Amendment 4 **Approval Urged** State Representative Price

Daniel Jr., this week urged all Texans, regardless of political philosophy or party affiliation, to vote Nov. 7 for Amendment 4 providing for revision of the Texas Constitution. "Modernizing our Texas

Constitution is absolutely essential if we are to make our State government more responsive to the needs of all Texans and more responsible in transacting the State's business. Constitutional revision is particularly important in our efforts to reform the legislative process," Daniel said.

"Our Texas Constitution has had to be amended more than 200 times. It now contains 53,000 words and is five times as long as the United States Constitution. Many of its archaic provisions retard, restrict and hinder, rather than encourage, the efficient and effective operation of our State government."

Amendment 4 would give the Legislature authority to establish a Constitutional Revision Commission and to convene as a Constitutional Convention in January, 1974. The Convention would then recommend changes in the Constitution and submit such proposals to the people of Texas for their approval.


