# Tigers In Action Saturday

The Slaton Tigers start down the 1969 football trail Saturday night, and the first stop is San Angelo where the Lake View Chiefs will be trying to launch the season with a victory for their new coach.

Kickoff time is 7:30 p.m. It's only the second year down the Class AAA trail for the Tigers and, with juniors dominating the squad, it will be a tough and challenging road for the Slaton crew.

Coach Ernie Davis, starting his fourth year as Tiger grid-

master, reported the team in good physical condition Wednesday but he is as shaky as a bowl of Jello about the opener. However, Davis recalls that he feels the same way about this time every year!

The starting lineup is expected to be almost the same as used in pre-season scrimmages. On offense, this would be: RE--Robert Englund (170 Sr.), RT--Dennis Rushing (190 Sr.), RG--Louis Scott (180 Sr.), C--Charlie Geer (155 Jr.), LG--Ollie Rainwater (160 Jr.),

LT--Allen McDonald (195 Sr.), RE--Jimmy Rogers (165 Sr.), QB--Terry Mosser (150 Jr.), LH--Alan Fondy (160 Jr.), FB--Larry Moore (200 Sr.), RH--Nick Farrell (170 Sr.).

On defense, the probable starters: Englund and Allen Walkers (155 Jr.) at ends, McDonald and Scott at tackles, Ronnie Howard (165 Sr.) and Charles Thomas (170 Jr.) at guards, Don Smith (160 Sr.) and Ted Dixon (140 Jr.) at linebackers, Glen Akin Jr. (180 Jr.) and Mosser at half-

backs, Frank Self (160 Jr.) at safety.

With those lineups, the Tigers would have 7 seniors and 4 juniors starting offensively and 5 seniors and 6 juniors defensively.

According to scouting reports, Lake View is reported to be improved over last season and showing much more enthusiasm under new coach Chuck Smith. The new Chief mentor was an assistant at San Angelo Central last year. Chief quarterback Jimmy

Williams is one of the outstanding football players for Lake View and is adept at running and throwing. The Chiefs are not as hefty as last season, but may be quicker and tougher mentally. The right offensive tackle and end sport 200-pound-plus weights.

Davis was not too pleased with his Tigers' showing in a scrimmage session at Tulla last Friday, pointing out that they made too many mistakes with the season about to start. But (See TIGERS, PAGE 6)

## 2nd Bale Here, Showers Start

The Slaton trade area recorded its second bale of cotton for the season last Thursday, but then the rain started and the third bale may have to wait a few days.

Jack Burkett was producer of the second bale at Hackberry Gin last Thursday, and he will receive the Slaton Chamber of Commerce award of \$100 cash. First bale was produced Aug. 27 by Virgil Smith of Southland.

Showers and drizzle dominated the weather picture Tuesday and Wednesday in the Slaton and South Plains area. Slaton had recorded an inch or more of rain through Wednesday morning, while some spots around Posey had more than 3 inches.

The showers and drizzle started Monday night, with the heavy rainfall coming around Posey. Juel Bradshaw, south of Posey, reported 1.3 inches Monday night. Slaton received

about .9 of an inch Tuesday. The siege of murky weather continued with drizzle and a heavy fog Tuesday night. Wednesday's forecast called for continued overcast skies and 50 percent chance of more rain.

Burkett, who farms 3 miles east and 2 miles south of Hackberry Gin, brought in 2,700 pounds of seed cotton to get the 660-pound bale. Burkett used Lankart 3840 seed.

## C-C Directors Hold Meeting

Slaton Chamber of Commerce directors held a regular monthly board meeting Tuesday morning in a breakfast session at The Carnation House.

Clark Self Jr., president, announced that plans for the annual Farmer - Merchant Barbecue and committee reports highlighted the meeting.

The board voted to continue the new employment service initiated recently by the Chamber office. Manager Ted Weaver reported that 12 job placements had been made. The service was started on a temporary basis to determine if the need was sufficient.

Other topics discussed included freight service into the city, and extended area telephone service into Lubbock. Directors agreed to study the matters further. Direct phone lines to Lubbock have been discussed previously, but directors feel that proposed rates by Southwestern Bell would not be generally acceptable to citizens.

Jake Wendel, special projects chairman, announced that plans were about complete for the annual F-M Barbecue. Self announced that the swimming pool operation was "in the black" for the first time in years. C of C manager Ted Weaver was commended for his work with the pool.

## Ambulance Service Started by City

Slaton's new City Ambulance Service is now in operation after the police department received a new vehicle last week, and equipped the ambulance with the help of Englund of Slaton.

The city purchased the ambulance from the Gordon K. Allen Co. of Dallas at a cost of \$5,495. This included the 1969 Chevrolet Suburban Ambulance with special lights, air conditioner, and other basic equipment.

City officials said Bud Englund, local mortician, donated some \$775 worth of equipment to help equip the ambulance in "first-class" style. This included new and used internal equipment and supplies, as well as a siren.

The emergency ambulance will be operated and supervised by Slaton Police Department.

A group of Slaton Volunteer Firemen have agreed to serve as ambulance attendants.

The ambulance made three "runs" this past week-- one from the rest home to Mercy Hospital, one from the hospital to a Lubbock rest home, and one from Mercy Hospital to a Slaton home.

The city has set fees of \$25 for emergency trips and for transfer of deceased persons. Sick runs will be charged at \$15 a trip. Calls outside the city limits will draw an additional 35 cents per mile over these fees.

The ambulance is not scheduled to make non-emergency transfers. The area of service is restricted to a 10-mile radius of the city. A "waiting charge" of \$5 per hour is also included in the fee schedule.

## City's Water Crew Cited

An "Award of Merit" has been presented to the Water Department of the City of Slaton in recognition of outstanding safety efforts during 1968.

The certificate of award came from the American Water Works Association. It is awarded to those utilities that have experienced no lost-time injuries during the previous year.

Herman Fleming, Slaton water superintendent, accepted the award on behalf of the employees of the Slaton Water Department.

## Relatively Quiet Week For Police

Slaton Police Department reported a relatively "quiet" week the past seven days.

Police made 8 arrests, issued 10 traffic tickets, and recorded 3 emergency ambulance calls.

## F-M Barbecue Tuesday Night

Slaton's 12th annual Farmer - Merchant Barbecue is scheduled Tuesday evening in Little League Park with food, fellowship, awards and entertainment highlighting the event.

The barbecue, sponsored by Slaton Chamber of Commerce and participating merchants, gets underway at 7:30 p.m.

The "Farmer of the Year" award is to be announced by the Chamber, and first-bale cash awards will be presented. Gift certificates will also be given during the course of the evening.

Robert H. Davis will serve as master of ceremonies for this year's event. Clark Self Jr., C of C president, will welcome the group, and Leroy Zieschang is scheduled for the farmers' acceptance address.

Special entertainment will be provided by "Johnny Flanagan and The Road Runners."

Jake Wendel is chairman of the barbecue arrangements committee. Serving with him have been Glen Akin, Milt Ardrey and Clarence Kitten.

The popular event annually draws some 700 to 900 farmers and merchants. Tickets are on sale at the Chamber office for \$6 each. Free tickets--provided by Slaton and area merchants--will be distributed to farmers through the gins.

The first-bale prize of \$150 will be presented to Virgil Smith of Southland, and the Chamber's second prize of \$100 goes to Jack Burkett of the Hackberry community. Third bale had not arrived this week.

Smith's first bale was ginned Aug. 27, and Burkett's second bale came Sept. 4. Harold Voigt was recipient of the "Farmer of the Year" award last year. Previous winners were Ed Moseley and Walter Heinrich.

## City Buys Truck, Puts Off Master Plan Action

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, again postponed a decision on a master plan for the city, approved purchase of a new dump truck and an extra bed, and heard street grievances from a Latin-American group.

The commission also approved purchase of work uniforms for some city employees, approved bills, and transferred \$10,000 from the water and sewer fund to the general fund. On the transfer, it was agreed to replace the funds when sale tax money arrives.

Appearing at the commission meeting to answer questions concerning the comprehensive city plan were Jim Dalashaw, planning official from the governor's office, and Alden Dec, executive director of the South Plains Association of Governments. (Formerly LMCOG).

The city had received approval of a Federal grant earlier this year to assist in the planning project, and the commission had been concerned as to how long the grant would be held for Slaton. The two officials indicated the grant would be in effect until the first of the year.

The grant had been approved by HUD (Housing Urban Development) in May, setting aside \$14,860 as the government's two-third portion of the cost of the master plan. The commission decided to study the

plan further before making a decision.

The commission accepted a low bid of \$4,583.81 from Tom Sims Chevrolet for the dump truck and two beds. The city solicited two bids, with the other from Smith Ford at \$4,727.53. One dump bed will be installed on another city truck. The city traded in a car formerly used by the mayor and city secretary. It will not be replaced.

A group of 11 Latin-American citizens appeared at the meeting to discuss street conditions in their part of town. Included in the group were four representatives from two organizations with offices in Lubbock. They were Ciudadanos Por Justicia Social (Citizens for Social Justice) and La Voz de los Llanos (The Voice of the Plains, a bilingual weekly).

Guadalupe Ruiz, local spokesman, indicated the two Lubbock groups were called in to help present the problem, since some of the local citizens might not express themselves correctly.

Primarily, the complaint concerned the condition of dirt streets in the south and southeast part of town and on drainage in those areas. Specifically, several of the citizens said deep ditches cut across intersections were hard on vehicles.

One man said he asked a policeman why they didn't pat-

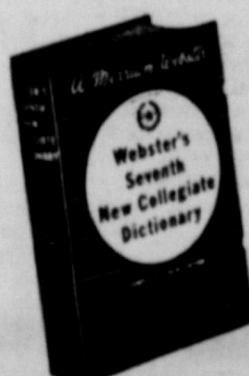
Mrs. Roy D. McCallister was installed as president when the Roosevelt Young Homemakers held a luncheon meeting Sept. 4 at the Clubhouse.

Teresita (Tessie) Que, the 22-year-old student, wanted most to ride a horse but now, she says, "I never want to ride another horse!"

The Hogues provided Tessie with the opportunity of riding a horse, and Tessie reported she had to sit on a pillow for a day or two after the ex-

perience.

Tessie is majoring in psychology, while Ronnie is taking post graduate work at Azusa. He received his BA in music education this summer.

Tessie's home is in the Philippines, and she has been attending college in California for one year and seven months. She took an exam to qualify for a scholarship provided through the cooperation of the University of the Philippines and the American Embassy. Tessie said she thought some 150 students took the exams and 15 received scholarships.

Her strongest impression on visiting here, says Tessie, is "the outward friendliness of the people." She also thinks that life here is more slow and restful than on the West Coast. She comes from Bacolod City in the Philippines, where sugar plantations abound.

She also noticed the brick-covered streets in Slaton, referring to them as "tile streets." She and Mrs. Hogue spent much time discussing different customs and traditions of their countries, and Mrs. Hogue said she found the discussions "very interesting."

Teresita remembers that she was very apprehensive about coming to the United States. All she knew about Americans, recalled Tessie, "were the drunk sailors and soldiers in

her town." When U.S. servicemen were on leave in her city, families would warn their children to stay indoors.

Since coming to America and making friends at college and elsewhere, Tessie says she realizes the "drunk sailors" were not representative of the American people.

Her first food on arriving in the U.S. was an American hamburger, says Tessie. She found it to her liking, reporting that there are some types of sandwiches in the Philippines, but no hamburgers.

Tessie found out that the "wild West" is only a memory, but she still likes Texas and the area!

**It's a woman's WHIRL**

A very meaningful and necessary program that is underway in Slaton is suffering a great deal for a very definite reason. The program I am speaking of is Slaton Opportunity School, which is a local satellite program sponsored and overseen by the State through the large installation recently opened just outside Lubbock.

The local school is primarily for school-age trainable retarded children and gives them an opportunity to attend school and still live at home.

There are now a total of 12 children in Slaton who have expressed a desire to come to the school and who fill the necessary requirements, mentally, to be participants in it. Mrs. J. C. McDougal, state paid teacher for the school, has visited in the homes of these 12 children and says there are possibly other children she doesn't know about.

Only three of those 12 are able to come to the school because of the lack of transportation to and from the 5-day-a-week sessions. All 12 live in the city limits, but it is too far for them to walk from their homes. She said in some of the cases, the parents work all day and cannot provide rides for their children.

The sessions begin each morning, Monday through Friday, at 9 a.m., and the sessions are over at 11 a.m. Transportation is needed. This is something that a number of women in our community might be able to do, it was felt and expressed by Mrs. James (Sharon) Newhouse, the newly appointed chairman of the program.

Another need is for more volunteer workers to assist each morning in the program which takes place at the school located at 230 Scurry across the street from the First Baptist Church. The First Baptist Church donates the use of the building, along with utilities and a telephone.

If you would be willing to help furnish transportation or to be a volunteer helper in the school, you are urged to contact either the Slaton Chamber of Commerce or Mrs. Newhouse. Their telephone numbers are 828-6238 and 828-3713 respectively.

This is a real need in the life of Slaton if it really is to be "Your Kind of Town". Mrs. Newhouse asks, "Won't you help?"

BY THE OLD TIMER

From Mary (Mrs. A. C.) Neubauer, Chicago, Ill.: In the early 1900's, I remember a clear day in October, possibly November, my parents were discussing my father's trip to a flour mill twenty miles away.

He would load our wagon high with sacks of wheat threshed the previous summer and early next day he would hitch up the team, climb into the spring seat dressed in his old fur coat and drive over dirt

roads. It was a hazardous journey, as he had to cross railroad tracks and a river bridge (the Mississippi River) to the distant mill.

Late at night, he returned weary, with a load of fragrant flour, not bleached, graham flour and "shorts" which the husks were called and which were used to feed the cattle in winter.

Thus we had our year's supply of creamy, pure flour stored in our house, for the baking of wonderful homemade bread and other good things.

# Eagles Hope Lean Years Gone, Open Season Against Whiteface

After recording the best grid season ever for a Roosevelt team last season, the Eagles are aiming even higher in 1969. The Eagles had a 4-2 mark in the tough District 4-A race last year to tie for second, and the season ledger was even at 5-5. It was only the seventh season for the school in Texas Interscholastic League play, but Eagle fans decided their team had arrived.

Coach Powell counts four offensive and five defensive starters among his 17 letter winners. The Eagles lost some heft in the line, and the performance of some of last year's part-time starters will be counted on to give the team good balance.

The Eagles have just one letterman tackle, George Henry, 175-pound senior. Armando Gonzales, a 175-pound soph is slated to start at the other tackle. Halfback Danny Mahaffey, 150 is another soph who may see plenty of action.

Artemus Tennison (150, Sr.) returns at halfback along with either Randall Hughes (165, Sr.) or Johnny Brown (160, Jr.), all lettermen. Joel Chaney (145 Sr.) and Steve Maines (165 Jr.) are the fullbacks.

Tommy Martin, 160 - pound senior, was the starting quarterback last season, and appears ready to take over again. Don Jackson, 155-pound sophomore, is contesting for the signal caller's job after a fine freshman year.

Three guards who were part-time starters last season are being counted on to fill some gaps. They are Bobby Parks (155 Sr.), Terry Paxton (165 Sr.) and Marvin Williams (165 Sr.).

Other lettermen include ends Ricky Daniel (165), Ross Hughes (145) Riss Burns (140), and Gerald Tennison (140), centers

Joe Washington (160) and Steve Holland (150), and back Steve Viney (145).

The Eagles lost district games to Petersburg and Ralls last season, while the non-district defeats came at the hands of Ropesville, Cooper and Post.

Powell is a Texas Tech ex. Other coaches for the maroon-and-white Eagles include Lane Tannehill (West Texas State), John Alexander (Wayland), Don Black (Texas Tech), and Gene Mims (H-SU).

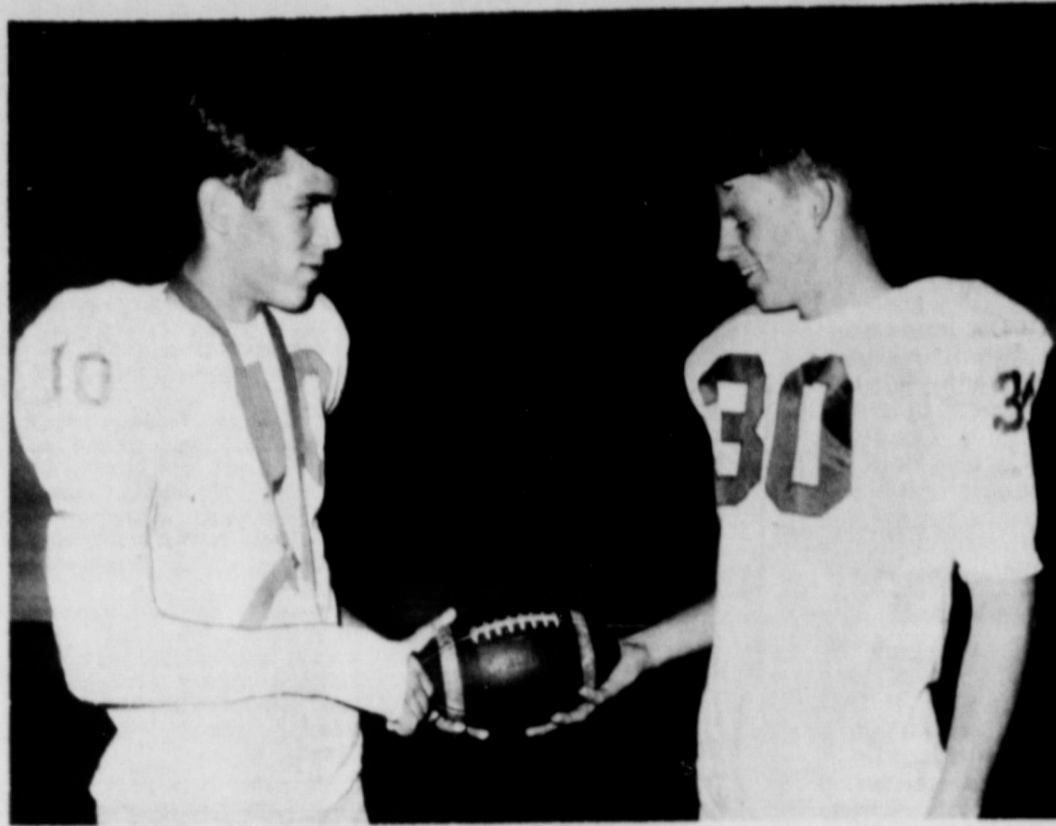
The carrier is the flagship of the commander of Anti-submarine Warfare Group Three.

## Electricity Challenges 4-H Ingenuity

SPECIAL - Who has built and installed a sophisticated home intercom system? Or established his own recording business? Or installed 2,000 electrical wall receptacles and switches? Or constructed a tesla coil and laser in his spare time? Teenagers working on a 4-H

electric project, geared to their ability and surroundings, reports the Cooperative Extension Service. Girls join the boys in the national 4-H Electric program sponsored by Westinghouse Electric Corporation and supervised by the Extension Service. The girls learn about electrical home appliances such as performance, care and safe operation. One girl learned to construct and wire a table lamp at 4-H Camp. She became so good at it that she was asked to conduct the class the following two years. She later taught a special interest series on electricity. Another girl invented an electric motor tool to be used as a drill, screwdriver, mixer or grass edger simply by changing the attachments. Her last reported project was to design a miniature record player. This summer and fall, scores of electricity buffs will wind up current 4-H projects, and exhibit or demonstrate their wares at county and state fairs. Westinghouse will provide county medals (four members per county). To the state award winner will go an expense-paid trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago. Six \$600 scholarships will be presented to the national champions during the 4-H Congress. Besides giving annual awards for 34 years, Westinghouse has underwritten costs of an extensive series of electrical educational material distributed to 4-H Clubs from coast-to-coast. In recent years the electric program has attracted many more members from suburban

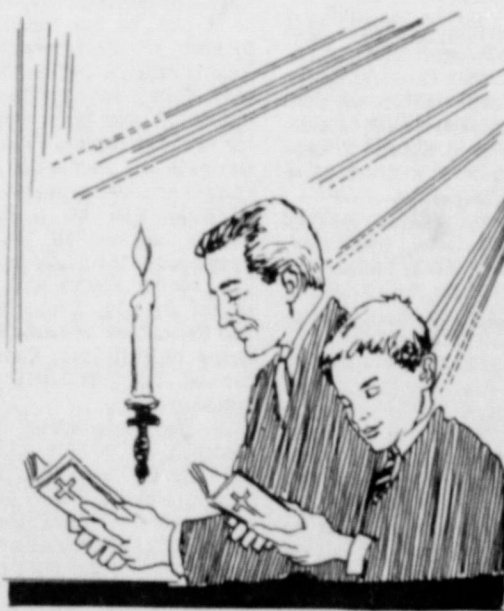

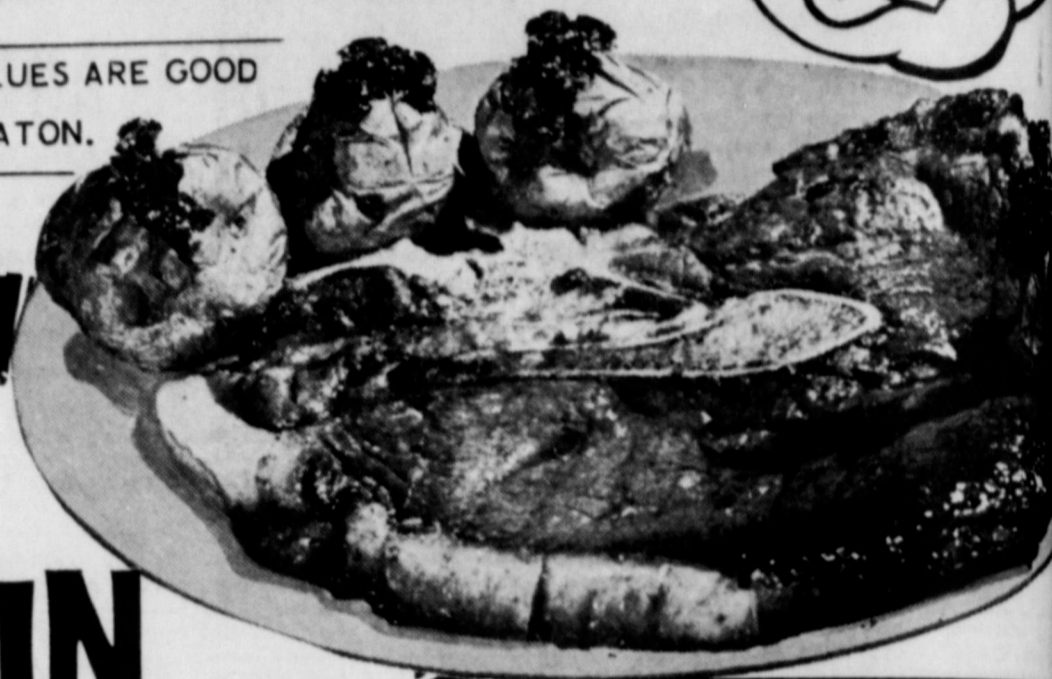

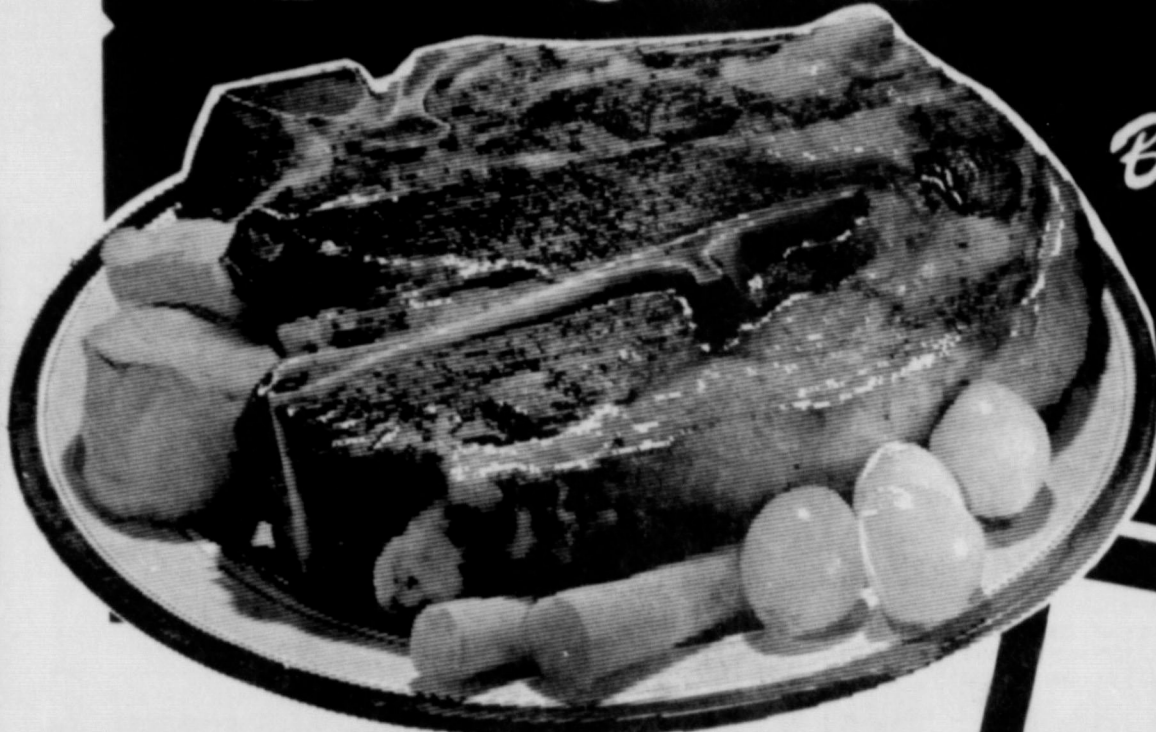
