## Slaton Basketball Teams Ready For Playoff Games

Slaton's Tigerettes prepared for a big bi-district clash with Friona next Tuesday as the boys team fought its way back into the district title picture this week.

The Tigerettes, who now own a sparkling 29-2 record, closed out district action by walloping Frenship 52-26 last Friday, then edged Hale Center in a tuneup clash 45-42 Tuesday night.

Junior forward Karla Kitten led scoring in both contests, with 24 against Frenship and 27 against Hale Center. Jan Davis scored 20 and Gretta Stricklin 15 against Frenship. Elnora Moore hauled down 17 rebounds.

Coach Gay Benson's team will face a Friona squad which owns a 25-4 mark. Bill Ellis of the Friona Star told the Slatonite Wednesday that the Friona girls lost two times to Canyon (which also beat Slaton once) and once each to Spearman and Floydada. In addition to the Canyon loss in a tournament, Slaton's girls lost the opening game of the season to Petersburg.

Friona's offensive and defensive stars are forward Diane Day, a senior listed at 5-9, averaging 20 points per game, and guard Vicki Ulen, a 5-10 guard. Both girls have been starters for three years for the Squaws.

The two teams will meet in the new gymnasium of Wayland Baptist College in Plainview at 7:30 p.m. Tuesday. Admission price will be \$1 for students and \$2 for adults. Slaton patrons should take FM 400 to Plainview, turn west on U.S. 70 in the city and proceed west on 70 (which also is 5th St.) to Vernon Street, where a turn back to the right, or north, will take them to the gymnasium.

Slaton beat Post 67-57 Tuesday as Lloyd Kitten and James Conwright scored 20 points each, while T. W. Whitfield had 17. Last Friday Coach Kenneth Housden's team slammed Frenship 81-48 as Conwright had 26, Kitten 18 and Whitfield 14 points.

Going into Tuesday night's games, Slaton, Post and Idalou had been tied in second half action. Tahoka beat Idalou 69-67. Ralls, which had lost two previous games, beat Roosevelt 66-51.

## Coaches, Principals Get Contracts

Contracts of all coaches and principals were extended one year in action by the Slaton School board in the February meeting Tuesday night.

Principals were kept on a three-year-ahead basis, with the one-year extension putting the contract expiration dates at June 30, 1975. Principals voted the one-year extensions are M. W. Kerr, high school; James Perkins, junior high; T. C. Martin, West Ward Elementary; and Mrs. Virgie Hunter, Stephen F. Austin Elementary.

Contract of head coach and athletic director Ernie Davis also was extended one year to leave him a three-year contract. Other coaches have one-year contracts and these were renewed. They are Doc Mize, Bill Shaha, Kenneth Housden, Mrs. Gay Benson, and Jackie Stewart in high school, and R. G. Copeland and Charles Hearn in junior high.

One-year contracts also were renewed for business manager Edwin Knight and curriculum coordinator Joe Sparkman.

School board members also authorized installation of two water sprinkler connections on the new track now being installed and which will be used this season, and authorized the superintendent to proceed with plans for installation of doors on the east side of the junior high cafeteria, when and if the project is considered feasible. Supt. J. C. McClesky explained that consideration is being given

to an outside door and walk in order to relieve congestion which develops as high school students come to the junior high cafeteria for lunch.

Use of computer service for scheduling of high school classes was approved by the board, as well as a computer payroll system to begin in September.

In comment related to the need for computer scheduling of classes, Supt. McClesky noted that high school enrollment of around 600 is anticipated next year, and that present enrollment is 548, about 70 more than last year.

In answer to a question from a board member, McClesky said

Slaton schools undoubtedly would again be classified AAA three years from now, explaining that the classification system requires that a school remain in its present classification for two years ahead of the time it falls within one group.

With reference again to the recent court rulings on funding for school systems, the superintendent commented that even though additional facilities are badly needed in the schools here, "we can't do much about any program requiring any capital outlay for at least the next couple of years."

Increased costs of utilities and insurance, and other problems regarding insurance were cited in the superintendent's report to the board.

## Need Of Tank Repairs For City Is Discussed

Slaton city commission Tuesday night listened to the third representative of tank companies give his views on the leaking storage tank situation and discovered that none of the three "experts" who have looked at the tank on Golf Course Road have been able to agree on what needs to be done.

Tom Yates, representing American Tank and Tower Co. of Joplin, Mo., suggested Tuesday that the bottom of the tank be repaired instead of replaced, as one tank company man had proposed. Mayor Bland Tomlinson later noted that time is growing short on getting the storage tank repaired in time for peak water usage in the city, and said a called meeting may be forthcoming before next regular session, in order to authorize the work. He explained

that the city is checking on the Missouri firm, which said it would do the job for \$8200, with a 16-year guarantee. Yates also said the job would take nine days.

An error in the previously announced date for the city election was noted. The election will be on April 1, with filing deadline March 1.

The commission rejected an offer by Harold Wilson to buy water from the city for irrigation purposes, instructed City Secretary Alex Webb to take bids on a new maintainer to replace the present one, and heard Mayor Tomlinson report on a meeting of Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, which he attended.

Five members of Slaton Jaycees were present to observe proceedings.

## Area Health Care Situation Topic Of Lions Club Program

Rising costs of health care and efforts being made to alleviate the medical care situation in the Lubbock and Slaton area were outlined in an address to Slaton Lions Club Monday by Dr. Brandon Hull, director of the Experimental Health Delivery System for Lubbock County.

Dr. Hull, introduced by Lion Bill Smith, a member of the hospital district board, explained that the experimental program is one of 12 federally-funded operations across the nation designed to bring together the providers of medical care, the payors of medical care, the politicians, and the consumer, or patient, with the goal of solving problems which are growing in the health care field.

He pointed out that a major problem is rising cost of health care brought on by increasing demand for quality service. He also noted that labor costs run about 65 to 70 per cent in hospitals.

He noted that each of the 12 areas of the nation where the experimental program has been set up is supposed to study the needs of its own region without regard to the needs of any other section of the country. "We're charged to do what is best for Lubbock County," Dr. Hull said. The speaker said he was ap-

palled at the lack of understanding among the people of this area regarding the medical services available to them, even the free services, and cited the need for public education in this area.

Purpose of the organization, it was pointed out, is to share professional information and promote professional growth within the area. 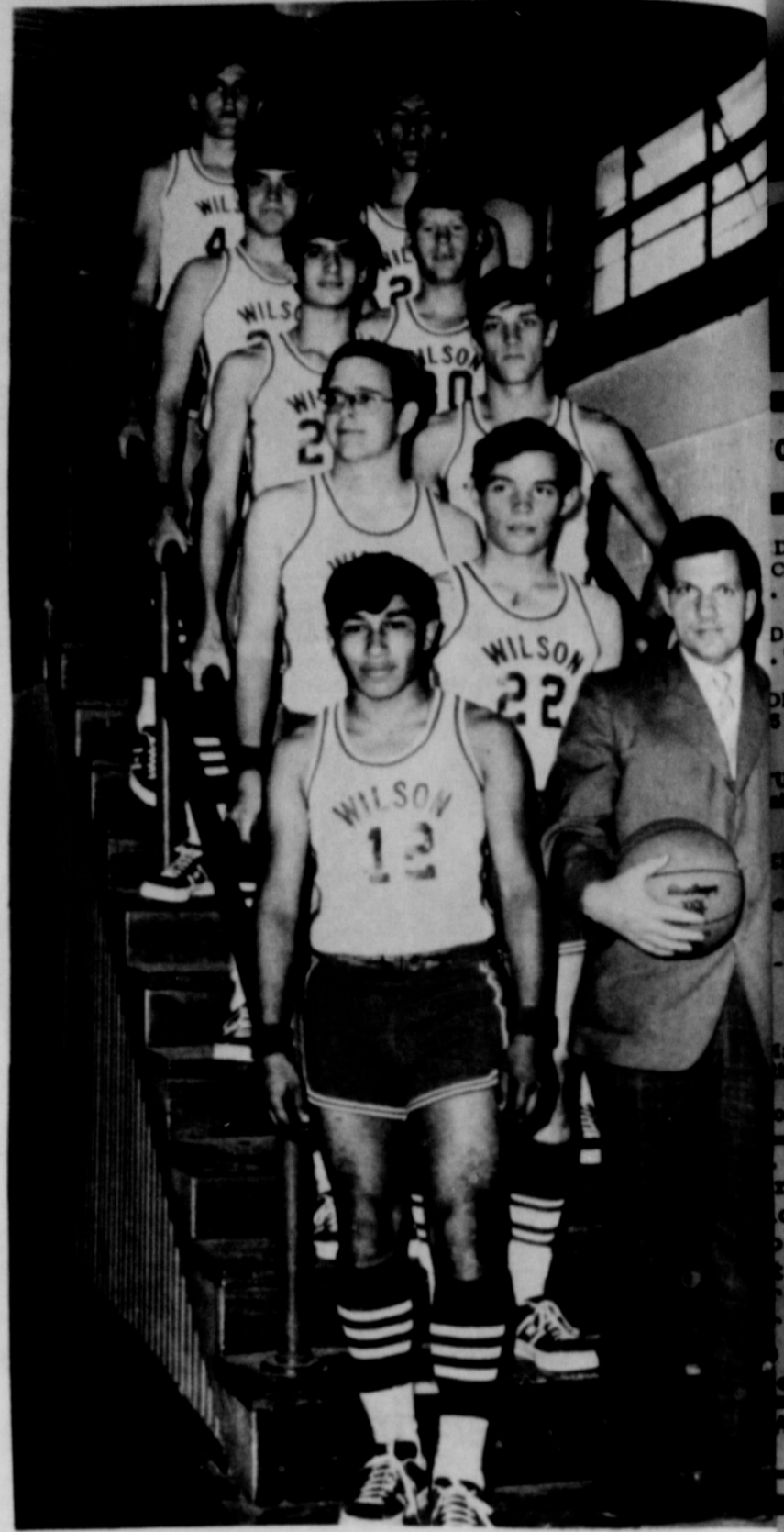

## Non-Chemical Control Sought For Pests

Cultural control, a fancy name for preventing insect damage without using chemicals, has been found to be the best method of controlling the southwestern corn borer in West Texas.

Information from two years of result demonstrations by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has shown that various cultural practices have outperformed insecticides in controlling the small borers, which hit many American corn producers square in the pocket-book each year.

"In our tests, we found that very little yield increase was obtained through chemical control," reports Dr. Bill Clymer, area entomologist at Amarillo.

For the past two seasons, he has worked with county agricultural agents and farmers trying various practices to stop the insect, which can infest 100 per cent of the plants in a corn field and completely prevent grain production.

"Damage is caused by young plants being killed or dwarfed by borer activity in the stalk," Clymer says, "yield is reduced by extensive tunnelling and grain may be lost as a result of girdling which causes lodging or falling of the stalk."

The recent tests have produced concrete suggestions to minimize corn borer damage. Clymer warns that late corn plantings are especially subject to severe attack by second generation borers at a critical time in the development of the plants. He suggests planting as early as possible with Edward Everett, famous orator, delivered an address two hours long at the Gettysburg dedication.

early - maturing varieties to minimize crop damage.

In the Panhandle and other colder areas, double disking or plowing corn stubble exposes the borers to drying and freezing temperatures and allows almost complete overwinter kill. If wind erosion is a problem, the entomologist suggests listing the soil, which also prepares it for good retention of any winter rainfall.

If no cultural practices are used in the fall or winter, the larvae will overwinter in the stalks below ground level. Later on, farmers can usually gain some control by deep plowing in the spring to bury the larvae so the mature moths cannot emerge. Some control can be obtained by deep plowing prior to planting.

In-season control is limited to application of chemicals, which must be critically timed because the larvae are safe after they bore into the stalk. Clymer adds that insecticidal control on moderate infestations has not been economical in the tests.

## New USDA Ruling Protested

LUBBOCK -- The U. S. Department of Agriculture, in a major switch from 1971 policy, has ruled that applications for participation in federal cotton, feed grain and wheat programs in 1972 will be discontinued if the productive capacity of land designated as "set-aside" is below that of acreage planted to program crops.

In 1971 producers by choice or inadvertently could designate sub-par land as set-aside to satisfy program requirements and suffer only a relatively small monetary loss. For cotton, county committees of USDA's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) determined how many pounds the designated set-aside acreage was capable of producing, and the payment was reduced by an amount equal to the difference between this figure and the farm's payment yield times five cents per pound times the number of acres set aside.

But the latest instructions from Washington to county ASCS offices say "If the farmer indicates that he will designate inferior quality set-aside, his

application for participation shall be disapproved."

Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock - based producer organization speaking for farmers in 25 High Plains counties, is voicing strong objections to the new ruling and asking USDA to leave 1971 regulations in effect for this year at least.

"We are now in the month of February and hundreds of our farmers have already laid out cropping patterns for their farms," says PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, "and this involves expensive preparation of land intended for planting. If there was to be a change in set-aside eligibility rules it should have been announced no later than December of last year before farmers put down fertilizer and herbicides for 1972 crops."

In a letter to Texas members of Congress, Johnson said "Regardless of the reasons given for tightening up on set-aside eligibility regulations, to make this change at this late date is a gross injustice to farmers who have conscientiously tried to abide by the rules as they existed at the time they began preparation for the 1972 crop year."

The new Washington directive instructs county ASCS office personnel to specifically advise farmers at sign-up time that acreage designated as set-aside must be of productive capacity at least equal to land on which program crops are grown in the current year. It goes on to say "In case of farms producing irrigated crops the set-aside must be on acreage which could be irrigated in the current year in

addition to crops actually irrigated with existing irrigation facilities and available water supply."

USDA officials reason that without marketing quotas and overplanting penalties with which to regulate production as under previous programs, to be effective the current program requires that acreage taken out of production as "set-aside" must be land that would otherwise have produced a normal crop.

In 1971 ASCS officials made spot checks to evaluate the quality and eligibility of land used for set-aside in 39 counties of five states. Also, the Office of the Inspector General did a "test audit" in 41 counties of seven states, and instances were disclosed where the designated set-aside was

either totally unproductive or inferior to other acreage. The disclosure of such irregularities has generally thought to be on this year's set-aside.

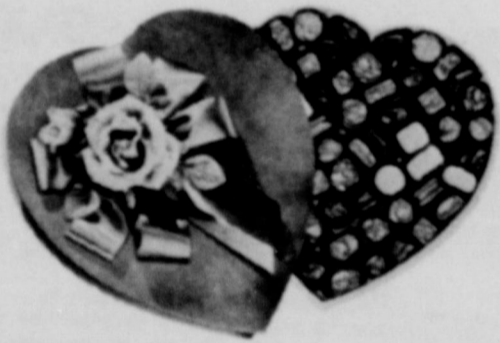

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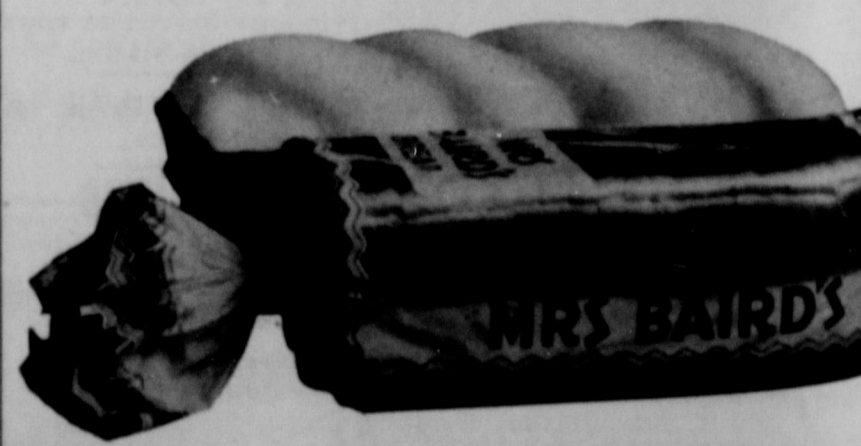
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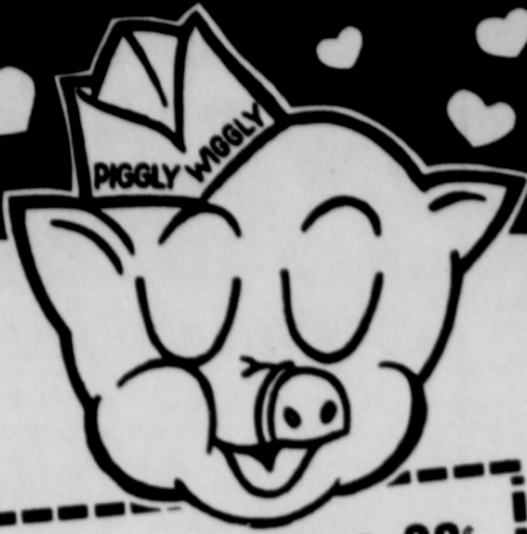

### Newspapers In Class Improve Readership

Students can become better newspaper readers by using newspapers in the classroom. This was proven by the results of a test given to more than 13,000 youngsters in junior and senior high schools.

The test was developed by Educational Testing Service of Princeton, N. J., under a grant provided by the American Newspaper Publishers Association Foundation.

The test was conducted with students in Charlotte, N. C., Peoria, Ill., and Fort Worth, Texas. The areas were chosen as representative of middle size cities in different regions served by good newspapers with active programs using newspapers in the classrooms.

Newspaper-using classes did substantially better on the tests than classes that had no newspaper-using experience. Furthermore, the test shows a consistent superiority of newspaper classes from bottom to top scores in both junior and senior high school.

## Council's Goal: To Improve Environment

**COLLEGE STATION** -- The Texas Council, an organization that first developed in 1954 and has since been continuing its efforts in nearly all phases of environmental improvement. The council is principally an advisory agency which business, industry, government and public organizations can call upon to prevent deterioration of the state's natural resources.

The council has been active for about five years and now has more than 100 members, including representatives from business, industry, government, and public organizations. The council's major goal is to improve the quality of living. Emphasis is placed on the elimination of solid waste pollution.

Jones says that any community except those six winning cities in the preceding year can enter the contest if they file reports with the council. The cities should file reports of activities for the period of January 1 through Dec. 31, 1971.

Reports of community accomplishments must be mailed to the Beautify Texas Council by March 15, 1972.

The entries will be judged in April and awards will be presented to the winners by the Governor of Texas at the annual meeting of the council June 22 in San Antonio.

Organizations sponsoring the community achievement awards program are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Department of Community Affairs, East Texas Chamber of Commerce, West Texas Chamber of Commerce, South Texas Chamber of Commerce and Lower Rio Grande Valley Chamber of Commerce.

Official entry blanks for the awards program can be obtained by writing to the Beautify Texas Council, Drawer CS, College Station, 77840. The city's population and the name and address of the individual or organization inquiring must be included.

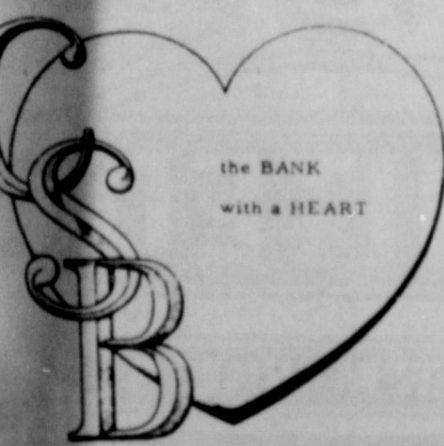
