> The city has set fees of \$25 for emergency trips and for transfer of deceased persons. Sick runs will be charged at \$15 a trip. Calls outside the city limits will draw an additional 35 cents per mile over these fees.

The ambulance is not scheduled to make non-emergency transfers. The area of service is restricted to a 10-mile radius of the city. A "waiting charge' of \$5 per hour is also included in the fee schedule.

# **City Buys Truck, Puts Off Master Plan Action**

Slaton City Commission, in regular session Monday night, again postponed a decision on a master plan for the city, approved purchase of a new dump truck and an extra bed, and heard street grievances from a Latin-American group.

The commission also ap proved purchase of work uniforms for some city employees, approved bills, and transferred \$10,000 from the water and sewer fund to the general fund. On the transfer, it was agreed to replace the funds when sale tax money arrives.

Appearing at the commission meeting to answer questions concerning the compre hensive city plan were Jim Delashaw, planning official from the governor's office, and Alden Deo, executive director of the South Plains Association of Governments. (Formerly LMCOG).

The city had received approval of a Federal grant earlier this year to assist in the planning project, and the com-mission had been concerned as to how long the grant would be held for Slaton. The two officials indicated the grant would be in effect until the first of the year.

The grant had been approved by HUD (Housing Urban Development) in May, setting aside \$14,860 as the government's two-third portion of the cost of the master plan. The commission decided to study the plan further before making a decision.

The commission accepted a low bid of \$4,583.81 from Tom Sims Chevrolet for the dump truck and two beds. The city solicited two bids, with the other from Smith Ford at \$4,727.53. One dump bed will be installed on another city truck. The city traded in a car formerly used by the mayor and city secretary. It will not be

replaced. A group of 11 Latin-American citizens appeared at the meeting to discuss street conditions in their part of town. Included in the group were four representatives from two organizations with offices in Lubbock. They were Ciudadanos Por Justicia Social (Citizens for Social Justice) and La Voz. los Llanos (The Voice of de the Plains, a bilingual weekly). Guadalupe

Guadalupe Ruiz, local spokesman, indicated the two Lubbock groups were called in to help present the problem, since some of the local citizens might not express themselves correctly.

Primarily, the complaint concerned the condition of dirt streets in the south and southeast part of town and on drainage in those areas. Specifically, several of the citizens said deep ditches cut across intersections were hard on vehicles.


One man said he asked a policeman why they didn't pat-

rol that part of town more often. He added that the patrolman told him the roads were too rough and would tear up the cars.

In the discussion, the com-mission indicated to the group that the City would do a better job of grading the roads in the future, but the drainage pro-blem was one that the city "has lived with" for a long time.

Commissioner Otis Neill said the commission had a study made years ago on the drainage situation, and the only real solution was far too expensive to undertake. Mayor David Hughes said the City could change the method of cutting drainage ditches across intersections, however.

One spokes man said he didn't think Latin-American citizens were getting "the city services we are entitled to as taxpayers." With the city sales tax in effect, he added that this was even more the case.



A very meaningful and necessary program that is underway in Slaton is suffering a great deal for a very definite reason, The program I am speaking of is Slaton Opportunity School, which is a local satellite program sponsored and overseen by the State through the large installation recently opened just outside Lubbock.

The local school is primarily for school-age trainable retarded children and gives them an opportunity to attend school and still live at home.

There are now a total of 12 children in Slaton who have expressed a desire to come to the school and who fill the necessary requirements, mentally, to be participants in it. Mrs. J. C. McDougal, state paid teacher for the school, has visited in the homes of these 12 children and says there are possibly other children she doesn't know about.

Only three of those 12 are able to come to the school because of the lack of transportation to and from the 5-daya-week sessions. All 12 live in the city limits, but it is too far for them to walk from their homes. She said in some of the cases, the parents work all day and cannot provide rides for their children.

The sessions begin each morning, Monday through Friday, at 9 a.m. and the sessions are over at 11 a.m. Transportation is needed. This is something that a number of women in our community might be able to do, it was felt and expressed by Mrs. James (Sharon) Newhouse, the newly appointed chairman of the program.

Another need is for more volunteer workers to assist each morning in the program which takes place at the school located at 230 Scurry across the street from the First Baptist Church. The First Baptist Church donates the use of the building, along with utilities and a telephone.

If you would be willing to help furnish transportation or to be a volunteer helper in the school, you are urged to contact either the Slaton Chamber of Commerce or Mrs. Newhouse, Their telephone numbers are 828-6238 and 828-3713 respectively.

This is a real need in the life of Slaton if it really is to be "Your Kind of Town". Mrs. Newhouse asks, "Won't you help?"
