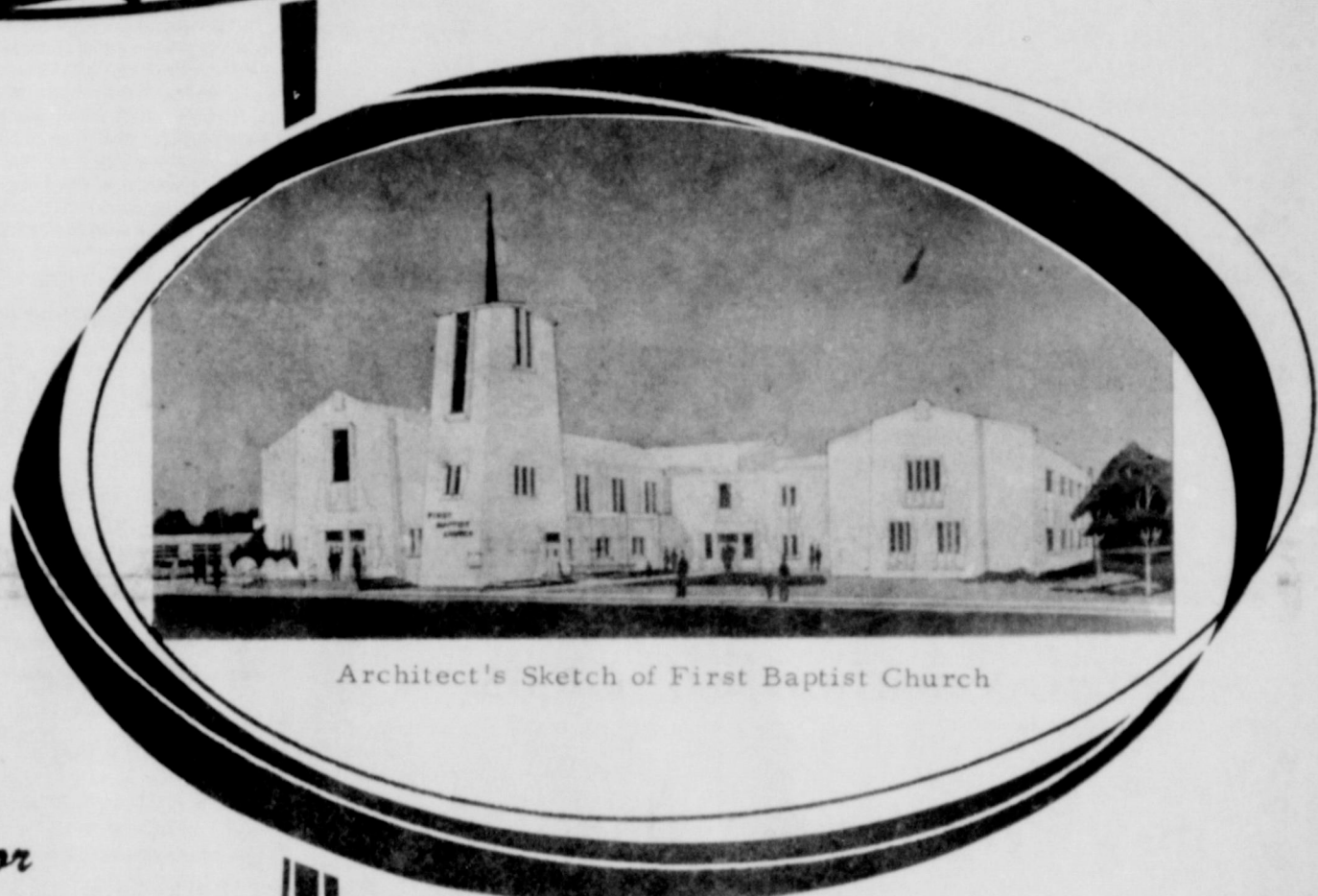
