## Crop Outlook Good In Slaton Area

Harvest predictions around the Slaton area are optimistic, but there's a big "if" attached to the ag outlook. Most farmers and farm-related businesses contacted this week report that the cotton crops are "fruiting real good", despite lack of moisture, drying winds and the many days of scorching heat. Many farmers say the cotton never looked better, and "if" beneficial rains come in another week, conditions would be ideal. Grain and other crops have not held up so well as the cotton.

Some insect damage has been reported in grain fields, and there has been widespread spraying for green bugs in maize fields. Dryland producers are facing a critical period, with some already reporting an expected loss in yield.

Much of the Slaton area has gone without measurable moisture for a month. Only areas reporting rain recently were around the Gordon and Hackberry communities south of Slaton, where about 1 inch of rain was recorded last Thursday.

Some area farmers are surprised that the cotton is doing so good and "loading up heavy," but they are quick to point out that August is the deciding month for cotton crops in this area. In other words, there's nothing wrong with the cotton crops that some good, soaking rains wouldn't cure -- provided they are not long in coming.

Temperatures were in the high 90's this week under cloudy skies, holding the possibility of much-needed rainfall. High readings Monday and Tuesday were 98 degrees, with lows at 68 and 72. The previous week started last Thursday with a cool 80-degree maximum and 56 low.

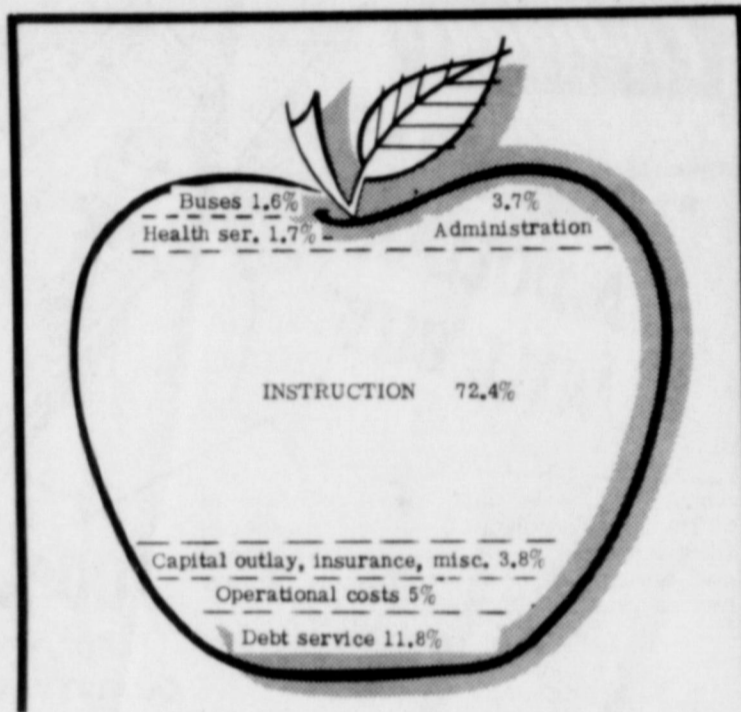
The hot, dry weather is not all farmers have to worry about.

The crucial floor debate on future farm policy was set to start this week, possibly Wednesday. The hotly-contested issue will be where to set a proposed ceiling on payments to individual farmers.

The Senate recently voted a \$20,000 limit on payments, tacking it onto the Ag Appropriations bill over the opposition of Texas Senators Tower and Yarborough and 33 others.

Talk is that Rep. Bob Poage of Waco, chairman of the House Ag Committee, is now trying to get agreement on a limit of around \$5,000 per crop per farmer.

It seems certain that any future farm program that involves direct payments to producers will carry a limit on the size of payments. The form and level of the limitation is now the big question.

### TO SLATON LIONS CLUB

## Proposed School Budget Outlined

Slaton's proposed \$1 million school budget was briefly outlined to the Slaton Lions Club Monday by Buford Duff, school business manager, who pointed out that most of the \$134,000 increase over last year -- with receipts and disbursements -- comes from required state programs.

The budget highlights were presented at the club's regular weekly luncheon meeting in the Community Clubhouse. Duff said a public hearing is scheduled for the budget Aug. 11.

Duff gave a breakdown on the school's \$1 million budget for the coming year, pointing out that about 72.4 percent is estimated for instruction. It also included 3.7 percent for administration, 1.7 for health services and attendance, 1.6 for bus services, 5.0 for operational costs, 11.8 for debt services, and 3.8 for capital outlay, insurance and miscellaneous.

The school district has a \$20 million tax valuation. Anticipated revenue will include 68.4 percent from Federal and state funds, and 31.6 percent from local taxes.

Revenue from local sources is projected at \$337,972 -- up about \$11,247 over the past year. New property and delinquent tax collections is anticipated to take care of the increase in local tax funds. The tax rate remains at \$1.75 per \$100 assessed value.

Aside from painting at high school and routine maintenance, the only renovation has been in the old cafeteria building at West Ward. This building will be used for the new kindergarten.

### BUT PAVING NEED IS STRESSED

## Housing For Low-Income Families Going 'Great'

Slaton's million-dollar housing project still has two - bit streets, but yards are looking better and occupancy is at an all-time high.

The 70 units were opened for occupancy a year ago and, while rentals started slowly as expected, there are now just five vacancies--all one - bedroom units.

C. L. Hatch, executive director for Slaton Housing Authority, reports things "running real smooth" at the project except for the "dire need" of paving to the units.

"Just a little rain makes a mess of the dirt roads around here," Hatch exclaimed. He added that paving could benefit the housing area in more ways than just providing access to the units. "It would make the residents much happier, and give them more pride in their homes."

Hatch has been executive director since March 1, after retiring from Santa Fe Railways in February. He replaced Dudley Berry, who left the director's post due to illness.

The housing authority office, and community center, is located on Powers Street, between 4th and 5th streets. The 35 duplex apartments are located

in southeast Slaton -- between 2nd and 7th streets, and between Jean and Edwards streets.

Rent is based on family income and the number in the family, according to a government formula. A couple can have no more than \$3,300 income to be eligible, while a family of seven can have no more than \$4,500 income. For instance, one family with a three-bedroom unit pays only \$12.50 a month due to their low income.

The rent includes water and lawn care, and each unit is equipped with refrigerator and range. Hatch said the units would be full "if we had more three - bedroom units." He thinks the government survey probably allowed for too many retired couples.

Of the 65 units now rented, the race of the occupants is "about evenly divided" in three groups, said Hatch.

Hatch said the two major problems have been lack of paving and getting grass started in the yards. The paving issue has been a problem since the units opened and is still a stalemate. The City of Slaton held a paving hearing on the street, or streets, involved and most of the residents opposed the project. In some cases, the cost to the property owner of

paving was more than the property was worth.

Since property owners were unwilling to be assessed for paving in front of their homes, the city commission said the city did not have the funds to do the job. So, it is the link between pavement and the housing authority tracts that caused the stalemate. The Department of Housing and Urban Development apparently will pay for paving in front of the units, but not for other property in between.

Hatch said the city commission has offered to provide the engineering at no cost, if he could come up with government funds for the paving. Hatch said he is still seeking a solution to the problem.

The housing director said a disagreement between the government and the landscaping contractor had left that work uncompleted. Roy Lacy, maintenance man for the housing center and the only other paid employee, started working in the yards this summer, however, and grass is beginning to take hold.

Hatch is proud of the community center building which also houses his office, a kitchen, and a clinic room. The health and immunization clinic, conducted by the Lubbock County Health Department, is held in the building. Three cooking schools are also being conducted at this time.

The health clinic is conducted the first Thursday of each month by a county health nurse. Immunizations available include small pox, diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, tetanus and typhoid. Other health services are offered.

A cooking school for Spanish - speaking women is being held each Tuesday; a school for girls 9 to 12 is held each Thursday, and a school for English - speaking women is held on Fridays. The community center building is air-conditioned.

A school for mentally retarded children is also held each morning, five days a week at the center.

Slaton Housing Authority is directed by a board of five commissioners. Bruce Pembler is chairman of the board, and Howard Swanner is vice chairman. Other members are T. J. Wallace, Charlie Walton, and Joe Diaz. The local housing authority has a 40-year loan on the project with payment guaranteed by the Federal government.

After a wedding luncheon at the Slaton Club House, the couple will be at home at 1415 Sylvania N.E. Apt. 4, erque, N.M.

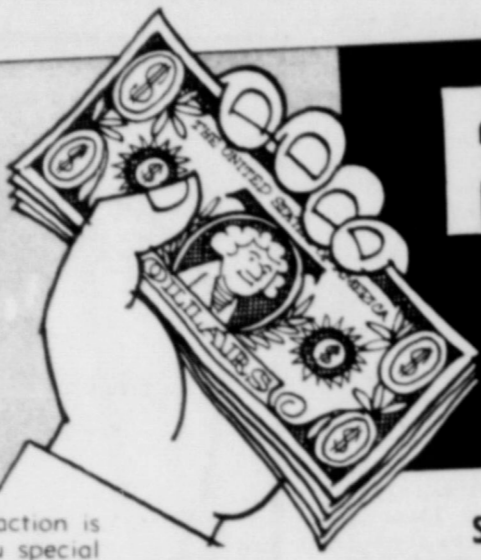

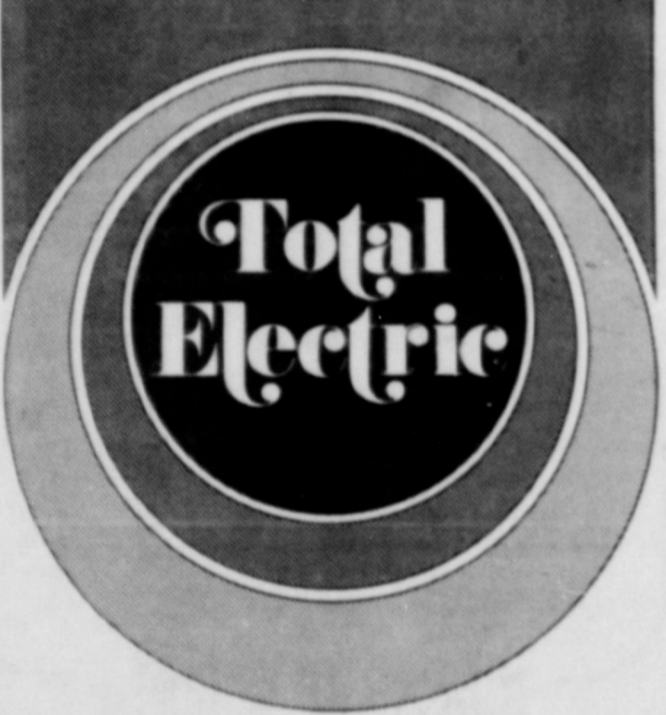

### JONES TO INTRODUCE ON LAW ENFORCEMENT

State Rep. Delwin Lubbock said today he will introduce a bill during the 62nd Session of the Legislature that will bring law enforcement personnel into the state with no cost to the taxpayers. The bill would transfer the law enforcement personnel of the Parks and

Wildlife Department to a special division of the Department of Public Safety. According to the Lubbock representative, it would mean that men serving as game wardens and law enforcement personnel in Texas parks would have the necessary training and authority to enforce all laws and not just the limited authority now given parks and wildlife personnel.

Rep. Jones said that this expansion of authority for game wardens would be especially beneficial to sparsely populated areas which need additional representatives for law and order.

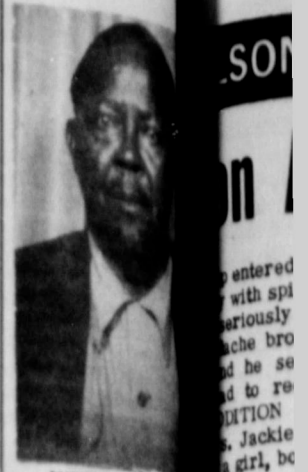



**COTTON TALKS** FROM PLAINS COTTON MARKETING BOARD

On July 22, after a long and turbulent germination period, a seedling farm bill for cotton, feed grains, wheat, dairy products and wool finally emerged from the House Committee on Agriculture. It is now headed for its first survival test on the floor of the House, possibly as early as July 29.

The Ag Committee version of cotton legislation contains provisions for cotton much the same as reported back in May before the sprouting farm bill bumped its head against the crusty payment limitation issue. The cotton section calls for replacing long standing marketing quotas with a national cotton production goal which the Secretary of Agriculture would translate into acreage allotments each year.

It spells out that the national base acreage allotment shall be 11.5 million acres in 1971 and for 1972 and 1973 would be of such size as the Secretary determines necessary to maintain adequate supplies.

The loan level, set at 18.7 cents per pound, basis 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire, would be comparable to this year's loan of 20.7 cents per pound for cotton in the premium micronaire category. The maximum that the Secretary could require a producer to "set aside" would be an acreage equivalent to 33-1-3 per cent of his base allotment. And in the event the producer's payments under the program were limited, the Secretary would reduce his set aside requirement to the extent he "deems fair and reasonable in relation to the amount of the payment reduction."

An advance payment of 15 cents per pound times the average actual production for the previous three years would be made on each farmer's base acreage allotment. This payment would be supplemented later if necessary to bring the payment plus the national average market price came to only 19 cents, a supplemental payment of one cent per pound would be made. However, should the market price average 21 cents per pound or more, producers would not have to return any of the advance payment. For purposes of determining the amount of the supplemental payment, the national average market price for the first five months of the cotton marketing year, August through December, would be used.

The bill would continue sale and lease of allotments within states, but do away with the requirement for a referendum to permit acreage to cross county lines. Release and re-apportionment of acreage also would be continued for the three years of the bill.

On payment limitation the Committee is sending to the House floor an amendment limiting to \$55,000 per crop total payments to an individual producer. The amendments "is designed to divert attention, public comments and market forces, but not to change."

This \$55,000 payment on payment is set too high by representatives and a severe attack on the floor. So hot is the issue it will overshadow any effort to change.

The Senate Finance Committee's Agriculture Subcommittee would limit payments to \$20,000 per crop. The bill in the past two years has been similar. The bill already has several amendments in the Senate farm bill.

In a letter to members of the House, the Senate Finance Committee said "The bill not only needs to limit one penny to \$20,000 per crop, but also needs to be amended to include George Mahon and others among membership and proposed to Mr. Finance. Most of these amendments are opposed to the payment limitation."

This youth caravan is composed of 16 teenagers (10 girls and six boys) who will be visiting 20 different Pentecostal Holiness churches in Oklahoma, Kansas, Arkansas and Missouri.

Special entertainment will be presented by the "Psycho-Ceramics" -- (Jack Lancaster and his Crackpots of Amarillo).

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT** NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (General Election Nov. 3, 1970)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 1-d, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 1-d. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops rather than upon the value of such lands and the crop growing thereon."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a qualified elector at an election to be held on the first Tuesday of the month of November, 1970, at which time ballots shall be provided for voting for the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide by law for the establishment of a uniform method of assessment of ranch, farm and forest lands, which shall be based upon the capability of such lands to support the raising of livestock and/or to produce farm and forest crops."

**PUBLIC NOTICE**

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT** NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (General Election Nov. 3, 1970)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Subsection (a), Section 64, Article III, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 64. (a) The Legislature may by special statute provide for consolidation of governmental offices and functions of government of any one or more political subdivisions comprising or located within any county. 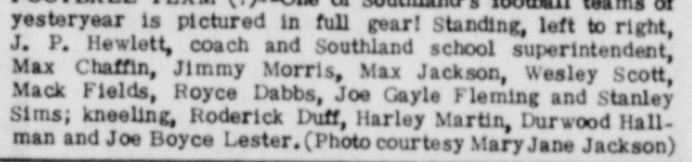
