It appears fairly certain that Slaton district patrons will vote for consolidation, with the only

question apparently being in the minds of some that consolidation would force Slaton into a Class AAA category with the Interscholastic League. However, regardless of the outcome of the consolidation election, Slaton will be moving into that class in 1974, unless the qualifying membership figure is

changed.
"We in the Slaton school system feel that consolidation would be advantageous to students of both Southland and Slaton districts," said J. C. McClesky, Slaton School superintendent. "The combined resources of both districts could make possible a broader pro-

gram offering more to the youngsters than either district could provide separately."
At a Slaton school board meeting last week it was noted that all Southland teachers and administrators' contracts must be honored if consolidation carries, and it was indicated that contracts would be extended for all qualified personnel.

tion of \$22,146,735. The district's assessed valuation has grown, showing a gain in the Slaton tax value over the past four years without increasing either the tax rate or the valuation formula. In 1969 the total was \$18,878,820, with a tax roll of \$330,385.65. In 1972 it reached the \$22.1 million figure, with a tax roll of \$387,590.22.

A comparison of present tax rates paid in the two districts shows that Slaton residents pay \$1.75 per \$100 valuation, with 50 cents of that figure set aside for debt retirement. Southland pays \$1.50 per \$100 valuation, with 10 cents set up to retire a small debt of \$8,000, half of which is scheduled to be paid off next month, according to Southland School Supt. Ray Simmons.

Slaton's school district has a bonded indebtedness of \$925,000, which is 4.2 per cent of the district's assessed valua-

Slaton school officials foresee the possibility of a bond issue to expand Slaton High School facilities, and this could bring a tax increase in the Slaton district. But because of industrial development now underway in the district, projected to bring in an additional \$145,000 per year in taxes, school officials believe it may be possible to pay for the expansion without increasing the tax rate.

Southland School definitely must build new facilities or consolidate, because of accreditation difficulties. The school board reportedly is considering calling a bond election for \$500,000 to build a new school plant.

"The school board is not for consolidation," Simmons said Tuesday, confirming a stand expressed by Board President Spence Bevers in an interview with the Post Dispatch last week. According to the Dispatch story, Bevers said he was personally opposed to the consolidation move with Slaton and would fight it.

Simmons, who pointed out that Southland school enrollment, now 150, is up about 40 over last year, said "if they'll give me the same rate as Slaton, I'll have as good or better school than Slaton."

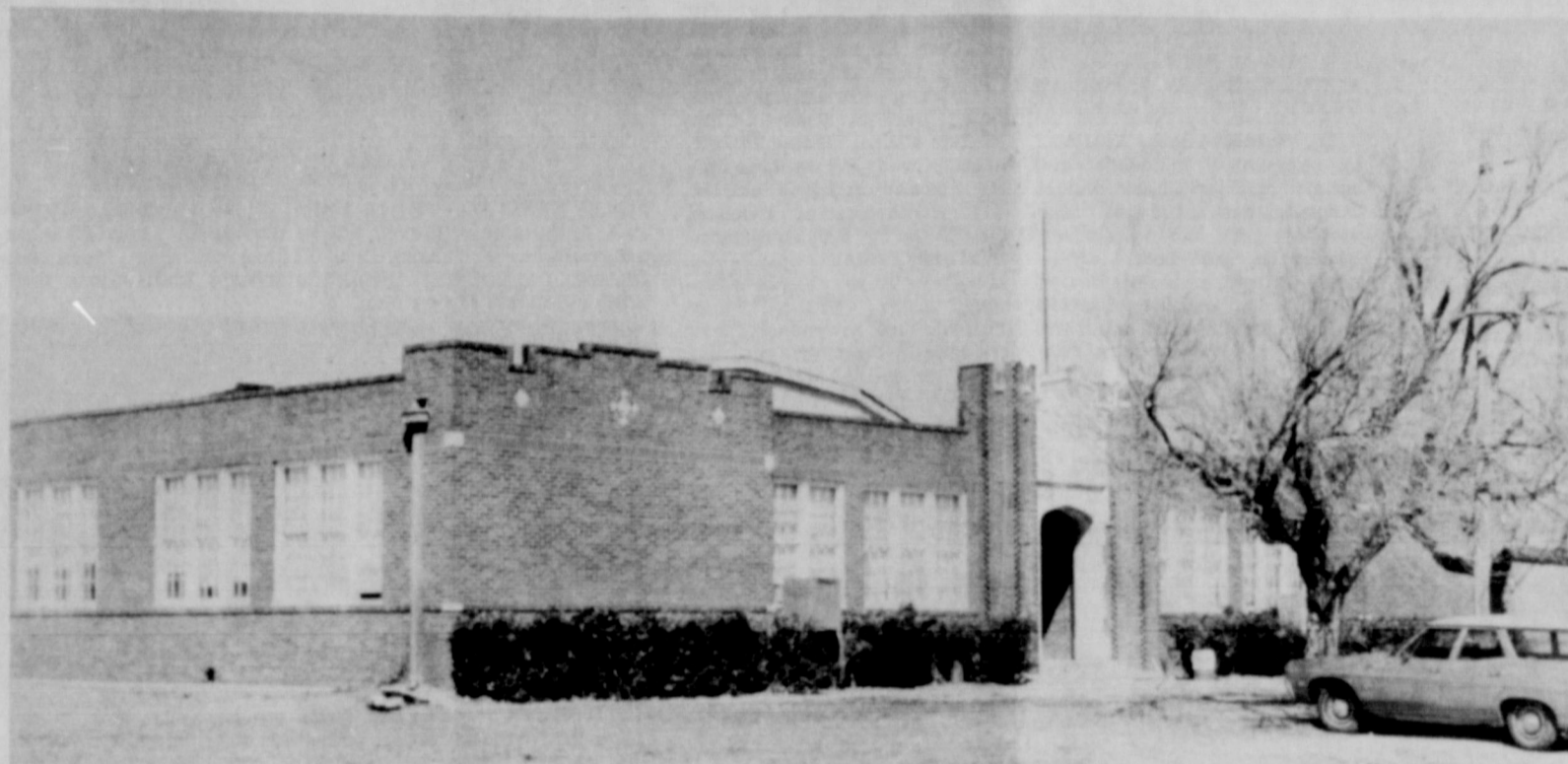
"The most we have in any classroom is 18, and some Slaton classes have about 35 in them. . . It just makes sense that you can teach 15 students better than you can 35."
Simmons said publicly on the consolidation election had killed Southland's chances of getting into an 8-man football district next season.

The petition for consolidation was first initiated in Southland district. "We think the districts should be consolidated, because otherwise we're going to have to build a new school, and our taxes will be jumped away up," said one Southland woman with school-age children.

Another mentioned Slaton's band, athletic and vocational programs as being a factor in favor of combining the districts. Each school administrative office has prepared a sheet of figures on the assessed values on land, and these are available to any interested party. Southland's sheet projects a tax rate of \$1.80 per \$100 valuation if a bond issue should be passed.

A school district may not vote more than 7 per cent of its assessed valuation without invoking Senate Bill 116. Since Southland's assessed valuation is \$4,800,000, according to Simmons, the \$500,000 would be much higher, and would require that the district's voters approve SB 116. Operation under this law stipulates that at least 50 cents of the tax rate be applied to debt retirement. Southland school officials reportedly are considering an even higher portion for debt retirement, but even with 50 cents set aside, this would leave just \$1.30 on which to operate the school. Presently the school is being operated on \$1.40, which means the school would have to raise more money in some manner.

Simmons admitted the possibility that both the consolidation election and the bond election could be defeated. "If that should happen, we'll just have to try the bond election again," he said.
At any rate, it appears that Southland district's approximately 200 voters may get quite a workout at the polls. In addition to the consolidation vote March 31, there's the possible bond vote if consolidation fails, and an election for trustees scheduled April 7.

Hospital Trustees Selected

Three trustees for Slaton Hospital Memorial Foundation, Inc., were elected by that organization's board of governors which held its annual meeting last Thursday.

Chosen as trustees replacing R. C. Hall Jr. and the late Dr. M. Jay McSweeney were Mrs. B. H. Crandall and Steve Smith. A third trustee whose term had expired, Harvey Morton, was re-elected. Holdover trustees are Bill Sewell, chairman, T. J. Wallace, Wilford Nesbitt and Alex Bednarz.

The board of governors also re-elected all of its officers, including Howard Hoffman, president; L. A. Harral, vice president; and Earl Bartley, secretary.

Organized to keep Mercy Hospital operating in Slaton, the foundation has sponsored a fund campaign with a goal of \$70,000 in contributions to revamp the facility to meet necessary standards. It was noted that about half that amount has been raised, and that a renewed campaign effort is planned soon to raise the balance.

Hospital Administrator Philip McDonald gave a report on the last year's operation of the hospital, observing that "the performance and aims recorded in this report are indicative of our continued stability, growth and expansion of service to the patients in this community."
It was noted that actual construction work on renovation of the hospital is expected to begin soon.

Mrs. C. O. Buxkemper, president of the Mercy Hospital Auxiliary, reported on that group's activities during the last year.

101,395 Bales Are Ginned In Area

A whopping 101,395 bales of cotton have been ginned in the Slaton vicinity this season, as the Slatonite took its final count this week, although some gins still were operating in this, the latest ginning season in history. Those gins which still are ginning estimated how many bales they would wind up with, knowing the situation of their own customers. The total for

this season is much higher than last year's low output, and the highest in many years. Farm observers noted that a tremendous crop could have been harvested had snow and wet weather not persisted.
Gins in the area gave totals as follows: Slaton Co-Op, 25,000; Farmers Gin of Slaton, 5,400; Posey Gin 4,300; Union Co-Op Gin 6,910; Acuff Co-Op Gin 17,700; Wilson Co-Op Gin 8,400; Hackberry Co-Op Gin 7,000; McClung Co-Op Gin 7,174; Basinger Gin 3,868; Wayside Gin 6,400; Gatzki Gin 3,050; Gordon Gin 2,540; Campbell Gin 2,623.

Samples from 36,000 bales were tested and classed at the

Lubbock office during the week ending Friday, March 16. This brought the total classed for the season to 1,888,000 bales.

Grades of cotton were about the same as the previous week. Low Middling Light Spotted (52) was the predominant grade, making up 23 percent of all cotton classed. Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) made up 20 percent, Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) 10 percent and Low Middling Spotted (53) 12 percent.

Average staple length also was about the same as the previous week. Staples were

predominantly 30 to 32. Thirty-one percent had a staple length of 30, 32 percent stapled 31 and 19 percent was 32.

Micronaire readings were lower as the harvest neared completion. Only 8 percent of all cotton classed at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 through 4.9, 7 percent "miked" 3.3 through 3.4, 25 percent was 3.0 through 3.2, 35 percent 2.7 through 2.9 and 25 percent was 2.6 and below.

The Agricultural Marketing Service of the USDA reported active trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were \$2.50 to \$5.00 per bale higher. Prices ranged from \$2.50 per bale over the loan for low grade, low micronaire cotton up to \$60.00 per bale over the loan for high grade, premium micronaire cotton.

Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronaire range were: Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 30 - 27.30 cents per pound, Strict Low Middling pound, Strict Low Middling Light Spotted (42) staple 31 - 27.70, Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) staple 30 - 22.00, Strict Low Middling Spotted (43) staple 31 - 22.30, Strict Low Middling Tinged (44) staple 30 - 18.35 and Strict Low Middling Tinged (44) staple 31 - 18.45.
