

MUSICIANS' DISCORD

James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, has been charged with building up the welfare fund for unemployed musicians at the expense of the rights of performing artists. This charge was made by the Hollywood, Cal., local. Second largest and one of the wealthiest in the AFM, it is a major contributor to the welfare account.

Contracts with music recording businesses provide that recording artists will pay percentages directly into this fund, which is used by unemployed musicians whether they contribute or not. Hollywood musicians, because of association with movies, television and radio, receive few welfare benefits. Of this they do not complain, but they do claim that during the past two years \$3,000,000 of theirs has been channelled to the fund at the expense of helping employed musicians whom they believe the union should also be representing. They further say that Petrillo has diverted about \$275,000 into a pension fund which benefits only union administrators.

The basis of their argument applies to all union organizations. When unions maintain large welfare funds which are controlled by a few people, some form of accounting is needed which will assure members that this money is being used for their benefit and not to build up the wealth, power and interests of selected individuals. Unless union officials voluntarily provide such accountings, they may eventually be forced to do so by law, because such funds are too large to be treated as private property.

THE MISSILES ARGUMENT

The recurrent argument as to whether our armed forces ought to be moving faster in development of long-range missiles is at a high pitch again. The average man has a tremendous stake in the outcome.

Much of the debate revolves about this question: Are we ahead of Russia, or is Russia ahead of us? The question is important, and it serves to dramatize the matter. But in a sense it is an academic question, because both the United States and Russia are making rapid progress and will soon possess that terrible weapon, the intercontinental ballistics missile.

Actually, whether we or the Russians have the edge is not the most important thing. Russia is not going to rush into war immediately on achieving this weapon, nor would our possession of it be a final deterrent against aggression.

The really essential aspect is that the intercontinental ballistics missile will soon be reality. When it comes, it will be able to transport a hydrogen bomb warhead some 5,000 miles in about half an hour. For practical purposes, warning time will be reduced to almost zero.

Once such missiles are unleashed, it will not much matter who had them first. The vital thing is for all men of good will to work more devotedly than ever, aware of this terrible new weapon and its potential menace, to ease tension and move away from the verge of disaster.

FOLKLORE OF THE '50'S

Stories of gold and silver rushes in the days when the West was wild and woolly are still a source of excitement, but they've not obscured the scene of contemporary adventure for uranium prospectors. The mule and horse have given way to the automobile. The pick-ax has been supplanted by the geiger counter. But the elements of chance and excitement are still the same.

Uranium has world-wide implications. It affects the international balance of power in terms of bombs and technological aid to other nations. Furthermore, it is a source of great riches. It has made men wealthy overnight. And supplementing old yarns of gold and silver, new ones are in the making of those who've lost all in a fruitless search.

It may be a while before adventure writers catch the excitement of uranium hunts, but one day the jeep, the geiger counter and uranium may produce as many tales as the pick-ax the mule and the gold. Tomorrow's children may look back wistfully to the exciting old days of ticking counters and the uranium strikes of the 1950s.

Government Rain Gage Often Called Too Conservative

E. L. Brosch who lives about one and half miles southeast of Slaton is probably the only man in the area who gets a razzing every time it rains. Brosch operates an official government rain gage and he reports that his gage usually records less rainfall than the smaller gages which his neighbors have.

Following a rain he gets a lot of kidding from the other rain gage users for having a conservative gage. To defend himself Brosch writes from a trade publication "The Observer" which is put out by the United States Weather Bureau.

The publication states that the smaller "fence post" gages showed a tendency to catch about 8 to 10 per cent more rainfall than the regular weather bureau gage, especially when light rain showers occurred. When heavier rains fell the comparison between the small and the standard gage is somewhat better.

Brosch's gage holds about 24 inches of rain and is recognized by the weather bureau as the official measurement for the community.

The small gages on the neighbors' farms would more than likely give more representative reading for a particular farm in spite of its tendency to record more rain than the official gage, according to "The Observer."

Methodist Church Holding Television Program Series

The Methodist Church of Slaton is helping launch a new national television program, "The Way," according to the Rev. J. B. Sprangler, pastor of the First Methodist Church.

He said the first weekly program in a series of half-hour dramas is to be telecast by station KUB-TV on Sundays at 1 p. m. The initial program is entitled "An Eye For An Eye."

Released through the National Council of Churches, the series is a sectarian and will be carried on more than 100 television stations as a public service feature.

The programs are aimed at demonstrating the power and content of Christian love in dramatic, "life situations," Rev. Sharp said. "They should appeal to all groups," he added.

"The Way" was produced by the Methodist Radio and Film Commission as a project of the denominational "television ministry" authorized by the Methodist Council of Churches.

Methodist Churches across the country are contributing to a special fund established to produce "The Way" and other television programs, according to Rev. Sharp.

Local Resident Tells of Events While in Costa Rica, Mexico

"The busiest time of my life was the time we lived in Chihuahua City, Mexico," says Mrs. Wilson Ross. "For at that time I was 'mother' to 20 boys ranging in ages from nine to twenty.

This seems rather unusual until you realize that the Rosses are missionaries to the Spanish speaking people and were stationed at a student home in that city. This is just one of many rewarding and interesting experiences they have had since becoming foreign missionaries.

Attend Hardin-Simmons

At the time Jimmie Meek, Mrs. Ross' maiden name, met her husband they were both students at Hardin-Simmons University. She knew that he was going to be a preacher but at that time they did not realize they were to go into mission work, although she says it is a most happy life.

They were married while the Rev. Ross was a student at Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Ft. Worth. He was pastor of Gene Autry, Okla. and at a Ft. Worth church before going to Costa Rica to language school for 10 months. This was in August of 1950.

Lived in Costa Rica

Jimmie says Costa Rica is a beautiful semi-tropical country with the average temperature 72 degrees the year around. It is called "the land of eternal spring." Flowers bloomed constantly with an abundance of rainfall. She could tell very little difference in the rainy and dry season although the people told her it was unusual for it to rain during the dry season as it did while they were there.

The language school they attended was a Presbyterian school which was attended by missionaries of all denominations. They studied Spanish four and one half hours a day. They studied grammar, conversation and phonetics.

Practically all of their instructors at the school were Latins. The Rosses were told by their teachers not to feel complimented when congratulated on their excellent Spanish by those who had used the language all their lives, but when the Latins said nothing about their Spanish, they were to feel that their accent was really good.

Two Ross Children

The Ross children are Becky, who is six and a half and was 9 months old when they went to Costa Rica, and Judy, who is three and a half and was born in Mexico. Judy learned to speak Spanish and English as she learned to talk. The children understood some Spanish while they lived in Mexico but of course have forgotten most of it.

While living at the students' home in Chihuahua City, Mrs. Ross and her husband had to take care of the boys' money for them, look after their clothes and keep them repaired. These boys, who lived in the home, were from localities for the most part who did not have secondary schools and had to room and board away from home.

They attended the public schools, but were afforded a Christian atmosphere in the student home. The Mexican schools have an average of one holiday every two weeks and the students in the home loved picnics and outings on those days.

Taramari Indians

Jimmie says one of the most interesting groups of people she saw while living there were the Taramari Indians, who came down out of the mountains when there was a drought, to beg. They were very primitive and either had on old sandals made of old automobile tires or were barefooted. The men wore loin cloths made of a khaki and the women wore full-gathered skirts, one on top of the other. As the outside one became dirty it was taken off and discarded. Some kind of an old blouse completed their costume. On one occasion she looked up to see one of the Indian men standing at her kitchen window with his hand extended asking for tortillas."

On leaving Chihuahua City they were moved to Torronon, Coahuila, where the Rev. Ross was field missionary. He was never a pastor

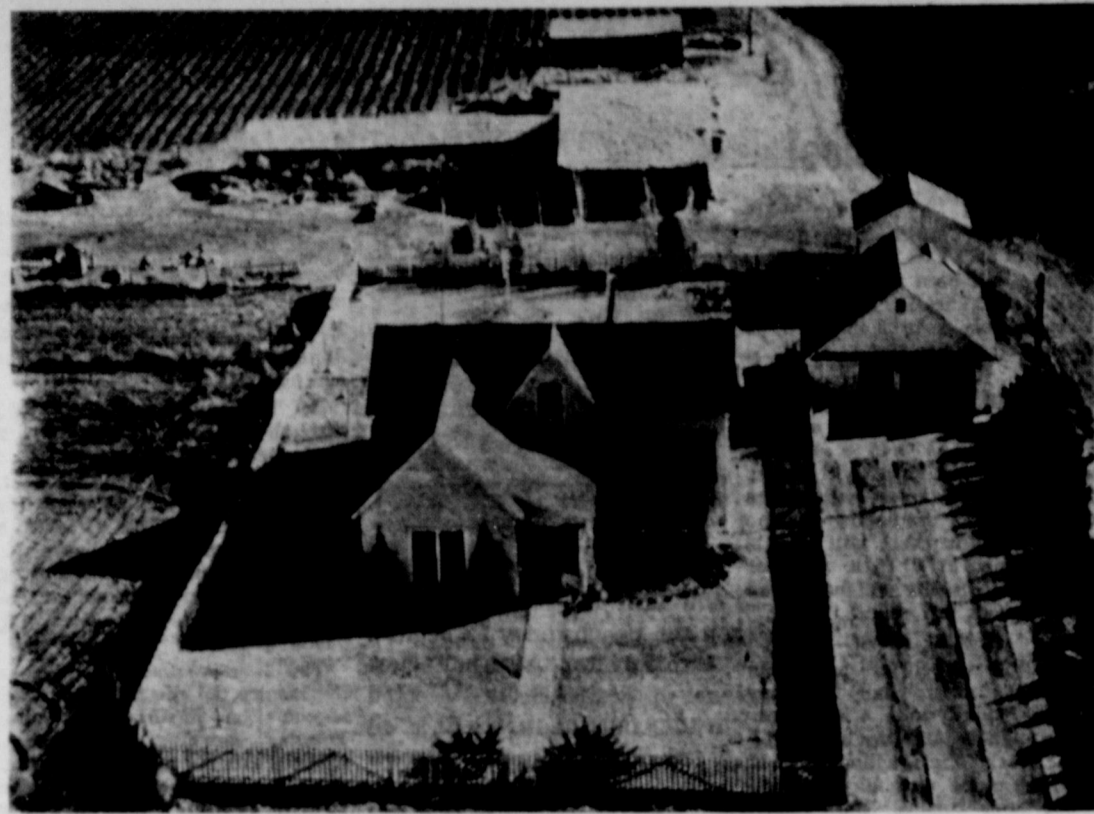

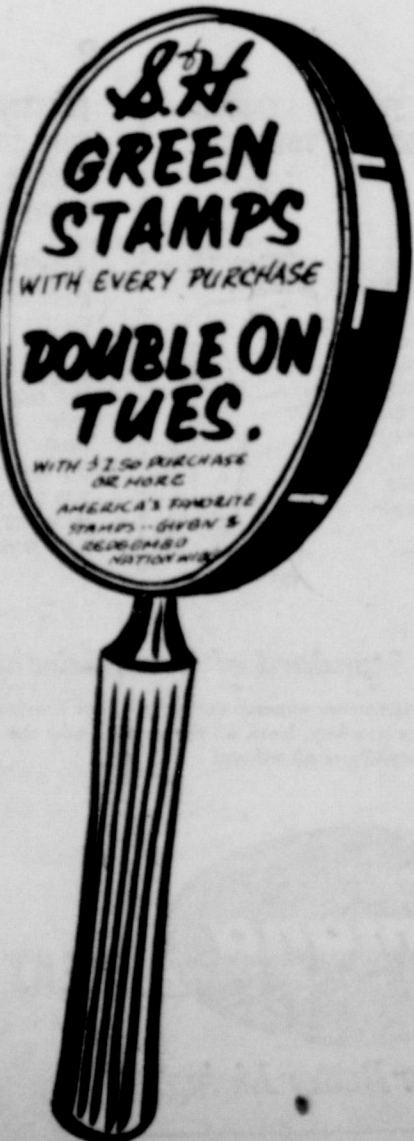

Atomic Bomb Slides Shown To Rotarians

"Before and After" pictures of the damage that occurs from an atomic bomb on electric service was shown to the Rotary Club Thursday noon. John Schmidt was in charge of the program.

Melvin Kunkel presented Arlie Hudson, division manager of the Southwestern Public Service Co., who gave a very interesting talk along with the pictures. A test was made on the testing ground of New Mexico on what a town can expect in the way of electric service if one of these bombs were dropped.

"Public services pride themselves on continuity of service," said Mr. Hudson. To prove that they can give this service under the most extreme difficulties is why the tests were made, he explained. The effect of the bomb on ordinary electric poles and wires was shown. Also the results if steel towers were used. The pictures showed that the thin steel structures were damaged very little, while the wooden poles and wooden crossbars were damaged.

The tests proved that electric service could be restored quickly to all areas except directly under the explosion itself.
