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# Slaton's Volunteer Fire Dept. Answers 125 Calls In 1971

Slaton's Volunteer Fire Department answered 125 fire calls during the 1971 calendar year. Of these, 100 were in the city and 25 were out of city calls. Of the 25 volunteer firemen, an average of 69% responded to each call.

A breakdown of the year's calls is as follows: 50 house fires; 2 gin fires; 41 grass fires; 19 car fires; one tractor fire; 2 cotton trailer fires; seven miscellaneous calls, and three false alarms.

The report for January includes 35 calls, a record for the department. Ten calls per month is usually average, but the dry conditions and winds brought that to triple the average number. Sixteen grass fires have been reported, two smoke scares, five house fires, four cotton trailers, four fence fires, one trash fire and three false alarms were answered. Eleven of these were out of the city, according to Fire Chief Don Kendrick. He cautions persons about carelessness with grass fires. The grass is especially dry at this time of the year,

and no burning should be done without close supervision.

The Slaton Volunteer Fire Department is here to provide fire protection for the city and county. There is no charge for a fire call: that is provided by the taxes, and is city owned and maintained. The qualified men have been trained to provide emergency rescue service, and have light duty rescue equipment. The emergency equipment includes a reccesator (for breathing problems) and a portable generator for emergency lighting. The units are radio equipped, and the firemen are qualified in the administering of first aid.

The fire department is made up of men of all standings in the community, and the varied fields of their work gives them a vast field of knowledge to call on.

The organization is completely volunteer, with 25 members and five officers. Kendrick is Chief, Pete Williams, assistant chief, Skip Tumlinson, captain, Bob Kern, lieutenant, and John Richey, secretary-treasurer.

Firemen are selected by the present firemen from applications, when a vacancy occurs. When elected, the fireman is on probation for 90 days, and is then voted on again.

In the way of pay, the firemen receive \$1 per fire call they answer in the city, whether it is five minutes work or five hours. They receive no pay for out-of-city calls. Each fireman is paid \$7.50 per month by the city. This has taken the place of the free water that was formerly given them. Firemen also receive \$1 for each practice session they attend. They

furnish their own vehicles to the fire.

Each year, three men are sent to a firemen's training school at A&M for one week. They go on their own time.

Slaton's firemen spend an average of four hours a month in drills as is required by state law.

They do maintain a storm watch. They watch storms and cloud formations but only give a warning signal if the town is in eminent danger. The take cover signal is the siren blast, on and off, for three to five minutes. Fire signal is four siren blasts.

They receive no pay for the storm watches, but do this in cooperation with the local civil defense unit. This takes in the storm watch, warnings, public information, traffic control, rescue operations, the transfer of injured, welfare, and the maintenance of city government.

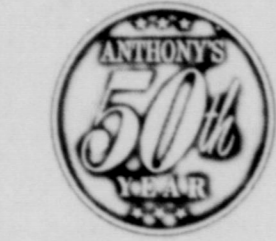
Twelve of Slaton's Volunteer Firemen are qualified to serve as attendants on ambulance runs, and are subject to calls by the police department.

Recently, the department, as a body, and at no cost to the city, to have installed and maintain a telephone warning system for firemen. They will assume 100 percent of the approximately \$1200 per year cost. With the new alarm system for the firemen, their phones will ring two short rings. If the phone is busy, a buzzer can be heard over the line. Persons should hang up the phone and then pick it up again. The resident fireman, having moments earlier recorded the location of the fire, can be heard repeating that information for five minutes. Once the phone is hung up, the phone service on that line will return to normal.

Several of the volunteers' vehicles are equipped with radio equipment and the group is in the process of buying a complete new radio system. This is another project that the volunteers have taken on themselves at no cost to the city.

Recently the city employed a second resident fireman, Brad Doherty, to assist the present resident fireman, Clyde Doherty. The new resident and his wife live in the fire station. He is 21, and is a student at Texas Tech. His wife Betty, is employed by Citizen's State Bank in Slaton.

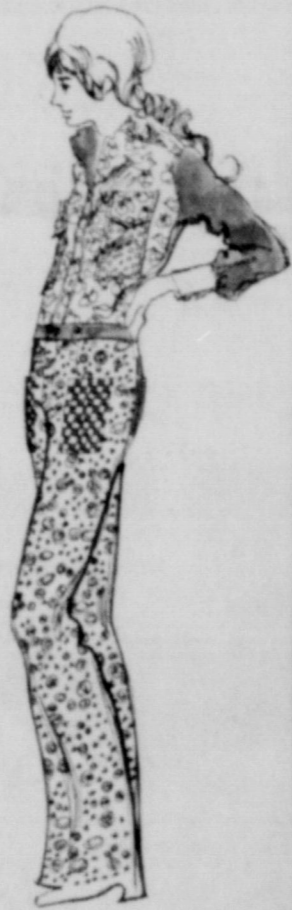

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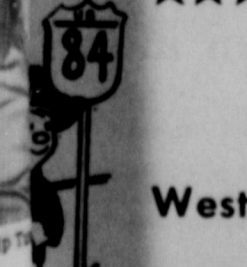
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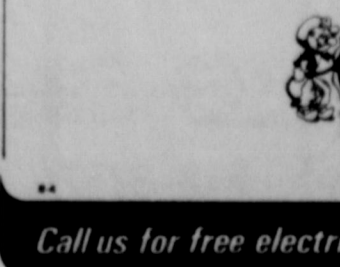

### Boat Should Be In Good Order

AUSTIN -- Warm weather is here -- at times -- and so is the season for getting out on the water.

Since it will be a great temptation for boat owners to rush off at the first hint of spring, a little preparation is in order, according to Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials.

For one thing, your boat should be registered if it is powered by anything but a paddle, oar, pole or sail. Even a canoe with an electric trolling motor and a sailboat with an auxiliary engine must be registered with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Safety equipment is another consideration. Chances are the boat's running lights need some attention. And you'll need more life jackets this year since all children 12 years old or under must be wearing a Coast Guard approved vest type preserver while the boat is underway.

Some types of fire extinguishers may need to be replaced.

And don't forget your engine. A good tune-up at home may save the misery of a stalled-out engine on the lake.

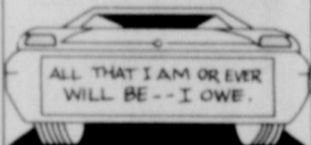
Some of the older, wooden boats should be recaulked and repainted.

Since a burned wheel bearing on your trailer could delay your trip to the water, a little preventive maintenance in this area can save you a lot of misery.

And don't forget to check the brake lights and running lights, and make sure that rust hasn't affected the structural integrity of your trailer.

While you're huddled next to the fire during these last cold days of winter, brush upon your "rules of the road" for boating. Go over in your mind what you'd do in case of an emergency. Part of enjoying any sport is knowing how to do things safely, according to department officials.

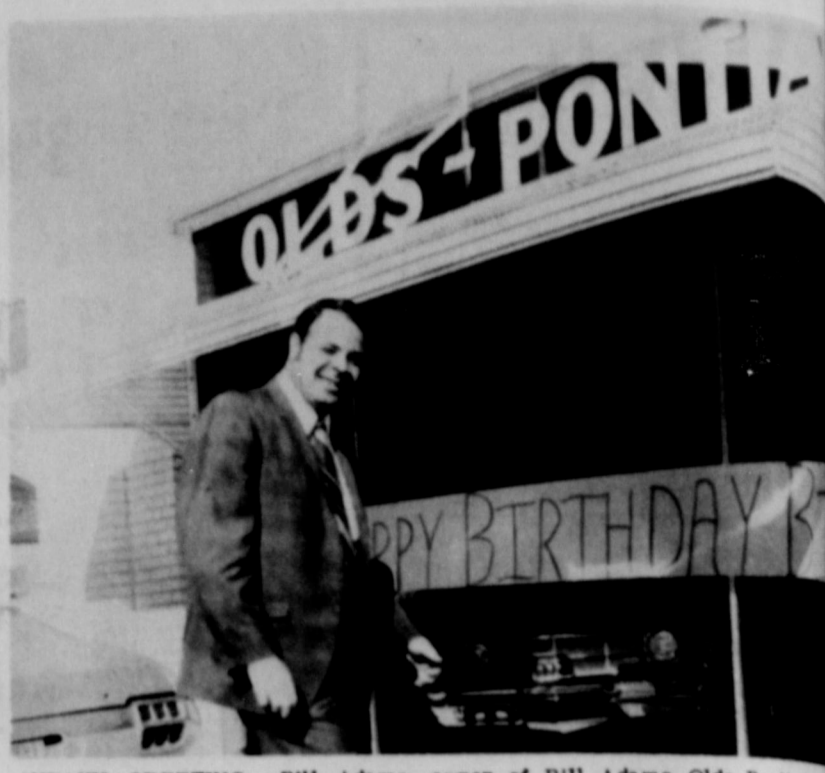

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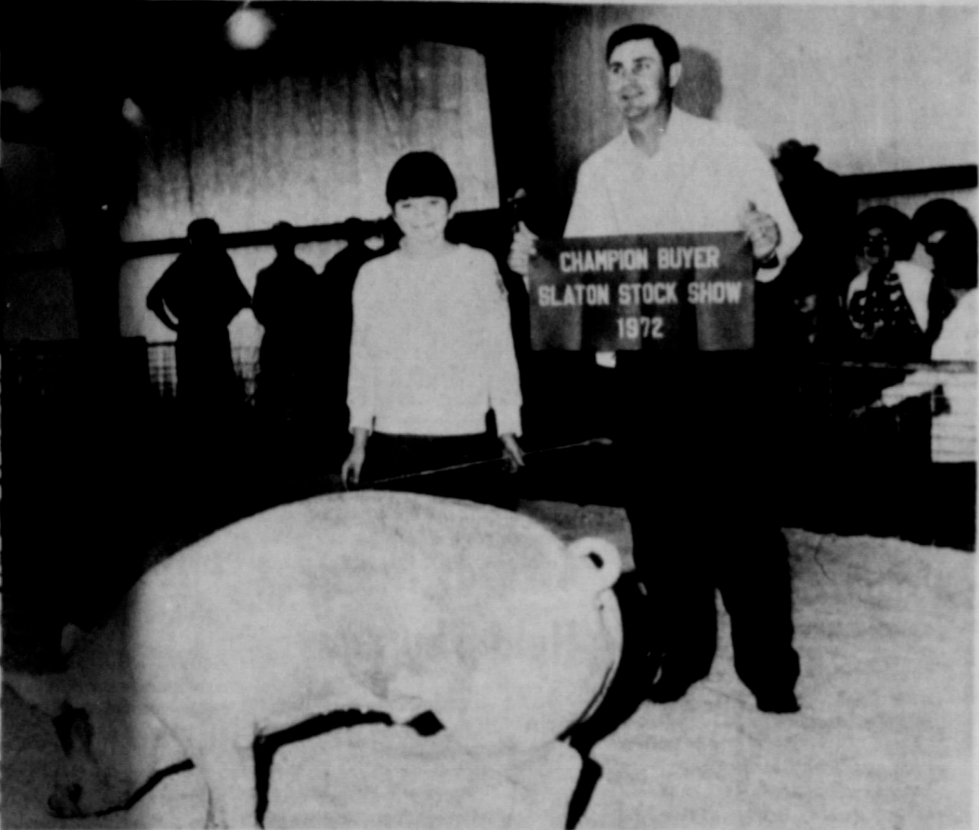

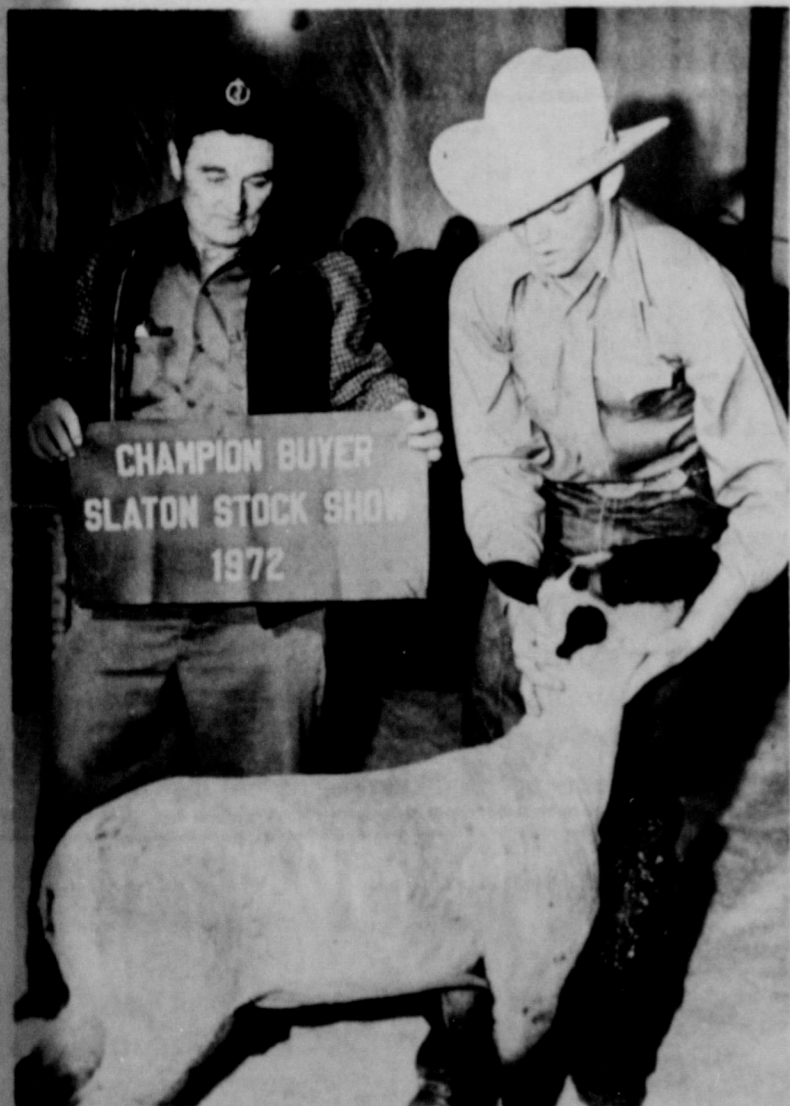
