Trustees Are Self, Abeyta, Gamble

Three new trustees were named to Slaton School Board as a record vote total of 1,127 was recorded here Saturday.

Leading the ballot in a field of seven candidates was Clark Self Jr. with 450 votes. Rev. Emilio Abeyta was only one vote back, and Joe Gamble took the third spot with 433 votes.

The three - year terms on the board went to the top three vote getters. The third and fourth - place candidates were not far off the pace -- Alex Bednarz polled 410 votes and Jake Wendel 405. They were followed by P. C. Kitchesn with 273 and Sharon Head with 92.

The school board met Tuesday night to canvass the returns of the election. The three new trustees will take their oaths at the next regular meeting. Retiring from the board Ted Swanner, Jack Clark and Dr. M. J. McSween.

Self, 36, is owner and man-ager of Self Furniture, a past president of the Chamber of Commerce and active in community and civic affairs. He has three children in school. Abeyta, 28, is a Catholic priest and is believed to be the first Spanish - American to serve on the board. He is a

member of Slaton Lions Club. Abeyta was reared in Littlefield. Gamble, 48, is a farmer and resides at 750 S. 23rd St. He has two children in

Voters were asked to select three candidates from the ballot, but the vote total reflected the fact that all persons did not choose to mark three, Approximately 435 voters voted only for one or two candidates. One tally counter estimated that about 350 voters marked only one can-

The previous high vote total in a Slaton School District election was reported to be 894 recorded in 1962. Officials said a large turnout of Spanish - Americans helped push the total to 233 over the previous high.

The school board is composed of seven members. The holdovers are Don Kendrick, Tommy Davis, Bettye Burks and R. C. Hall Jr. Three were elected this year, and two will come up for election the next two years.

Issue Here

A request for a variance in the zoning code was allowed by the City Zoning Board in a controversial hearing Monday afternoon, M. W. Kerr had requested that the zoning board allow use of his building and property in the 700 block of Division as a used - car lot. The property is zoned for some type businesses, but not a used-car lot.

About 30 citizens appeared at the hearing and a petition protesting the request was signed by about 25 property owners in the area. Bruce Pember is chairman of the zoning board.

After the board allowed the request, Mrs. Ruth Longtin appealed to the City Commission Monday night on behalf of the petitioners. She said the group felt the board "ignored" their petition, and added that one of the board members -- Milton Davis -- was employed by the firm which was to lease the property in question.

Minutes of the zoning meeting, however, revealed that Davis abstained from voting on the matter and did not participate in the discussion on whether to allow the variance in the code.

The city commission agreed to review the case with the zoning board, However, Kerr withdrew the request Tuesday, stating that he was surprised at the reaction of citizens in that area and he did not "want to cause any hard feelings' over the matter.

Some political observers estimate there are about 650 registered voters residing in the Ward 2 boundaries, which takes in residents north of Divisions and west of 9th streets. Ward 4 includes citizens living south of Division and east of 9th

An outstanding civic worker in Slaton for many years, Mr. Hagerman is probably remembered the most for his service to the Boy Scout program. He served as Scoutmaster along with other phases of the Boy Scouts. He attended three national Boy Scout jamborees and was a former Scout Commissioner of the Year for this area. His most coveted award in scouting was the Silver Beaver Award which was presented to him in 1949. This is the highest award on council level.

Mr. Hagerman was named Citizen of the Year by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce in 1952. He was a member of the Eastern Star No. 585, Volunteer Fire Department until his retirement, and the Santa Fe Retirement Club.

He was born July 21, 1892 in Bowling Green, Ky. He worked for the Santa Fe Railway from 1911 until his retirement in 1958.

His wife, Virginia, whom he married June 16, 1915 in Alva Okla., preceded him in death as did his son, Merle.

He is survived by a brother, Fent of Fairview, Okla., and a sister, Mrs. Jay Tharp of Denver, Colo,







Be Patient, Census Taker Is Coming

B. L. McCasland, district manager, reports that the 1970 Census of Population and Housing is nearing completion in the area, that in about another week the census takers should have visited every residence on their lists.

Census takers began visiting households on April 1 and have been working continuously to cover their territories. The District Manager asks that householders hold their questionnaires, which were de livered prior to April 1, and have them filled out, ready for the census taker to pick up. This will save time for both the householder and the census taker and speed up the completion of the census.

For every fifth household, the census taker will have a longer questionnaire which she will fill out by interviewing a member of the household. The District Manager asks householders to welcome these census takers when they call and to give them full cooperation in getting the required census information.

Most of the census takers are women. Each wears a red, white, and blue identification badge which is her official credential. It bears her signature and certifies that she authorized to perform the duties of a Census Enumerator, and has sworn to keep confidential all census information

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

I have had the pleasure of flying over some beautiful country these past three weeks. The ranchers down in the Big Bend area were having trouble with coyotes killing sheep and hired your local flyer.

I flew with a boy that has been a trapper all his life, and I believe he is half Indian and half coyote himself. He could spot a coyote hiding in a bush or see their trail on the sand, as well as places they had bedded down or dug a den.

When we jumped a coyote, he could tell if it was young or old, male or female. Myself, I wasn't sure if it was a coyote (or just what) the way they took off through the brush. At times we shot coyotes with a tranqualizer and once had two tied outside the helicopter and two inside. I was hoping he didn't let one loose in the chopper.

At noon time we'd stop along a river at old Indian camps and look for arrow heads. The camps were way back in the ranches and hadn't been disturbed, so we had good luck on finding relics. Seems the Indians would camp along the rivers where there was a close supply of water. They would pile a lot of rocks in one place where they built fires and cooked a local plant. 

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
