SCHOOLS BEGIN MONDAY-WILL YOU HELP SCHOOL AUTHORITIES?

The Slaton School Board has been on the job all Summer engaged in repairing old buildings and erecting a modern new ward building, and trying to devise ways and means to give the children of the Slaton Independent School District an opportunity to secure a high school education. If they had drawn pay for all the time they have put in at this business the cost to the schools would have reached into thousands of dollars. But they have worked and given time and thought to school affairs with only one obin view-to put within reach of the children an opportunity to improve themselves.

School will start next Monday, and it's now up to the parents of the children. If they will work as faithfully and as unselfishly, and take everything that comes up as cheerfully as the Board has done, and try to co-operate in every way with the Board and Faculty, then we can hope for a realy successful school term.

Four things make up a successful school: The Board, the Faculty, the Children and the Parents and greatest of these is the parents. So parents, if you are interested in a good school get on the job and STAY ON THE JOB.

WILL GOVERNMENT AUTHORITIES EVER LOWER THE TAX RATE?

And so the State tax rate goes to the limit. It was 26 cents last year and will be 75 cents this year. The march of taxes is ever upward. The people have long looked forward to the time when government would be so perfect and so economically administered that taxes would not be burdensome, but this is a dream that will never be realized. Just as the expenses of the home increase, even so do the expenses of the State grow. We may as well settle down to the truth that taxes will not be lowered, and hustle and pray that we may be able to pay the State, County and Municipality what they assess against us.

LUBBOCK'S LOW TAX RATE AND CHEAP ELECTRIC POWER

Lubbock, Sept. 4 .- The mayor and city commission met August 25th in the city offices and fixed the tax rate for Lubbock, making the same rate as we had last year of \$1.25 on the hundred. The revenue from the municipal light plant will be approximately \$65,000, with fuel of \$12,000 and salaries of all city officers in all the departments of \$27,000.00. which will leave a net income, after extension of lines, etc. of approximately \$26,000.00.

The city of Lubbock has one of the best municipal light plants in the State of Texas, with a maximum rate of 10c per k. w. h., graduating to a 5c rate, according to the amount of "juice" used. They have a power rate of 2c per k. w. h., and a cooking rate of 4c. In excess of 200 of only 3c per k. w. h.

The excellent showing the municipal light plant has made shows that the financial end has been taken care of by the city commission, which shows them to be business men. With Martin S. Ruby as city manager, Lubbock is assured of not only cheap rates but excellent service.

AUTHORITIES ON TRAIL OF BIG WHITE SLAVE GANG

Raids in Chicago, Milwaukee, Min-neapolis and St. Paul are expected as carlton Simon, special deputy police commissioner of New York, by a young Chicago woman of good family, who swears she was forced into a life of white slavery through drug englevement. slavement.

Hundreds of girls have fallen vic-tims, she said, to a brand of drug vendors and white slave traffickers operating in a number of cities and hav-ing headquarters in Chicago and New York. Four New York arrests have been made made in the case.

Dr. Simon says the young woman questioned in New York revealed methods of the gang and other information which it is believed will result in wholesale arrests. Barber shops which specialize in bobbing hair for girls are used as blinds for the which slavery and narcotic traffic of the gang.

The girl customers, after one or more visits to such a barber shop, are introduced to a woman known in the underworld parlance as the "gray hawk." The "gray hawk," posing as a kindly intentione dmiddle-aged woman, ingratiates herself with intendd victim and invites her to all night in her company. When the intended victim falls asleep, heroin, the most exciting of all drugs, is administered and under its influence the girl is persuaded to live a life of drug enchantment.



No severe storms are expected during balance of September; material cropweather changes cannot be expected when no severe storms are in sight. About the same kind of weather for About the same kind of weather for next thirty days may be expected as occurred the past thirty. In at least one-half of North America the kind of crops to put in for next year is of greater than usual importance, and the success or failure of crops in other countries has much to do in determining what crops should be cultivated. mining what crops should be cultivated in North America.

Condensed Forecasts: This bulletin

is for section 5 (see my sectional map), and the condensed forecasts are in the paragraph beginning with the numeral 5. The average temperatures of the warm and cool waves are given separately, and they make the total average above or below normal; the latter word means the average for for-

ty years.
Section 1: Highest emperatures
Sept. 18 and 23; average baout normal; lowest 21 and 25; average above; total warmer than usual; no severe storms; less rain than the average of past three months.

Sec. 6: Highest temperatures 22 and 28; average above; lowest 25 and 30; average above; total average warmer than usual; moisture will continue near average of past two months; no severe storms; no hurri-

Sec. 2: Highest temperatures 20 and 25; average about normal; lowest 23 and 27; average above; total average warmer than usual; moisture less than average of season; no severe

Sec. 7: Highest temperatures 16 and 21; average near normal; lowest 19 and 23; average above; total warmer thna usual; a little more moisture than the average of the past month; no severe storms.

3: Lowest temperatures 15 and 25; average about normal; highest 20 and 30; average about normal; moisture a little better than for past month; no severe storms.

Sec. 8: Highest temperatures 19 and 24; average about normal; lowest 22 and 27; average about normal; to-tal near normal; a little better moisture than for last thirty days; no severe storms.

Sec. 4: Lowest temperatures 18 and 23; average normal; highest 20 and 26; average normal; total average normal; moisture near ten-year average; no severe storms.

Sec. 5: Lowest temperatures and 23; average above; highest 20 and 26; average above; total warmer than usual; no severe storms; no hurricanes; moisture near average of ast two months.
