# City Budget of \$499,000 Approved

Slaton City Commission ap-proved the 1968-69 budget, discussed the Lubbock Metropolitan Council of Governments, passed an ordinance on regulation of pawn shops, approved bills and handled other routine matters during a regular meeting Monday night.

Following a public hearing on the budget -- with no one appearing -- the commission routinely approved the city budget calling for \$499,114 expenditures in the coming year. The budget had been discussed, trimmed and tentatively approved at the last meeting.

Aldon Deyo, new executive director of LMCOG, appeared at the meeting along with Lubbock County Commissioners Max Arrants, Arch Lamb and Alton Brazell, to discuss the objectives and operation of the

The group held an informal discussion with the city commission, answering questions concerning the council and asking questions about problems Slaton might be facing that would figure in regional planning.

Commissioner David Hughes said one of Slaton's big problems in the near future could be the improvement of its sewer and garbage disposal systems to comply with new air pollution and control laws.

Hugo Mosser presided at the city session Monday night in the absence of Mayor Jonas Cain, Commissioners Hughes and Henry Bollinger were present, and Rudy Dominguez was

Although the budget was approved, city commissioners have been studying ways to secure additional revenue for an expected shortage. An election has been called for Saturday, Oct. 26, on a one cent municipal sales tax.

The commission has reported to voters that either the city sales tax or a big hike in water rates will be necessary to secure the necessary revenue for operation of the city.

The added cost of the Canadian River water project this year, in addition to other needs and rising expenses, has caused the need for additional re-The approved budget antici-

pates tax revenues of \$180,000. General fund revenues add about \$128,000 -- the big items being sanitation charges, franchise taxes, and corporation court The remainder comes from water revenues -- about \$190,000 total,

the expenditures include: water and sewer fund, \$203,000; police department, \$71,500; sanitation, \$31,900; streets, \$52,-700; fire department, \$14,600; accounting and collection, \$14-300. The Canadian River water payment adds some \$85,000 to the power and pumping portion

of the water fund. The city's bond requirements for 68-69 total \$74,700. Total outstanding bonds amount to \$627,000.

Hughes again urged that the city prepare a "prospectus" on the city's financial needs in the future, so that commiss-ioners will be aware of programs which need to be put

Mosser agreed that city officials need to be better informed so "we can plan for tomorrow." Figures on the city's projected revenues and expenditures would be "most helpful", he added.

The second and final reading on the pawnbroker ordinance was passed. The ordinance provides primarily for a license to operate a pawn shop, the keeping of daily records which are required to be open to the police at all times, clear identification of items pawned, Persons convicted of violations are

subject to a \$200 fine. Commissioners posed several questions during the session. Hughes inquired about a reported tax reduction action at a special meeting of the commission. Mosser reported the only move was to correct figures on the rolls. A lower tax rate is allowed property owners inside the city limits who do not receive city services,

and businesses were also included, he reported.

Mosser said it had come to his attention that two salary increases had been given city employees, and he wanted to know if this was proper procedure. It was agreed by the commission that such action should receive commission ap-

Mosser also asked Police Chief Glenn Farmer to report on an accident involving a city vehicle. The chief gave an explanation of the accident, and said the patrolman involved was no longer with the department.

Hughes asked about the recent formation of a Citizens Traffic Commission, It was determined that no organization meeting has been held, and Farmer said he would call a meeting of the appointed group,

Mother Nature continued to smile on the Slaton area this as the temperatures climbed above the 90-degree mark for five straight days, then farmers breathed a sigh of relief as damaging thunderstorms and hail skipped around the region Tuesday night and Wednesday morning.

A cool front moved in with the storm activity over West Texas and the Panhandle, and the high reading Wednesday was forecast in the mid 70's.

The mercury had hit 90 or above from last Friday through Tuesday, with 98 degrees reported on Sunday and Monday. The warm weather was just what cotton crops needed, as many farmers had been concerned about the large number of green bolls still in the fields. Spindle-type machine pickers

1.5 million bales, reveals that 5,131 bales have been classed by USDA's cotton classing offices as of Oct. 11. The small sampling indicates the trend to longer staples and higher fiber strength. While at this time last year

only 2545 bales had been classed, classing office personnel have observed both staples and strengths running considerably above the level experienced

#### Contracts Let On SWPS Plant

Construction contracts have been signed for the multi million dollar Southwestern Public Service Co. generating plant several miles northwest of

R. H. Brummal, division manager of SWPS, confirmed that construction is scheduled to start January 1969 on the first unit, estimated to cost about \$20 million, including equipment.

Prime contract award went to Missouri Valley Constructors, Inc., of Amarillo, Electrical labor contract went to Budwine Service Electric Co. of Carlsbad, N.M. Combined contracts for the two totaled about \$5

Completion target date for the first unit is July 1, 1971. Long-range plans call for expansion of the plant at an investment up to \$80 million. The Lubbock - area plant will be the largest of 11 major generating plants feeding into the SWPS company's 4,200 miles of transmission lines in a 45,000 square mile service area.

The plant will be built on 320 acres, part of the V-8 Ranch near Buffalo Lakes.

#### Parcel Post Rates Hiked

Postmaster Rush Wheeler reminded postal customers this week that higher parcel post and catalog rates will go into effect Saturday (Oct. 19).

The rate increase will average 10.5% and in most cases will mean an additional 10 cents postage per parcel.

The higher rates were approved by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Under the new rates the minreturned Sunday from a five imum charge for local parcel delivery will go from 40 to 50 cents. The minimum charge pense paid trip was sponsored by Ford Auto Light and was for parcels destined outside the local delivery area will be won by the parts department raised from 50 to 60 cents. Parcel post rates are based on the weight of the package and the distance it is mailed. Higher rates for the delivery of packages and catalogs are required to bring revenue from this type of mail within four per

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
