

see the possibility of a bond issue to expand Slaton High School facilities, and this could bring a tax increase in the Slaton district. But because of industrial development now underway in the district, projected to bring in an additional \$145,000 per year in taxes, school officials believe it may be possible to pay for the expansion without increasing the tax rate.

Southland School definitely must build new facilities or consolidate, because of accreditation difficulties. The school board reportedly is considering calling a bond election for \$500,000 to build a new school plant.

"The school board is not for consolidation," Simmons said Tuesday, confirming a stand expressed by Board President Spence Bevers in an interview with the Post Dispatch last week. According to the Dispatch story, Bevers saidhe was personally opposed to the consolidation move with Slaton and would fight it.

Simmons, who pointed out that Southland School enrollment, now 150, is up about 40 over last year, said "if they'll give me the same rate as Slaton, I'll have as good or better school than Slaton."

"The most we have in any classroom is 18, and some Slaton classes have about 35 in them. . . It just makes sense that you can teach 18 students

better than you can 35." Simmons said publicity on the consolidation election had killed Southland's chances of getting into an 8-man football district

next season. The petition for consolidation was first initiated in Southland district. "We think the districts should be consolidated, because otherwise we're going to have to build a new school, and our taxes will be jumped away up," said one Southland woman with

school-age children. Another mentioned Slaton's band, athletic and vocational programs as being a factor in favor of combining the districts.

Each school administrative office has prepared a sheet of figures on the assessed values on land, and these are available to any interested party. Southland's sheet projects a tax rate of \$1.80 per \$100 valuation if a bond issue should be passed.

A school district may not vote more than 7 per cent of its assessed valuation without invoking Senate Bill 116. Since Southland's assessed valuation is \$4,800,000, according to Simmons, the \$500,000 would be much higher, and would require that the district's voters approve SB 116. Operation under this law stipulates that at least 50 cents of the tax rate be applied to debt retirement. Southland school officials reportedly are considering an even higher portion for debt retirement, but even with 50 cents set aside, this would leave just \$1.30 on which to operate the school. Presently the school is being operated on \$1.40, which means the school would have to raise more money in some manner.

Simmons admitted the possibility that both the consolidation election and the bond election could be defeated. "If that should happen, we'll just have to try the bond election again," he said.

At any rate, it appears that Southland district's approximately 200 voters may get quite a workout at the polls. In addition to the consolidation vote March 31, there's the possible bond vote if consolidation fails, and an election for trustees scheduled April 7.
