Cotton Harvest In Race With Santa

The Slaton area cotton harvest headed for the final countdown this week after warm, sunny weather allowed farmers to continue operations at full speed.

No bale count was made this week, but The Slatonite will make a survey this weekend and report the total in the Christmas edition next Tuesday.

The bale count had passed the 50,000 mark last week in the area, with some 14 Slaton and area gins included in the count. Most gins reported they were 75 to 80 percent through the ginning season. The big backlog of cotton trailers which has

The USDA Cotton Classing Offices at Lubbock, Brown -field, Lamesa and Levelland classed approximately 246,000 samples during the week end-ing Friday, Dec. 12. This brought the total classed and received by the four offices to 935,000. Estimates indicate that 70 to 75 per cent of this season's crop is now out of the fields.



Gun Control Act November Accident Report **Eases Records On Ammo Sales**

It no longer is necessary dealers to keep records for certain ammunition sales, B. Frank White, Regional Commissioner for the Southwest Region, Internal Revenue Service, said today.

Newly enacted legislation aliminates the need for dealers to keep records on sales of shotgun ammunition, ammuni-tion suitable only for use in rifles, and component parts of these types of ammunition. Purchases of ammunition inter changeable between rifles and handguns, such as .22 caliber rimfire ammunition, continue to be subject to the recordkeeping requirements. Pre viously, the gun control act of 1968, required records for all

ammunition sales. White stressed, however, that no other aspect of the act, which is administered by the Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Division of the IRS, was changed by the legislation.

Persons engaged in selling ammunition still are required to be licensed under the act. Anyone under 21 years of

age cannot purchase handgun ammunition. However, indivi-duals at least 18 can buy rifle and shotgun ammunition. Dealers must still require pur chasers to identify themselves if there is doubt about their age.

Once again in Texas we are approaching the most joyful season of the whole year, Christmas. However, traffic wise the month of December has proven to be the most destructive month to the life of mankind--Death by a Motor Vehicle.

In 1968, two traffic records were set in Texas; the month of December had the highest traffic fatality number of 369 as compared to 341 during December of 1967. The second record was 3481 traffic deaths for the year as compared to 3367

traffic deaths for the year 1967. What is the outlook for the year 1969? The Sergeant stated "the Texas death count for the beginning of December, 1969 is 125 more traffic deaths as compared to the same time last year."


The church gradually accepted and blessed the practice of decorating both the church buildings and the Christian home with plants and flowers on the feast of the Nativity.

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
