MAYOR PLEADS FOR APPROVAL, COMMISSION WANTS MORE TIME

Debates Comprehensive Plan With Federal Funds

ning project for the City Slaton was left "dangling" Slaton City Commission nonday night, after Mayor David Hughes had pleaded with he three commissioners to ac-

The comprehensive plan was proved for a Federal grant of \$14,860 on May 2, 1969. The project is tabbed for a cotal cost of \$22,290 with the ty paying one-third, or \$7,430, commission decides to ceed with the program.

The City of Slaton applied for the urban planning assist-ance grant in January of this year, however the three com-missioners attending Monday night's session were not mem-

bers of the council at this time. Otis Neill, J. S. Edwards and Floyd Guelker were elected as commissioners in April.

Jim Delashaw, State Depart-ment of Health; Bennett Reaves, consultant engineer for the city, and Nathan Kiser, consultant planner, attended the com mission meeting Monday night to explain and out the overall planning program.

After lengthy discussion, the mayor recommended the commission approve the contract for the project. His reasons included the fact that such a plan is needed in regional planning purposes and to be eligible for certain Federal grants; that it would provide for continuity of information and plans from commission to commission, and that it would provide for orderly

and efficient growth of the community in the future.

"I beg you to accept this plan," Hughes told the commissioners. "It may not be as important to you or to me as it will be to Slaton citizens in

the future," he added.

Neill replied that he did not have sufficient information or ample time for consideration "to cast an intelligent vote." Edwards and Guelker agreed and asked for more time to consider the matter.

Edwards said the commission had not discussed the program in detail, in fact he didn't know the previous commission had applied for a grant, Guelker said he didn't remember hearing about the grant being approved. The mayor said the plan had been mentioned in several commission meetings. and that the local newspaper had a story on the grant ap-

"The lack of information on what previous commissions have done further points out the need of a comprehensive plan," remarked the mayor.

Edwards said the Monday night discussion "should have been held a month ago so we could have studied the matter better." Hughes agreed, but pointed out that the need for immediate action was brought to his attention only a few days

Delashaw explained that the State Department of Health will undergo a transition Sept. 1, with administration being transferred to the Governor's office. He said if the contract

was not signed before that date, there might be some delay in getting the project started. His office, he added, was checking around to get as many contracts completed as possible before the change-over.

As explained by the three

visitors, the comprehensive plan is proposed, generally, to include such things as: base mapping; base studies with economic analysis and population projection; land use studies and neighborhood analysis; circulation and transportation -- including master plan for central business district; studies and maps on public facilities -- water, sewer, drainage, schools, parks, public buildings; capital improvements and budget programs, and adminis-

The project would include a number of preliminary reports over the period of about a year to 18 months, with the city commission approving each report prior to the compilation of the comprehensive plan.

Reaves, when questioned about the need of such a plan, pointed out that a study by the engineering firm alone on water, sewer and drainage would cost the city almost as much as this overall plan. Since the city has the Federal grant, he said commissioners should decide if the other studies and information are needed.

Kiser, the consultant planner, emphasized that the project was a complex plan. "If it was simple, you would have done it last year, or 10 years ago."

He added that the plan was designed as one that could be used, not to be put on the shelf and forgotten.

The health department man explained that the city's share would be paid in three in stallments. An initial payment of \$2,480 would be made on the contract signing, and payments of \$2,475 would be paid when the project was 35 percent and 70 percent complete. The state agency checks and reviews the planner's work, he added.

Reaves reported his firm was currently working on comprehensive plans for Levelland, Friona, Brownfield, Lamesa and Colorado City. Delashaw said the State Health Department has completed some 100 plans and is working on another 100.

A Father-Son Golf Tournament, under sponsorship of Slaton Lions Club, is set Saturday at Slaton Municipal Golf Course.



Slaton's long, hot, dry summer ended over the weekend

as thunderstorms roamed a-

round the region leaving from 1.5 to 4 inches of rainfall in the

Slaton area. The most general and heaviest rainfall occurred Sunday night with most reports ranging from 1.4 inches to 2

inches of moisture. The Southland and Gordon areas south of Slaton reported the most moisture since last Friday, with some totals mea-

sured from 3.5 to 4 inches. Unofficial rain reports in Slaton totalled 2.4 inches since Saturday. This included .70 of an inch Saturday, 1.4 inches Sunday, .20 of an inch Monday and .10 of an inch Wednesday morn-

The Saturday rain was spotted, with some sections of town reporting only a shower while others had half aninch or more. A shower about 6 a.m. Wednesday left a trace or about one-

tenth of an inch around town. The long-awaited rains came after temperature readings had been at the 100-degree mark or over for 35 straight days, according to a report from the Pioneer Natural Gas Co. office in Slaton.

The crop - saving showers were a welcome sight to many farmers, although some in - dicated that rains came "too late" to do much good on dryland crops.

The cool cloud cover heldthe maximum temperatures in the 80's Monday through Wednesday. A high of 104 degrees was reported last Thursday and Friday, the mercury dipped below 100 (to 98) on Saturday -marking the first time in 35 days that the maximum was below the century mark.

The minimum temperatures also dropped below 70 for the first time in many days. Readings of 68 were recorded Sunday and Monday nights, and the low was 70 on Tuesday night.

A forecast for cloudiness and possible rain was announced Wednesday. The high Wednesday was not expected to reach 100 degrees.





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

School's Open, **Drivers Urged** To Use Caution

Thousands of children are headed back to school full of nervous excitement -- but with little thought for safety. And so again, joining with law enforcement officials throughout the state, the American Automobile Association urges extra care during the first few weeks

Traffic accidents kill more children between one and fourteen years of age than any other cause. Because kindergarten and first grade youngsters, many on their own in traffic for the first time, suffer most of the school route injuries, AAA suggests that parents walk with their children on the opening day of school, making sure that their children are familiar with traffic aids and regulations and use guarded crosswalks whenever possible.

Driving children to school only adds to the confusion around school areas, creating hazardous conditions. Even though children should learn traffic rules, the major anniversary of the organization, traffic responsibility consistently falls on the driver.

AAA pleads with all drivers to help protect the lives of school children this year by driving with particular care everywhere children might be playing or crossing - and especially near school areas.






