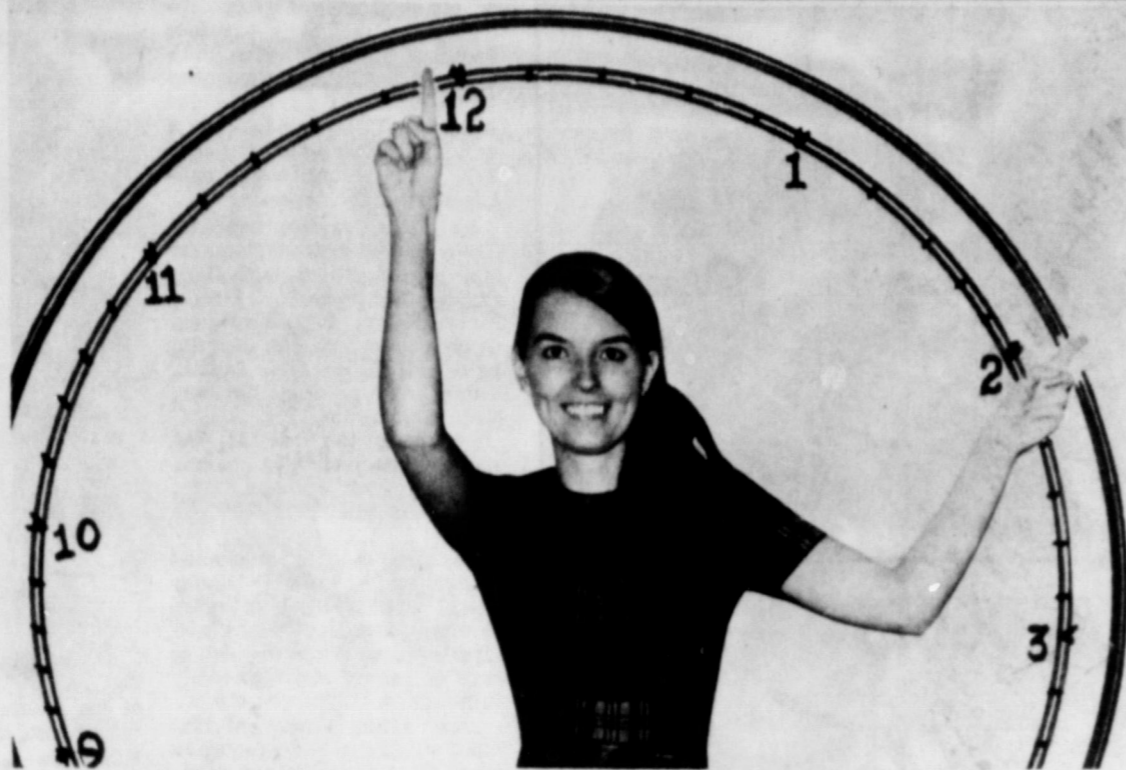

## UIL Shuffle Puts Slaton Back In 4-AA District

Slaton High will compete in District 4-AA for the next two years, it was announced last week by the University Interscholastic League.

The UIL increased the enrollment figures on Class AAA, with the result that Slaton and Littlefield will drop from the big 3-AAA district, Littlefield will go to 3-AA.

The realignment puts Slaton back with some familiar schools for UIL athletic and literary competition. The 8-member district will include Denver City, Frenship, Post, Tahoka, Dalou, Roosevelt and Ralls.

The latter two schools -- Roosevelt and Ralls -- were also involved in classification changes with both moving up from Class A. The new district alignment is effective for the next school year, beginning in

September, 1970.

The UIL classes are based on high school enrollment, and Class AAA was changed to take schools from 500 to 1,100. The low figure was formerly 450, and Slaton has about 460 students, and just barely made it in the AAA ranks the past two years.

Class AA districts include high schools with 230 to 499 enrollment, after a span of

225 to 449 the past two years.

The new 4-AA lineup next year will have a compact district, with all schools being within about a 30-mile radius except for Denver City. Morton was changed to 3-AA along with Littlefield, Floydada, Dimmitt, Olton, Fjolina, Abernathy and Lockney.

## Tigers Test Cubs In Zone Contest

Slaton's Tigers -- fresh from a 22-9 conquest of favored Sweetwater -- go seeking their second 3-AAA zone victory at Brownfield Friday night, where the Cubs will be celebrating Homecoming and hoping to chalk up their first win of the season at the expense of the Tigers.

The Tigers will probably draw the favorite's role for the first time this season--although Slaton now has a 3-3 record on the year. Coach Ernie Davis is hoping the favorite's nod

won't catch his Tigers napping.

With a 1-0 mark in zone play, the Tigers are still in contention for a district-title game, but another band of Tigers--Snyder--have become the heavy favorite to take the Zone A championship. The two zone winners will meet Nov. 21 for the 3-AAA crown. Estacado is favored but unbeaten Lamesa is still a strong contender in Zone B.

Davis announced this week that the Tigers came out of the fine winning effort against Sweetwater without serious injuries. Nick Farrell and Larry Moore had some painful bruises but are expected to be ready Friday night.

Although Brownfield is winless this season, Davis and the Tiger coaching staff are not taking the game lightly. With Homecoming activities set at Brownfield, the Cubs are expected to be "high" for this game.

According to a scouting report Monday night at the Tiger Club meeting, Coach Gene Franklin said the Cubs would be about the same size as Slaton. Brownfield caught Estacado and Dunbar the first two games of the season, absorbing 50-0 and 34-0 defeats. Then followed losses to Colorado City (28-7), Lake View (21-12), Andrews (51-8), and Snyder (47-0).

The Tiger offensive statistics for the six games show Slaton averaging only 199 yards per game total offense, however, the Lamesa and Estacado games knocked the figures way down. The Tigers have just one game with more than 200 yards rushing -- that coming in the opener

### Adult Education Program Starts Here Nov. 4

An Adult Education Program of Slaton Public Schools will get underway Tuesday, Nov. 4, it was announced this week by Supt. J. C. McClesky.

The program is free to any person 16 years of age or older who did not complete public school. Classes will be conducted on Tuesday and Thursday nights, beginning at 7:30 and adjourning promptly at 9:30.

Classes will be conducted at the Stephen F. Austin school building. Three levels of instruction will be offered. Instructional supplies and books will be provided, along with learning aids, at no cost. A nursery will be provided for participants with small children.

Level 1 will cover grades 1-3 and will be taught by Mrs. Vera Sexton. Level 2 will include instruction in grades 4-5 and the teacher will be Mrs. Mary Taylor. The advanced group in Level 3 will cover grades 6-8 and will be taught by Mrs. Mabel McDougal.

The Adult Education Program is operated by the Slaton Public Schools with Federal funds granted through the Texas Education Agency.

The program is approved by the Division of Adult and Continuing Education of the Texas Education Agency. All interested persons are urged to be in attendance for the first class session on Tuesday, Nov. 4, at S.F. Austin School.

### Police Report 20 Arrests

Slaton Police reported 20 arrests the past week, including one for forgery and one for burglary, and also issued 14 traffic tickets and made 3 ambulance calls.

Police said forgery charges were filed against Jesse Steel, and burglary charges filed against Richard Morgan in connection with a house burglary at the Andrew Ruiz home. Bond was set at \$2,000 in the latter case.

Three accidents were investigated by police, one with injuries. Judy Miller was the driver of a car involved in a one-vehicle accident Tuesday morning. Police reported she apparently lost control of the vehicle and it went off the side of the north US-84 overpass road. Mrs. Ann Lester was taken to Mercy Hospital for minor injuries.

Only minor damage was reported in a two-car accident at the intersection of Lubbock and 8th streets Tuesday afternoon. Drivers involved were Doc P. Hale and Marilyn K. Davis.

Enrique Bierra and John P. Rubio were drivers involved in a two-car collision at E. Division and 4th streets Sunday afternoon.

A siege of rainy weather--launched in a squall line which arrived Sunday night--continued with a cool front Tuesday and Wednesday, leaving up to 4 inches of moisture in some Slaton area points.

The unofficial rain measurement in Slaton Wednesday morning was 3.2 inches for the three days, but some reports of up to 4 inches were received around the area.

The rain stopped all cotton harvest activities, which were off to a modest start last week. Most of the cotton harvest had been restricted to mechanical picking.

After a high of 89 degrees Sunday, the temperature dipped to a high of 73 Monday and 55 Tuesday. The low reading was recorded at 64 degrees Sunday and dipped to 45 Tuesday night.

Farmers agreed Wednesday, as the wet weather continued, that it was too early to know how much the rain would affect the cotton crop. One thing for sure, the moisture won't do the crop any good as far as quality is concerned. Farmers are hoping for a quick end to the wet weather, so that harvesting can get underway.

Slaton recorded 1.9 inches Monday and Tuesday morning, and another 1.1 inches were measured Wednesday morning. The rain report showed .20 of an inch for Sunday night.

The rains were heavier in some areas around the city. One farmer near the Union community reported .30 of an inch Sunday night, another 2.2 inches on Tuesday morning, and about an 1 inch Wednesday morning.

The rain was still falling slowly Wednesday morning, with weather forecasters calling for more intermittent light rain or drizzle through the day. A 50 percent chance of rain was predicted Wednesday night with highs in the upper 50's and lows in the 40's.

The South Plains cotton harvest was off to a modest start in September and early October, according to W. K. Palmer, in charge of the Lubbock Cotton Classing Office of the USDA.

However, harvest activities are increasing daily and samples from 1000 bales were received at the Lubbock office last Friday. Samples from

### Chamber Seeks New Members

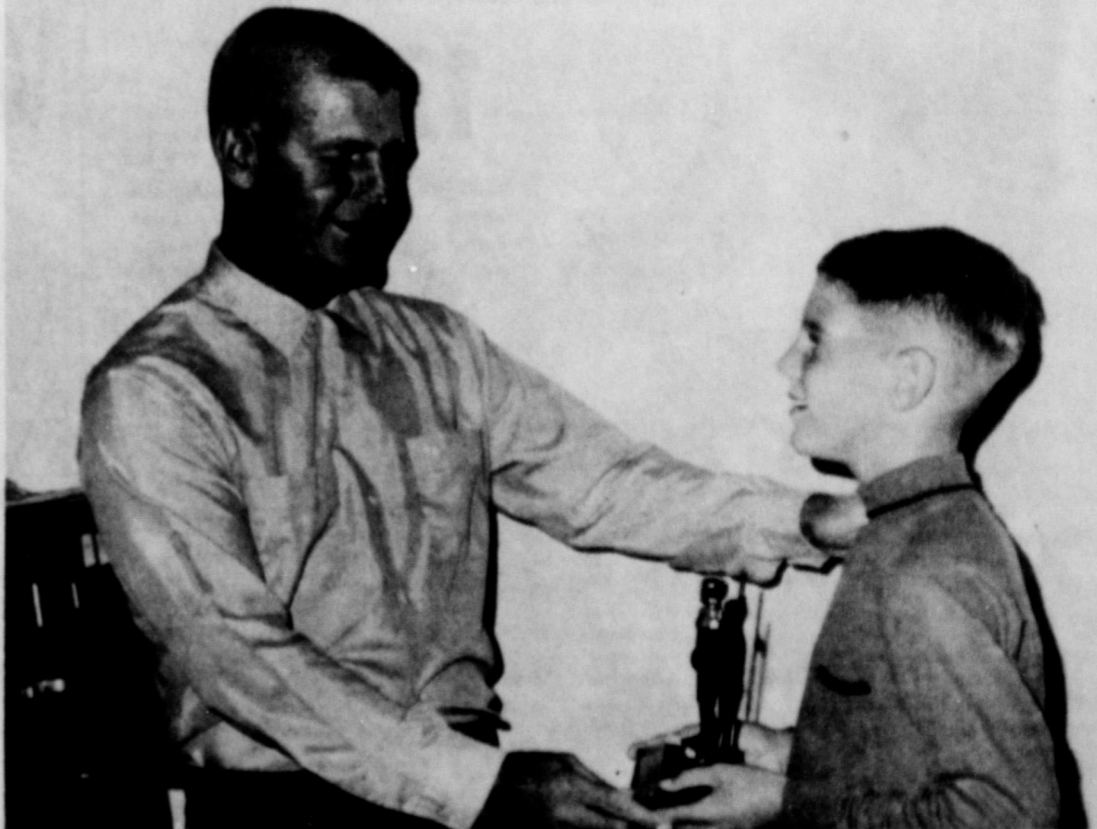
The annual membership drive of Slaton Chamber of Commerce is now underway with Dee Bowman and Speedy Nieman heading two teams of directors competing during the drive.

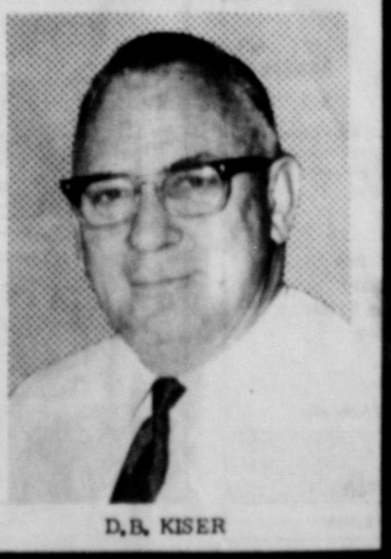

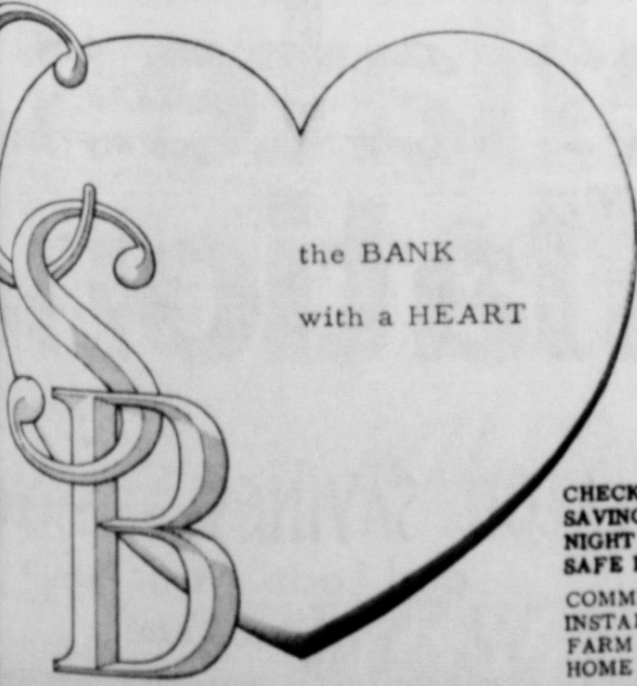

Thanks to Fonda for such a lovely poem given from a heart of love. Trust to see you.

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



